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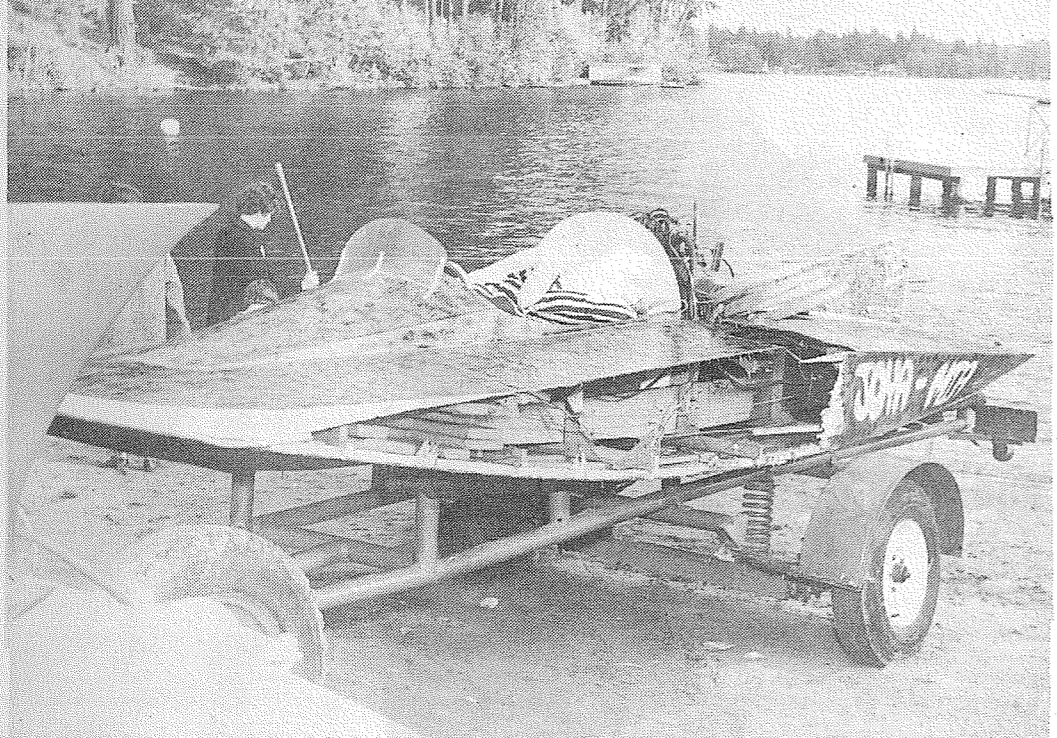
Hydro Races Sunday

Freshmen Prepare For PLU Opening

Over 500 freshmen and transfer students will converge on the Pacific Lutheran University campus Sunday for four days of orientation prior to the opening of the school year Thursday, Sept. 20. University officials expect an enrollment for the fall semester about equal to last year which was 1,752 students. The orientation program will include placement and achievement tests, lectures by university administrators and student leaders, registration and social events. Dr. Robert Mortvedt, who took over the reins as eighth president of the university on August 1, will give the address at the opening convocation Sept. 20. Dr. and Mrs. Mortvedt are living in the president's home, Park Ave. and 123rd St. Eighteen new full-time faculty members have been added. They and their families have moved into the Parkland area in recent days.

The new teachers and their positions include: Dr. Harry S. Adams, associate professor of physics; Wayne K. Aller, assistant professor psychology; Roy E. Martha Huber, instructor in psychology; JoAnn Hundtofte, instructor in English; Donna Mae Johnson, instructor in nursing; Calvin M. Knapp, instructor in Spanish and French; Thomas C. Reeves, instructor in history; Dr. Vermont Tye, associate professor of psychology; Janet M. Ulleland, instructor in nursing; Boris Illashevich, instructor in Russian and German.

