Mass Meeting Called By Youth Center Leaders

The Summit Youth Center Association, Inc., in order to clarify matters concerning its building at the Central Avenue School has called a meeting of all interested persons for Friday, June 7, at 7:30 p.m. at the center building.

The project, which was started in 1955, has resulted in a 36 foot by 78 foot building, where activities for the young people in the area have been conducted.

At the present time the Franklin Pierce School Board is faced with a problem concerning the Youth Center. The building is on school property, but their at the time it was built with the consent of the board.

The ramifications of the dilemma concern insurance coverage for persons using the property and the future of the Central Avenue School itself. According to rules of the State Board of Education a school must have a minimum amount of acreage per classroom and Central Avenue School is apparently near the limit for the present school building.

The Summit Youth Center building started in 1955 as a necessary meeting place for Scout Troop 76. The troop stayed in the school for 8 months before the building was started.

The group took four years to build the present building, which was dedicated in February of 1960. It represents donations of much time and money by the people responsible. A recent appraisal set the value of the building at \$31,000.

The Summit Youth Association, recently incorporated as a non-profit organization, put up the backstop for the baseball diamond and put water into the building as part of their interest.

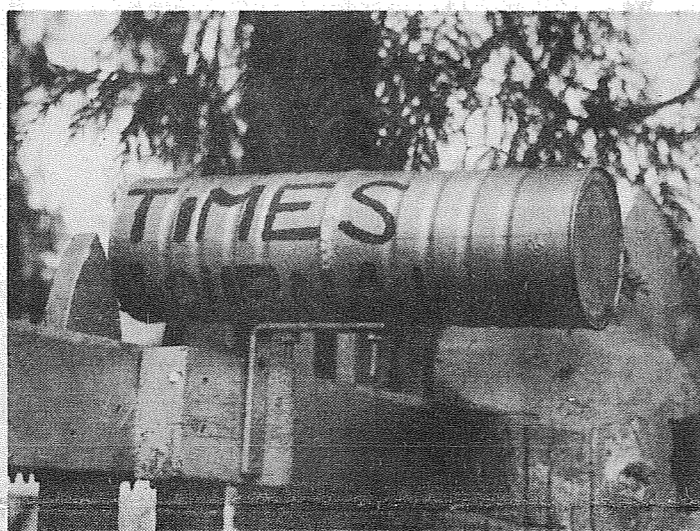
Livestock will be provided from the Del Wright Rodeo Ranch at Yelm.

Let Me Tell One Memorial Day Marred By Carelessness, Desecration

Time was when Decoration Day meant something to almost every person in town, or so I remember the days when my grandmother led all the family out to the cemetery to decorate the family plot.

Decoration Day started in the South, to remember the boys in gray and blue who died during that awful conflict which almost split this country irrevocably. Later it became Memorial Day for the remembrance of the dead of other wars.

The observance has changed to a national holiday, during which we spread more death and destruction on the highways, than we care to remember.

During this day, a number of people in the Parkland area visit their family plots, to decorate graves and remember other times and faces.

I have visited a number of these burial grounds, out of curiosity, I must confess. Old headstones and names have a fascination for me, not morbid, but in the spirit of attempting to capture the thoughts of generations past.

However, I was invited to take a look at one cemetery this week, one which I had not seen before, for a special reason.

It is not necessary to name it, as I think the problem is common to most burial grounds where a full time caretaker cannot be retained. Apparently, some people think that a quiet place like this, not quite Sunday-go-to-meeting clipped and trimmed, is a playground or a dumping ground. 'Who's to know, it looks as if no one comes here,' seems to be the attitude.

Respect for the living in the organization which owns the hallowed ground seems to be as lacking as respect for the dead.

When a group sets aside an especial place and cares for it as best they are able, wanton or careless damage to the property destroys more than the trees or the headstones involved. In this particular instance, old, old growth of ivy had been pulled down from a small block house on the property.

This carelessness strikes at the final resting place of human dignity and is a symbol of the callous attitude of the times. To some this may not mean anything, but to those who have loved ones resting there, it is a serious matter.

