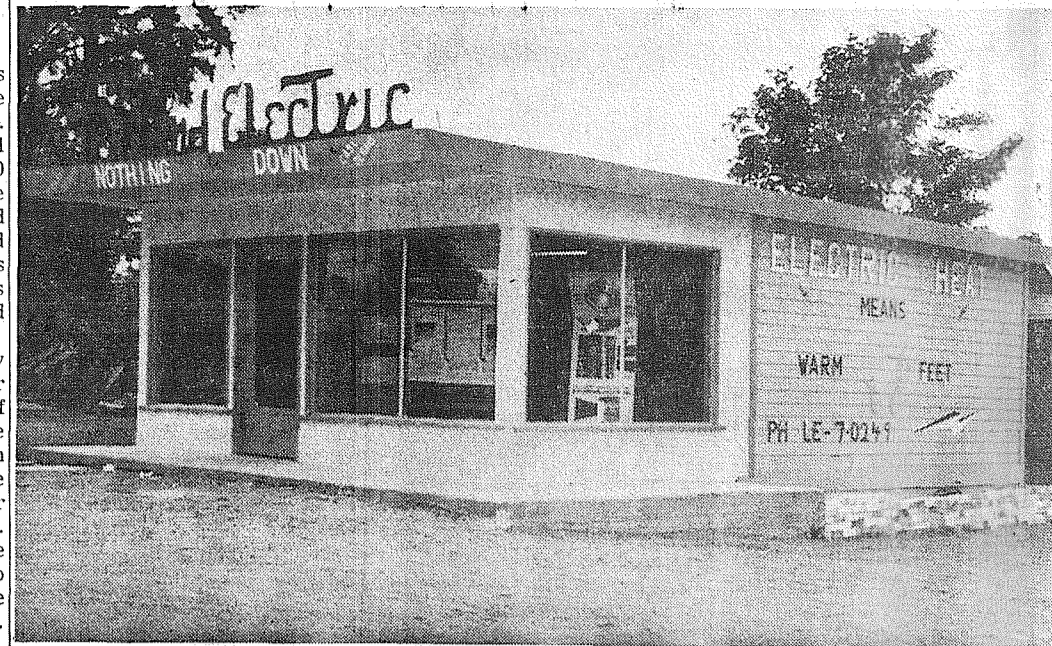

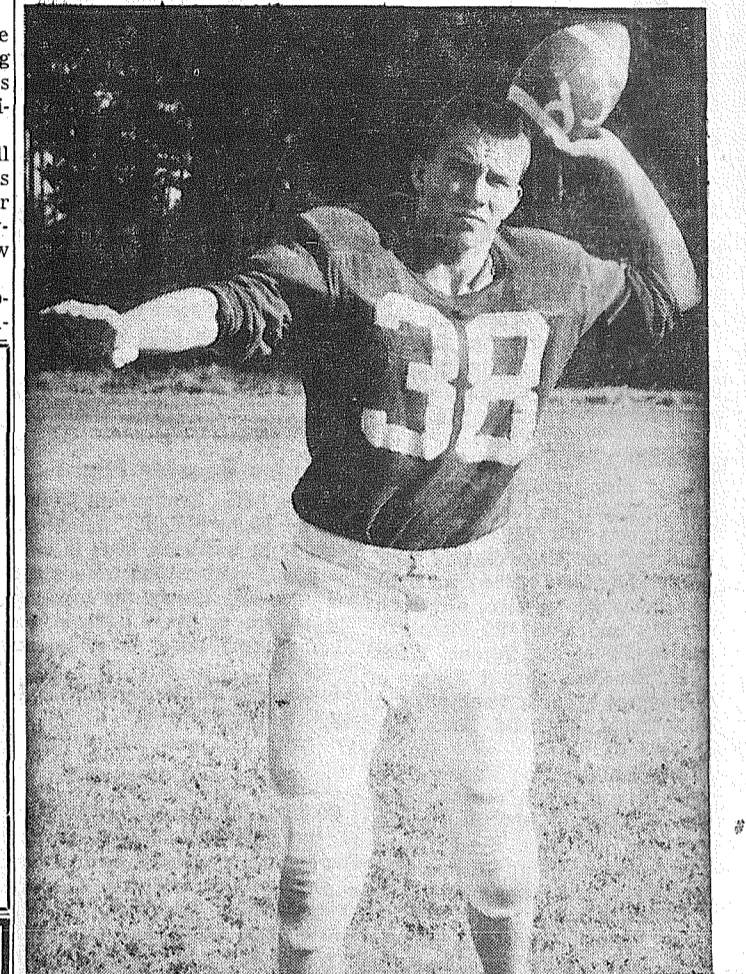

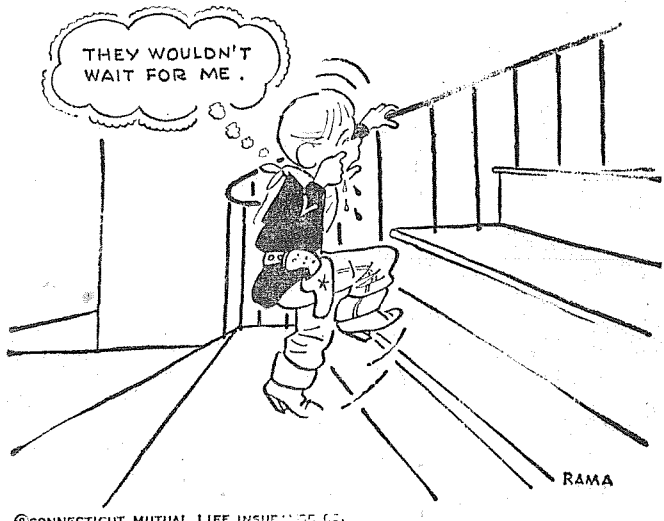

**a-Wondering . . .  
and a-Wandering . . .**

With JACK BROWN

One of the prime differences other than age between you and me and the youngsters of today is the fact that we must learn to accept and live with the ever increasing wonders of our modern day world, while the youngsters, born into this atomic age, accept without fear or question all that is put before them as a way of life.

I had this very thought forcibly brought to mind recently. I was a passenger in a private plane high over the city of Seattle in a formation flight, cruising along at about 160 mph. Even after a year of flying myself, I was finding this a thrilling experience. We were returning home from an air show where we had watched veterans thrill the crowds with their breathtaking maneuvers.

We had seen one pilot crash while stunting and miraculously escape with his life. With all this fresh in mind, plus the thrill of this late afternoon flight, I turned to the back seat expecting to find my nine year old son Mark and his buddy Steve Dugan excited and practically bug eyed over the ride they were getting. I think I was the one that became bug eyed when I realized that they were sitting there on the back seat all curled up talking a mile a minute about the fire truck back at the airport we had just left and completely unconcerned about the speed we were traveling, the view, our height above the ground, the other plane flying at our wingtip, or anything else concerning the flight. Flying they accepted as everyday living, but talking to firemen and looking over a fire truck gave them the same thrill it did you and me as youngsters. I guess they haven't changed much since our time with the exception that what to you and me were the wildest of dreams is but an everyday occurrence to them.

