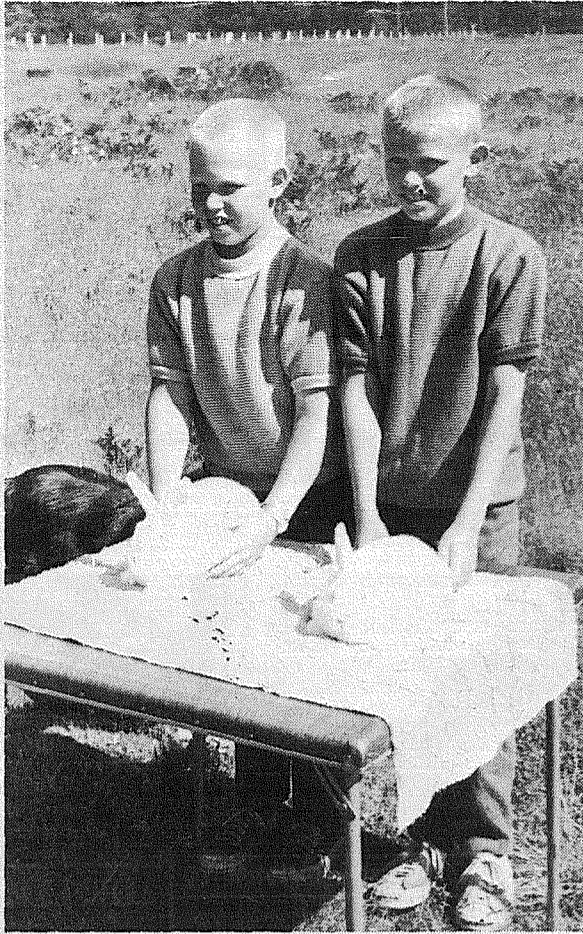
Asphalt Plant Discussion June 27

7:42 p.m. June 20th a call was received to attend a Turkey shed fire at 1406 East Brookdale. No damage.

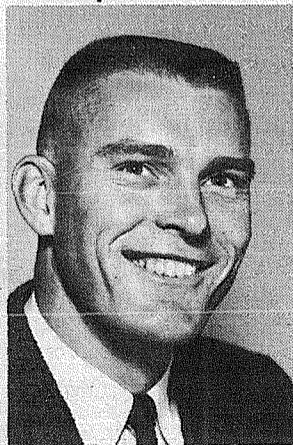

Fight The Drunken Driver

Time is running out for voters supporting Initiative 242, the Implied Consent traffic measure, to get their signatures on petitions now being distributed.

Under the proposed law, a traffic violator apparently "under the influence" would either agree to a breath-alcohol test or lose his license for six months. Present law considers a driver with a blood-alcohol content of .15 percent or higher as unfit to drive. The proposed Implied Consent law would lower this level to .10 percent.

The proposed legislation requires that state troopers observe a violation before stopping a motorist. Even then, no breath test would be administered unless the officer suspected intoxication.

Alcohol is the LEADING factor in all fatal highway accidents and statistics show it is responsible for most night time fatal teenage accidents. More than half of Washington State's 873 traffic fatalities in 1967 involved drinking.

Both the implied consent principle and the .10 percent alcohol level are among the new highway safety standards recommended by the federal government. At present 27 other states including Oregon and California have implied consent laws.

The most common objection to the principle of implied consent, which means that when a driver accepts a license he implies his consent in advance to tests for intoxication, as is that it represents an infringement on personal liberty by forcing the driver to incriminate himself.

In 1966 the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that administering a chemical examination for evidence of intoxication does not violate a driver's right against self-incrimination because only physical evidence is being sought. The high court ruled a person's body can be examined for breath, blood and any other physical test without infringing on constitutional freedoms.

Some State Supreme Courts rule that driving on the highways is a privilege - not a right. The power to suspend this privilege is an administrative, not a judicial function.

Sponsors of Initiative 242 still need more names to fulfill their goal of 100,022 petition signatures. We urge voters in our area to contact the Puyallup Valley Chamber of Commerce Office and support this important measure.

The proposed legislation is vital if Washington State's Highways are to be rid of the drunken driver!