Ground To Be Broken Sunday By Methodists

The Spanaway Methodist Church will break ground on Sunday, June 2, for its new church sanctuary at S. 163rd and Pacific Avenue. The special observance, following the morning worship service at eleven o'clock, will be led by the Superintendent for Methodist churches in the Tacoma area, the Rev. A. C. Wischmeier, and by the Spanaway pastor, the Rev. John Russell Qualley.

Methodist work first began in Spanaway in the year 1908, with the church being served for many years by student pastors from the University of Puget Sound. For several years the church formed a Methodist circuit with the Parkland Methodist Church. In 1956 the church was re-dedicated and moved to its present site on South 163rd Street. One year ago Rev. Qualley was appointed as minister of the church by Methodist Bishop Everett W. Palmer of Seattle.

Plans for the new building crystallized last year when a successful financial drive was held with the help of the Methodist Board of Missions. The Building Committee was headed by Mr. Lloyd Carey.

The \$65,000 brick and cedar sanctuary building will also house the church offices and a fellowship hall. Plans for future expansion include a two-story Sunday School building and an enlarged fellowship area.

The construction of the first unit is scheduled for completion in late November, is being financed by loans from the Puget Sound National Bank and from the Pacific Northwest Conference of The Methodist Church. Brynastad Builders of Tacoma have been hired as contractor for the work.

Special music is being planned for the June 2 service by the church choir, directed by Charles McAvoy and accompanied by Mrs. Richard Curtiss at the organ. All interested friends of the church are invited to attend.

