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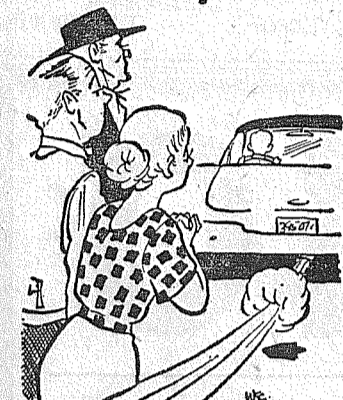
## Bad Check Drive Helps Local Firms

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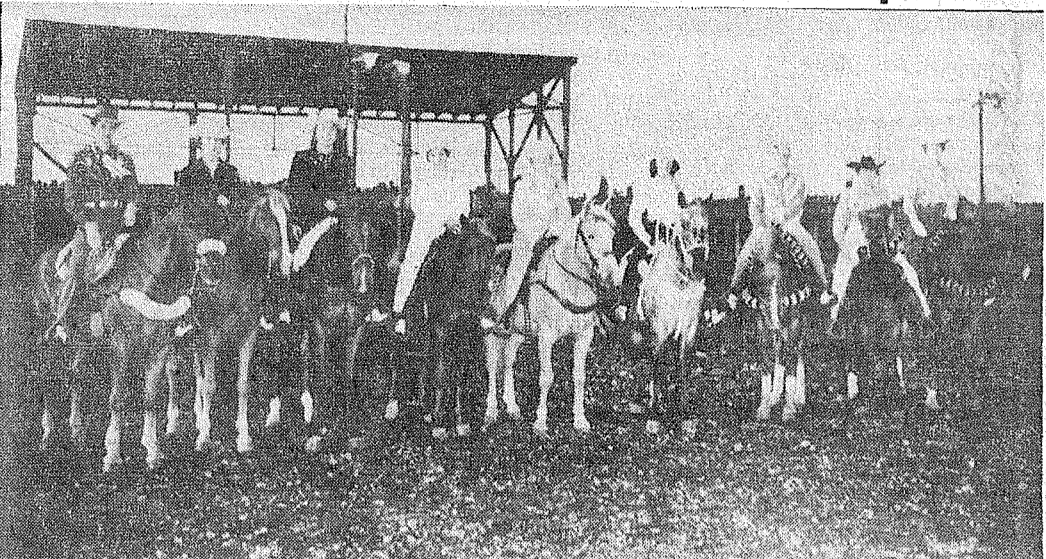

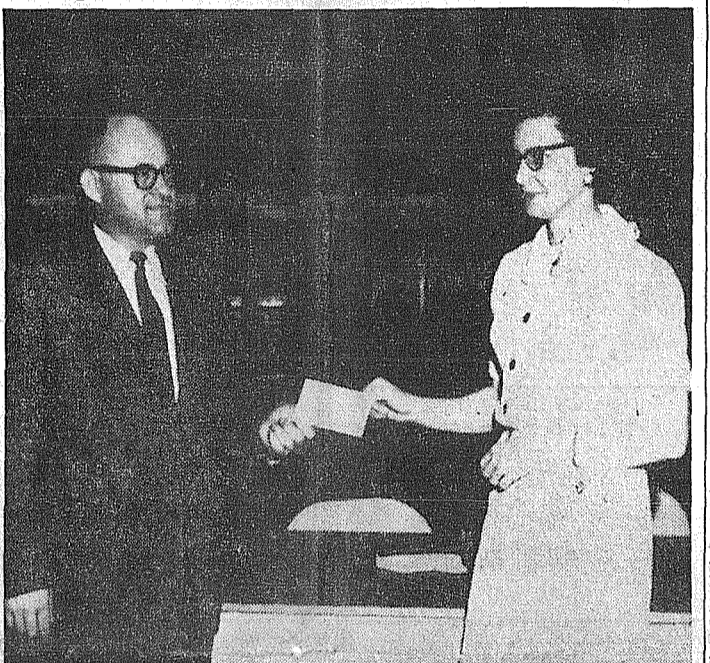
Teams already formed, also coaches, are reminded that May 21 is deadline for new teams and May 28 is deadline for registration and insurance money.

