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



At approximately 7:15 last Tuesday night fire broke out in the Parkland Theatre Building, possibly caused by a faulty popcorn machine, bringing thousands of dollars of damage to the theater and the building's two other occupants, A2Z Realty and Parkland Sewing Center.

Almost before the smoke had cleared away, workmen were covering the area like ants at a family picnic, pounding, tearing, and ripping apart pieces of charred wreckage that had shortly before been the focal point of weekly entertainment for families and teenagers from many miles around.

Everyday the hot, sweaty, dirty job continues. At almost any time, day or night, workmen can be seen laboring at the long, tedious job cleaners.



**Salmon Tagging Now Underway**

The Washington State Department of Fisheries is currently tagging pink salmon in five major pink salmon streams on Puget Sound in an investigation in conjunction with the Fisheries Research Board of Canada and the International Pacific Salmon Fisheries Commission.

The Washington agency is gathering pink salmon by beach seines in the lower reaches of the five streams - Skagit, Nooksack, Snohomish, Stillaguamish and Dungeness rivers - and by one fish wheel in the Skagit. Salmon are tagged and released to continue their migration journeys. Later, spawning grounds will be checked for tagged to untagged ratios from which stream population determinations can be made. This total, added to this year's pink catch, will give a good indication of the pink run in Puget Sound.


The Fisheries Research Board of Canada has been tagging pink salmon off Cape Flattery since early July. The IPSFC is tagging in the Fraser River.

The overall pink tagging program, to gain more knowledge on migration patterns and size of runs, etc. was begun last year by the three fisheries agencies. Last year the Canadian Fisheries Department was also involved in some of the tagging.

Benefits can certainly result. The travelers who fly


**Letter to the Editor . . .**

the route will be given faster, more convenient service. More important, any peaceful relations between the two nations may contribute in some measure to a better understanding and to an eventual lessening of tensions.  
Last but not least, the people I have mentioned that feel there is something left to be desired in our way of life can travel to the land of the communists with ease.  
I personally think we should make it as easy as we can for these folks. The easier it is for them to make the trip the faster we will be rid of them.  
As long as we're on the subject, I hope our negotiators kept on their toes and wrote unequivocal safeguards into the terms finally agreed upon. The reason for that is simple. The U.S. airline that will provide service is Pan American World Airways--a self-supporting private enterprise with some 40,000 stockholders. The Russian airline that will provide service is Aeroflot--and it is wholly government-owned and a branch of the Soviet air force.  
So, if Aeroflot were allowed to, it could offer ridiculously low fares--losses are nothing to a socialized enterprise, or to a military arm, because increased taxes can always be levied to cover them. It would be used as a weapon in the Soviet economic war against us.  
The new service seems a desirable addition to international air traffic. But American rights and needs be carefully protected.

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**Dairymen Realize Farm Revolution**

Dairymen as well as all others in the business of farming are finding that we are really in a farm revolution. Whether it is good or not for the country or for farming, the dairy business is getting larger and more efficient. Dairymen in any area must keep up with the times and produce milk as efficiently as other areas. It they do not, transportation and marketing technique soon puts the less efficient out of business and this very thing is happening every day.  
There are many dairymen who have expanded their herd to "Keep up with the times". Many of these have not actually become more efficient but just work harder.  
This time of the year, before we get into the winter season, should be a good time to take stock of your dairy operation. Is it more efficient or do you just work harder? Would a little reorgan-

ization of gates make access to feed yards, loafing sheds easier? Are calf pens set up to make feed calves in a dozen places? Did you know that saving ten steps per cow a day would save you 50 miles of walking in a year if you had a 30 cow herd? Most of the time, the things done are such a habit, time is never taken to find a new and easier way.  
Now is the time to check your dairy layout to see if it is arranged for ease in milking, handling, and feeding of cows, feeding and handling of calves and young stock, easy manure handling using machines whenever possible.

### Fair Opens Saturday

PUYALLUP---- A major portion of the state's population will begin descending on Puyallup Saturday as the 58th edition of the Western Washington Fair opens its gates for a nine-day show.

Already established on the 46-acre Fairgrounds are several thousand exhibitors, hundreds of animals, a sparkling list of entertainers for the grandstand show, and the ever-present youngster, waiting for the Fairway's attractions to open for his benefit.

With their fingers crossed for good weather, the fair association's board of directors made a final tour of the big exposition this week and pronounced the plant ready for a new attack on the attendance record. That was set last fall, when 406,774 persons passed through the Fair's turnstiles.

On a daily basis, 55,359 individuals will have to visit the Fair on opening day to match last year's mark. The following day, the first Sunday of the Fair, is always the biggest attendance day --- last year 76,726 people were counted.

The fair that has "something for everyone" will be open at 7:00 a.m. Saturday and continue through until midnight, observing those hours through September 24.

