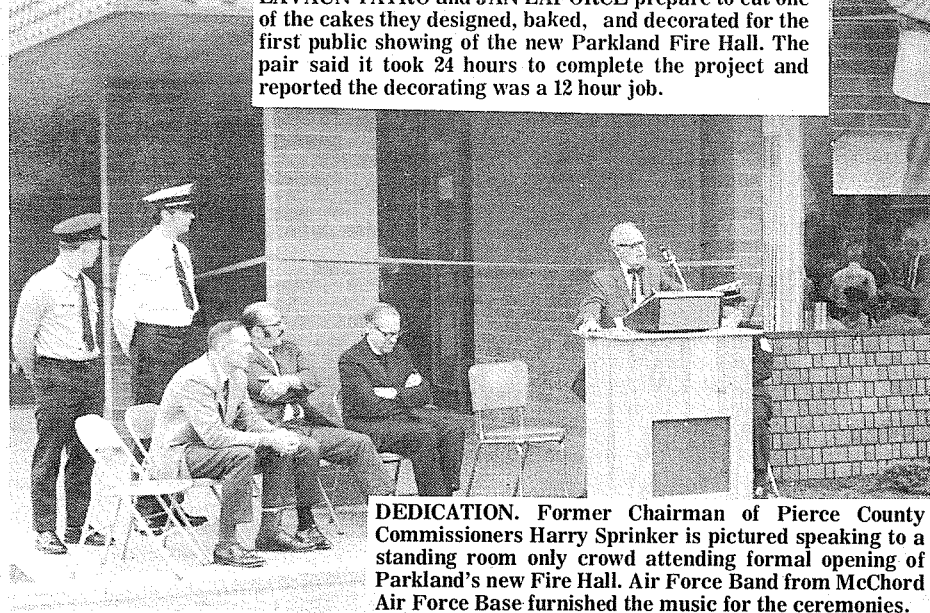

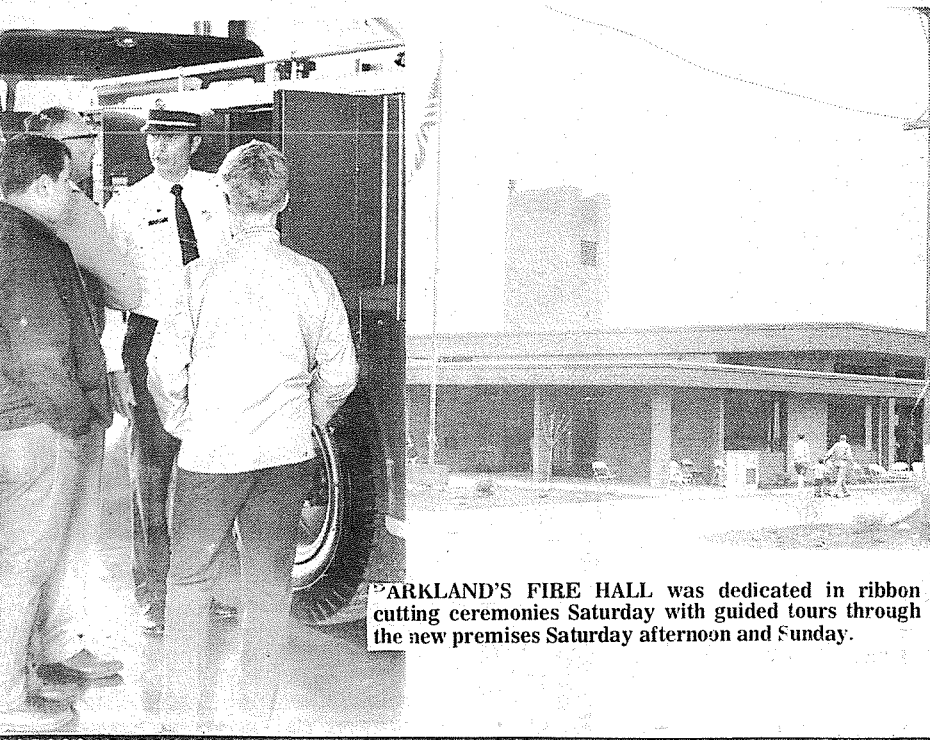
The couple announced Friday, July 18 will be the wedding date. Meanwhile back at the office, the theme is, "Ain't love wonderful when found in the classified ads?"

# Bethel Budget Adopted



The preliminary budgets for the Bethel School District were adopted at the June 3rd board meeting. The general fund budget of \$3,333,641.55 was increased \$329,500.00 from last year, with additional students and salary increases as the major reasons. The building fund budget of \$3,010,712.31 includes addition to the high school, Kapowsin Elementary, and Roy Elementary, as well as the new Spanaway Junior High. Preliminary plans for another elementary school and continued site acquisition is included in the budget. The bond redemption fund will be \$161,276.39. The total local millage to support the budget is 54.25 mills.

The administration of the district had recommended this budget to the board on the basis that salaries should remain as competitive as possible. That this was difficult is recognized when it was found necessary to reduce expenditures of \$26,000.00 in capital outlay, travel and communication, and inservice training of teachers. Some additional teaching positions were deferred until the next school year.