Wise men always know more than they tell, but fools tell more than they know.

Double taxation of corporate dividends is "one of the most unfortunate accidents that ever occurred in our tax system." That is the considered opinion of Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange. And he certainly isn't alone—all manner of authorities have pointed to the injustice of double taxation, and have shown the damage it does to the nation.

The way double taxation works is simple enough. First of all, the corporation pays a 52 per cent federal tax on any profits it earns. Then, when remaining profits are distributed as dividends they are subjected to the personal income tax, which runs from a minimum of 20 per cent on the lowest taxable incomes to a high of 91 per cent.

This is a very important matter to the 12,000,000 Americans—most with moderate means—who own stocks. But its importance doesn't stop there. Double taxation is a barrier to industrial development—and most particularly to newer and smaller companies which are trying to get established and finance themselves. It thus is a barrier to better living and working standards.

Congress, in effect, has already acknowledged the injustice of double taxation of dividends. In 1954 it approved a law which exempted \$50 of dividend income from taxation and allowed a 4 per cent credit of the balance. Now, Mr. Funston urges, it is time for another step. For example, \$100 of dividends could be exempted and the credit on the balance raised to 10 per cent. The good effects would be felt everywhere.

To quote Mr. Funston directly: "If we tell investors that we regard them as fair game for double taxation, if we tell them we intend to treat them as the most unworthy and most highly penalized taxpayers of all—then heaven help the bright young Henry Ford or Thomas Edison who need some backers for a company of the future."