The grandstand show, center of attraction twice daily --- at 1:30 and 7:00 p.m. --- promises many a thrill, many a laugh for the throngs which fill the stands each day. The attractions will range from top-flight entertainers, led by the Kristensens, famed circus troupe from Denmark, to the excitement of one of the West's biggest rodeos, where the nation's leading cowboys will compete for an estimated \$15,000 in prizes, as well as points in national competition.

In between the two extremes will be Cy Tailon, grandstand show master of ceremonies; horse races called by one of the country's best, Harry Hensen; the crowd pleasing clown, Happy Kellems; Pompofo, They and Family, a zany Spanish quintet who have become known as The Royal Family of Comedy; and Washington State's own George Prescott, a cowboy in his own right who has "retired" to the less rigorous activity of announcing rodeo events throughout the Pacific Northwest, and many another all star attraction.

Topping off the nightly grandstand show will be an attraction fast disappearing in the United States --- a gigantic fireworks display which is recognized as a spectacle in itself.

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Much of the judging --- including photo, art, handicraft and hobby exhibits --- has already been accomplished, but 4-H and Future Farmers of America competition will continue throughout Fair Week.

### Hay Quality A Factor

This is one of the questions asked most frequently by dairymen and stockmen. Hay is one of the most variable products, quality wise, sold or used by farmers.

Hay quality depends on the kinds of grasses and legumes used, stage of maturity when cut; weather conditions when hay is cured; methods of handling during harvest; storage conditions; and weather conditions during transport.

Top-quality hay retains its fresh green color and fresh clean smell. It also has a high proportion of leaves to stems. It is free of musty, mildewed odors, greyish or black discoloration, and damp moldy areas.

About 75 per cent of the feed value of alfalfa and clover is in the leaves. If the leaves shatter, feed value is lost.

Alfalfa hay can lose from 25 to 50 per cent of the dry matter if rained on. These losses are due to leaching, shattering of leaves, and change in protein and other feed nutrients. These losses are mostly the soluble, most easily digested part of the hay.

More feed value is probably lost by harvesting hay when it is too mature than for any other reason.

Three years research in Washington showed that irrigated alfalfa had from 5 to 10 per cent more protein when cut at the pre-bloom stage than the full bloom stage. Pre-bloom protein was approximately 2 to 5 per cent higher than the one-tenth bloom protein.

In Wyoming 1628 pounds of alfalfa cut at the pre-bloom stage were required to produce 100 pounds of gain by steers. One-

tenth bloom hay required 2086 pounds; full bloom, 2163 pounds; and the seed stage, 3910 pounds. Production of milk would be similar.

The one-tenth bloom hay would be worth twice as much in feed value as hay harvested in the seed stage.

It is often possible to reduce leaf shatter by the use of hay conditioners. These machines reduce the drying time by increasing the moisture loss from the stems. Conditioners usually reduce drying time about one-half.

If hay is baled with too high a moisture content or if it is not protected from the weather, it is likely to mold, lose feed value and be unpalatable to cows. Use of good species and harvesting at the right stage of maturity cannot prevent such a development.







**Best Way to Freeze Corn** Homemakers are often in a quandary as to whether it is best to freeze corn on the cob or to freeze cut corn. Often they remark that friends or neighbors have found marvelous new short cuts, such as freezing raw corn on the cob right in the husks. Others claim their corn had a "funny" taste so their families didn't care for it.

Some tried and true freezer research tips from Inez Eckblad, WSU Extension foods specialist, should clear up many of the queries, Miss Eckblad believes. Miss Eckblad points out that most vegetables for freezing need a period of blanching to stop the maturing process and then a period of thorough cooling. This may be the answer to that "funny" taste homemakers have experienced with frozen corn on the cob.

For the fresh-from-the-garden flavor, the specialist offers the following pointers for freezing corn on the cob.

Choose ears with plump, milk-filled kernels that offer only slight resistance to pressure. Work as quickly as possible—an hour from garden to kettle is a good rule of thumb. Holding the product for any length of time will not give premium results. Enzyme action continues after harvesting, which means the corn continues to mature and lose sweetness.

Clean thoroughly and trim off any bad spots. Put 4 to 6 ears of corn into about 3 gallons of boiling water. Leave for 8 to 12 minutes—the youn8er and smaller the kernels, the less time it takes. Quick thorough cooling is the next important step. The cob continues to cook unless thoroughly cooled; result: a "cobby" taste. So plunge the blanched ears of corn into cold running water for 8 to 12 minutes. Be sure they feel cool when taken out of the water before packaging.

Next step—pack ears into containers, plastic poultry bags—the small-size—make good ones. Then freeze immediately at 0 degrees F. Miss Eckblad reminds that cut corn is a little more economical to freeze in quantity because it takes up less space in the freezer. To prepare cut corn, she says, follow the same procedure as for corn on the cob but cut the pre-heating time to 2 to 3 minutes, since it isn't necessary to cook the cob. When the corn has cooled 2 to 3 minutes in cold running water, cut off the kernels and pack into containers. No further moisture is needed. For more detailed information on freezing late summer vegetables, Miss Eckblad reminds that Extension Bulletin #375, "From Farm to Freezer", is available at the county Extension office.


