

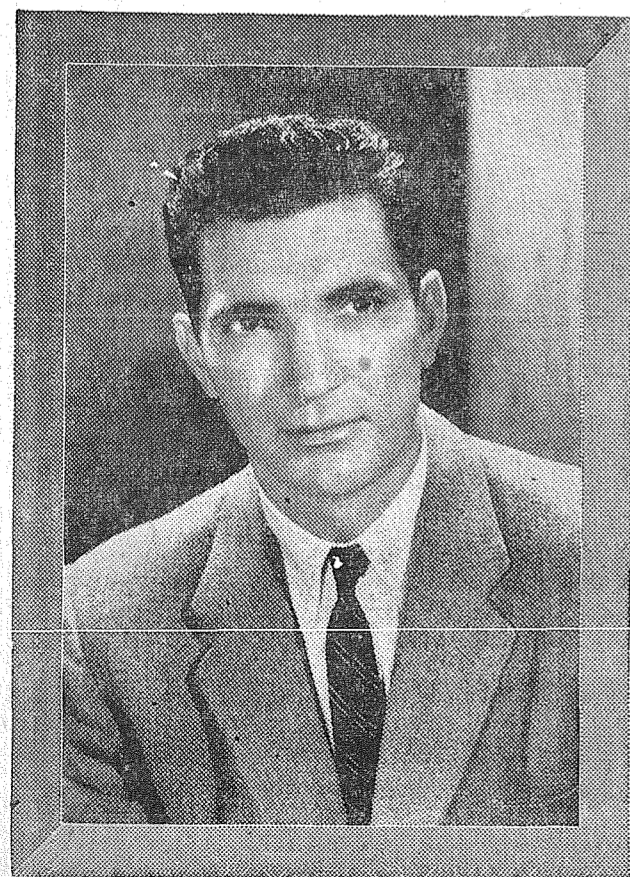

Camp Fire Girls Plant Trees to Mark Arbor Day

Thus, the Camp Fire Girls, an agency of the United Good Neighbor, have sought to beautify their surroundings in keeping with the Golden Jubilee Theme.

Rabbit School Set At Mt. Vernon

The Washington State Rabbit Breeders Assn. will hold its 14th. Annual rabbit school April 23, 24 at the Riverside Grange Hall in Mount Vernon, Wash. A panel of well-informed speakers, including Dr. Robert Casady, superintendent of the USDA Rabbit Experiment Station at Fontana, Calif. will discuss every aspect of the rabbit business. There will be displays of modern hutches, feeders, watering systems, ribbons, trophies, tattoo sets, tattoo boxes, nest boxes and nesting material. "We have allowed ample time for individuals to question the various speakers, both immediately following their talks and during an open forum on Sunday," writes Barbara Lang, chairman of the school. "We would especially like to urge all breeders, old and new alike along with any other interested people, to attend this school, for there will not be another opportunity such as this in which to increase their knowledge and skills for at least another year."

LET'S GO FISHING!

Sheriff Stojack Advises On Fishing Rules

Avid sportsmen eagerly await the opening of fishing season on lowland lakes of Pierce County. On that date the enthusiastic acceleration of thousands of Pierce County trailer-sailors will commence. A timely reminder to observe all boating rules and regulations comes from the Office of Pierce County Sheriff Frank Stojack. "Observe the rules of road and water — Operate in Safety — Safety for yourself and others," Stojack advises.

Quoting from the ordinance passed by the Board of County Commissioners on June 3, 1958 regulating speed limits on Pierce County waters, Sheriff Stojack cautions, "It is unlawful to operate a motor boat at a speed in excess of 8 m.p.h. within 200 feet of any shore, dock, or public swimming area or within 100 feet of any other water craft or swimmers." The 8 m.p.h. provision, however, "shall not apply to motor boat operators pulling water skiers for take-off landing when perpendicular to shore, dock or other launching facilities and such take-off or landing would not constitute an undue risk to persons or property."