The salary schedule with a base of \$6,300.00 to a maximum of \$11,656.00 was approved at the same meeting. Also included for all personnel, both certificated and classified, was support locally for insurance benefits up to a maximum of \$10.00 per month.

# LEWIS LLEWELLYN What Happened To Harvard?

Cartoonist and caustic commentator on the current scene Al Capp said recently that Harvard University had degenerated into a "combination pigpen and playpen."

Everyone except the anarchists and the lunatic fringe of the liberal left has been appalled at what has happened on the campus of the revered institution, Harvard University.

What is the reason for the disintegration in this renowned intellectual community?

Harvard was founded to provide education for young men, with the express purpose that this education was to be guided by the principle of dedication to truth, Christ, and the church. How far has Harvard strayed from this!

**Radical Shift**  
Though established by men who revered the Bible and had uncompromising faith in God, the university became the citadel of leftist educational and political philosophy.

Of course, the evolution from the original philosophy of putting God first to the present attitude—which has produced the current chaotic condition at Cambridge—was brought about by a complex variety of factors.

But, underneath it all, the denial of the authority of the Bible should be recognized as a very significant determinant of direction.

Of course, I am aware that those who themselves deny the authority of the Bible will dispute this.

Nevertheless, it cannot be denied that those who believe

the Bible and who follow in the steps of the Master do not go about promoting anarchy.

They do not make it a practice to shout obscenities at all who disagree with them.

Students and others who are patterning their lives after the example set by the Nazarene do not act as the Harvard rebels have acted.

Denying the authority of the Bible was the first slippery step on the road which has led Harvard to the brink of anarchy.

**Contrast**  
I have just returned home after attending the commencement convocation of Bryan College, a small Christian liberal arts college in Dayton, Tenn.

One thing which impressed me as being in sharp contrast with what is happening on some other campuses was this: each graduating senior, as he or she was handed the coveted diploma by the president, stepped to the microphone and repeated from memory a verse of Scripture.

A Negro girl was among those receiving diplomas. When her turn came to step to the microphone, she quoted from the prophecy of Jeremiah the words of the Lord, "Call upon Me and I will answer thee and show thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not."

Doesn't it seem to you that a life based on this principle will be likely to achieve more than one which is based on the principle of disbelief, destruction and disorder?

Maybe if Harvard had not abandoned its dedication to God...

## Tacoma Handicap Highlights Week

Camway, Evergreen Stable's powerful runner, collared a classy field of three-year-olds last Saturday at six furlongs. The gelding blistered six furlongs in 1:09 2/5 in that winning effort.

Others which have shown top form in the first days of the meeting include Fitness, Deep Heat, Trailerlodge, Rough Judge, Buttermilk Skies, Glittering Affair, and Fosket.

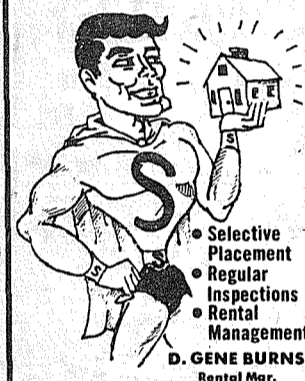

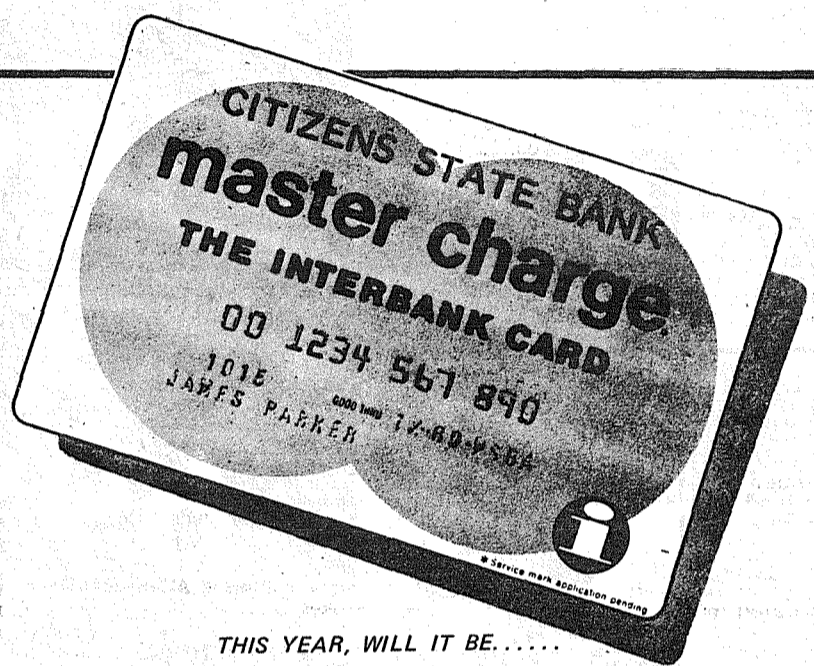