Parkland Round - Up Ends Sunday With Hydro Races Queen Valerie

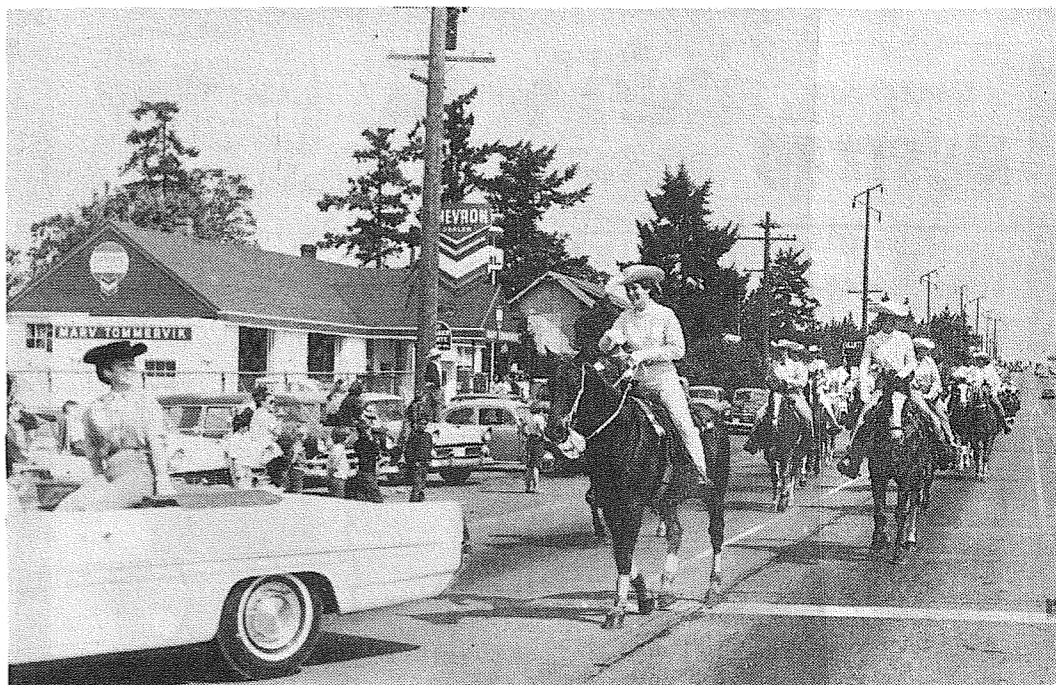

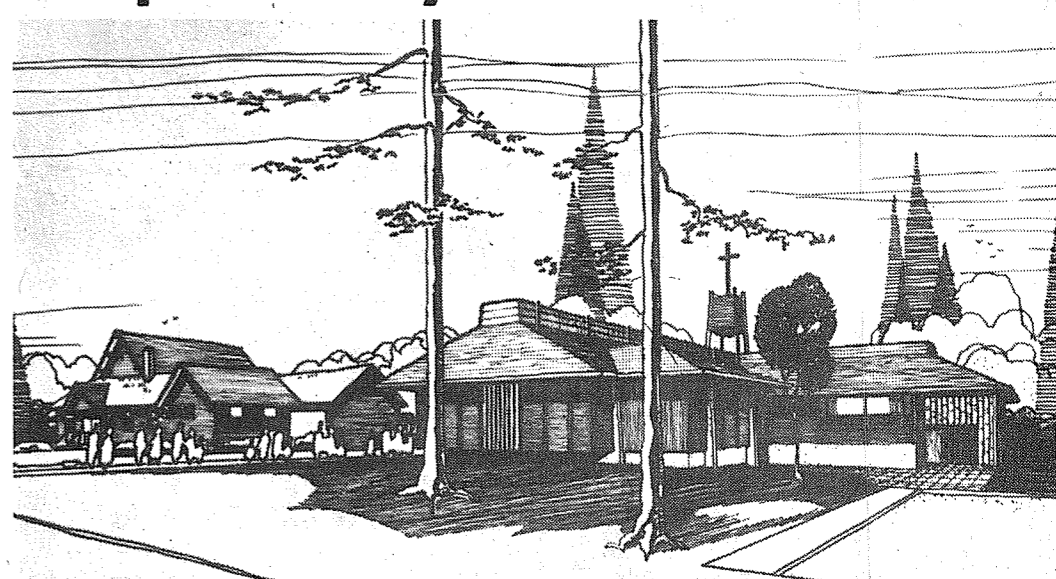

Courses Set For Summer In Puyallup

Summer learning opportunities will again be made available by the Puyallup Schools. Summer school courses will be offered for students now enrolled in grades two through twelve. Emphasis will be primarily in the areas of self-improvement and enrichment.

Elementary students may take reading, arithmetic, spelling and language for self-improvement. Enrichment courses will be offered in typing, French, arts and crafts, and science. A special remedial reading class will be given for students now enrolled in grade two.

Self-improvement classes at the junior high level will be held in reading, arithmetic, language, spelling, and social studies. Enrichment courses will be offered in the same areas as for elementary.

For the first time a physical education skills class will be offered to elementary and junior high boys. It will stress the acquisition of the skills recommended by the President's Physical Fitness Report.

Most regular high school subjects will be offered. Up to two semester credits can be

earned, grades can be improved, or classes may be taken for enrichment.

New science classes are available to high school students. Biology field trips can be taken by either beginning or advanced students and a special reading class will be offered in physics or chemistry for either students who are preparing for a college course or who want it for enrichment.

A basic English class is being televised over Channel 9 in conjunction with Puget Sound area schools. It will bear high school credit and adults interested should contact the Summer School Director at THornwall 5-6655 immediately.

Driver training for high school students or adults will be offered on a first come - first served basis.

Classes start Thursday, June 13 and end Friday, July 26. All classes are held in the morning and meet daily. Registration closes Tuesday, June 11. Fees, which must cover all charges, are \$15.00 for the first hour and \$10.00 for each additional hour. All high school classes meet 2 hours and elementary and junior high courses are for one hour.

All classes will be held in the Puyallup High School. Registration is now open at the Superintendent's Office at 109 East Pioneer, where further information is available.

