a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

With JACK BROWN

A few weeks ago I made mention of the fact that I used to ride a horse to school and that the chore of stable cleaning was standard school punishment. The papers were hardly delivered before my phone rang and the voice of a young man, who has entered the teaching profession, came over the wire giving me the horselaugh, so to speak, and asked me who I thought I was kidding about riding a horse to school. Now I could have taken his remarks as a compliment and assumed that I looked more like a bridegroom than a grandfather, but one look into a mirror dispelled those thoughts as I surveyed my shiny dome and pot belly. No, it was obvious that the remarks of my "young and wet behind the ears" friend were meant in all seriousness and certainly not as a compliment.

Just to set the record straight for him and any others born into, and only able to remember, the gas age, I started school at the ripe old age of six, or to be exact, 5 years and 11 months of age. I had my choice of either walking approx. three miles to school or riding "Pete", our big old fat workhorse. Being born lazy, I naturally elected to ride and "Pete" spent many a day in the school stable contentedly munching hay taken from a gunny sack I had slung up on his broad rump each morning for his day's feed, while I tried to learn something in between trips to the principal's office and sneaking outside for a chew of old Missouri twist. That was only 35 years ago and as I remember some 7 or 8 other children also rode horses to school.

Now the average young person like my caller can only remember back to the Model A days. They group around a Model T and wonder where the gear shift is. To them, horse drawn vehicles and schools with 8 grades and a total attendance of 56, as was the case in my first years of school, is unheard of and therefore perhaps it's really hard for them to understand this horse bit.

While seeking in my mind a method of proving to our younger set that all talk of yesteryear is not mutterings from the depths of a senile mind, Mr. John Thomas of Spanaway stopped by our office and unknowingly held the key to the problem I was seeking to solve. He had stopped in to show me a copy of a notice of public sale that was held nearly 111 years ago, on March 1st, 1849.

Now for the benefit of my young friends who happen to read this column, I would like to ask you to stop and think. Just how long is 111 years? It's not really too much over a lifetime anymore, yet consider the changes that have been brought about in our society in that short period of time, and after reading the notice below, perhaps in the future you may doubt less the words of your elders.

The notice is as follows:

"Having sold my farm and am leaving for Oregon Territory by ox team, will offer on March 1, 1849, all my personal property, to-wit:

"All ox teams except two teams, Buck and BEN, AND Tom and Jerry; 2 milch cows, gray mare and colt, one pair of oxen and yoke, 1 baby yoke, 2 ox carts, 1 iron plow with wood mold board, 890 feet of poplar weather boards, 1,000 three-foot clapboards, 1,500 ten-foot fence rails, one 60-gallon soap kettle, 85 sugar troughs made of white ash timber, 10 gallons maple syrup, 2 spinning wheels, 20 pounds mutton tallow, 20 pounds beef tallow, one large loom made by Jerry Wilson, 300 poles, 100 split hoops, 100 empty barrels, 32-gallon barrel of Johnson Miller whiskey 7 years old, 20 gallons apple brandy, one 40 gallon copper still, four sides of tanning leather, one dozen real hooks, 2 handled hooks, 3 scythes and cradles, one dozen wooden pitch-forks, one-half interest in tan yard, one 32 calibre rifle, bullet molds and powder horn, rifle made by Bon Miller, 50 gallons soft soap, hams, bacon and lard, 40 gallons sorghum, six head of fox hounds, all soft mouthed except one.

"At the same time will sell my six negro slaves, 2 men 35 and 50 years old, 2 boys 12 and 18 years old, 2 mulatto wenches 40 and 30 years old, will sell all together to same party as will not separate them. Terms of sale cash in hand or note to draw 4 percent interest, with Bob McConnell as security.

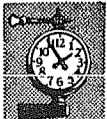
"My home is 2 miles south of Versailles, Kentucky, on McConn's ferry pike. Sale will begin at 8 o'clock a.m. Plenty of drink and eat."

Now for the clincher to make you realize how greatly has been the change in our daily lives . . . It is now exactly three minutes after twelve 12:00 noon as I write this. I have to take time out to eat and then I plan to fly over to Walla Walla for a few minutes to see a customer there. I won't have to be in any hurry though, as I don't have another business appointment until 4:00 p.m. back in Spanaway.
