Bethel District Board Sets 1959-60 Goals

Approval for the purchase of two school buses to help ease the expected crowded conditions on the Bethel buses next year and the setting up of a preliminary budget were the main topics of business taken up by the Bethel School Board at a special meeting held recently.

Other business transacted by the Board included the granting of funds for seeding the Bethel Junior High School recreational fields and the setting up of a fee for kindergarten children to be paid beginning next fall.

Gus Sorenson, vice president of the Bethel Booster Club, reported to the Bethel School Board that the Boosters had gone as far as they could without receiving financial aid from the district in preparing the Junior High school's recreational fields. Sorenson stated that the Boosters had been able to recruit enough equipment and labor to level of the site and valued this work at \$10,000. Sorenson then requested the Board to provide money enough to purchase seed, top soil and a sprinkling system for the fields. The Board voted to allow the district to purchase the needed supplies to finish the project.

The district board, after considering bids from three bus companies, voted to purchase two 73-passenger Gillig buses to be added to the Bethel fleet next fall. One of the buses will replace a 1941 Mack bus that has been in use in the Bethel area for the past 18 years. The other will be an addition to the district's service and will help take care of the expected 250 more students that will enter the Bethel schools next fall. Each bus will cost the district over \$16,000 and the state will provide 90 percent of this amount over the next ten years to help finance the purchase.

In other Board action, the school board voted to accept the largest budget in the Bethel School District's history. The budget, a preliminary one, calls for the expenditure next year of \$997,278.34 for the maintenance and operation of the Bethel elementary, junior high and senior high schools. Of this amount \$625,520.48 has been set aside for paying the cost of instruction, including teachers' salaries, books and supplies.

The remainder of the budget is subdivided into salaries for other district personnel, maintenance and transportation costs. Included also in this preliminary budget, according to Superintendent Dewane Lanka, are funds for the complete-

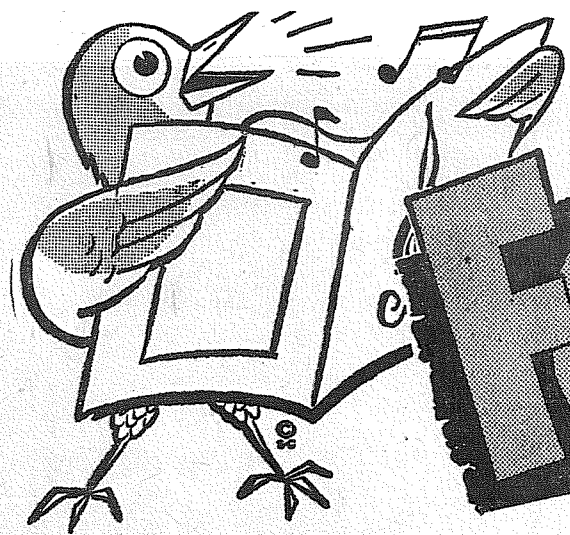

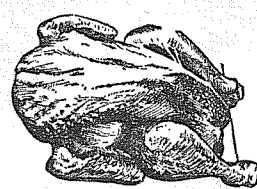

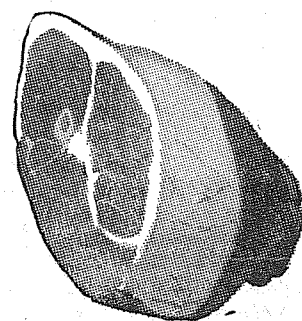

tion of the kitchen units at Spanaway and Elk Plain so that the students may move into the lunch-rooms at these schools. Funds also were included in this budget to provide for folding lunch tables so that the lower primary grades at Kapowsin may use the multi-purpose room instead of classrooms for lunch.
A \$5 fee for all kindergarten children will be paid by the parents next fall due to the action of the Board at the last meeting. Superintendent Lamka joined out that due to the fact that the State Legislature had cut the support for kindergartens by 30 per cent for the next two years the Bethel District would be faced by an \$8,000 deficit in the kindergarten program. By charging a \$5 fee for supplies, the district could raise about \$1,000 to help support the kindergarten classes. These funds would be used only for kindergarten, he reported. Lamka also noted that some districts in the State were charging \$3 a month for kindergarten students next year to help make up their deficits.