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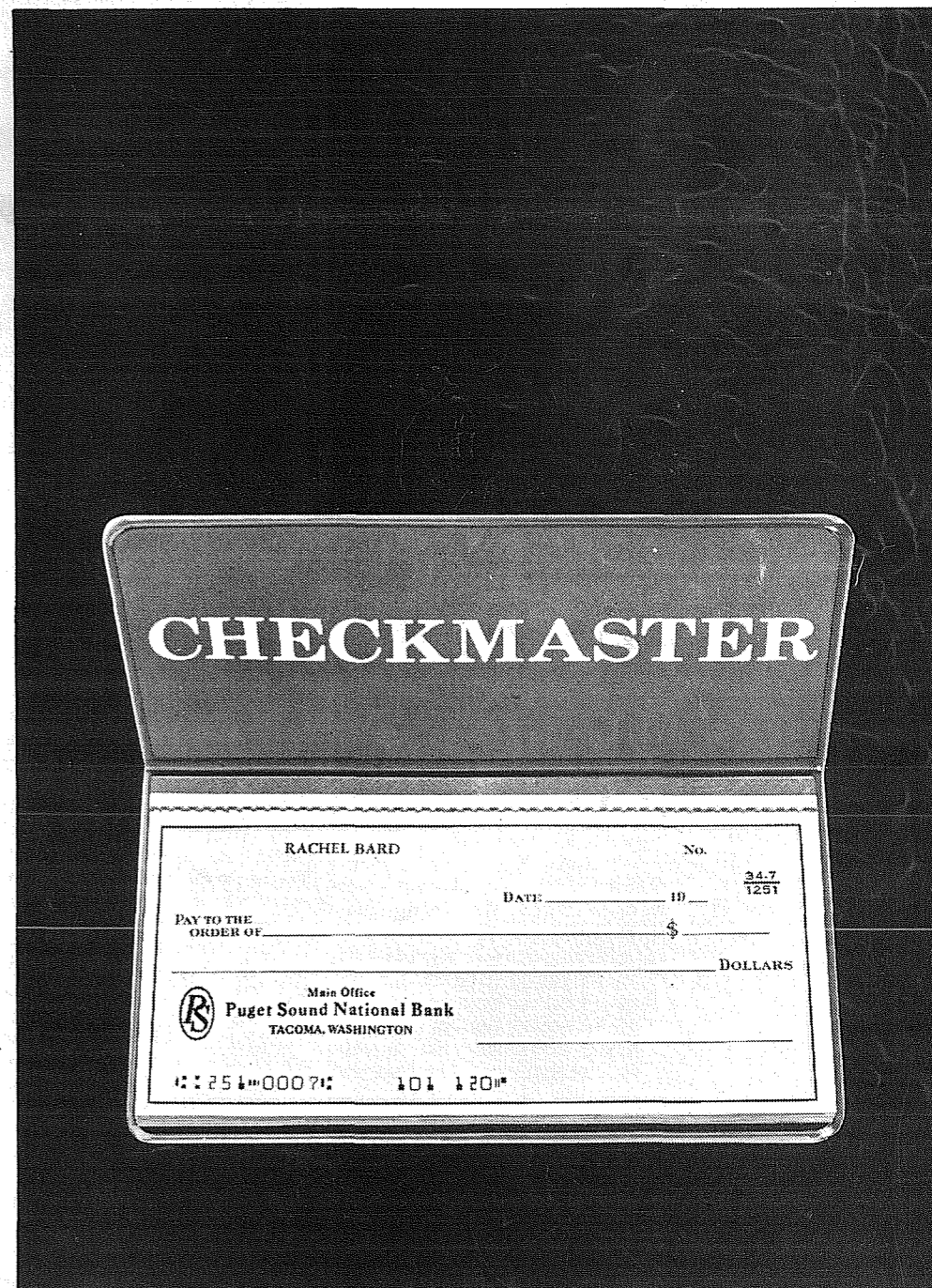
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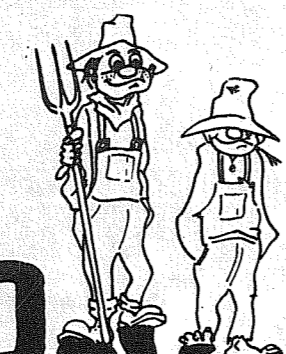

It was more than a century ago that Abraham Lincoln pointed out that the "legitimate object of government is to do for a community of people, whatever they need to have done, but cannot do at all or cannot so well do for themselves, in their separate and individual capacities."