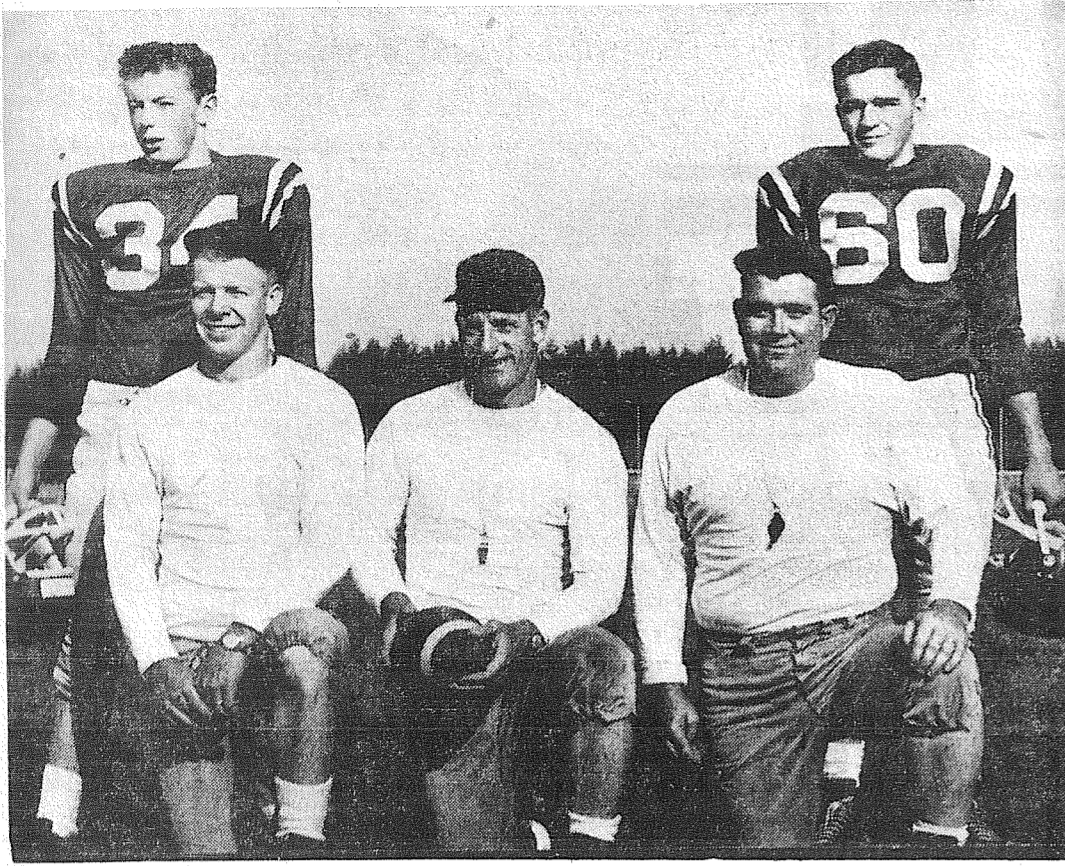

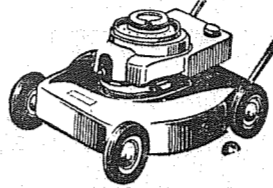

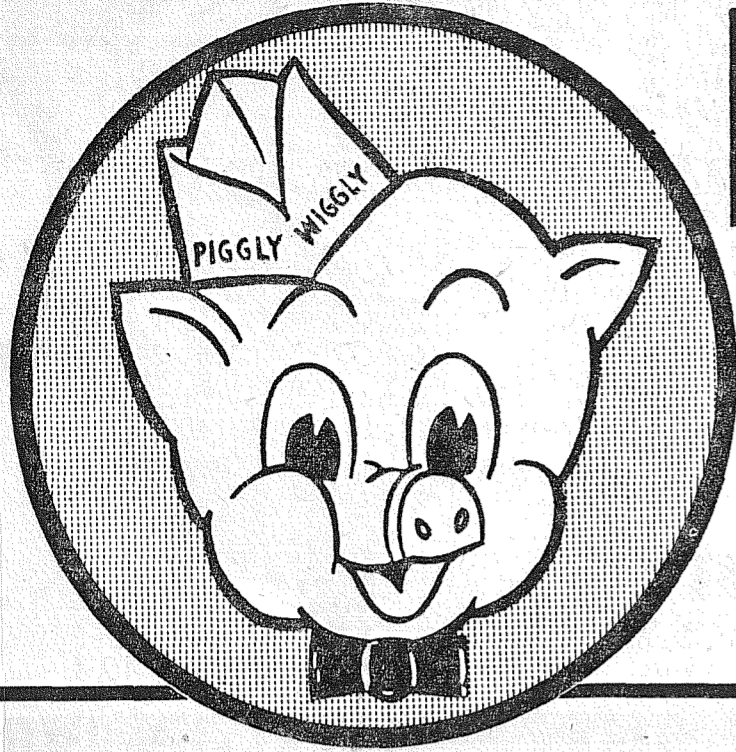
