The Squadron recently distinguished itself by winning awards in four of seven categories on judging based on outstanding scholastic accomplishments for CAP groups throughout the State of Washington.

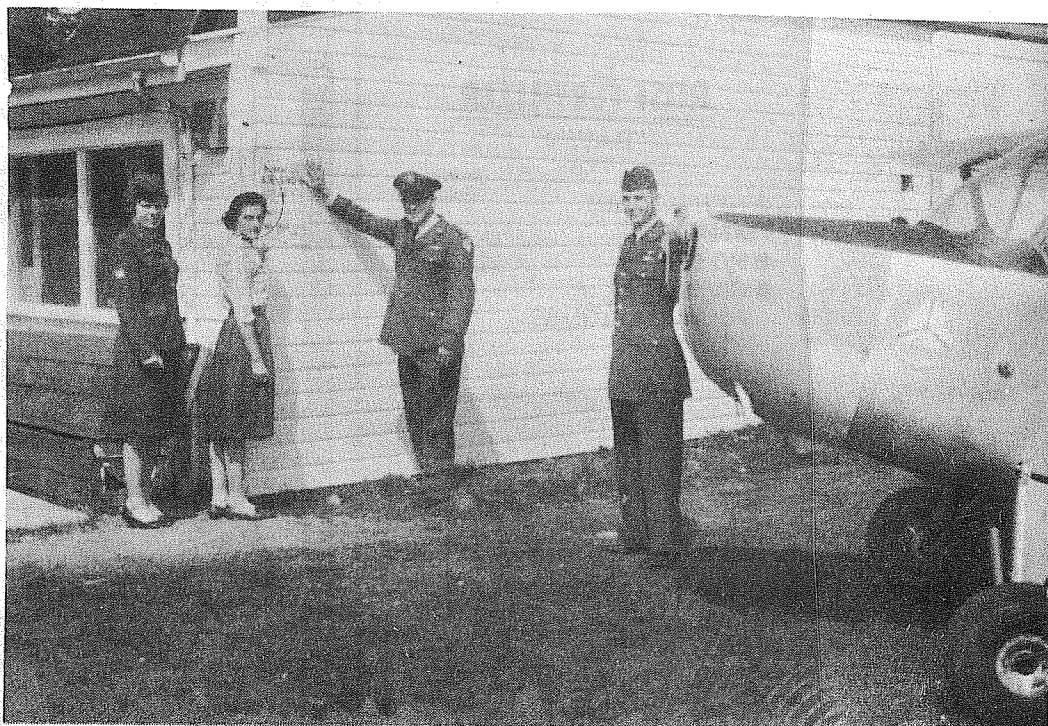

## Bank Drops Fee

A new banking service was introduced this week by National Bank of Washington for men and women 65 years of age or over. A. G. 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## Fencing Laws Are Explained

You can avoid serious problems with your neighbors. To-day a man, like many others have done, came in to see us about how to avoid fencing problems with his neighbor. He said he was in no dispute with him and wanted to maintain good relationships with all his neighbors, if he would not have to do all the compromising to avoid a dispute.

His questions and answers provided us by Keith Magorfin of the County Prosecutor's office are:

1. Who pays for a boundary fence? Either or both parties pay equally for it depending on whatever mutual agreement they have as to the type fence to be built. If they can reach no agreement, either one can build it as he pleases of course, if he pays for it.
2. Does the neighbor have the right to walk on your side of the fence to make repairs? Yes—but if, for example, in so doing he tramples and damages your shrubs and flowers then he is trespassing and can be held liable for damages.
3. Are the fencing laws essentially the same in Tacoma and other Pierce County towns as they are out in the country? Yes.

Did you ever stop to think that experience is the hard-

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## County Agent's Corner

### Caterpillars Now Present In Shrubbery

The caterpillar webs are present in trees now and unless insecticides are applied, the caterpillar will strip the leaves from your trees. This pest has a special taste for alder, apple, hawthorne and cherry leaves, reports Jack Parsons, County Extension Agent. However, this pest will also attack other deciduous trees and shrubs.

Parsons says the caterpillars are easiest to control right after they are hatched. A problem often exists in that bees are often working the bloom of our fruit trees just when we would like to spray. I would not spray on days when bees are active, but wait for a day when bee activity is low. Some insecticides are less toxic to bees than others. Malathion is one that has a low toxicity

towards bees. Also residues of malathion only lasts one day. DDT has a moderate to high toxicity towards bees and some workers report a repelling action of DDT to bees. However, DDT does last for several days, whereas malathion is only toxic for one day.

On trees where bees are not working then DDT would be best because of the lower cost. But in trees where bees are present, then malathion is the best choice. These two materials can be purchased as a 57 per cent emulsifiable malathion concentrate or 50 per cent wettable DDT powder. A spray of either chemical can be mixed at the rate of two tablespoonsful per gallon of water. Combination spray can be mixed at the rate of two tablespoonsful of each chemical to the gallon of water. Parsons says the combination spray will help prevent a build-up of spider mites as well as controlling the caterpillars.

### Care Urged In Handling Poison Spray

#### Handle Pesticides Carefully

They are for bugs and other harmful insects and used correctly—not you!

This pre-season reminder comes from County Agent Jack Parsons who warns that all pesticides are poisonous and should be handled with caution. The degree of toxicity varies among the different kinds of pesticides. Some are just more poisonous than others, but all should be respected.

Parsons urges all pesticide handlers to observe these safety measures. Keep all chemical supplies in a place where children, pets, or livestock cannot get to them. Always store pesticides in their original, labeled container. Never use empty pesticide containers to store other material. Dispose of empty containers safely so children and animals cannot get to them.

Read and follow the precautions on the label. These are for your protection. When handling pesticides, be careful not to breathe the fumes. Always wash any exposed skin with soap and water after applying a spray or dust. For added safety, wear rubber gloves. Never spray or dust when there is a chance of the chemical blowing into your exposed skin or drifting onto other crops.

Use only the recommended amounts of pesticides. Save the extra teaspoonful for the next time you spray. The recommendations made are the result of careful study and testing. Not only by the chemical company, but also USDA and Washington State University.

If a chemical is used on a food crop, be sure to follow the directions concerning application and harvest time. This will insure that no harmful residue will be on the crop at maturity.
