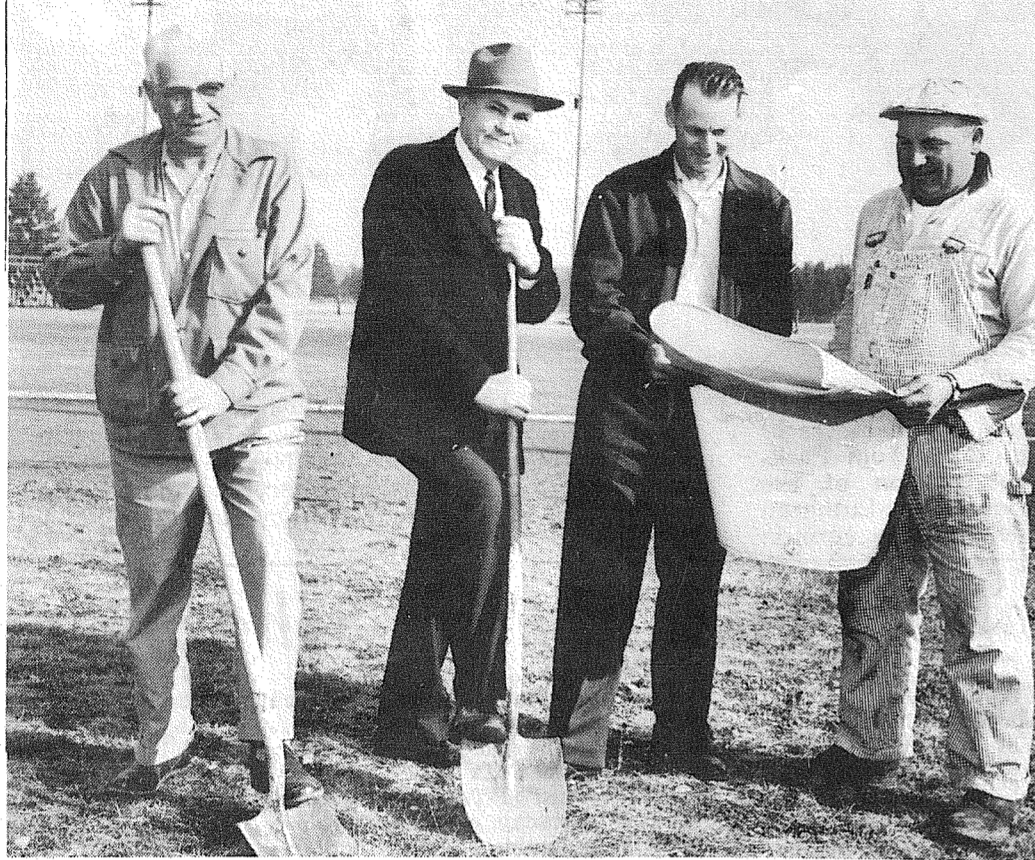

## Bethel's New Grandstand To Seat 1200

Four members of Bethel Junior and Senior High School Boosters broke ground recently for the installation of a new covered grandstand at the school's joint athletic field. The grandstand will seat approximately 1200 spectators and will measure 160 feet in length incorporating 14 tiers of seat rows.

Bethel Junior and Senior High School Boosters is a six-year-old organization made up of the school children's parents, faculty members and interested individuals living within the school district.

"This organization always has a project at hand for improvement of the school district's athletic facilities," John Milroy, school district superintendent said.

Art Crate, president of the Boosters, explained that the majority of building labor and fund raising will fall upon its members. Actual construction began the following week.

The project is scheduled for completion shortly before school reopens next September.

## Lutherans Will Dedicate New School Building on Sunday

## Prof Otto Guest At Church Rites

Dedication of the new parish education building of the Parkland Evangelical Lutheran Church will take place Sunday, March 24, at 3 p.m. it was announced this week.

An open house will follow the dedication ceremonies.