Sugar-Coating the Socialist Pill

a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

Two things have eaten away the value of the dollar in recent years. One is taxes—taxes of a hundred and one kinds. The other is inflation.

Today, according to former Commissioner of Internal Revenue T. Coleman Andrews, a single man has to earn an income of \$4,806 to match a 1939 income of \$2,000—because of these two, dollar-debasing forces.

You'd think we'd have learned a harsh lesson from this—but, seemingly, a good many people haven't. For example, a bill is now up in Congress to provide medical care for the elderly people covered by the Social Security System. According to conservative estimates, this would boost taxes by a staggering \$2 billion a year. That is enough, all by itself, to throw any projected budget hopelessly out of balance. So, as sure as shooting, more of the dollar would be eaten away by taxes and by inflation.

And that wouldn't be the end of the matter. The Arizona Republic characterizes this as one of the most dangerous pieces of legislation submitted to Congress in recent years—for the sound reason that "it would push the door wide open to socialized medicine." After all, if one group is to be given tax-supported medical care, other groups are going to demand it and get it.

In this connection, a statement made by the American Medical Association News is 100 per cent in point: "... if Congress curbs inflation by declaring a national policy for a stable dollar and by balancing the federal budget, everyone would benefit.

"Families could save with confidence, knowing that the dollar they put away now would be worth a dollar in the future . . .

"The government would need less money in taxes to pay for goods and service.

"And more of our senior citizens then would be able to care for their own needs, including medical care, with dignity and self-reliance."

A-wondering about women I can't decide why the young ones try to look old and old ones try to look young. Apparently they never heard the old adage that to live is to look your age and act your age.

One of the more enduring and damaging illusions of the time is that federal aid to states and cities and other local governments is somehow "free" — that it really provides us with something for nothing.

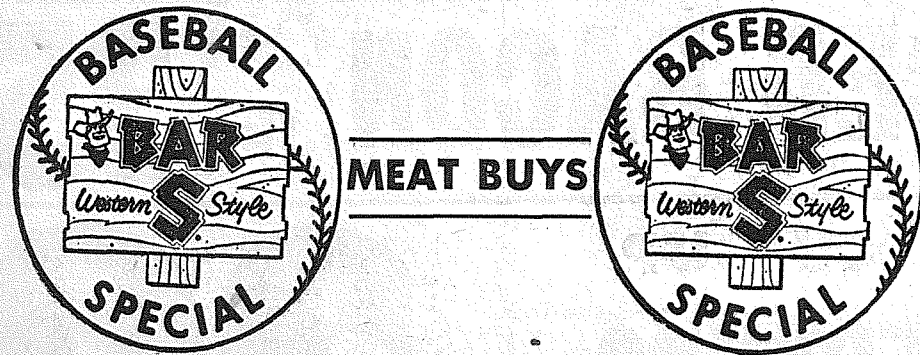
Economists Fred G. Clark and Richard Stanton Rimanoczy of the American Economic Foundation clearly and simply show the hole in that kind of reasoning by citing two prime principles of economics.

First: "Nothing in our economic life comes from nowhere or goes nowhere; there is always a source and a destination." Second: "Government cannot give the people anything that it does not take from them."

To supply federal aid, the government first takes away money that otherwise could have been spent directly at the local level, and then gives part of it back. A certain and substantial percentage disappears in the process. Indeed, according to Messrs. Clark and Rimanoczy, only one state, Mississippi, gets as much back from the federal government as it puts in.

So federal aid, far from being "free", is as expensive a device as we could think up.
