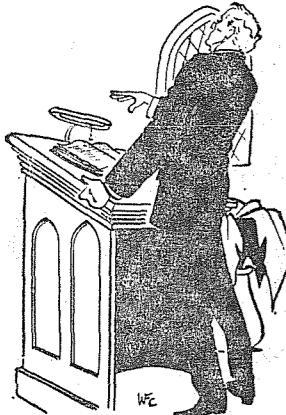
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Nobody Hurt In Logging Truck Upset Monday

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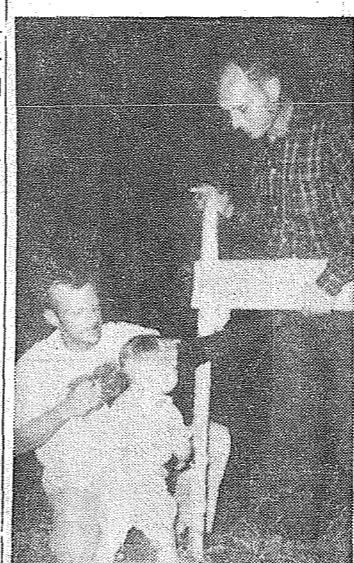

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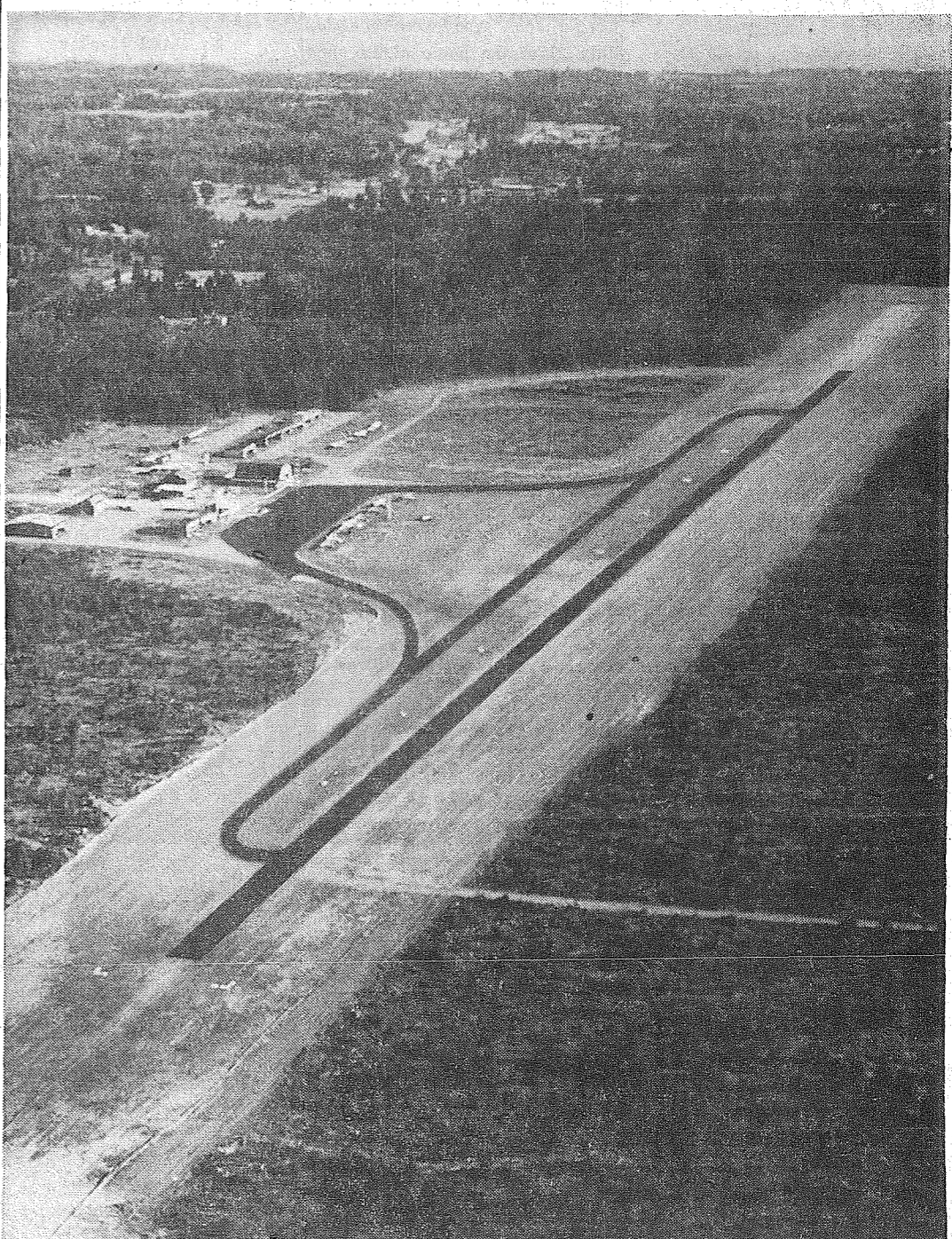

Next Sunday, August 30, will find the skies above Thun Field (shown above) in Puyallup alive with activity when the Tacoma Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol presents its big Benefit Air Show. The event is sponsored jointly by the Tacoma Civil Air Patrol, the Antique Aircraft Association and Thun Field.