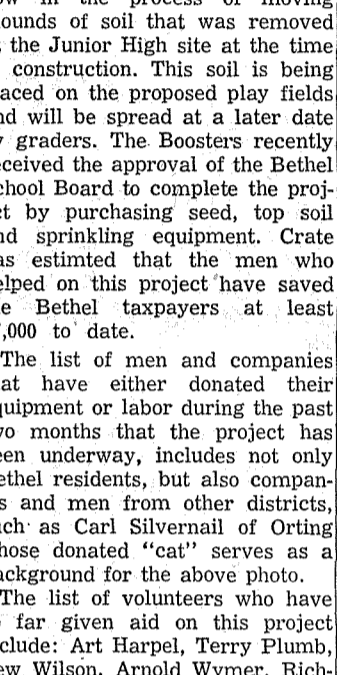

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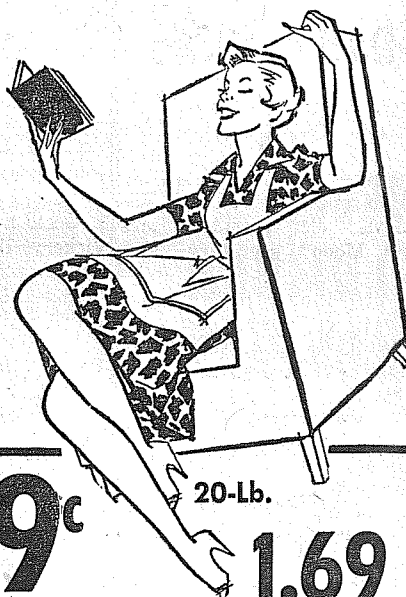

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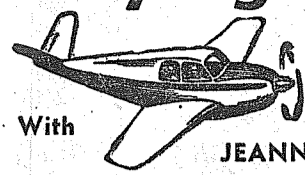

## Fors Hatchery Buys Highland Feed Mills

An important recent business transaction in the community is the sale of the Highland Feed Mills, 9616 East Jackson, to Fors Hatchery, 8326 Woodland Avenue, Puyallup.

Under the name Fors Feed Mills, Inc., the business will be greatly increased by the installation of modern equipment which will step up the volume capacity and permit the preparation of additional types of feed, principally designed to serve the poultry industry.

Henry and Ernie Fors, leaders in the growing of poultry for the market, have acquired a surprising store of knowledge concerning this extremely intricate industry over the years, the know-how which they are now implementing by rounding out their operation through facilities to prepare exactly the types of feed best suited to their business, as well as supplying the public.

While Highland Feed Mills has had a large volume trade in serving its field, the operation will now be greatly augmented through the new equipment presently due. With Larson & Baardson of Federal Way as the contractors, there are to be added immense storage and bulk handling facilities, the blending and mixing of materials to be done by huge automatic equipment operated by air power, "Just like a gigantic vacuum cleaner," according to Ernie Fors. Broiler feeds will be the chief item and wide coverage of this phase of the poultry business will be supplied in bulk deliveries. Since taking over the concern, the Fors brothers have put one bulk feed truck to work and a second one is on order.

It will be "business as usual" as far as customers of the feed mill is concerned. Henry "Pete" Highland, who has owned the business for the past seven years, will stay on the job as manager of the plant, though now he has six assistants instead of the one he required before the change over. As always, there will be high standards of quality, with now the advantage of many additional varieties of feed for specialized needs.

The poultry operation is big business in the Pacific Northwest and Fors Feed Mills, Inc., is welcomed as another significant phase of the development of a rapidly growing community.

Well, I see where the barbers in Seattle are going to raise the price of haircuts to \$2.00. Apparently they haven't visited a bowling alley lately where the backs of heads of men from all walks of life may be studied without the studier appearing to be obnoxious. From this vantage point, it's plain to see that the home snip and clip jobs are becoming more popular with every raise in the price of hair cuts. Some of those who started their women folks at the back of their heads way back when barber shop prices reached \$1.50 now have the laugh on the rest of us. Most of their wives by now have attained a certain degree of proficiency in the tonsorial art and their husbands' home made hair cuts can no longer be distinguished from the professional job.

Well, so much for that. It hasn't happened in Pierce county yet, but if it does, I'll be a charter member in the frontier TV style hairdo club. Take a gander at your favorite western star and you'll see what I've got in mind, podner. What's to stop us men from starting a fad? No obstacle that another raise in hair cutting prices won't remove.

There's nothing quite so weather-resistant as old election posters.

There are two sides to a question, the old saw goes, and you can find the unions on both of this one.

Right now in New York, a big drive is on to organize the nonprofessional help in the privately supported hospitals. Various New York unions are pledging their support for this effort, and there is some talk of a strike which will mean empty stomachs and full bedpans all around the wards.
