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Registration Now Open In FP, Bethel Districts

Registration for new junior and senior high school students to the Franklin Pierce School district will begin August 20th and continue each day until school starts. Hours will be from 9 to 3 p.m., with registration being conducted at the school students will attend.

Keithley Junior High boundaries have been changed to include all students living west and south of the following lines: Pacific Avenue from 96th to 109th east to Golden Given Road, south on Golden Given to 128th (Collins Rd), east on Collins to Waller Road and south on Waller to 144th.

Elementary students in the FP district may register from 9 to 3 p.m. August 27-31. No new elementary students will be enrolled on opening day, but may report on Wednesday, Sept. 5th.

There will be no transportation for kindergarten children the first week. On the first day of school all kindergarten children will report in the morning, receive assignments and return home with their parents. For the next three days kindergarten children will be kept in session one hour only morning and afternoon. Starting with Monday the week of Sept 10th, full kindergarten schedules will be maintained and bus transportation furnished (where necessary). First grade students will be dismissed each morning of the first week at 11:30, and transportation will be furnished.

Second and third grade students will be dismissed at 11:30 on the first day of school.

All cafeterias will be in operation the first day of the school year, and teachers will meet August 28-29-30 for workshops and instructional training sessions.

Aug. 27-31 Named Registry Days For Bethel District

Registration for students of the Bethel District not in attendance there previously will be daily from 9 to 12 noon and 1 to 3 p.m. in each school this week, August 27-31.

September 10 is the "entrance age date" for the Bethel district, with kindergarten pupils required to be 5 years on that date and first graders six years. Substantiation of birthdate should be furnished at time of registration.

Bethel schools will open Tuesday, Sept. 4, for a full day of operation on regular schedules.

Levy Needed For Improvements

Ancient rest rooms, some of them tottering relics of WPA days, are one of the big reasons the Pierce County Commissioners are asking for a special millage in the election September 11.

This year is the first time that the commissioners have ever asked for an excess levy for parks. But when 350,000 visits were actually checked at Spanaway Park and more than 100,000 were counted at North American Lake last year to name only two parks, the commissioners in desperation are seeking money for capital improvements.

The levy, if approved, will be about 3.5 mills and will raise a million dollars for capital improvements. It would be for one year only and the total cost for most home owners at this rate would be less than \$12 and probably only \$8 or \$10. Half of the million dollars will go for repair of outdated facilities and construction of new ones. The other half will go to buy land for new parks. Every day, there is less and less land for public use. Each passing day sees the price of the land which can be used for parks go up. The commissioners feel we are faced with a true crisis in public land and want to secure some of the sites that are still left before they are gone forever.

A great many of us don't even know what profits are. We tend to think that profits are some vast amount of money gouged from the helpless citizenry by fat financiers who manipulate the economy to suit their own pocketbooks.

Profit, by any standard you set up, is what makes the wheels of the economy go round. Any man in business to provide goods or services, must have a profit or he can't survive.

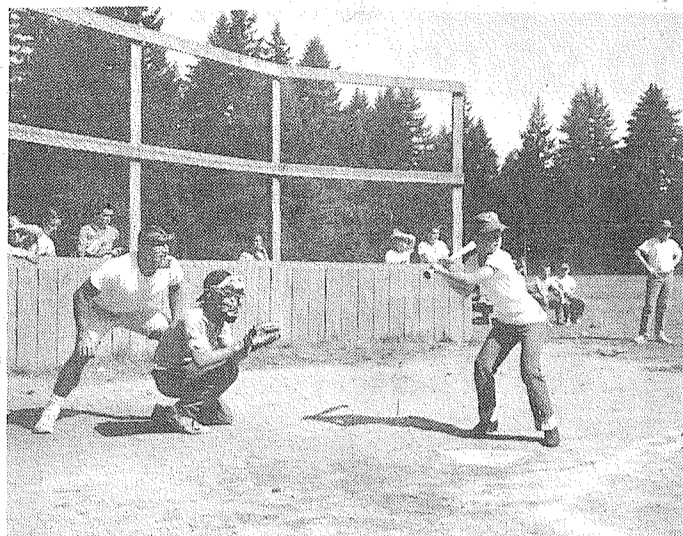
Macawber was right when he said the outgo must be less than the income in order to assure any degree of happiness.