The Rev. Prof. Milton Otto, Professor of Theology at Bethany Lutheran Seminary in Mankato, Minn., will preach the sermon at Parkland Evangelical Lutheran Church on Sunday, March 24th.

The new building is the culmination of the efforts of the congregation since 1959 when it was decided to sell the school building which had served the school since 1904. The cost of remodeling and modernization prompted the move. The school children themselves began the fund with their Wednesday "Chapel Offering" that year. In 1960 a building committee was selected. Serving on this group were: A. J. Langseth, A. E. Berger, Lloyd Nord, Milton Rose, Richard Daniels, B. Wermedahl and Dan Kelly.

The new building, 90 feet long and 40 wide, contains a parish hall and other auxiliary rooms in the daylight basement and three large classrooms on the upper floor. A breezeway connects the parish building to the main church.

The Parkland Lutheran Elementary School began as a department of Pacific Lutheran University which was founded in 1890 by the Norwegian Luther Synod. Classes were first held in a farm house near the site now occupied by the first building erected on the campus, Harstad Hall. In 1894 when the first College building was dedicated, the school moved into two rooms.

The Parkland Lutheran congregation assumed operation of the grade school in 1902 and the recently vacated school was built. The teachers at that time were Miss Hannah Hong and Miss Amelia Harstad.

By 1907 the school was operating at full capacity as a four-room school with Lewis Nyhus, principal. From 1939



to 1950 the school was operated by the Concordia School Association.

Since 1950 the school has again been conducted by the Parkland Lutheran Church. The two teachers are B. Wermedahl, principal, and Miss Karen Johnson.

The Parkland Lutheran School offers daily instruction in common subjects based on a Christian philosophy drawn from the Word of God, with emphasis in careful training in Christian virtues.

Rev. H. A. Theiste is pastor of the Parkland Lutheran Church.

Professor Otto was one of the teachers at Parkland Lutheran Parochial School when he was a student of theology. He served his year of internship at Parkland before he graduated from Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary in St. Louis, Mo.

All interested persons have been cordially invited to the dedication and open house ceremonies.

In ceremonies held last Sunday, Rev. Theiste led the congregation in the cornerstone laying ceremonies. Among the items placed in the plaque was a current copy of the Times Journal.

## Univalves Anyone? Keithley Has 85

An invaluable collection of 85 calcareous univalves, bivalves and corals was recently received by Keithley Junior High School Science Department from MSgt and Mrs. Willard Reese, a couple of skin diving conchologists.

Confused? Don't worry—univalves and bivalves are different kinds of mollusks, and "calcareous" simply means "chalky" which all shells are.

Conchologists (derived from the Latin "concha", meaning shell) are amateur shell collectors.

Sergeant Reese turned over the collection to Donald Pattie, a Keithley Science teacher, for classroom use. This collection will enable students to practice identifications observe species and variety difference and study growth forms. The shells and corals come from places as distant as New Guinea, Australia and the Caribbean Sea.

Shells have aroused the interest of man for centuries. In the Northwest area the wampum which served the Indians as a medium of exchange was largely mollusk shells. Collectors will pay \$1500 for a rare, "glory-of-the-sea" shell, found off the Florida coast.

## Egg Production Price Changes To Be Explored

What is happening in the egg production industry? Why do egg prices change? What does the future hold for egg producers? Karl Hobson, Washington State University Price Specialist, will be featured April 29th. Poultry industry leaders will assist at the May 27th session. Pierce County poultry leaders will lead discussion groups at the June 24th meeting. All poultrymen and industry people are urged to participate.

(Continued from Page 2) year; that is, if the bond issue is approved.

Mr. Mortvedt also states, if the sewers are not in by the time PLU needs added service, it would cost the PLU \$50,000 to get their own sanitary equipment, and if they spent that amount, they would not hook up with the Parkland sewers.