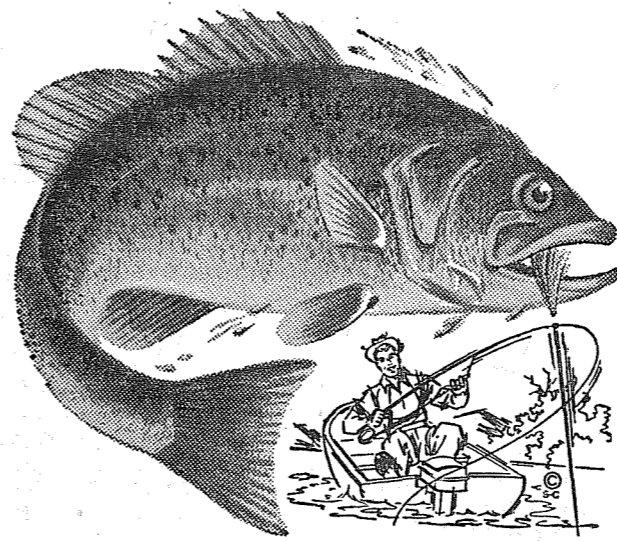
RED LIGHTS appear on Port side of boat, GREEN LIGHTS on the starboard. In approaching another vessel's stern, the overtaking boat is the BURDENED vessel. The boat being overtaken is the PRIVILEGED vessel and has the right of way.

Generally speaking, in approaching another craft head on, vessels should pass port to port.

Any vessel coming in sight in the area around one's boat located clockwise from dead ahead (12 o'clock) to the starboard beam (approximately 12:17 o'clock) has the right of way.

Buoys with odd numbers are black in color. Buoys with even numbers are red in color. Pass between buoys with odd or even numbers when entering or leaving a channel. It is illegal to tie to a buoy or any other aids to navigation.

Distress signals. A continuous sounding of a horn, bell or whistle in blasts of 4 or more, or continuous waving of an object. A

flare burning or waving flashlight of assistance is needed. A flashlight should always be aboard, even if return before dark is expected.

Generally speaking, a craft with an outboard motor (because of its greater maneuverability) should give right of way to larger vessels such as ferry boats, tugs, etc., and all sailboats have right of way at all times.

Excessive speed in the vicinity of fishing vessels, boats aground, or tied to piers or floats, should be avoided. A VESSEL IS RESPONSIBLE FOR ITS OWN WAKE. Do not fail to reduce speed in anchorage areas. Do not operate near swimmers or water skiers.

It is advisable that all boats equipped with outboards carry at all times a spare oar or paddle, can or pail for bailing, extra line, pliers, crescent wrench, screw driver, extra shear pin and spark-plug. A suitable cleat of some sort adequate to fasten tow line in case

of assistance is needed. A flashlight should always be aboard, even if return before dark is expected.

It is recommended that when leaving on an all-day weekend cruise that some responsible person be given full description of your boat, be told of your planned destination, estimated time en route and proposed or alternate route considered. If on failing to return the Coast Guard is notified, and a search is undertaken and the boat returns safely without the aid of the Coast Guard, the Coast Guard should be notified immediately. Pacific Telephone-Northwest announced a plan today to provide all Tacoma, including Dupont, customers with extended area dialing to Puyallup, Sumner and Graham, without long distance charges. Telephone customers in those cities also would be able to dial Tacoma and Dupont telephones without long distance charges. Customer opinion of the plan in Puyallup, Sumner and Graham will be asked starting next week through a post card survey conducted by Pacific Telephone-Northwest. Customers in the Tacoma exchange will not be included in the survey since there would be no increase in regular local monthly rates here. Long distance charges on calls to Puyallup, Sumner and Graham, however, would be eliminated for Tacoma and Dupont customers.

