Leaver Says Group Must Take Action

Group action to obtain a safe and clean drainage area in Parkland is a must, according to Robert E. Leaver, district Engineer, sanitary engineering Section of the State of Washington Department of Health.

Leaver, in a letter to the Parkland Sewer Commission, last week pointed out that the roadside ditches checked by chemists from Pierce County Laboratory showed relatively large quantities of the organisms from the intestinal tract. The organism is coliform bacteria and a count of 300/100cc. is considered a strong concentration.

Leaver said also it is true that some septic tanks and drain fields in certain areas of the Parkland Sewer District are disposing of sewage underground. He added that when there is run off in the ditches, contaminated water can, and does, run in practically all the area ditches.

Leaver was quoting figures from the survey taken in February of this year by the District Sanitarian of the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department. The results show a 3,900/100cc. of coliform bacteria as one of the low counts in the area surveyed.

Some of the ditches surveyed were: at 110th and Pacific Avenue, east side; 40,000/100cc. of coliform bacteria; S. 119th and A Sts., unable to count plate overgrown; S. 107th and J, 3,700/100cc.; 107th and Pacific Avenue, 6,500/100cc.; 100th and Pacific Avenue, west side 40,000/100cc.

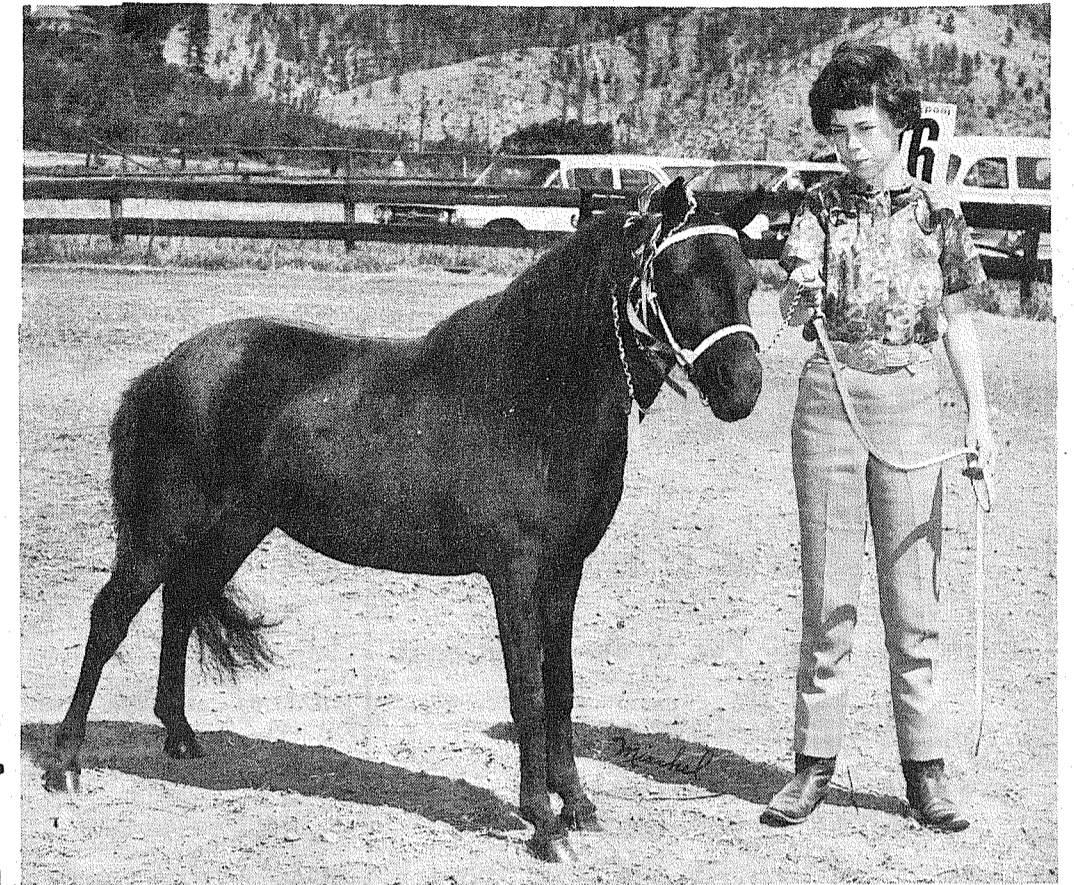

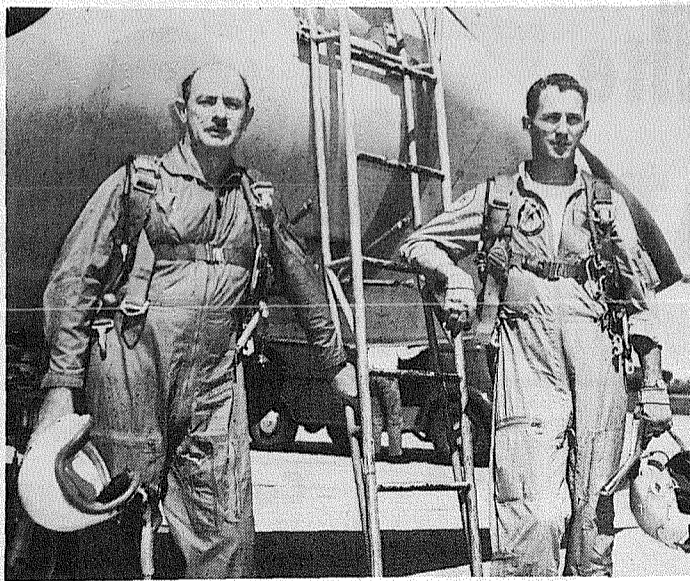
Bethel Hi Addition To Be Viewed

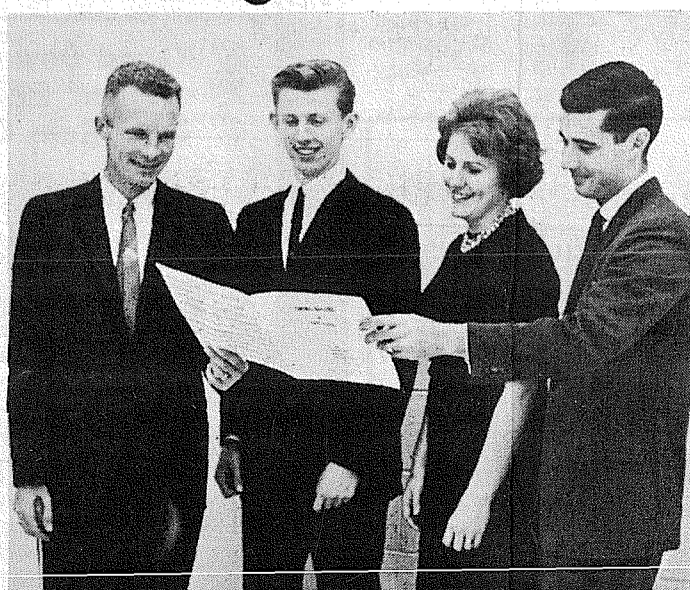

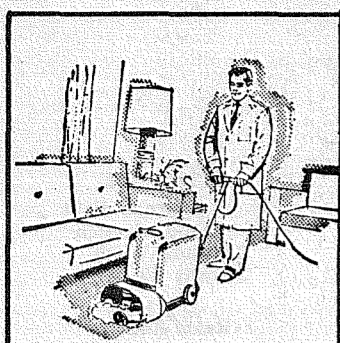

a - Wondering and a - Wandering ...

Last week I wandered down Florida way with the Air Force to cover the "William Tell" weapons meet at Tyndall AFB near Panama City. No doubt you have read about it in the dailies, seen it on TV and what not by now. To come up with a complete story on the event that ended Monday would border on the ridiculous for a weekly such as ours, but perhaps I can bend your ear, figuratively speaking, enough to let you in on some of the behind-the-scenes purposes, thoughts and reasoning that other media have left untouched, and with luck, still hold your interest.