He added, "In all that the people can individually do as well for themselves, government ought not to interfere." In considering the things that people cannot do "at all" or "so well do," Lincoln set up two classes. The first dealt with "wrongs" — prevention of crimes, misdemeanors, non-performance of contracts, and the like.

Lincoln's second category, which, as he put it, "embraces all which, in its nature . . . requires combined action," is what concerns me today. By "combined action" he meant government action and cited "public roads and highways" as an example. This is well and good and his philosophy unparalleled for that day and age. It does not, however, hold completely firm today, as practiced in tote by some branches of our government.

Lincoln's statement was made years before the public had a hand to any extent in investments. A house wife with her egg money invested in a large company just did not exist at that time. Today they outnumber the living in Lincoln's time.

Today companies formed, operated and financed by American dollars from all walks of life can "so well do" and therefore should be afforded the opportunity of facing an open field of endeavor wherein a return on the investor's dollar might be found. In some fields this is the case, but in far too many Uncle is in competition with the investor firms, operating a tax free business with our money and rarely making a return on it.

I've said it before and I say it again . . . Let's get the government out of business while we still live in a land of free enterprise. Soon it will be too late. When the time comes that the government controls the business world as we know it, it will be too late to do anything but jump when you're told, sit when you're told and stand when you're told. Our free-wheeling days of being our own master will have ceased to exist.

If some of the labor unions aren't riding for a fall, something has gone dismally wrong with the thinking of the people of this supposedly free nation.

Take, for instance, this recent event: The little town of Forest Grove, Oregon, has a 48-member glee club. Over the years it has developed an international reputation. It is 100 per cent amateur, the members being housewives, businessmen, professional men, and so on. Its funds come from voluntary donations.

The club was invited to appear in a big Los Angeles hotel to sing to a convention of dentists. Any revenues were to go into a pot to pay the club's way to Europe, where it has been invited to perform in various cities and countries.

And what happened? A union said that it would picket and close the hotel unless the club members, each and every one, joined up and paid an initiation fee of \$175 per person along with dues of \$36 a year. The Los Angeles appearance was cancelled.

If this isn't an example of a cruel and callous use of monopoly power, what is? And if this doesn't show the need to include organized labor within the framework of the antitrust laws, or something akin to them, what does?

So line up and start swinging. I can't live forever, any-how!

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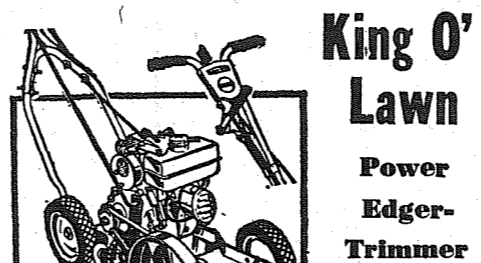
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Mrs. Harvey Becomes New P-TA Prexy

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VA Informs On Vets Cemeteries

Any deceased veteran of wartime or peacetime service, whose last period of service terminated honorably, is eligible for burial in any national cemetery in which grave space is available. John B. Kirsh, Manager of the Seattle Veterans Administration Regional Office, said recently.

The spouse, widow or widower of an eligible veteran may be buried in the same grave or in an adjoining grave if space is available.

A minor child of the veteran may also be buried in a national cemetery in the same grave in which either parent has been interred.

Should the spouse or child die before the veteran, the veteran must sign a paper stating his intention to be buried in the national cemetery before the spouse or child can be buried there.

At the time of the death of a veteran, spouse or child eligible for burial in a national cemetery, the mortician or person responsible for funeral arrangements should request interment directly from the superintendent of the national cemetery.

There is no charge for the gravesite in a national cemetery, or for the opening or closing of the grave therein.