When we put money into a savings account or into U.S. Savings Bonds we expect to collect interest on the money which we, in

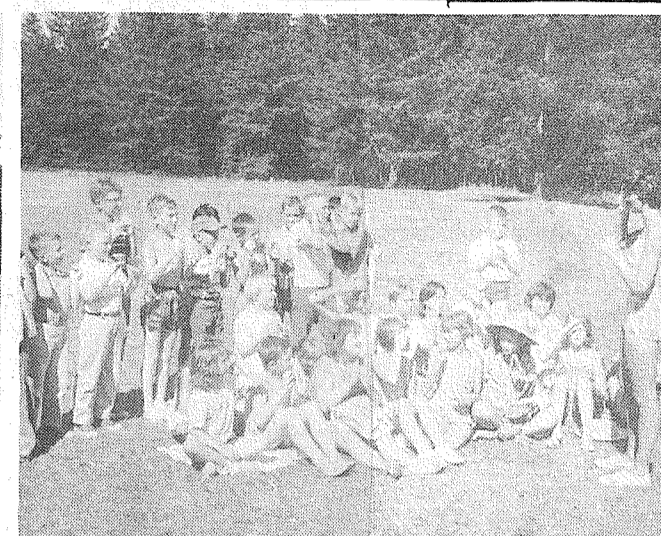
effect, are loaning to the bank or to the government. Why then do we call it evil when private firms are doing essentially the same thing? When a man invests his own money in a business he not only puts the money in with the expectation of a return but he usually puts his time, sweat and blood into the business also.

We don't put our money into savings where the return is only three per cent, but investors in corporate stocks are being told these days that three per cent on their savings is too much. We hear about the gigantic corporate profits, but the critics, instead of citing percentage returns, mention the dollar amounts, which are impressive to those of us who deal in a few dollars at a time.