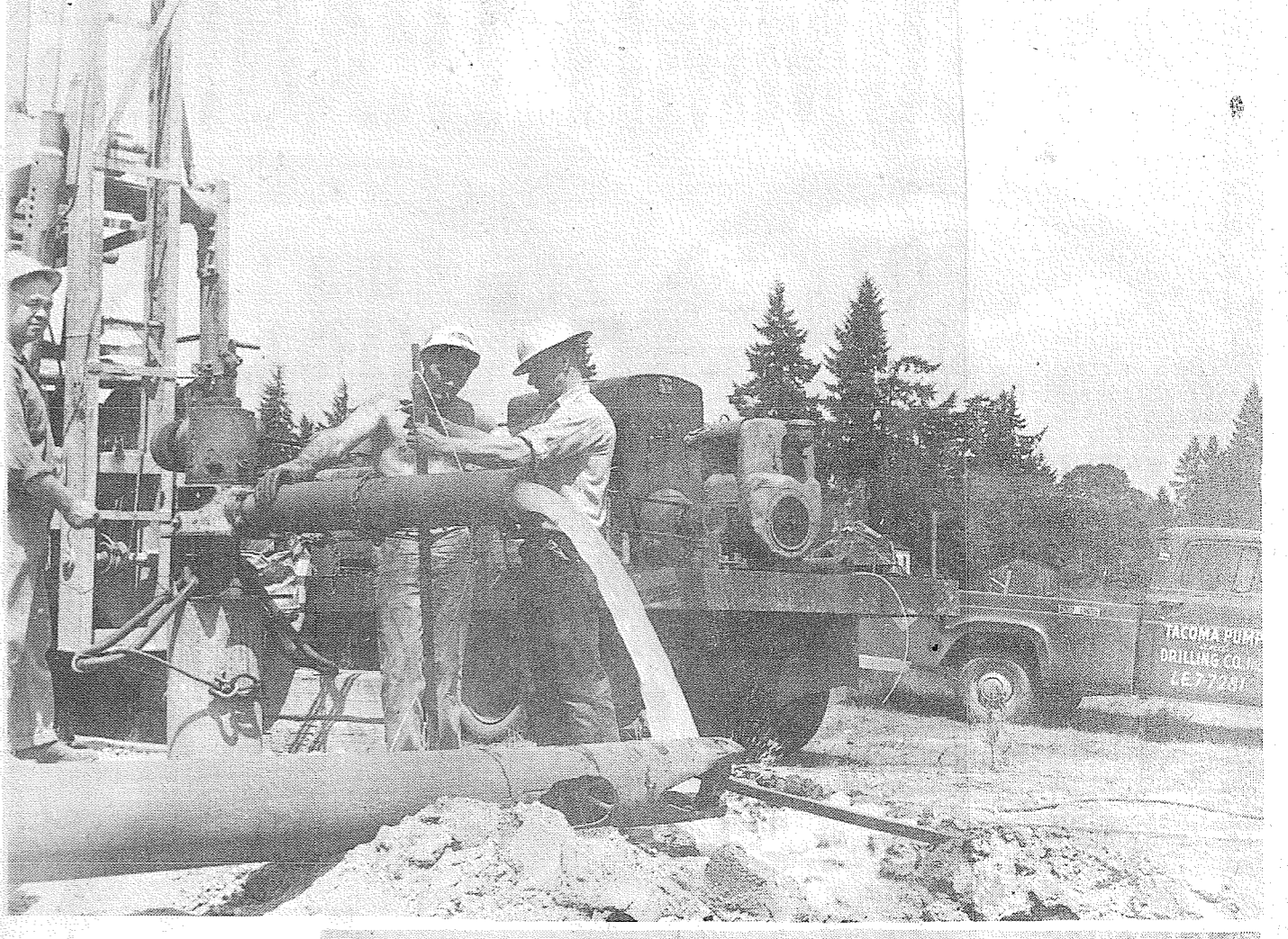
Elk Plain Grange To Meet Mondays

Blood Appeal Issued For Woman

Mrs. Mary Pamela Bradshaw of Spanaway, lies ill in Tacoma General Hospital this week, with a blood ailment which threatens not only her own life, but the life of her unborn child. Her unusual illness has required nearly 20 pints of blood so far, and although temporarily improved, she may require future transfusions. It is estimated that 60 pints of blood are needed to replenish the blood bank supply. Her husband, Ronnie, this week issued an appeal to residents of the area to donate blood. Donors may give blood at the Tacoma Blood Bank to her credit. The Bank operates on Tuesday and Thursday from 11 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The Bank is located at 1211 South 12th St. The 23-year-old Mrs. Bradshaw has had her pregnancy-connected illness tested at the University of Washington Medical School and further tests are scheduled at the University of Oregon Medical School.

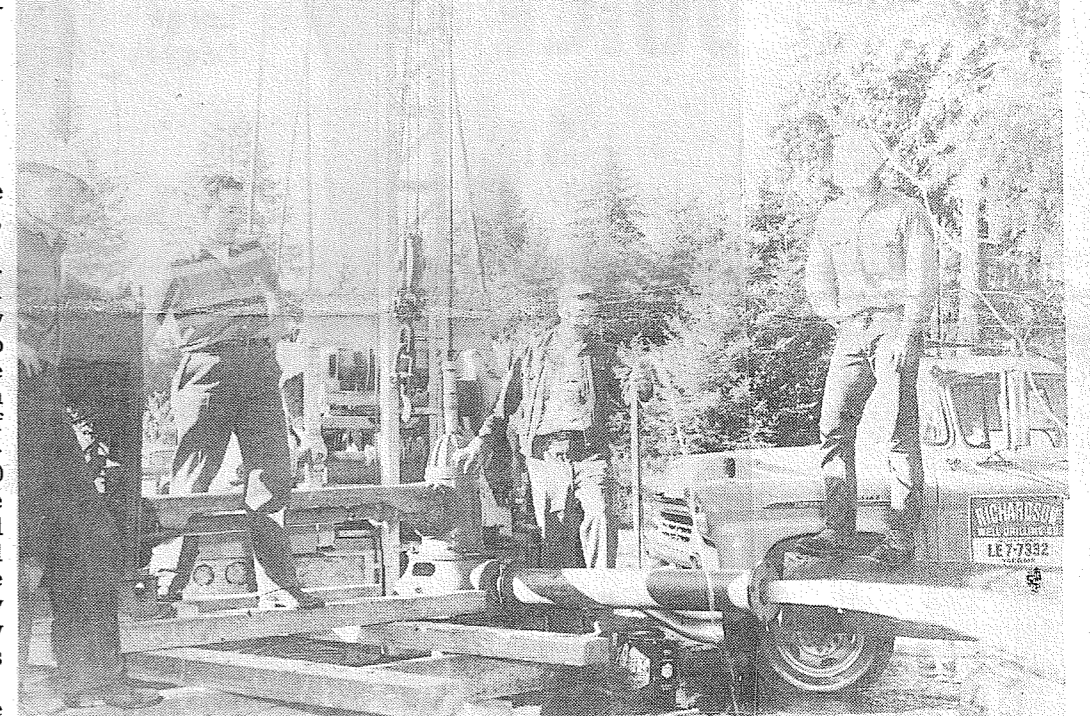
Bethel Enrollment Reaches New High
A new high in enrollments in the Bethel District was achieved this year, with a total of 2770 students in attendance, an increase of 185 over last year. This shows a percentage growth of 7%. The largest increase is in the high school, which now numbers 490. The kindergarten class, now the largest in the district, numbers 242. Bethel District has received State Board approval of its preliminary plans for an addition to Bethel High School. The approval carries with it a preliminary allocation of \$75,286.65 in State Matching Funds for the \$185,000 project that will provide vocational, music, physical education and general classroom facilities. The district architect, Harry Botesch of Everett, is now proceeding with final plans and specifications. A special session of the Bethel School Directors will convene Friday, Sept. 28th at 2 p.m. in the Treasurers Office of Pierce County, to open bids and take action on a \$140,000 bond issue sale. This money will finance the Bethel High School addition and other capital improvements and additions in the district. Julius W. Detrick has been added to the staff of Bethel's special education division, to work with Mrs. Katherine Small, Director. Although Sept. 17th has been proclaimed a holiday for students to attend the Puyallup Fair, it will be a work day for teachers, who will be taking part in the district workshop held at Bethel Junior High on that day.

