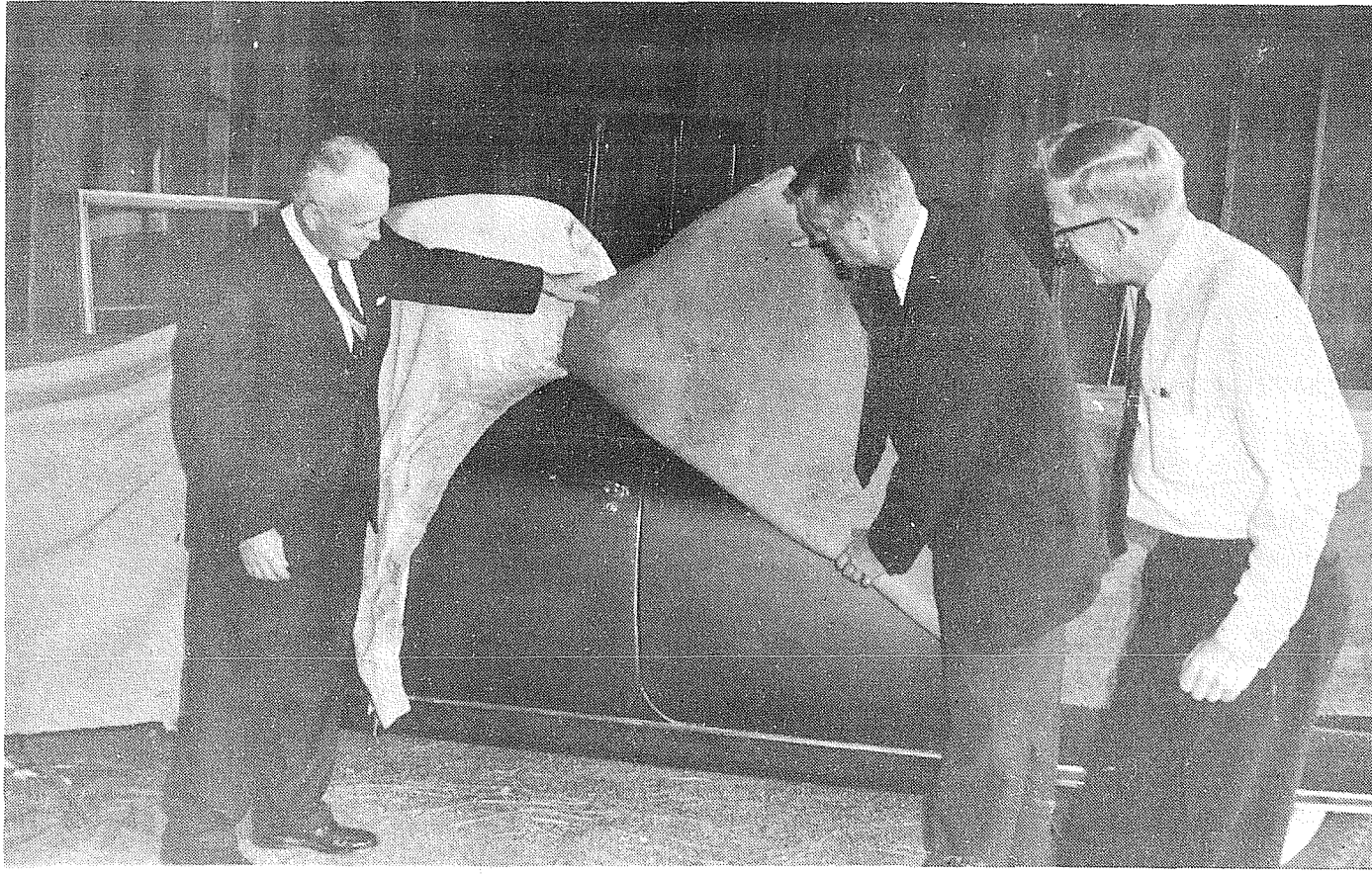

Famous Car To Be Exhibited At Stores

The Times Journal Publishing Company and the Thriftway organization announced this week that the two firms had agreed on exclusive exhibit rights for the Northwest grocery firm for the display of the former presidential staff car acquired recently by Jack Brown.

Soon to be displayed at Thriftway stores throughout the Northwest, the car was President Eisenhower's parade car and staff vehicle, used at state functions.

The only one of its kind, the gray '60 Cadillac, reportedly cost the taxpayers \$18,000. The car did not come off a showroom floor, having many features which are custom-made.

The car had been displayed only in Florida and for a short time in Chicago before it was purchased by the Times Journal Publishing Company. The price has not been disclosed but a 1927 Curtiss Robin (sister ship to the plane "Wrong Way" Corrigan flew across the Atlantic) and a sum of cash were swapped for the auto.

As far as is known, this ex-presidential vehicle is the only one which has escaped the collectors of such autos.

One of the first stores which will display the Cadillac will be the K & W Thriftway (formerly Stan's) in Lakewood.

The proposed bonds will not add anything to the general tax rolls, it has been pointed out. The bonds, if authorized, will be paid out of revenues to the district, if the affected property owners approve the construction.