because of growing interest in extended area service with Tacoma by telephone customers in Puyallup, Sumner and Graham," manager Ron Johnson explained. He emphasized that plans to provide extended area dialing would depend on results of the survey and the approval of the Washington Public Service Commission. Most Graham telephone customers, for example, can call about 550 telephones now. Under the new plan they would be able to dial 116,600 telephones in Puyallup, Sumner, Tacoma and Dupont. Graham customers with optional extended service now would have the number of phones they can call increased from 16,500 to 116,600. "Business, economic and social ties between the three cities and Tacoma have grown extensively during the past few years," Johnson said. "Extended area service would help meet the increasing need for direct phone service between them." The post card survey questionnaires to be mailed to Puyallup, Sumner and Graham customers next week include an explanation and map of present and proposed calling areas, and new monthly service rates which would be asked in those cities.

**a-Wondering . . .
and a-Wandering . . .**
With JACK BROWN

I'm directing this article towards church members and members of various school and service clubs in our area who enjoy a game of bingo occasionally. If you'll stop and think, this is the first time you have seen the word "bingo" in print for quite some time. As silly as it may seem to you, this is about the only type of article wherein by law we can openly use the word except to advise you that a game of bingo held at such and such a place was raided by law enforcement officers, or some other such action.

Due to the element of change, bingo is classed as a lottery and thus no announcement advising the public of the intention to hold a game may be printed and distributed through the U.S. mails. A recent P.O. ruling brought out the fact that we in the newspaper business cannot refer to games of chance in any manner. We can't refer to them as "Games Nights", "Party Nights", "Zingo" "Bango" or in any other camouflaged play upon words.

The postal rules further state: "No exemption from the rules regarding non-mailability of lottery information is granted because the lottery may be conducted by churches, fraternal groups or other worthy organizations."

I bring all this out for two reasons. First: Each week some club or church group sends or brings us a story concerning bingo, prizes, door prizes or such which we cannot print and sometimes it takes a lot of explaining to avoid hard feelings over the matter. We did not write the law nor did the present postal people who must now enforce it. Secondly: I, my family, my friends and my neighbors play bingo quite often and I for one would like to do it legally as I'm sure you would too.

By state law a bingo game is unlawful, yet people from all walks of life daily are entertained by and greatly enjoy the game. Some are lucky and win, while those who are not so fortunate lose only a small amount of money. This in my way of thinking can certainly not bring havoc to the financial stability of our citizens nor lower their morals. I like bingo. I think it's a lot of fun. I think there should be no restriction on it and so do you, judging by the attendance at these games, yet you and I both know that each time we walk through the door of a church or a club to play bingo we become a lawbreaker.

To me the one big issue is not the pros and cons or good and bad of bingo or other games of chance. It's a matter of molding the minds and lives of our youngsters. How can you raise a child to be a law abiding citizen and still take or permit the child to attend a bingo game each week? That's a question I keep asking myself nearly every week for my two boys are ardent bingo fans. How do I explain to them that even though it is against the law I think it's alright for them to go?

It's a problem that needs correcting immediately if we are to continue to think of ourselves as good righteous law abiding citizens. We cannot continue to accept the teachings of God from the pulpits on Sundays and condone lawlessness in the basements on Fridays, for we were not meant to all be hypocrites.

There is only one answer. It's obvious that the majority of residents of our state and nation consider bingo and such as a harmless pastime. Since our lawmakers are elected to office to reflect the voice of our people, let us then flood them with mail urging an immediate repeal of our lottery laws or at least an amendment making legal the activities we all seem to enjoy so much, so that all of us may live as law abiding citizens.

There is no reason why a movement started here in Pierce county could not snowball overnight and blanket our entire state, bringing about a release from the chains of bondage holding us out to the world as a people with no respect for the laws of our land.

The next move then would be to appeal to our congressmen to ease ancient postal laws passed at the insistence of some long forgotten band of do-gooders so that we in the newspaper business can call a spade a spade and a bingo game a bingo game.

I don't know what you think about this but I think we all might hold our heads just a little higher if it came to pass.

By the way. How much will be in the jackpot next Friday?
