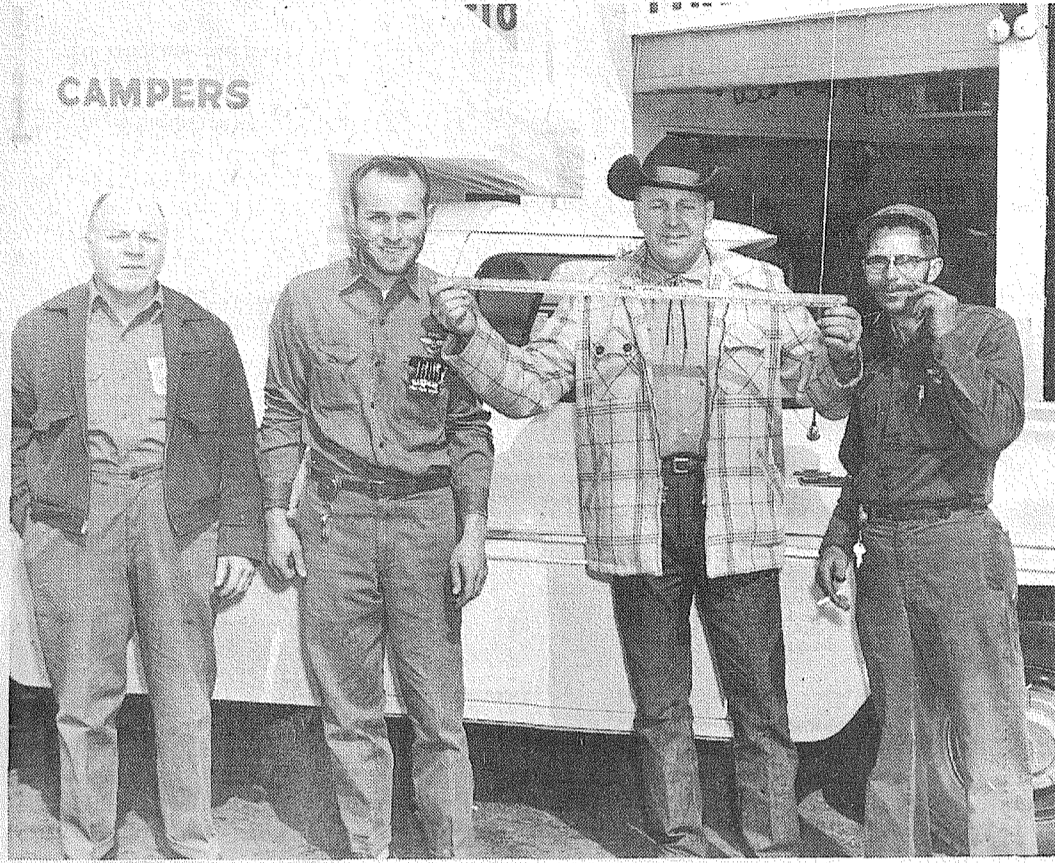

FP Announces Talent Winners

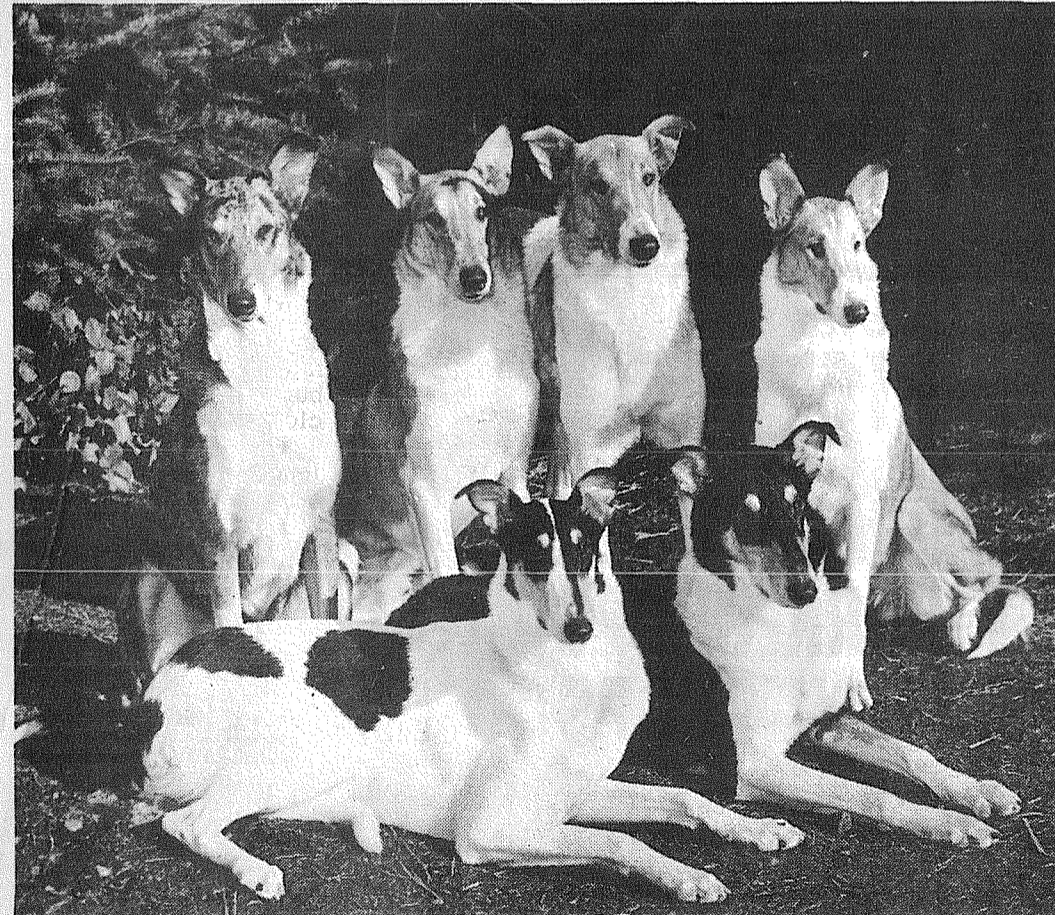

The training and obedience observed during the show is part of the