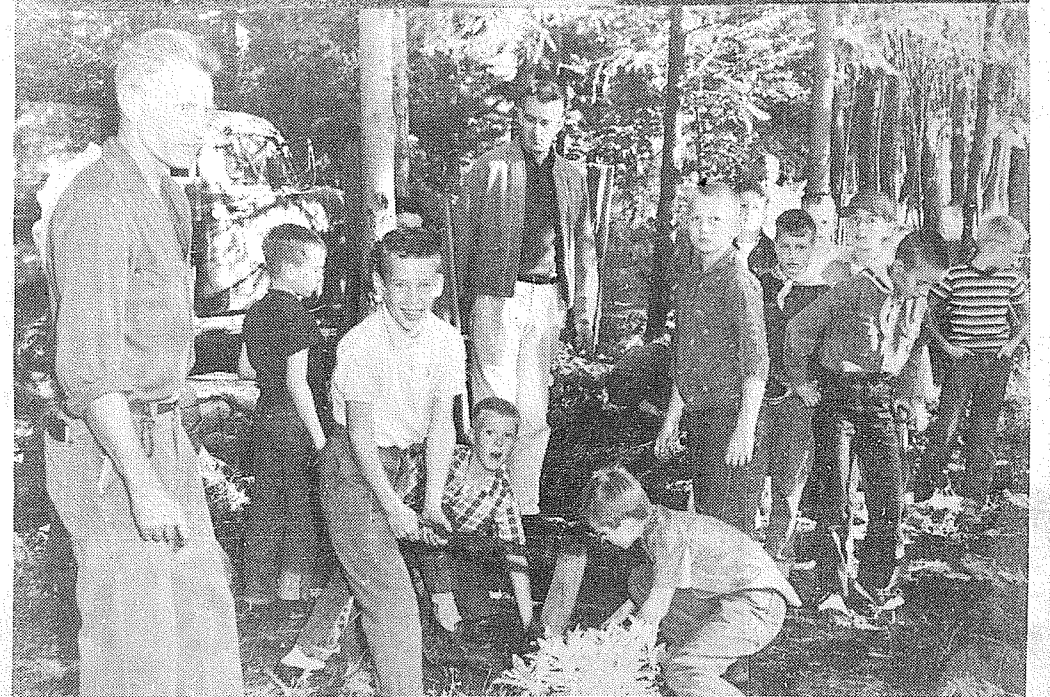
Lawrence Armstrong, one of the District commissioners, has stated that, if the bonds are approved, the district still must obtain approval of the affected property owners before any construction can be started.

The Spanaway 49ers and Franklin Pierce both wound up on the short end of the score in last Sundays Pierce County Pee Wee league games. The 49ers bowed to the Lakewood Warriors 21-0 while Franklin Pierce was losing a hard fought game to Fircrest 13-0. In other league action the Lakewood Bears and McChord Jaguars ended in a 0-0 tie.

The Warriors grabbed an early lead when Tom Munhoven rambled 8 yards to score the first Warrior touchdown in the second period. David Melby then increased the winners margin by scooting 6 yards to rack up a second TD. Then in the closing minutes of the fourth quarter Melby picked off a 49er interception and returned it 35 yards to score the final touchdown for the Warriors. The 49ers had a couple of scoring opportunities but fumbles proved costly to the losers. The Franklin Pierce eleven ran up against Fircrest, last years champ and dropped their first game of the season until the final five minutes of the contest. At this point Phil Kuhl shifty Fircrest halfback rambled 25 yards to pay dirt and Mike Bartlett plunged for the extra point to sew up the contest for the winner.

praise on the fine running ability of young Arick.



a - Wondering and a - Wandering ...

With Jack Brown

Your Growing Garden

Harriet Kennedy

Many of you have already begun your fall planting but there is still time to start from scratch. The recent rains after a dry, though often cloudy, summer are a welcome aid to planting. As yet, though, there has not been enough rainfall to penetrate sufficiently deep enough to loosen soil when lifting out plants, nor thoroughly deep enough to provide the soil moisture needed for planting. Even with rain the garden hose and a watering can are essential for these activities. Also, during the first few days, when plants are getting established in their new beds, water and shade must be provided for them unless it is definitely raining.

The second step is preparing a planting mix which can be blended in a wheelbarrow. Blend together screened compost that contains as many earthworm egg capsules as possible. Add plenty of fine ground natural rock agricultural miners, and kelp meal. Peat Moss, sawdust, leaf mold may be added. This mix is then blended with the soil from the holes dug for the new plants.

All bulbs and bare roots should be dusted with the minerals and the plant roots should be dusted with the minerals and the plant roots spread out. Both minerals and kelp meal will help bulbs and plants resist transplant shock, freezing, and heaving out during winter weather. Then too, our winters are so mild here that plants seldom go through a complete dormancy, they need this kind of nourishment to develop strong healthy root growth resistant to weather changes.

Set the base of bulbs in a handful of sand. The planting mix goes below the bulbs where the roots will grow. Because kelp has a tendency to repel rodents an extra proportion of kelp meal around the root zone line often helps save bulbs. Ample space should be allocated to plants according to the room they will need for full growth. This is why the holes should be dug deep and wide and filled with long lasting fertilizers used in the planting mix. The depth encourages root penetration. Filling the entire hole with the mix provides nourishment for the top feeder roots.

Another advantage to digging a deep hole is to find out if there is any underlying hard pan that may prevent proper drainage. No plant can stand it's roots being water-logged. Hard pan should be broken up and gravel added. Fresh compost with lots of earthworms, especially egg capsules, will help break up soil particles.

If you're moving established plants to a new area it's a good idea to root prune. Get under the plant far enough to sever the far end of the tap root too. This should be done several months in advance but at least a few days or weeks before moving. Take as much soil with them as possible, saturating it with water containing the minerals and liquid seaweed. Tops should then be pruned back by about 1/3, or a bit more. Over pruning
