Things are swinging the final hour for the Ninth annual Parkland Round-up. Activities will begin this (Thursday) morning at 8:00 o'clock with Burt McMurtree broadcasting the kick-off breakfast from the Parkland XXX, which will be attended by Round-up Queen Linda Ross, her court and the Round-up committee and enthusiastic Round-up boosters.

Thursday evening will find merriment at the street dance at the National Bank of Washington parking lot at 112th and Pacific at 9 tonight; Western swing music will set the beat.

Friday night the Pierce County Sheriff's Posse will hold their annual horse show at the rodeo grounds, beginning at 7 o'clock. Dean Vosberg is chairman. Western equitation eliminations will be held at 4 p.m. Performance classes and games will begin at 7 p.m. Special attraction will be an exhibition by the Parkland Riding club, sponsor of Queen Linda.

The big rodeo dance is Friday from 9 to 2. Western music will be furnished by Ray Bartley and his boys. Mixer and ice will be available. Secretary Betty Anderson advises that tickets be purchased early, as tables and seating will be limited. Tickets may be had at Storkville, Mt. View Cleaners, Carl T. Lindgren, National Bank of Washington, Shop-Ette Variety & Department Store, Rural Realty, Home Plumbing, Snap-On Tools, Parkland Grill, Bunkhouse and Anderson Lumber.

Of interest to young and old will be the big Round-up parade Saturday morning at 10 o'clock from 96th and Pacific avenue to the rodeo grounds. The parade will be led by Pierce County Sheriff Frank Stojack and the Pierce County Posse, followed by Round-up Queen Linda Ross and her court of Princesses.

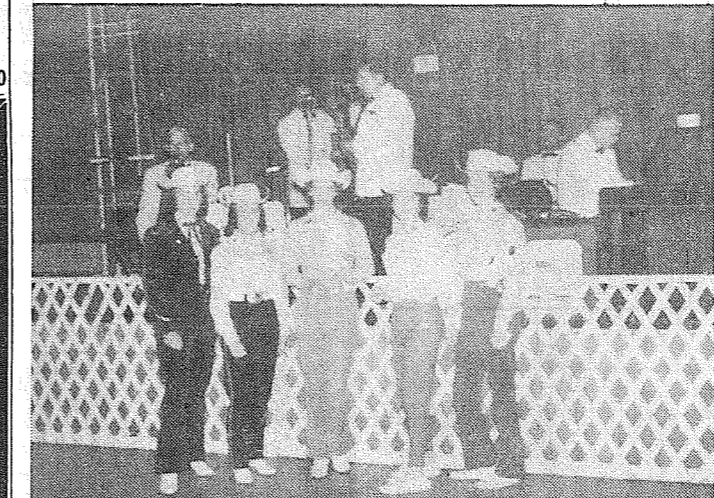

### It's the LAW

All parties gain if they can settle a lawsuit out of court justly. Knowing this, lawyers and judges encourage people to make such settlements. For each case that goes to trial today, there are scores settled.

Lawyers have "Canons of Ethics." They say: "Whenever the controversy will admit of fair judgment (settlement), the client should be advised to avoid or to end the litigation."

When people settle a case, it lifts a burden from the heavy load of cases now before our courts and thus saves the court's time and the taxpayer's money.

Because of the present heavy case load, many courts must call in judges from other counties to speed up trials. Both the parties and their counsel have an interest in disposing of the cases for until the case is over, many cannot make plans.

Of course, sometimes the parties cannot reach an agreement, and the courts exist to settle such disputes. In lawsuits one party wins and the other loses, but in settlements sometimes both parties can gain by making concessions. Many lawyers are skilled in such negotiations.

The new businesslike air in most courts today discourages the spectacular trials of old, when trials were big local events. In those days, a trial over a few dollars might pull a crowd for miles around and be talked about for weeks. Only the most sensational cases do that these days.

A courtroom is now a place where the judge, the jury, the lawyers, and the parties work hard at the business of reaching a fair outcome.