We should be given the same rights. As to the \$50,000 expenditure, quoted above, we home owners in every 300 homes have that much invested for sanitary equipment (septic tanks). To compare with PLU, let us take 600 homes to bring the number of occupants of said homes to correspond with the personnel and students of the PLU. We find the cost of septic tank installation for 600 homes to be approximately \$100,000. They find their equipment both satisfactory and economical. We for instance, have had our septic tank in since 1955, and it has not cost us one cent since.

Compared to the \$42 per year we would have to pay for sewer service, we have saved \$336 since 1955, and if we had sewers since that time, they would no doubt have gone up, but the real cost is not in the monthly rate, but in the \$7.50 per foot of frontage, plus charges for the change of plumbing and the hook up to sewer, not to mention the \$3,400,000 drawing interest of 6% each year. ## a - Wondering and a - Wandering ...

with Jack Brown  
Quite often some reader writes in with cryptic remarks that leave no doubt but what he is a-wondering about me. I've got news for you — I've joined the club.

Last week I wandered off to Phoenix to take in the National Air Races. Congregated there were the best pilots in the nation and the fastest planes. I came home a-wondering about myself because neatly tucked away in the plane was an air race trophy and in my pocket a Federation Aeronautique Internationale Sporting License. Back in Phoenix the daily papers were carrying a story about some non-professional race pilot from up in Washington coming up with 7th place time at the races. At my age I ought to have my head examined but once bitten by the race bug it takes a life time to recover. At least it seems to have for me.

It came about this way. I was knee deep in pilots and people trying to ferret out the story of a National Air Race, such as this, for the Northwest Flyer. Somewhere along the line after all ideas of getting an aerial picture of the races was erased due to regulations I decided to look into the possibility of getting into the race and taking some pictures while it was underway and then once the pack had left me to pull up and out for a landing, and just say my engine wasn't sounding right or something. After all, newsmen have been pulling stunts like that for years to get a picture, and I was out to scoop all the other aviation publications.

I checked on the requirements and since I seemed to qualify I plunked down my twenty bucks entry fee, bought the mentioned license which permitted me to race and then proceeded to make some runs around the course. The fact that they qualified me seemed to indicate that at least they felt I could get around the course without ramming another plane or smearing myself all over one of the steel constructed pylons. Chuckling to myself and watching to see if any other members of the press got similar ideas I bided my time till the race next day.

At the start of the race the officials insisted that all planes be cleaned out so that in a turn or in the event you got flipped upside down by turbulence nothing would be flying around in the cabin to conk you on the head. I took out all my gear and arranged for a cop to sit on it, alongside the runway, while I raced. I carefully hid my 35mm camera and once in the plane with the engine running I got it out, prefocused it and was all set for the flag.

As the starter lowered the flag and I raced by I could see the look of surprise on his face as I snapped his picture from within the plane. I sort of figured he'd have a few choice words for me on my return and sure enough he didn't disappoint me.

Anyway away we went and I held tight to the outside position so that I could fly with one hand and my feet and snap pictures. I was clicking away like mad when we came in on the home stretch lined up on the pace plane like a pack of greyhounds after a rabbit. Just as I saw the checkered flag drop I realized I was in perfect position and without rhyme nor reason threw the camera into the back seat, pushed my fist into the carburetor and was in the race up to my ears. All the wild thrill of previous stock car and motorcycle races came to life within me and I found myself in there giving the pros a hard time.

The irony of it all is that I hadn't washed my plane, taped any rough edges, allotted my gas nor skipped breakfast. I was flying a loaded plane with 80 horses less under the hood than the others and still pylon after pylon slipped by my wing without the pack leaving me too far in the rear. I watched the other planes slip around the pylons leaving considerable distance between wing tip and steel. I found that by aiming my spinner just to the right of the pylon and kicking in full rudder just before impact my wing would drop down 90 degrees and I could really polish off the pylon using the old method of a straight line being the shortest distance between two points and thus hold my own.

