The marriage will be the second for both and give



A Negro girl was among those receiving diplomas. When her turn came to step to the microphone, she quoted from the prophecy of Jeremiah the words of the Lord, "Call upon Me and I will answer thee and show thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not."

Doesn't it seem to you that a life based on this principle will be likely to achieve more than one which is based on the principle of disbelief, destruction and disorder?





Northwest three-year-olds pointing for the rich Longacres Derby get their first acid test in next Sunday's \$7,500-added Tacoma Handi-

The Tacoma — Longacres' oldest feature event — will have its 36th running June 15th. It is the only one of the present stakes races to be run every season since the track's inception in 1933.

Tradionally considered the first leg in the Longacres' version of the "Triple Crown," the Tacoma 'Cap is for three-year-olds at six and one-half furlongs. It is followed by the Spokane Handicap at one mile on August 3rd. and the \$20,000-added Longacres Derby at 11/8 miles on August 17th.

In 35 years only two horses, Sparrow Castle in 1960 and Kings Favor in 1966, have managed to sweep all three

The glamorous sophomore division this year is loaded with talent. At least a dozen have credentials which make them Derby material.

Pitch Out, a stakes per-former from California training brilliantly at Longacres, is expected to make its Northwest debut in the Tacoma.

Hope Line, the J. P. Seabeck owned flyer which was a come-from-behind division winner of the William E. Boeing Stakes, is primed for

Sunday action.