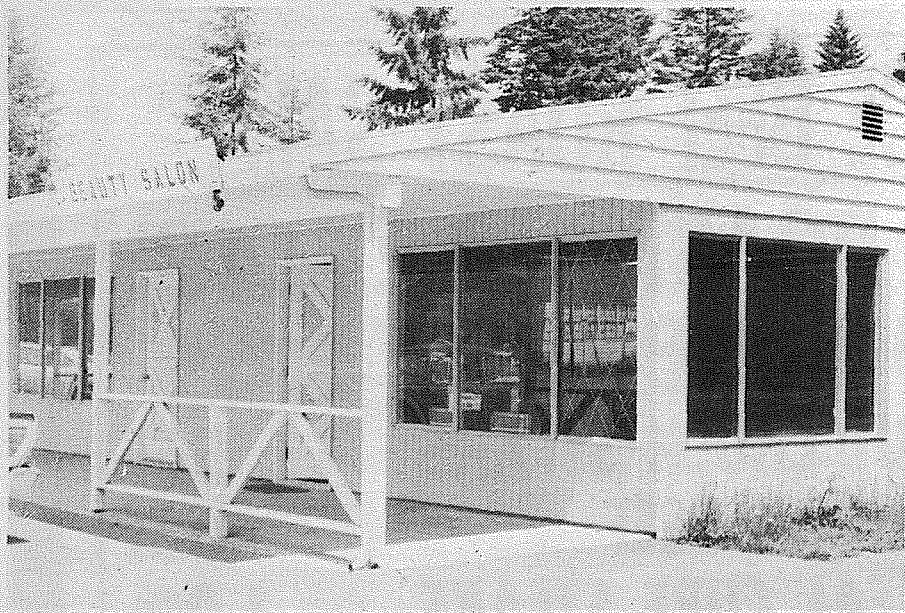

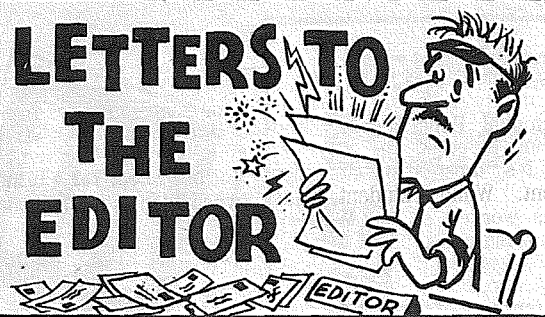

Dear Sir:

In your June 20 edition, you published an editorial opposing gun control. I wish to present the other side of the argument.

I agree with you on the point that firearms are a serious national problem. That is why control is needed now.

The bill to register guns is the best possible solution to the problem short of confiscation of all firearms. At the present time, I feel that people should be allowed to own guns. However, if conditions continue in the same direction, I most certainly would be in favor of confiscation.

To say that since comparatively few rifles and shotguns

are used in crimes they should not be registered is like saying that since few trucks are on the road they should not be registered.

Granted that there may be no significant change in the crime rate in states without gun laws, but how many guns were used after the laws were passed, and how many deaths and wounds occurred after the passage of these laws?

Stringent gun control is necessary to cut down the great firearms death rate. To borrow statistics from the June 21, 1968 issue of Time magazine, in 1962 29 murders were committed with firearms in England and Wales (with one quarter the population of the U.S.), 37 murders were committed with firearms in Japan, who has one half the population of the U.S., while in the same period in the

United States we had 4954 murders with firearms. I might also add that in England the death of a policeman is a rare and shocking experience, and they do not carry firearms. You say that firearms laws are not needed. I say let's get some control now, before we all get shot.

More Than Ever In June 1968

The amount of couples taking the matrimonial plunge in 1968 is already a full month ahead of the 1967 statistics, according to Pierce County Marriage License figures.

This time last year 2,153, 423 less than this year's figure of 2,576, received the necessary papers.

June, as is tradition, carried highest totals and for another year reigns as BRIDE'S MONTH.

Contending for the title last year was a very strong August, only five behind June's 538, followed by July, 444; and November, 430.

According to officials at the license department each month this year has broken records, with old faithful (June) going all out.

So far in 1968, 395 were married in January, 364 in February, 392 in March, 388 in April, 497 in May and 540 in June with one week still to go.

In the Spanaway-Parkland area a large percentage of the weddings are military, but of those who are permanent residents, most of them are staying in the area (also accounting for the tremendous growth of this area.)

The most unpopular months for matrimony appear to be February, March, April, September and October. So remember if you want a vacated honeymoon spot try the unpopular months, which last year accounted for 1,665 bridal entourage.

Young fillies from the breeding paddocks of Washington will get the key opportunity of the season to strut their stuff in next Sunday's feature at Longacres, the \$7,500-added Mary Broderick Memorial.

The two-year-old filly race at five and one-half furlongs is the female counterpart of the Washington Futurity. It is named in memory of one of Seattle's cherished sports and civic leaders.

Conditions of this race specify that the youngsters be placed in nomination the year they are foaled. For this year's running, 11th presentation in the event's history, there were 168 original nominees at \$10 each in 1966. Of that number, 136 were kept eligible last year at a \$15 fee.

