



Respect for the living in the organization which owns the hallowed ground seems to be as lacking as respect for the dead. When a group sets aside an

especial place and cares for it as best they are able, wanton or careless damage to the property destroys more than the trees or the headstones involved. In this particular instance, old, old growth of ivy had been pulled down from a small block house on the property.

This carelessness strikes at the final resting place of human dignity and is a symbol of the callous attitude of the times. To some this may not mean anything, but to those who have loved ones resting there, it is a serious matter.

Children, and some adults, too, should be made aware that private property of any kind, is sacred, and not a playground or dumping ground.

Ground To Be Broken Sunday By Methodists

The Spanaway Methodist Church will break ground on Sunday, June 2, for its new church sanctuary at S. 163rd and Pacific Avenue. The special observance, following the morning worship service at eleven o'clock, will be led by the Superintendent for Methodist churches in the Tacoma area, the Rev. A. C. Wischmeier, and by the Spanaway pastor, the Rev. John Russell Qualley.

Methodist work first began in Spanaway in the year 1908 with the church being served for many years by student pastors from the University of Puget Sound. For several years the church formed a Methodist circuit with the Parkland Methodist Church. In 1956 the church was rededicated and moved to its present site on South 163rd Street. One year ago Rev. Qualley was appointed as minister of the church by Methodist Bishop Everett W. Palmer of Seattle.


Plans for the new building crystallized last year when a successful financial drive was held with the help of the Methodist Board of Missions. The Building Committee was headed by Mr .Lloyd Carey.


The \$65,000 brick and cedar sanctuary building will also house the church offices and a fellowship hall. Plans for future expansion include a two-story Sunday School building and an enlarged fellowship area.

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

a - Wondering and a - Wandering

It was more than a century ago that Abraham Lincoln pointed out that the "legitimate object of government is to do for a community of people, whatever they need to have done, but eannot do at all or cannot so well do for themselves, in their separate and individual capacities." He added, "In all that the people can individually do

as well for themselves, government ought not to interfere." In considering the things that people cannot do "at all" or "so well do," Lincoln set up two classes. The first dealt with "wrongs" - prevention of crimes, misdemeanors, nonperformance of contracts, and the like.

Lincoln's second category, which, as he put it, "embraces all which, in its nature . . . requires combined action," is what concerns me today. By "combined action" he meant government action and cited "public roads and highways" as an example. This is well and good and his philosophy unparalleled for that day and age. It does not, however, hold completely firm today, as practiced in tote by some branches of our government.

Lincoln's statement was made years before the public had a hand to any extent in investments. A house wife with her egg money invested in a large company just did not $e_{\boldsymbol{X}} \mathrm{ist}$ at that time. Today they outnumber the living in

Today companies formed, operated and financed by American dollars from all walks of life can "so well do" and therefore should be afforded the opportunity of facing an open field of endeavor wherein a return on the investor's dollar might be found. In some fields this is the case, but in far too many Uncle is in competition with the investor firms, operating a tax free business with our money and rarely making a return on it.

I've said it before and I say it again . . . Let's get the government out of business while we still live in a land of free enterprise. Soon it will be too late. When the time comes that the government controls the business world as we know it, it will be too late to do anything but jump when you're told, sit when you're told and stand when you're told. Our freewheeling days of being our own master will have ceased to exist.

If some of the labor unions aren't riding for a fall, something has gone dismally wrong with the thinking of the people of this supposedly free nation. Take, for instance, this recent event:

The little town of Forest Grove, Oregon, has a 48member glee club. Over the years it has developed an international reputation. It is 100 per cent amateur, the members being housewives, businessmen, professional men, and so on. Its funds come from voluntary donations.

The club was invited to appear in a big Los Angeles hotel to sing to a convention of dentists. Any revenues were to go into a pot to pay the club's way to Europe, where it has been invited to perform in various cities and countries.

And what happened? A union said that it would picket nd close the hotel unless the club members, each and every one, joined up and paid an initiation fee of \$175 per person along with dues of \$36 a year. The Los Angeles appearance was cancelled.

If this isn't an example of a cruel and callous use of monopoly power, what is? And if this doesn't show the need to include organized labor within the framework of the antitrust laws, or something akin to them, what does?

So line up and start swinging. I can't live forever, anyhow!



On Vets Cemeteries

Any deceased veteran of wartime or peacetime service, whose last period of service terminated honorably, is eligible for burial in any national cemetery in which grave space is available, John B. Kirsh, Manager of the Seattle Veterans Administration Reg-

ional Office, said recently. The spouse, widow or widower of an eligible veteran may be buried in the same grave or in an adjoining grave if space is available.

A minor child of the veteran may also be buried in a national cemetery in the same grave in which either parent has been interred.

Should the spouse or child die before the veteran, the veteran must sign a paper stating his intention to be buried in the national cemetery before the spouse or child can be buried there.

At the time of the death of a veteran, spouse or child eligible for burial in a national cemetery, the mortician or person responsible for funeral arrangements should request interment directly from the superintendent of the national cemetery.

There is no charge for the gravesite in a national cemetery, or for the opening or closing of the grave therein.


