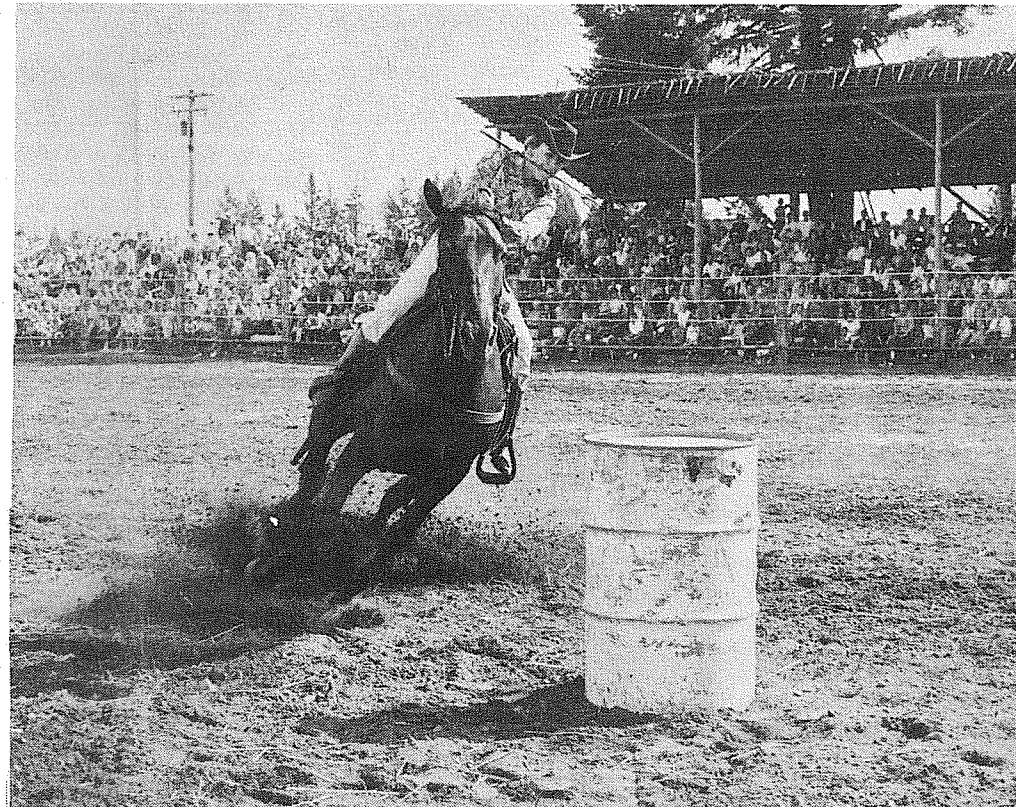
Also scheduled for next week are a stilts contest, a four-square tournament, and a cook-out.

### Route Change 4-H Prexy Tells For Round-Up Parade

Because of the new 5 G Freeway interchange at 109th and Pacific Avenue the route of the Parkland Round-Up Parade will be shortened this year. The date of the parade has been set for August 22. Starting time will be 10 a.m.

Highway officials pointed out that it would be next to impossible for them to get the long parade safely past that complicated section of divided highway.

This year's parade will start at 121st and Pacific Avenue (Parkland Grade School) and go straight through 138th and Pacific where it will end. It will be the same length as the annual Daffodil parade in Tacoma. Parade officials have regretfully given up the long established route from 96th to 138th and Pacific. Formerly, because of the long length of the route, it was necessary to stagger the bands with each one marching only one half the total distance. With the shorter route, all bands and marching units will go the full length.

### Violators Fined

Two youths were given jail terms and heavy fines by U.S. Park Commissioner Clarence E. Layton on June 28 for violating Park Rules and regulations in Mount Rainier Park. Superintendent Jhon A. Rutter announced recently.

Thomas W. Jackson, age 20, of Shelton, Washington, formerly from Eatonville, was given a 30 day jail term and fined \$225 for operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquors, failing to report a vehicle accident, operating a vehicle without a valid operator's license and unlawful possession and use of liquor as a minor.

Bryon W. LaPlante, age 19, of Eatonville, Washington was fined \$200 or 10 days in jail for operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor and possession and use of liquor as a minor.

These two young men were apprehended and taken into custody by night patrol park rangers during the early morning hours of June 28 for the above violations in the area between Paradise and Stevens Canyon. Shortly after midnight while operating a motor vehicle in the Paradise area, their vehicle rammed two parked vehicles. They left the scene immediately in an effort to escape undetected from the Park. Radio alerted park ranger road patrolmen were able to cover from the western and eastern areas of the Park to prevent their exit from the Park. They were apprehended at a road block set up at the Stevens Canyon Entrance near Ohanapecosh.