preparation for these dogs in their life-work as companions and guides for blind youngsters, who are not eligible

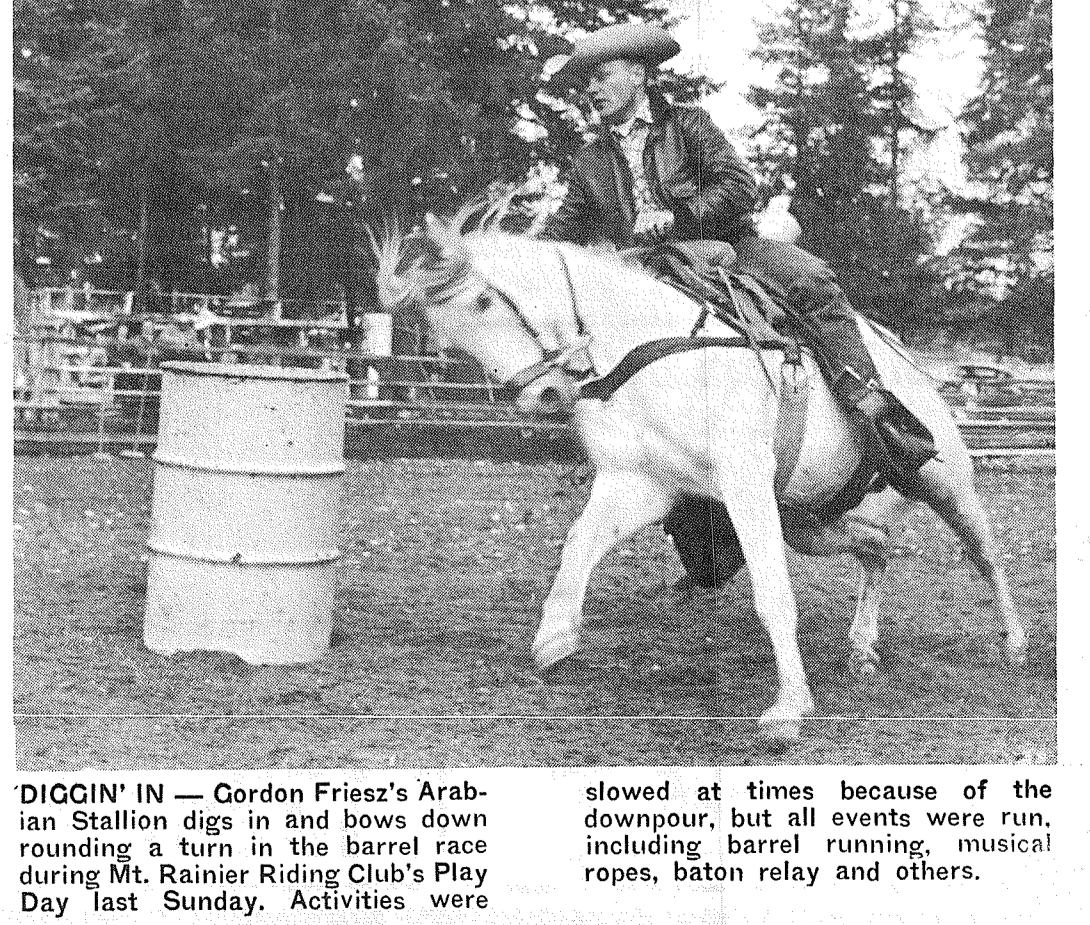
Let Me Tell One: Scholarship