Recently an editor said, "There is probably a more or less general belief that the health or lack of health of the corporate profit situation is of interest only to the owners of the enterprises in question. If so, this is an economic fallacy of high and dangerous order. For profits are the prime source of industrial expansion and modernization---and that is a prime national problem today. 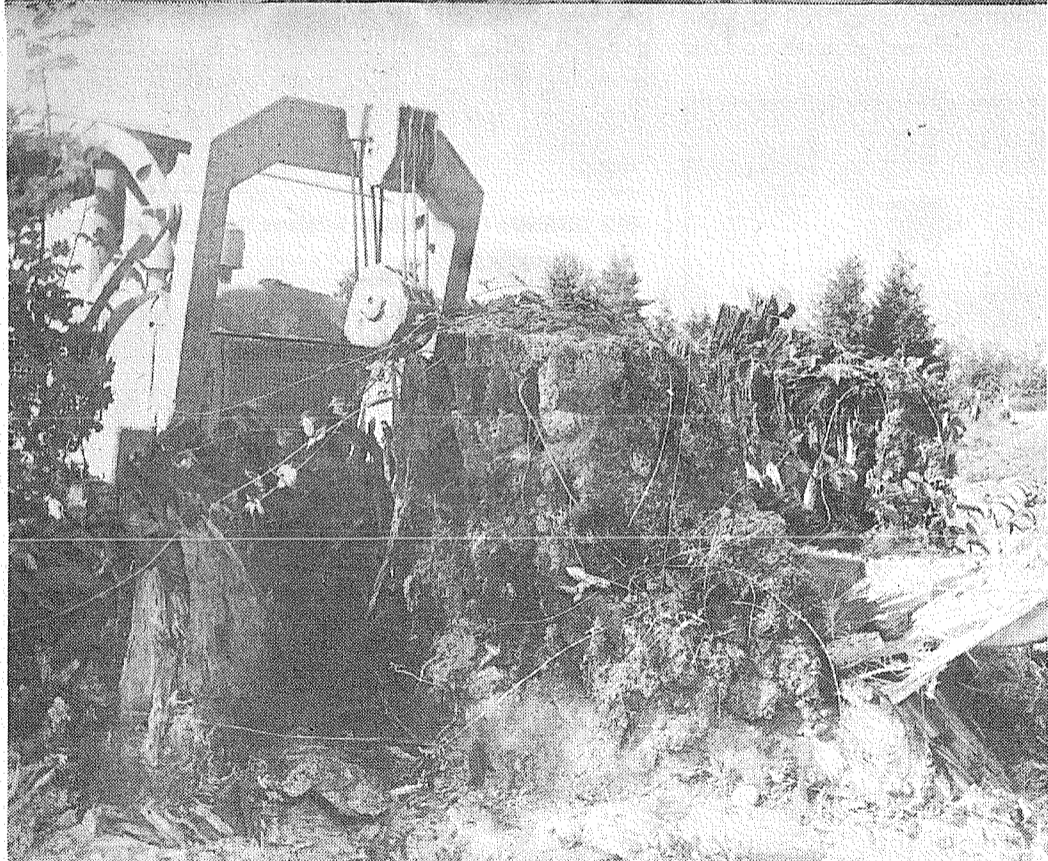
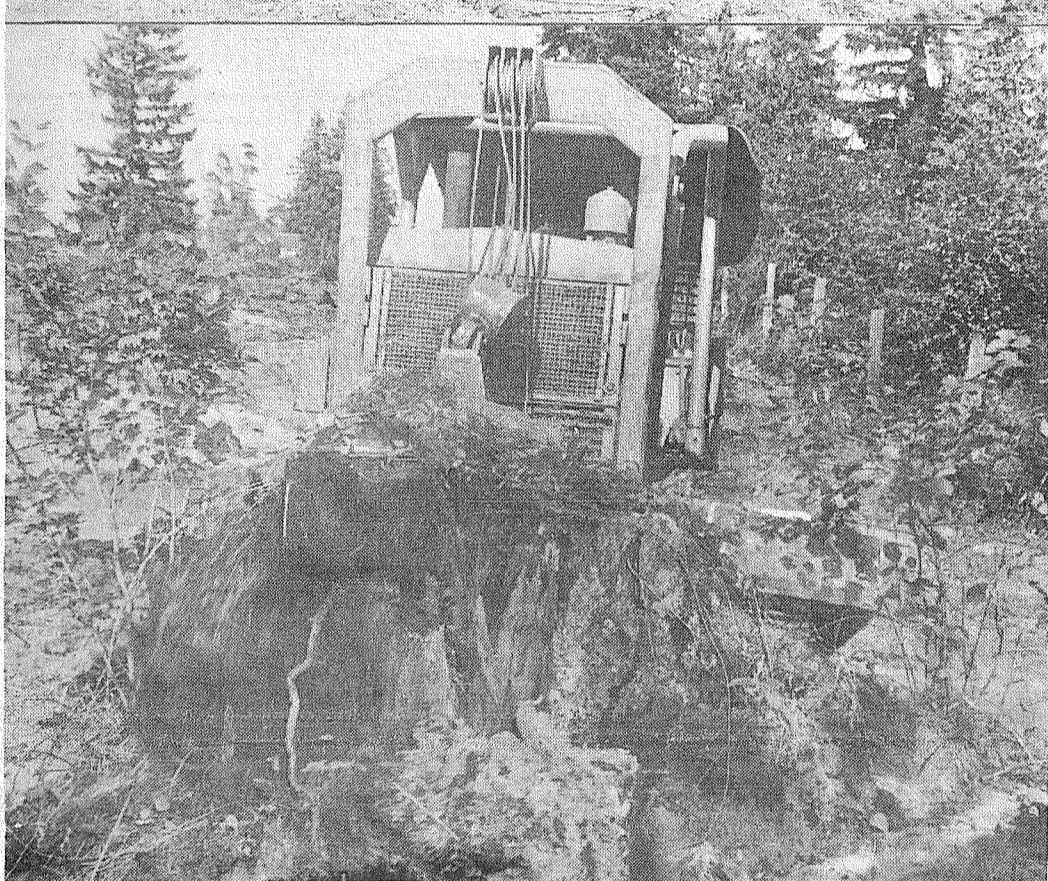
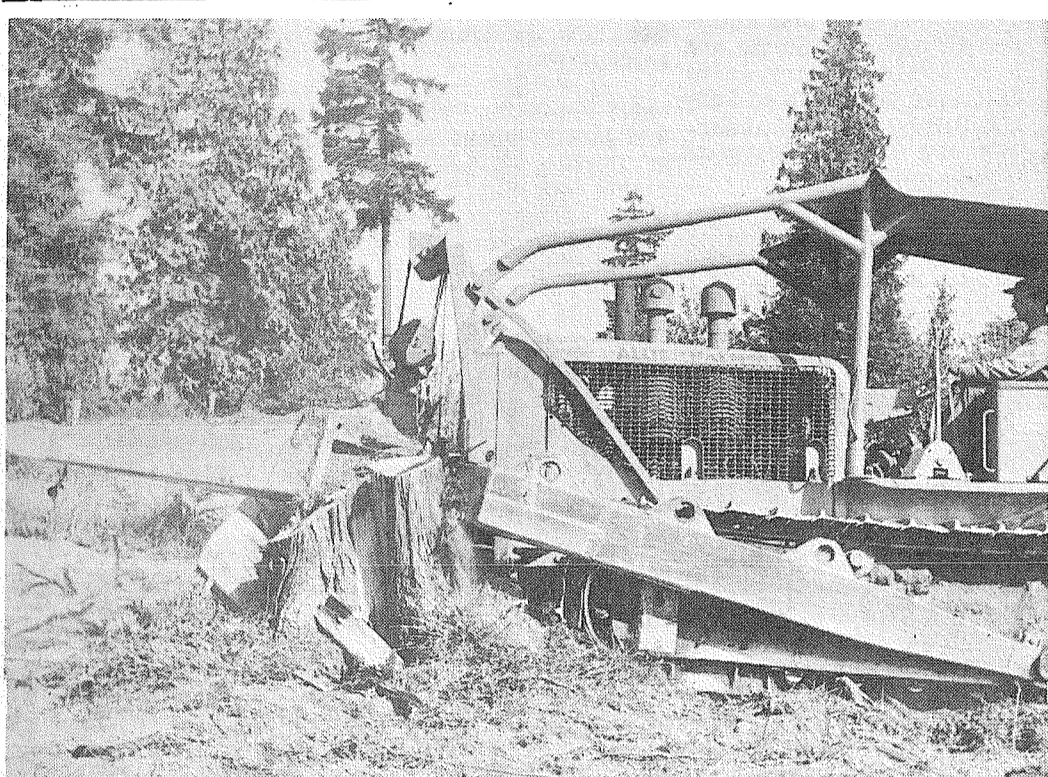

