





PUYALLUP---- A major portion of the state's population will begin des-cending on Puyallup Saturday as the 58th edition of the Western Washington Fair opens its gates for a nine-day show.

Already established on the 46-acre Fairgrounds are several thousand exhibitors, hundreds of animals, a sparkling list of entertainers for the grandstand show, and the ever-present youngster, waiting for the Fairway's attractions to open for his benefit.

With their fingers crossed for good weather, fair association's board of directors made a final tour of the big exposition this week and pronounced the plant ready for a new attack on the attendance record. That was set last fall, when 406,774 persons-passed through the Fair's turnstiles.

On a daily basis, 55,359 individuals will have to visit the Fair on opening day to match last year's mark. The following day, the first Sunday of the Fair, is always the biggest attendance day --- last year 76,726 people were counted.

The fair that has "something for every-one" will be open at 7:00 a.m. Saturday and con-tinue through until midnight, observing those hours through September The grandstand show,

center of attraction twice daily --- at 1:30 and 7:00 p.m. --- promises many a thrill, many a laugh for the throngs which fill the stands each day. The attractions will range from top-flight entertainers, led by the Kristensens, famed circus troupe from Denmark, to the ex-citement of one of the West's biggest rodeos, where the nation's leading cowboys will compete for an estimated \$15,000 in prizes, as well as points in national competition.

In between the two extremes will be Cy Tail-lon, grandstand show master of ceremonies; horse races called by one of the country's best, Harry Hensen; the crowd pleasing clown, Happy Kellems; Pompoff, Thedy and Family, a zany Spanish quintet who have become known as The Royal Family of Comedy; and Washington State's own George Prescott, a cowboy in his own right who has "retired" to the less rigorous activity of announcing rodeo events throughout the Pacific Northwest, and many another all star attraction.

Topping off the night-ly grandstand show will be an attraction fast disappearing in the United States --- a gigantic fire-works display which is recognized as a spectacle in itself.

Throughout the nineday show, dignitaries from throughout Washington will lead groups to the Fair in observance of days designated to honor areas of the state. That schedule includes: Opening Day, Grange, Pioneer and Eastern Washington Day; Sunday, September 17. Armed Forces Day; Monday, September 18,

Hay Quality A Factor

This is one of the questions asked most frequen-tly by dairymen and stockmen. Hay is one of the most variable products, quality wise, sold or used by farmers.

Hay quality depends on the kinds of grasses and legumes used, stage of maturity when cut; weather conditions when hay is cured; methods of handling during harvest; storage conditions; and weather conditions during transport.

Top-quality hay retains its fresh green color and fresh clean smell. It also has a high proportion of leaves to stems. It is free of musty, mildewed odors, greyish or black discoloration, and damp moldy areas.

About 75 per cent of the feed value of alfalfa and clover is in the leaves. If the leaves shatter, feed value is lost.

Alfalfa hay can lose from 25 to 50 per cent of the dry matter if rained on. These losses are due to leaching, shattering of leaves, and change in protein and other feed nutrients. These losses are mostly the soluble, most easily digested part of the hay.

More feed value is probably lost by harvesting hay when it is too mature than for any other reason.

Three years research in Washington showed that irrigated alfalfa had from 5 to 10 per cent more protein when cut at the pre-bloom stage than the full bloom stage. Prebloom protein was approximately 2 to 5 per cent higher than the onetenth bloom protein.

In Wyoming 1628 pounds of alfalfa cut at the prebloom stage were required to produce 100 pounds of gain by steers. One-

reduce leaf shatter by the use of hay conditioners. These machines reduce the drying time by increasing the moisture loss from the stems. Conditioners usually reduce drying time about one-

If hay is baled with too high a moisture content or if it is not protected from the weather, it is likely to mold, lose feed value and be unpalatabe to cows. Use of good species and harvesting at the right stage of maturity cannot prevent such a developement.





Best Way to Freeze Corn

Homemakers are often in a quandary as to whether it is best to freeze corn on the cob or to freeze cut corn. Often they remark that friends or neighbors have found marvelous new short cuts, such as freezing raw corn on the cob right in the husks. Others claim their corn had a "funny taste so their families didn't care for it.

Some tried and true freezer research tips from Inez Eckblad, WSU Extension foods specialist, should clear up many of the queries, Miss Belshaw believes.

Miss Eckblad points out that most vegetables for freezing need a period of blanching to stop the maturing process and then a period of thorough cooling. This may be the answer to that "funny" taste homemakers have experienced with frozen corn on the cob.

For the fresh-fromthe-garden flavor, the specialist offers the following pointers for freezing corn on the cob.

els, the less time it takes. Quick thorough cooling is the next important step. The cob continues to cook unless thoroughly cool; result: a "cobby" taste. So plunge the blanched ears of corn into cold running water for 8 to 12 minutes. Be sure they feel cool when taken out of the water before packaging.