The program will feature aerobatics in stunt-type aircraft and an exhibition of parachute jumping by the Rainier Parachute Club, including static line jumps and delayed opens. Well-known Pete Bowers will fly his 1912 Curtiss Pusher to add a nostalgic if not antique touch to the occasion. Branches of the military will furnish several displays on the ground, including a cutaway jet engine, a 46-foot aircraft carrier built to scale and a high altitude space suit. There will be acrobatic flying by Tom Ritchie of Seattle (North American 7-6) and consecutive loops by others. Glider flights by the Seattle Glider Club

will prove an exciting feature. The Washington Air National Guard will provide an airlift for top Puget Sound radio disc jockeys, who will provide a novel touch to the occasion when they race gasoline-powered Bantam-Carts in heated competition during the interims. 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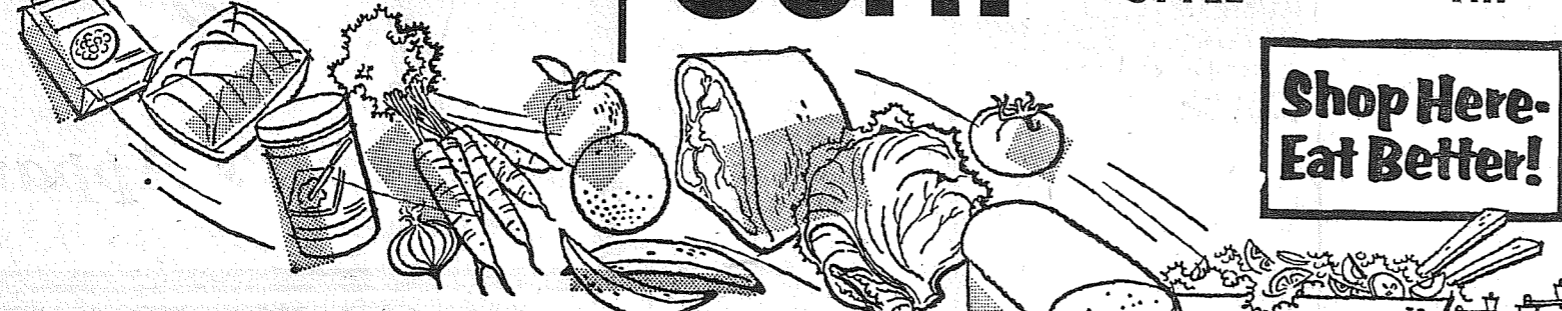

At the end of the get-together we will elect officers for another year.