A week ago Saturday at 8 a.m. on a grey, bleak morning we blasted off from Grey Field in a small six place jet that the Air Force has jokingly dubbed the "Super Car". Just six hours and ten minutes after takeoff, including a stop for lunch and gas in Texas, we were stepping out of the sleek little craft into the warm Florida sunshine.

I spent the first day at Tyndall trying to find out just why the Air Force had brought men and equipment to this base from points all over the globe. Why blow the taxpayer's money on something like this? What was the purpose? Obviously they had carted my carcass along in the hopes that I might just find out for all of us the answers to these questions and perhaps further to instill in you, our readers, some sense of well being about the use of your tax dollar in defending your hide against any invasion ever kicked off by some joker like pudgy K.

It didn't take too long to find out the purposes of the meet. They were threefold. Number one, to recognize the best air crew - controller team in the USAF air defense system. Number two, to demonstrate the capabilities of interceptor weapons systems; and Number three, to evaluate the ability of USAF air defense crews to maintain, handle and load defense weapons.

There were fourteen teams and fifty-six planes entered in the competition. A competitive spirit that might easily exceed any high school athletic meet prevailed thruout the base. These teams had already proven their superiority over the other teams in elimination events and were now out to capture the title of "World's Best Interceptor Team".

Naturally I hung out around the McChord camp, a huge fifty-foot trailer sitting on the flight line near the planes, for the occasion.

The McChord boys were still prowling around, checking and rechecking well into the night. Twelve and fourteen hour days were the rule rather than the exception, and these by choice rather than decree.

In each simulated mission the planes were armed, the men "scrambled" and the planes off and on the chase, under the careful scrutiny of judges. Every move meant points earned or lost. From the start, McChord men took the lead. It was easy to see why.

Standing on the sidelines on their second mission I was swept up by the keen spirit of competition and sportsmanship shown by the men. They were—pure and simple . . . out to win. Here was a sight to behold as these men, your neighbors and mine, stood by waiting for the signal to hit the air. Every man keyed to a fever pitch, stood at his designated spot determined that his every move should win the nod of the judges.

I was standing on the flight line just behind the four McChord planes entered on one mission. As the signal was given the men on the chocks pulled on the lanyard and the giant weapons began to move with a blast that rolled me over backwards on the lawn. In seconds two of the giant birds were screaming down the runway and off, with the other two planes following moments later.

Where was the ground crew as the planes took off? Right out on the grass alongside the runway with hats off cheering and yelling. Where was I? Right in there with them, yelling my fool brains out. Talk about catching. No four pilots ever had a better rooting section.

As soon as the planes were off it was one grand rush back into the trailer to watch the entire chase and firing on TV. As each of the four McChord planes moved in on the drone for the kill, the trailer fairly rocked with cheers.

On the serious side for a minute, I wonder how many of you readers realize what all this means. The excellent scores turned in by the McChord team means just one thing. That each night as you sleep, the finest fighting outfit in the world stands ready and poised to guard our freedom and our land from any enemy . . . and don't think for one moment that the feats of these men have gone unnoticed by the reds. These neighbors and friends of ours are the best, and most certainly we owe them a vote of thanks for their efforts on our behalf. Nothing dictates that they should work themselves into a top team. They could just as easily be on the bottom of the pile, but they just don't seem to be the type for it.

So the next time you hear one of the boys out in an afterburner on his jet, long after midnight, forget about the grumbling. Turn over and go back to sleep, thankful that they are there. The rumble of an afterburner could well come from a plane with the hammer and sickle emblem except for them.

Hats off to all the McChord team, the controllers, pilots and ground crew, for a job well done!