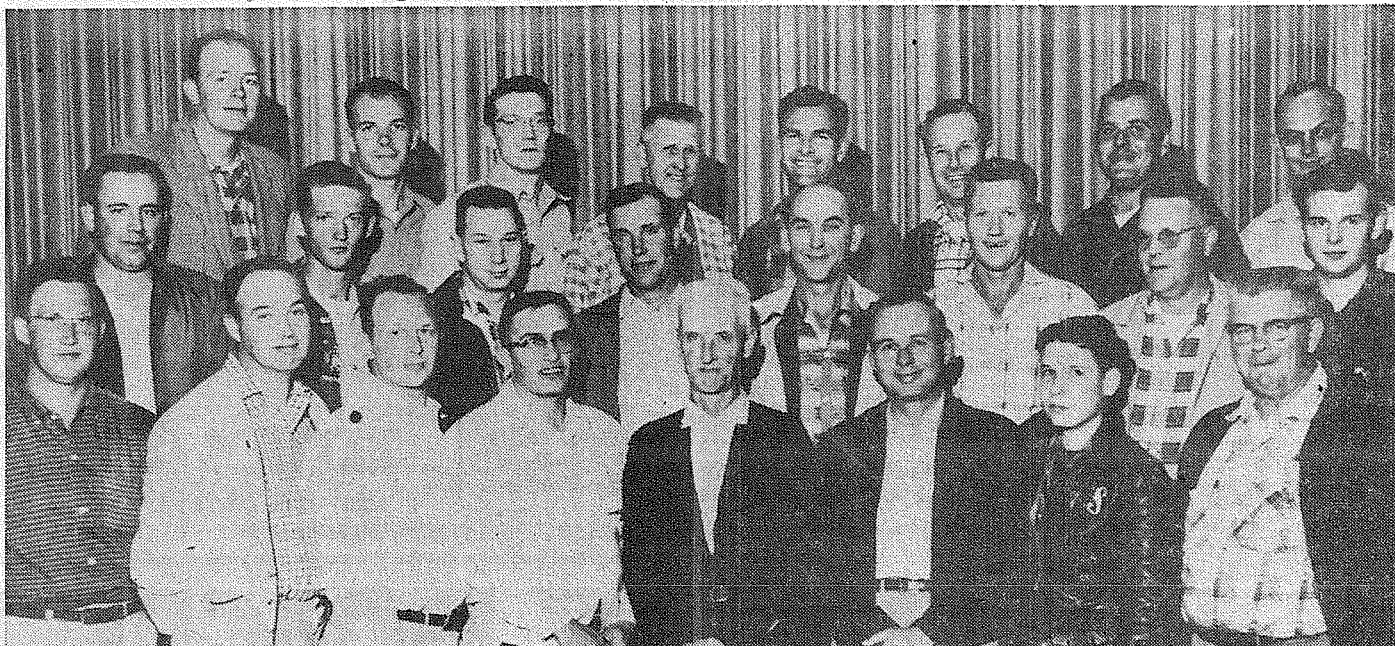

Vacation Church School County Agent's Corner

By Ernest L. Hopp Twenty thousand square feet of floor space under one roof - enough space to raise twenty thousand fryers at once. That's the capacity of the new 100 ft. by 200 ft. fryer house being constructed on the H. W. Halliday farm near the intersection of Vickery and Collins Rd. This building is in addition to a 100 ft. square house that has been used several years. Mr. Halliday has been leasing several chicken houses on other farms for fryer raising. The new construction is an attempt to consolidate his operation on one farm. Much time is lost traveling between farms. His total yearly fryer production capacity will be 120,000 birds based on four broods a year. This sounds like a good sized volume, which it is. Operations such as these are considered a minimum to return enough money for a family living. In fact, during the last eight months if a grower was selling his birds on the free market he barely covered operation expenses. Many growers, including Halliday, are now operating on a guaranteed profit per bird. Under this system a grower can earn a living wage if he raises about 100,000 birds annually.

Halliday's new fryer house is well constructed. Four rows of supporting posts run the full length of the roof ridge. Something that has impressed me about Halliday's other fryer house is the excellent ventilation. Even though it is 100 feet wide the air circulation is fine. I imagine this new house will work equally well. He hopes to have it in operation by the first part of July.

Speaking of Fryers, reminds me of a U.S.D.A. outlook forecast I read not long ago. This information stated that we probably won't see much change in the present fryer price during the next few weeks. Recent fryer egg settings and placements indicate that fryer supplies in July and August might be reduced to near year ago levels. If this happens, prices would probably rise to the July-August levels of last year. In this area this would mean prices around 21 or 22 cents a pound. This certainly would be boost for growers selling on the free market.

By Florence Allen Problems of condensation of moisture in a house were discussed at a meeting held recently on housing by Mr. H. E. Wichers, Extension Specialist in rural architecture, from Washington State College. It was recently learned he said that one of the best methods of moisture-proofing a house, if you mean by that keeping moisture out of a house, is by putting a moisture-proof membrane on the ground below the joist, especially where no basement exists. There is plenty of evidence at the present time, that a lot of the moisture we blame on coming through the walls and roof really enters the house from the ground under the house. Mr. Wichers said he had seen polyethylene placed on the ground beneath the joists. It really showed the air under the polyethylene laden with moisture and the ground slopply.

When we think how much moisture that kept out of the house it makes us realize what a good investment that was. Not long ago he told us he was in a house that had bare ground beneath the floor joist. The reason he happened to examine it was because the doors were beginning to stick. Some of them did not want to close. He advised a sheet of polyethylene on the ground, and in three weeks time the doors closed easily and the whole "feel" of

the house was less moisture.

By C. R. Doran Evidence mounts that supplies will be less plentiful in the next feeding season. C. R. Doran, county Extension agent, says this point is made by Karl Hobson, WSC Extension price specialist. Hobson says a number of recent developments point to smaller hay supplies. The list includes heavy winterkill of hay stands in certain areas in Washington and other parts of the west, flooding out of stands in parts of western Washington, slow growth because of the cold dry spring, and prospects for short irrigation water supplies in eastern Oregon, southern Idaho, and many other parts of the west. Also carry over of hay May 1 was down sharply from a year earlier. In Washington it totaled 280,000 tons compared to 469,000 on May 1, 1958.

The reduced hay supplies will have to take care of more livestock as cattle herds and sheep flocks are being increased steadily. Growing and having weather and the severity of the feeding season are still big uncertainties that will affect the hay supply picture, Hobson adds.