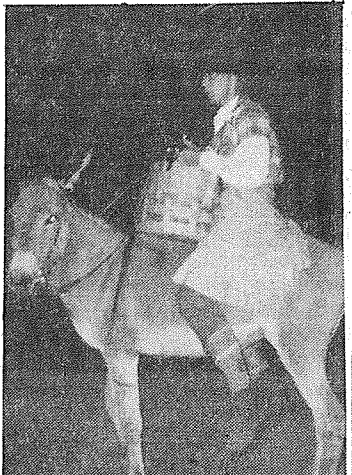

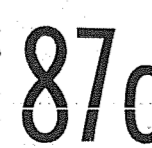

a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .
With JACK BROWN
I see where the Thurston County commissioners have raised the speed limit on most of their county roads. The limit on the majority of their roads has been raised to 50 mph. I think they're on the right track. Most county roads of today are far superior to the main highways of yesterday with their ancient 40 mph speed limit, yet here in 35 mph Pierce County we're told to obey or pay.
The other night I set out to find out who obeys the 35 mph speed limit and since I was in no rush I decided to do a little experimenting by doing the entire tour under the legal limit. The results of my trip proved one thing for sure. Pierce County is inhabited by scores of law breakers. One reason I advocate the raising of the county speed limit is that so long as we maintain it where it is, we daily make law violators of a majority of our citizens. Who can determine the effect this has on the molding of our youngsters lives when daily they watch their elders flaunt the law.
Now there are many of you who will immediately cry out that I am wrong, should be hung for suggesting it and what not. You'll claim that children walking the roads will be injured, your cows will be maimed and on and on and on, if people are allowed to drive 50 miles per hour on our county roads. Well, I'll tell you right now. They are doing it every hour of the day, and there aren't enough sheriff's cars and state patrol cars in the state to police all the miles of county roads and curb the limit boosters.
If you think this last statement is an exaggeration, let's re-enact my little drive. I started driving aimlessly as to direction, determined of only one thing: I would not exceed the 35 mph limit. About the first thing I discovered was that I had to keep one eye on the road and the other on the speedometer or I'd be over 35 in minutes. I had to ride the brakes constantly on the slightest hill or my car would go into free wheeling and shoot past 35 mph.
In a late model car traveling under 35 mph you're not really driving nor are you coasting. In an hour's drive I was in and out of overdrive so many times I got tired of feeling the change. By the time I had driven two miles out to where there were a few turns in the road I had three cars and a pick-up behind me. Seeing them I deliberately slowed down to around 30 mph. Then the fun began. From the air those cars behind me must have looked like angry gnats darting in and out trying to get around me and when they did get a chance to pass, believe me, they did it, full bore, all at 50 mph or over. The young fellow in the pick-up almost ran in the ditch glaring at me as he passed.
I turned down side roads, traveled north, south, east and west and still people roared by me like I was standing still, each giving me that dirty look like I was the law-breaker for holding them up. People working in their yards dropped their tools to watch me go by whenever I cut back to around 30. Children stopped their play to watch me. To the people who weren't driving, I was a side-show and to those who were I was about as popular as a bee in a phone booth. Even drivers of oncoming cars gave me a funny look. All I can say is that the days of 35 mph driving, legal or not, went out somewhere back when we weren't looking.
I think the crux of the situation is this: The people who are against raising the speed limit on county roads are the ones, who roared by me at fifty on the road in front of someone else's house.
It doesn't make sense to me. You turn off a busy 60 mile per hour highway onto a good uncrowded county road and according to law are required to slow 'er down to 35.
It's no wonder we've become a nation of lawbreakers. Let's bring things up to date so we can live legally and set some sort of decent examples for our younger generation.
At any rate I hope the young blonde fellow in the red pickup truck reads this article. Maybe he'll get some idea of how silly he looked trying to keep from going into the ditch after glaring at the crazy knucklehead who dared to drive his car at a legal speed.

School Starts 8th For 5800 FP Kids

Kindergarten classes will not begin until Monday, Sept. 14, while first grade classes in all Pierce elementary schools will be on a half-day basis Sept. 9-11. The Junior and Senior high schools will be operating on a full day schedule the opening day while all of the elementary grades will be in session for only the morning of Sept. 9.

Franklin Pierce schools open their doors for the first time during the 1959-60 school year Sept. 8 when nearly 5,800 students answer the first bell at eight elementary schools and the junior and senior high schools. Supt. Edwin L. Nelson and his administrative staff have been busy all summer long in preparation for the hectic opening day rush.

Newest feature of the Pierce system is the Andrew Christensen Elementary at South 102nd and Barnes Lane, just two blocks west of Park Avenue. Principal Wes Anderson

and a staff of fourteen teachers will be on hand to greet the new occupants of the school which is being rushed to completion before the opening.

High school students will be met by their new principal, William F. Whitesel. Whitesel replaces Orville D. Weeks who resigned last May and comes from Anacortes, Wash., where he has been principal for the past seven years. Whitesel served as an administrative assistant to Supt. Paul Hanawalt at Puyallup prior to his tenure at Anacortes.

He is a graduate of the University of Washington and was born in Seattle where he attended West Seattle High School. The 35-year-old Franklin Pierce principal and his wife and three children moved to Parkland during the first week in August.

A familiar face to most school observers in Pierce area will be missing during the coming year: Assistant Superintendent Harold J. Evans is in Spain with the United States Air Force Military Dependents Schools and has been granted a one-year leave of absence by school board directors.

Another major personnel change is the naming of Robert Haglund, long time Pierce instructor, as curriculum supervisor for the junior and senior high schools. Haglund has been busy at work all summer and last spring on streamlining the curriculum at the Morris E. Ford Junior High and Franklin Pierce High schools.

Franklin Pierce school officials

advised this week that 7th and 9th graders are required to have physical examinations before the opening day of school in September. Any doctor of the student's choice may give the physical examination.

School board directors make it a requirement for 7th and 9th graders to have an examination in order to participate in the five-day weekly physical education program of the Morris E. Ford Junior High. It is also strongly recommended that 1st grade children be checked by their family physician.

Examination blanks were given to school children prior to the closing of school last spring. New students or those who have lost their copies of the form may secure another at the district office. For further information parents are asked to call LE 7-0211.

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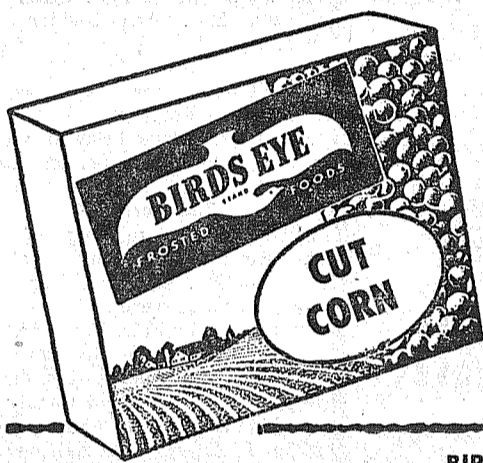
