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Times Journal Editor Neva Honeywell Retires July 15

When the Times Journal was a pup and Jack Brown, the publisher, had very few dog biscuits to feed it, a slight and gray-haired woman came to help out—"for two weeks," that's the way she said it, since she was over sixty at the time. That was in 1951 when the Journal, with 8,000 circulation and growing fast, printed the news of Parkland and vicinity in the basement of the Chapel Building on Pacific Lutheran College grounds.

Last week, the same gray-haired lady, was still here, not too much different but insisting that now "her two weeks should be about finished"—a temporary job that stretched along over nine hard-working years that saw the Journal almost double in circulation and become a familiar sight in everyone's mailbox in the better part of Pierce County.

Mrs. Neva Honeywell, Editor of The Times Journal retired last week for the second time in her life. Mrs. Honeywell was born in rural Kansas. Her growing years before she was married to Edmund Honeywell, she taught school in that state. After her marriage, the Honeywells came to Washington to live here in Tacoma. Mrs. Honeywell has lived here for the past 48 years.

Her first retirement was after her husband's death in 1947. At that time she was a working partner in her husband's business, the Honeywell Printing Corporation and Tacoma Journal. Mrs. Honeywell served as news editor for the paper publication.

Neva Honeywell is the mother of two sons and a daughter. Ed Honeywell is a sports writer on the Tacoma News Tribune, Valen H. Honeywell is a lawyer in a Tacoma law firm and Mrs. Lloyd Knutson is a Tacoma housewife.

Asked about her plans for the future, Mrs. Honeywell stated that now she plans on doing a lot of loafing but when the hot weather is past may visit relatives back in Kansas.

Spanaway Lake Treats Itch

Spanaway Lake will be treated with chemicals on Monday, July 25, to suppress the tiny insects that cause "swimmers itch" if present fund raising is successful.

Residents of Spanaway Lake aided by the County Park Department and State Fisheries Biologists will again treat the water to kill the fluke and the snail where the fluke lives part of his life.

"The Swimmers Itch" is common in parts of most lakes in the Pacific Coast area, being carried by the wild ducks. Those ducks residing the year around are especially implicated.

This is the second lake in the area to take steps to suppress this problem. Funds for the chemicals are solicited from the lake-front property owners and others using the lake.

Last year, \$1,000 was raised to buy chemicals to treat the lake. The treatment was considered a success by most lake users.

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STATE INCOME TAX

Why doesn't the State of Washington have a state income tax, as many of the other fifty states do?

The answer is that our state constitution, as it now exists, classifies a tax on "income" as a tax on "property", and provides that taxes on property must be "uniform".

The U.S. income tax and that of other states with income taxes is a "graduated", or non-uniform, tax on "net" income, and not on "gross" income. The state constitution, as interpreted by the Supreme Court, requires any tax on income to be uniform, or at the same rate, and to be on gross income, or all income, and not on only a part of a man's income.

If it wished, the legislature could impose a uniform tax at one rate—say five or ten percent—on all income received by all persons and corporations in the state. But such a tax might be unpalatable to many persons, and especially to those with incomes low enough to be exempt from paying much federal income tax.

However, if the legislature does not wish to enact an unpopular uniform income tax on all income—treating every taxpayer alike—but still wants an income tax, it must ask the people to vote to amend the state constitution to

WASHINGTON STATE DOG LAW

Many areas of the county—Spanaway, Edgewood, Gig Harbor, and all of the valley communities—have recently reported dogs chasing and killing sheep, usually the neighbor's animals. As you can see from the Washington State Dog Law, owners of these dogs are liable for legal troubles. This law states:

In each county which elects to proceed under the provisions of the State dog law which election shall be by vote of its board of county commissioners it is the duty of each county and township assessor and

specifically allow the legislature to impose a graduated net income tax.

In this respect, since the state constitution represents the will of the people on the subject of taxes, only the people can change the constitution to permit a state graduated net income tax. The change, however, must be initiated by the legislature, and until the legislature passes the question to the people for their approval or disapproval, there can be no state income tax similar to the federal income tax.

annually, at the time of assessing personal property, to make a list of all persons who own or keep a dog or dogs outside the corporate limits of any city. A license tax of \$1 for each male or sterilized female dog and \$2.50 for each unsterilized female dog is assessed against the owner. The owner or keeper of a dog kennel must pay a license tax of \$10 for 20 dogs or less and \$5

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for each additional 20 dogs or fraction thereof. License taxes must be paid on or before August 1 or become delinquent, in which case they are collected in the same manner as delinquent personal property taxes. On payment of the license tax the county treasurer delivers to the dog owner a license and a metallic tag for each dog taxed or licensed. The metallic tag bears the name of the county issuing it, a serial number, and the calendar year in which issued. The tag must be attached to a substantial collar and worn by the dog. All license taxes collected are placed in a separate fund in the office of the county treasurer and known as the county dog-license tax fund. The owner or keeper of any dog is liable to the owner of any animal killed or injured by such dog for the amount of damages sustained and costs of collection, to

be recovered in a civil action PROVIDED, that in case the owner of the dog is unknown, or the damages cannot be collected, the person suffering damages may present a claim for them to a justice of the peace in the county in which he resides. The claim must be made within not more than 40 days after the animals have been killed or injured and an affidavit made stating the number of such animals killed or injured, the amount of damages, and the name of the owner of the dog or dogs, if known. The damages must be proved by not fewer than two witnesses, who shall be freeholders of the county. Damages allowed shall not exceed \$12.50 a head for unregistered sheep or goats killed or injured and \$25 a head for registered sheep or goats killed or injured by dogs. The county treasurer pays to the claimant out of the

county dog-license tax fund the amount of damages sustained as certified by the justice of the peace. It is lawful for any person who shall see any dog or dogs chasing, biting, injuring, or killing any sheep or other domestic animals belonging to such person on any real property owned, leased, or under the control of such person or on any public highway, to kill such dog or dogs. It is the duty of the owner after being notified of his dog's being found chasing, injuring, or killing sheep, or other domestic animals, to keep the dog in leash or confined upon the premises of the owner or keeper thereof. Neglect of the owner to comply with these provisions makes it lawful for the owner of the domestic animals chased, injured, or killed to kill the dog found running at large. It is the duty of any person owning or keeping any dog or dogs which shall be found killing and domestic animal to kill such dog or dogs within 48 hours after being notified of that fact. Failure to do this is considered a misdemeanor. It is the duty of the

sheriff to kill any dog found at large, after August 1 of any year and before March 1 in the following year, without a metal identification tag. On March 1 of each year all moneys in the county dog-license tax fund in excess of \$500 are transferred and credited by the county treasurer to the current-expense fund of the county.