Each firm that gives up a project originally designed to meet competition or improve their process is like a grain of sand carried out to sea, it's lost forever.

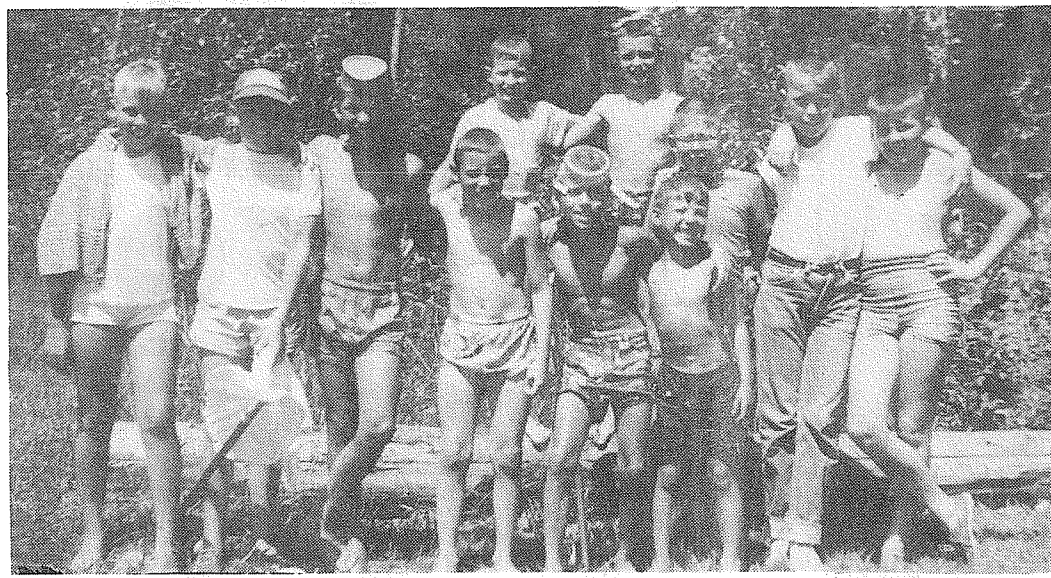
