

The first year after the seed germinates, the plant forms a rosette. During May and June of the second year, it grows from 1 to 4 feet tall. The lower portion of the stems are reddish-purple. The leaves are 5 green with deep cut edges. The base of the leaves are attached directly to the main stock with-

Now is a good time to root prune evergreens that you are planning to move to a different location next Fall. This includes any of the type of trees which tend to have a wide, rangy root system, for example White Pines or Concolor Firs. Many times the homeowner will plant these trees and not realize that they are misplaced till they are eight to ten feet tall. Then they are either reluctant to move them because of their size, or to try to move them without proper preparations - and lose

them.

In root pruning the forestry service recommends leaving a root ball with a diameter of ten inches for each inch of the trunk diameter. Using this as a guide the homeowner can estimate how far out from the trunk to dig a trench to cut the roots. We have found a trench dug about twelve inches deep to six inches wide on opposite sides of the tree one quarter of the way around, and then filled with peat moss or leaf mold works well. The outer edge of the trench should correspond to the root ball to be moved. The peat in the trench would tend to cause the roots to develop within this area. The tree is then left to be moved in the Fall.

Root pruning may also be done as a preparation to bringing a tree in from the forest. Much of the root system of a larger tree in the woods is spread out and is not close to the main trunk. both onto the bus. Gloria sat in the first seat behind the bus driver and talked and flirted with him on the trip to City B. Jane sat in the first seat on the other side of the bus and read a book.

When the bus arrived at City B, Jane Plain got her bags down from the overhead rack and started out of the bus by herself. The bus driver, instead of taking his place at the bottom of the bus steps to help passengers getting out of the bus, stayed in the bus to help Miss Gorgeous get her bags down from the baggage rack.

Miss Plain slipped on the edge of the bottom step coming out of the bus and fell with her bags on top of her. The fall broke her left leg and wrenched her back. The bus driver then rushed out of the bus to help her, but was only able to help get her into the ambulance called to take her to the hospi-

When her broken leg had mended, Miss Plain sued the bus company and the bus driver for \$50,000 damages, claimed the company and the driver were negligent in not seeing to it that she was helped down the steps from the bus. Reports continue to appear indicating the upward trend in business is holding a satisfactory level in most areas of the nation . . . However, inventory policies are extremely cautious, and planned investment increases are only moderate — a situation that tends to indicate a mounting suspicion of the current economic status in spite of the glowing praise of the government economists.

It appears the often gullible American public is not being stampeded into excessive spending just because the White House projectionists painted a rosy economic future in the wake of a political year . . . sort of a Rembrandt on newsprint!

The fact is that too many ignored incidentals are creating a braking effect that could stop any beefed-up economy — increased wage and fringe benefit demands resulting from the re-evaluated price index; cutbacks in taxpayer supported government spending in the current economy drive, and the low profit margin in business that almost eliminates the expansion so essential in a growing economy - these, along with other reasons, are beginning to take their toll in the projected economy of six months ago . . . and could well be the forerunner of a recession of major proportions unless pressures are relaxed enough to allow a regeneration of the economy.

The status-symbol, so important to the American way of life, yet so unimportant to our European cousins, is creating a new twist in white-collar 'sharecroping" (credit buying) . . . In some European countries you can now rent a flat complete with all the status-symbols — and including an automobile for personel use . . . the outcome should be interesting, and will probably be the forerunner of a like industry in America.

make about 18 kabobs. 1½ lbs. ground beef, ¾ cup uncooked oatmeal (quick or old fashioned), 2 eggs beaten, 1/4 cup finely chopped onion, 2 tsps. salt 1/2 cup tomato juice, 12 medium sized cooked carrots, 18 small cooked potatoes.

1. Combine all ingredients for meatballs. Shape into about 36 meatballs approximately 1 inch in diameter. Chill for 15 minutes.

2. Place in shallow baking pan. Pour melted shortening or bacon drippings over meatballs to depth of 1/4 inch in pan. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven 350 degrees. Pour off fat and save.

3. String two meatballs, two pieces of cooked carrot (cut to 1 inch size) and a cooked potato on each metal skewer, alternating the three. Brush with the shortening saved from baking meat.

4. Place filled skewers on baking pan and return to 350 degree oven for another 15 to 20 minutes, turning during baking and brushing with fat if needed. If preferred, kabobs may be broiled instead of baked; broiling time is about 6 minutes.