Thus the race, with the \$7,500-added, grosses \$11,220 to date. It will cost \$150 to pass the entry box Saturday morning and \$150 additional to start. With these entry and starting fees swelling the pot, the race becomes the first rich Washington-bred 2-year-old event of the season.

The \$10,000-added Washington Stallion Stakes will be run July 28th and the \$15,000-added Washington Futurity on September 8th.

Winners to date which may be expected to start Sunday in the Mary Broderick Memorial include Madamoo, Stillgal, She Bugs Me, Policia, Pacific Dawn, Majestic Flier and Countess Serenade. Other possibles are Rare Nugget, Deer Jo and Buttermilk Skies.

Madamoo, a daughter of Alate - Fresh Idea, has been particularly impressive. She won by three and one-half lengths and was timed in :58 1/5 in her last outing. The fleet Filly scored in her initial outing at Longacres by two lengths, closing from last to first in that one. Madamoo is owned by Perry Smith, Tacoma restaurateur and is trained by W. R. Cummings, also from Tacoma and currently the track's leading conditioner.

Majestic Flier has one victory and two close seconds in three starts. She Bugs Me sports a win and a third in two outings thus far.

4-H Caravaners To Travel Abroad

Far away places and strange sounding names voiced in Swahili, Singhalese, Spanish, and occasionally, Gaelic, are ahead for Washington's 1968 4-H international set.

The group, including four International Farm Youth Exchange delegates, and one 4-H Caravaner, will spend from 3 to 9 months abroad, tuning their ears to another language, and learning another culture by living it.

Two of the state's four IFYE's are already enroute to their overseas assignments.

Ray William, 21, Eatonville, is headed for the tropical island of Ceylon in the Indian Ocean; and George Laffin, Jr., 22, Arlington, will soon be

at home on the auld sod of another island, Ireland.

Later this month, the group's winsome teenager, Joyce Higginbotham, 17, Hartline, will span the Atlantic for the summer in Spain as a 4-H Caravaner.

And in September, Marny Jean Burdega, 22, Deer Park, will head south to Ecuador; and Marty Lee Emrick, 21, Issaquah, will fly to Nairobi, Kenya.

Miss Emrick will spend 9 months in Kenya and Miss Higginbotham, 3 months in Spain. The others will remain in their host countries for 6 months. Miss Emrick's assignment will include 3 additional months helping organize 4-H clubs, Kenyan equivalent of 4-H and FFA organizations.

Mrs. Patricia G. Hite, Pullman, State 4-H specialist in international programs for Washington State University's Cooperative Extension Service, said all five will share their insights and experiences with interested groups when they return home.

She said all five of this year's grassroots ambassadors to rural families abroad have been active 4-H'ers from 6 to 11 years and all have distinguished service records as junior 4-H leaders.

Ray William, George Laffin, Jr., and Marny Burdega are June graduates of WSU; Marty Lee Emrick is a junior at Central Washington College, Ellensburg; and Joyce Higginbotham will be a senior next year in Hartline High School.

William, WSU's 1968 Aggie of the Year, is a graduate of Sumner High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray William who operate a dairy farm near Eatonville. He has been studying Singhalese at WSU with an animal science collaborator from Ceylon, Dr. George W. Koditwakku.

Mrs. Hite said the delegates, following the 20-year IFYE tradition, will perform a two-way function in carrying out their goodwill mission.

By living and working with host families abroad they will provide a personalized mirror of life in the United States. And serving as a two-way mirror, they will reflect to the folks back home another way

The delegates share their experiences and insights by letter, and later by illustrated talks after they return home. The returned delegates also become a program resource for 4-H clubs, providing first-hand material for international study projects.

The IFYE program is conducted by the National 4-H Foundation for the Cooperative Extension Services of the land-grant colleges and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Travel expenses for IFYE delegates come from two general sources. IFYE committees in the delegate's sponsoring home county raise one-third of the expense money and the rest is provided by the National 4-H Foundation from donations by organizations and industry.

The 4-H Caravaner program, also conducted by the National 4-H Foundation, is a summer program for 4-H teen-agers. Most of the Caravaners pay all their own travel expenses.

Selection of delegates for the IFYE and Caravaner programs is made through state and county IFYE committees working with WSU's Cooperative Extension Service. Basis of selection includes age, maturity, experience in a rural youth organization, interest in people, willingness to learn another language, and a desire to help create a climate for peace.

IFYE delegates must be between 20 and 30 years of age, high school graduates, and unmarried. Caravaner delegates must be between 17 and 19.