Flagrant violations of the described here are rare. Rutter says. Park visitors, expected to number about 1,500,000, will properly use and enjoy the Park and its facilities before the year's end.

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Tips on GOOD LANDSCAPE GROOMING By Howard & Elaine Motteler

Now is a good time to root prune evergreens that you are planning to move to a different location next Fall. This includes any of the type of trees which tend to have a wide, rangy root system, for example White Pines or Concolor Firs.

Anglers are among the most honorable and truthful groups in our society, state the guys at Mercury outdoors, who, incidentally, just happen to indulge in this popular pastime themselves. They add that the tired, discouraged soul who turns in this well-worn excuse may deserve a better break before the bar of marital justice.

Why do we get so many alibis and so few fish of lunker proportions?

Simply this. The average angler usually isn't able to cope with a trophy situation when it occurs. Though man may have the intellectual edge, the larger and older a game fish becomes, the more difficult he is to handle. Through sheer weight alone a large fish can push tackle to its maximum capacities. This means that the big fish can literally "horse" the fisherman in the early stages of a tussle, thus gain the sanctuary of obdurate, straggling hangouts. Rocky ledges, sunken logs and other obstructions automatically spell trouble.

To keep such fish out in open water requires heavier gear than we ordinarily use in day-to-day fishing.

Another problem is knowing when a large fish has been subdued enough to remain fairly docile for landing. These big, tough old rascals inevitably summon up enough strength to make a last minute lunge for freedom, and often cause a lot of broken hearts.

It takes several such episodes before a man gains enough experience and patience to operate expertly in the lunker division, say the Mercury folks. Be tolerant the next time you hear about "the one that got away." It could happen to you . . . and it probably will.

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A Second Look At . . . THE BUSINESS CLIME by LARRY ROE

POLITICIAN: "A person who shakes your hand before election and your confidence afterwards."

Reports continue to appear indicating the upward trend in business is holding a satisfactory level in most areas of the nation . . . However, inventory policies are extremely cautious, and planned investment increases are only moderate — a situation that tends to indicate a mounting suspicion of the current economic status in spite of the glowing praise of the government economists.

It appears the often gullible American public is not being stampeded into excessive spending just because the White House projectionists painted a rosy economic future in the wake of a political year . . . sort of a Rembrandt on newsprint!

The fact is that too many ignored incidentals are creating a braking effect that could stop any befooled economy — increased wage and fringe benefit demands resulting from the re-evaluated price index; cutbacks in taxpayer supported government spending in the current economy drive, and the low profit margin in business that almost eliminates the expansion so essential in a growing economy — these, along with other reasons, are beginning to take their toll in the projected economy of six months ago . . . and could well be the forerunner of a recession of major proportions unless pressures are relaxed enough to allow a regeneration of the economy.

The status-symbol, so important to the American way of life, yet so unimportant to our European cousins, is creating a new twist in white-collar "sharecropping" (credit buying) . . . # Law Term Is Defined For Layman

Produce the body!  
That in effect is what a writ of "habeas corpus" demands of a sheriff or jailor. That means: bring the prisoner to court on a valid charge or turn him loose.  
Habeas corpus has long been a standby for us and our liberties for a much longer time.  
In old times, the king or tyrant could jail you on whim, with no chance of a day in court. No one dared to question him.  
In 1215 the English barons had taken all they could stand from King John. They demanded his written guarantee of their rights, they wanted the right to a day in court.  
The English Petition of Rights asked for habeas corpus in 1628. It said, "no man should be put in jail or held without cause shown to which he may answer according to law."

The Habeas Corpus Act became law 51 years later. Our state and national Constitutions say that the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless, when in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.  
Let's see how habeas corpus works.  
Suppose a policeman arrests and puts you in jail. You have the right to be brought to court for a hearing. In court the judge should tell of the charges against you and your rights to counsel and a fair trial.  
But what if you don't get a hearing in a reasonable time? Then somebody is unlawfully taking away your freedom. So you, a friend, relative, your lawyer may go into court and get a writ of habeas corpus on your behalf.  
The writ commands your jailor to "produce the body." Your jailor must show that he holds you lawfully or turn you loose. In court, the judge looks into the charges against you. He may hear witnesses. If he cannot find that you are held lawfully, he will order you turned loose. If he finds cause, you can ask for reasonable bail.