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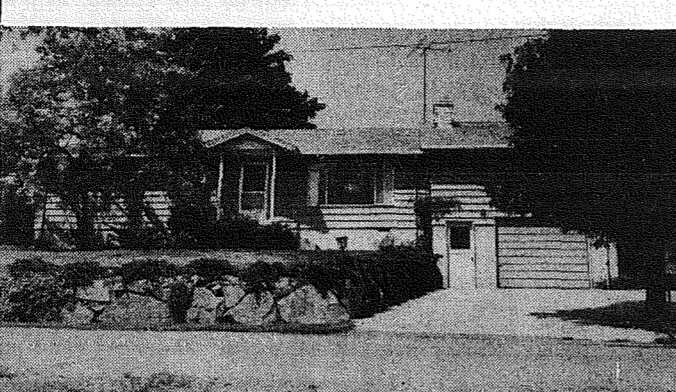

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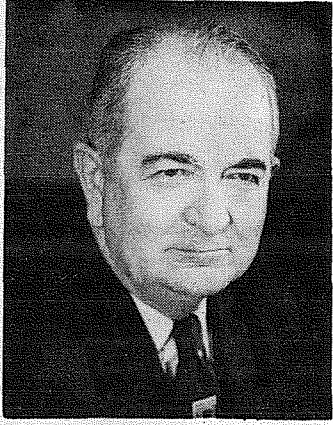
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Odlin Voted To Office Of ABA Group Honored

Patrol Chief Gives List For Winter Safety

Roy A. Betlach, Chief of the Washington State Patrol, had some suggestions for drivers about preparing their cars for winter driving.

Listed below are eight items to check in winterizing your car so that it is in top shape. "If you keep your car in good shape mechanically, and drive with extra care in bad weather, you should be able to drive safely all winter long," said Chief Betlach.

1. **BRAKES**—Have them adjusted, re-lined if necessary, be sure brake linings are free of grease.

2. **LIGHTS**—Be certain that both headlights work on upper and lower beams and that the stop lights, tail lights and also the directional signals work.

3. **TIRES**—Install your winter tires before the first snowfall and make sure all tires have good treads.

4. **CHAINS**—You should always carry a pair of reinforced tire chains. During deep snow and ice conditions, they enable you to stop and go safely, thus preventing skid accidents.

5. **WINDSHIELD WIPERS**—Your wiper blades should be in good condition so that they will sweep snow and sleet off the windshield and wipe it clean.

6. **DEFROSTER**—It is important to have your defroster working to prevent fogging.

7. **WINTER TUNE-UP**—An engine tune-up helps the motor start more easily and will keep it from stalling at critical times. Having it in top shape may save your life in an emergency.

8. **MUFFLER**—A rusty, leaking muffler or exhaust pipe can be a carbon monoxide hazard, particularly if you are stalled in traffic or a blizzard.

