



## Art Wing, Merchant, Sportsman, Hobbyist

Art Wing was born "about 40-years ago" in Tacoma. His first business enterprise was Wing's Variety Store, located at 13th and Broadway.

Along about 1953-54 Art began to see "the light." He decided it was time to get out of the congested downtown area and head south. In 1955 he made the move. The store became Wing's Marina and is now being run by his brother.

Art's dad, Lew B. Wing, was a veteran of the Spanish American War. Now deceased, he originally started the downtown store.

One of the main reasons people don't shop downtown Art feels, is because the convenience isn't there. Therefore, the place to go is away from the downtown area, to communities such as Parkland.

When asked why he did not consider Lakewood as a profitable place to build a business in, Art replied "Lakewood is reaching the saturation point, Parkland is the last area left for growth in the Pierce County area."

Art feels that Parkland should be incorporated. He thinks the citizens in the community should be allowed to run their own internal affairs, rather than have them controlled from a remote downtown area.

"The population is great enough, and there are certainly enough capable men in this area to do an able job of running an incorporated city," remarked (Continued on Page 6)


## Methodists Plan Drive

The main stumbling blocks to the proposed road construction have come from those residents owning land along the way who were not willing to sell.

Now, however, most of them have given in, and the Engineer's Office hopes to complete the newly paved structure by May, 1962. The turnoff point will be at S. 176th and Pacific, and will go straight through to Meridian.

The Engineer's Office has announced hopes of completing a sufficient amount of the work by January to enable traffic to turn at S. 159th, go to the Clover Creek School, then turn south and connect with S. 176th.

The road to Thun will greatly ease the present traffic problem, states the Engineer's Office, since traffic is now forced to go by way of S. 112th, causing traffic congestion at that point, or else by unpaved roads, either way causing considerable inconvenience.






Under the direction of Gene Ahrendt, the high school band and junior-senior orchestra will join the high school choir, with director Ron Smith, in presenting the program.


The band will play a suite of Civil War songs entitled "The Blue and the Gray," and the choir and the band will present an arrangement of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic."



P.E. facilities will be greatly lacking unless this addition is approved, as the present shower rooms are overcrowded and the school lacks laundry facilities and a small gymnasium for special work. The expansion would give the Senior High School P.E. facilities that would be equivalent to the Bethel Junior High School's.