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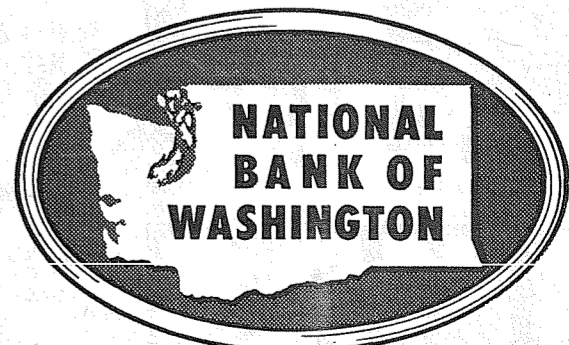
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**a - Wondering and

making special formulas. Basically you need Soil, Peatmoss, Sand and a complete fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphorus, potash, and trace elements. The ratio can be 1/3 each of soil, peatmoss and sand or 1/2 soil and 1/4 each of peatmoss and sand. It all depends on whether you have a clay soil that packs down, or a light fluffy soil. To this may be added screened compost, flaky leaf mold, and charcoal to keep it sweet.

All containers should have a bottom layer of charcoal for drainage and to prevent souring. The bigger the container, the deeper the charcoal. A half inch or so of moss mulch on top of the soil will deter moisture loss and soil packing. In a later column we can discuss follow up feeding, special formulas, and answer questions you might like to send in to the Times Journal. Your Garden Club news and notices are welcomed too.

Next week we'll talk about soil preparation for fall planting and transplanting in your outdoor garden.

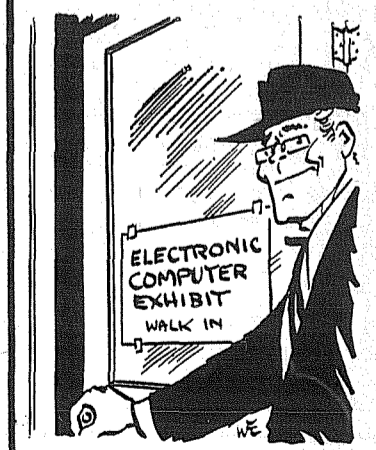

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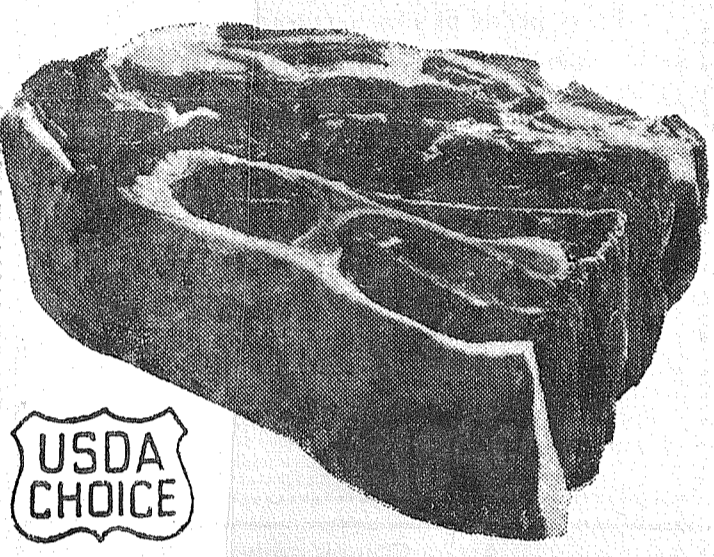

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
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