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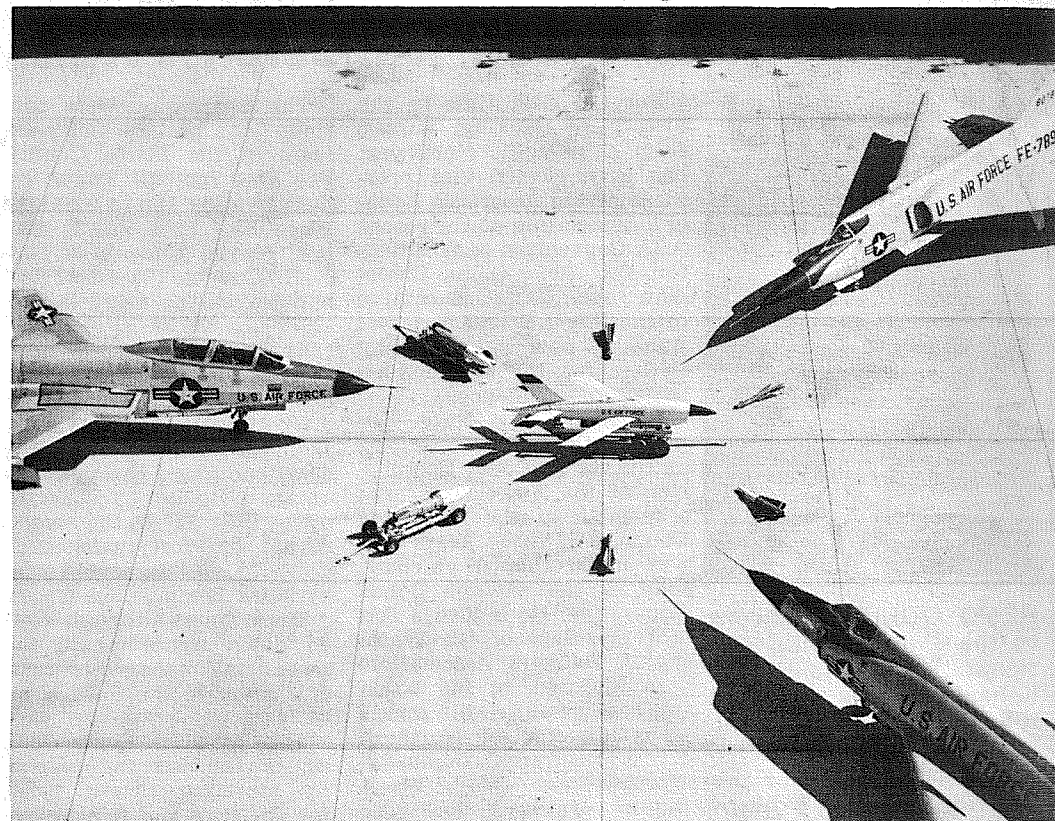

McChord's Air Show?**

Do you know how to get to McChord Air Force Base? If not, now is the time to get yourself a map and check the best route to take you there on Sunday, October 20.

If you wonder why you should drive to McChord that day, it's because of the ceremonies being held in honor of the 15th anniversary of the 25th Air Division, USAF.

The displays and events will be continuous from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Included in the list of events is an air show by the world famous Thunderbirds, the USAF's aerial demonstration team, and the Champion 318th Fighter Sq. back from operation "William Tell". Performing many varied and intricate maneuvers in their brightly colored F-100 Super Sabres, the Thunderbirds will thrill the young and old.

Other interesting things to see and enjoy will be a flying demonstration of a World War II Mustang (F-51), by Bob Hoover, an exhibition by Pete Bowers in his 1912 Curtiss Pusher aircraft, and flyovers of many of the jet aircraft now in service with the 25th Air Division.

From 8:30 a.m. until noon, tours of the Division and the Seattle Sector Combat and Direction Centers will be conducted. Shuttle bus service will be supplied from the parking areas to the Centers.

Parents, especially mothers with sons and daughters in the service, will be interested in touring the base's main dining hall to see the preparation and serving of food. Several base-operated concessions will be open for the sale of food and beverages. All proceeds from this endeavor, will go to the local United Good Neighbor fund drive.

The 25th Air Division has changed considerably since its activation in October 1948 at Silver Lake, Wash. It is now responsible for the air defense of the states of Washington, Oregon, and part of the states of Idaho, Montana, and California. Supporting the Division's jet interceptor squadrons in the Pacific Northwest area are U. S. Army NIKE-Hercules missile units, elements of the Royal Canadian Air Force, and U. S. Navy Radar Picket Ships — one and all components of the 25th Region, North American Air Defense Command (NORAD).

Those persons travelling on Highway 99 should take the McChord - Lakewood turn-off, go through the main (west) gate, through the stoplight intersection and follow the Air Police directions to the flight line area parking lot. For the Direction Center tour, turn right at the stoplight intersection and continue on the main road to Division Headquarters (SAGE Building). An alternate entrance from Highway 99 is at the Gravelly Lake - Ponders turn-off. Turn left at the first stop sign, follow Lincoln Blvd. past the Air Police check point to the Division Headquarters or continue on past the building to the traffic light. A right turn will lead you to the parking area on the flight line for the air show.