It wasn't until the race was over and I was back on the ground that I realized fully just how reckless with my carcass I had been. Those professional pilots were out to win and looked rather unkindly on some joker homing in and getting in their way, but once the race was over they all came over to give me a friendly word.

One of the nicest things about the whole deal was to find that I'd had my own rooting section. A dozen or more local Parkland & Spanaway people were in the stands really whooping it up for me, and once I was on the ground all came out to give me a pat on the back.

If this all sounds a little like bragging, maybe it is, but it backs up a couple of theories I have expounded on before in this column. . . Life is full of surprises and if we each live every day to its fullest we'll certainly depart this earth without any regrets, and secondly, you're never too old to start living.

## Under-Sink Cleaners Can Mean Death

Six children have been killed in Pierce County in the last six years by poisoning from common household items and drugs, Dr. Stanley M. Tuell, President of Pierce County Medical Society, warns.

Urging participation in National Poison Prevention Week, Dr. Tuell appealed to parents to remove poisons and other hazards from their homes to prevent needless killings and injuring of their children.

"The only sure way to prevent poisoning is to place all poisonous household substances and medicines under lock and key," Dr. Tuell said. "This means cleaning fluid, insecticides, furniture polish, weed killer, bleaches, paint thinner, rat killer and many other harmful substances commonly found under the kitchen sink or on the shelves."

The increase in recent years in the problem of accidental poisoning is graphically shown by the experience of the Pierce County Poison Information Center at Mt. View General Hospital.

In 1962 the Center received over 2100 calls, compared with 1480 in 1961 and 606 in 1958, the year it was organized. The Center has over 8000 card files with information on nearly every kind of poisonous and hazardous substance and plant.

Aspirin and other medicines were responsible in 1962 for 34 per cent of the calls to the Center, which maintains a 24-hour answering service. Last year one child in this area died after swallowing a bottle full of iron pills, left in easy reach in the living room.

Over half of the poisoning accidents involve pre-schoolers in the 1 to 5 age group, and for that reason, P-TA groups have stressed poisoning prevention in their pre-school programs.

Parents are urged to follow the advice included by many pharmacists when dispensing prescriptions: "Keep drugs out of reach of children, immediately destroy medicines no longer being used, don't take medicine in presence of children and read labels carefully before administering."

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## Borer Pest Damaging Raspberries

A large percentage of the cane berry planting in Pierce County are infested with raspberry crown borer, reports County Agent Jack Parsons. This is especially true of some of the older plantings of blackberries. Whether or not a control measure should be applied depends entirely upon the amount of damage the borers are causing.

Oregon State University recently recommended a spring treatment to control this pest against the small larvae of this pest and the materials recommended are expensive to use. If your fields are heavily infested with the crown borer, then a spray could be justified.

Dr. Ed Breakey, entomologist at Western Washington Experiment Station, conducted experiments several years ago to determine when the most effective control of this pest could be accomplished. Dr. Breakey found that the pest was easiest to kill shortly after October 1st. The material that proved to be most effective and economical to use was Parathion. Parathion is toxic and proper precautions should be taken when applying.

Prompt removal and burning of old canes shortly after fruiting is one cultural practice that will help control the crown borer. If you would like more information on control of this pest, contact the extension office in the County-City Building.

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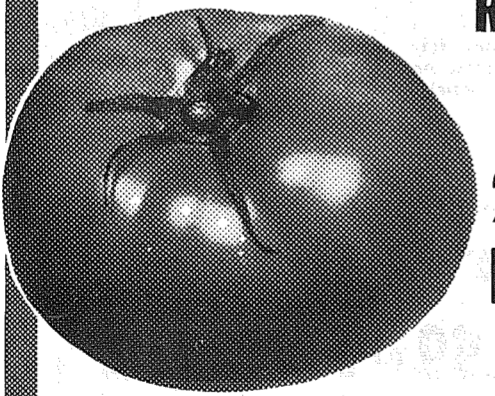
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### Soldier Ends Chemical Training
