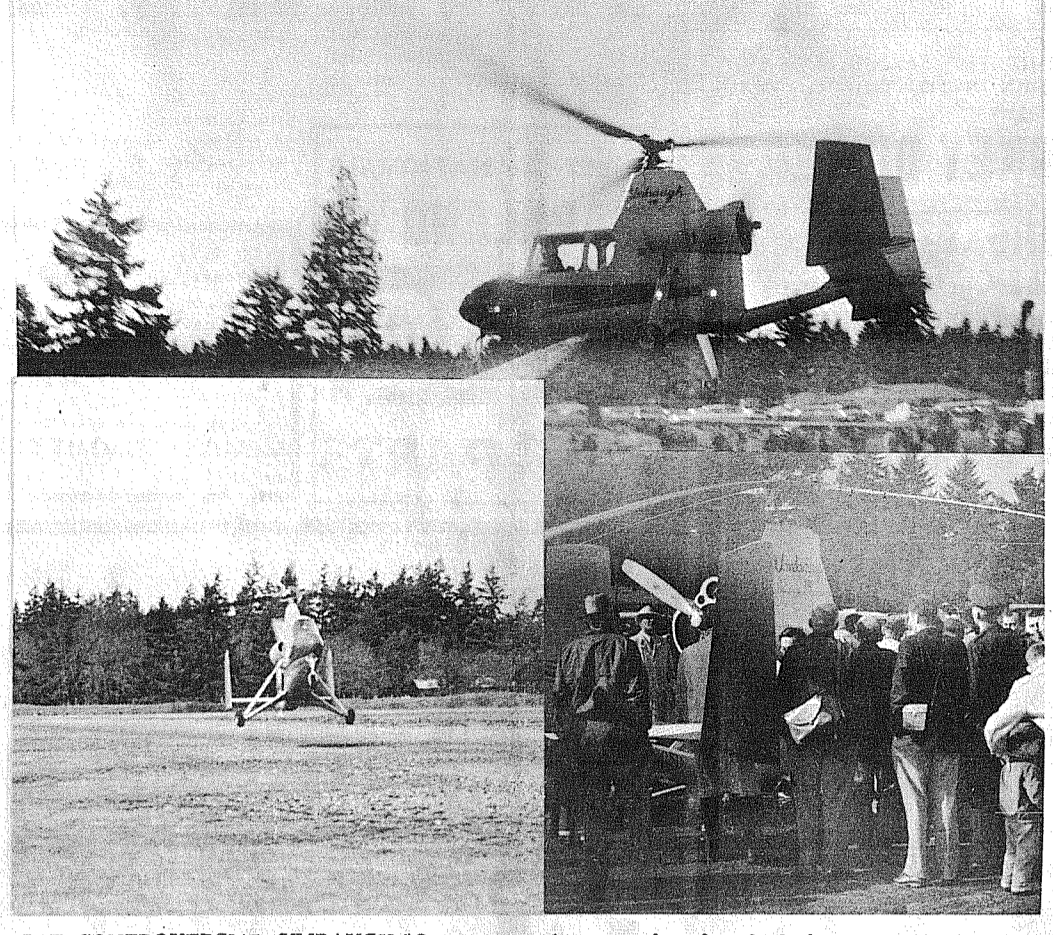

THE CONTROVERSIAL UMBAUGH-18, a new auto-gyro aircraft which has recently become well known in aviation circles, made its first appearance at the Spanaway Airport Wednesday, March 1st. The Umbaugh, with Bud Wolcott at the controls, leaps into the air in its new famous jump take-off in top photo. Lower left photo shows the craft making its spot landing. The Umbaugh can truly "land on a dime" since it requires no forward roll after the wheels touch the ground. Crowds typical of those which appear everywhere the Umbaugh stops, gather around the craft in lower right photo. Conceived and built by Ray Umbaugh in Hagerstown, Maryland, the auto-gyro appeals greatly to real estate people, loggers, and others who desire point-to-point transportation, due to its remarkably low price of \$9,995. 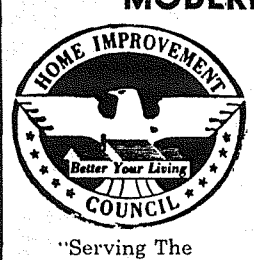

Then cross out about half of the news, for it undoubtedly would not pass the communist censor. Now, what do you have left?

Why not do just what I have suggested above, and give your kids a chance to reaffirm the American beliefs which made this newspaper and its contents possible.

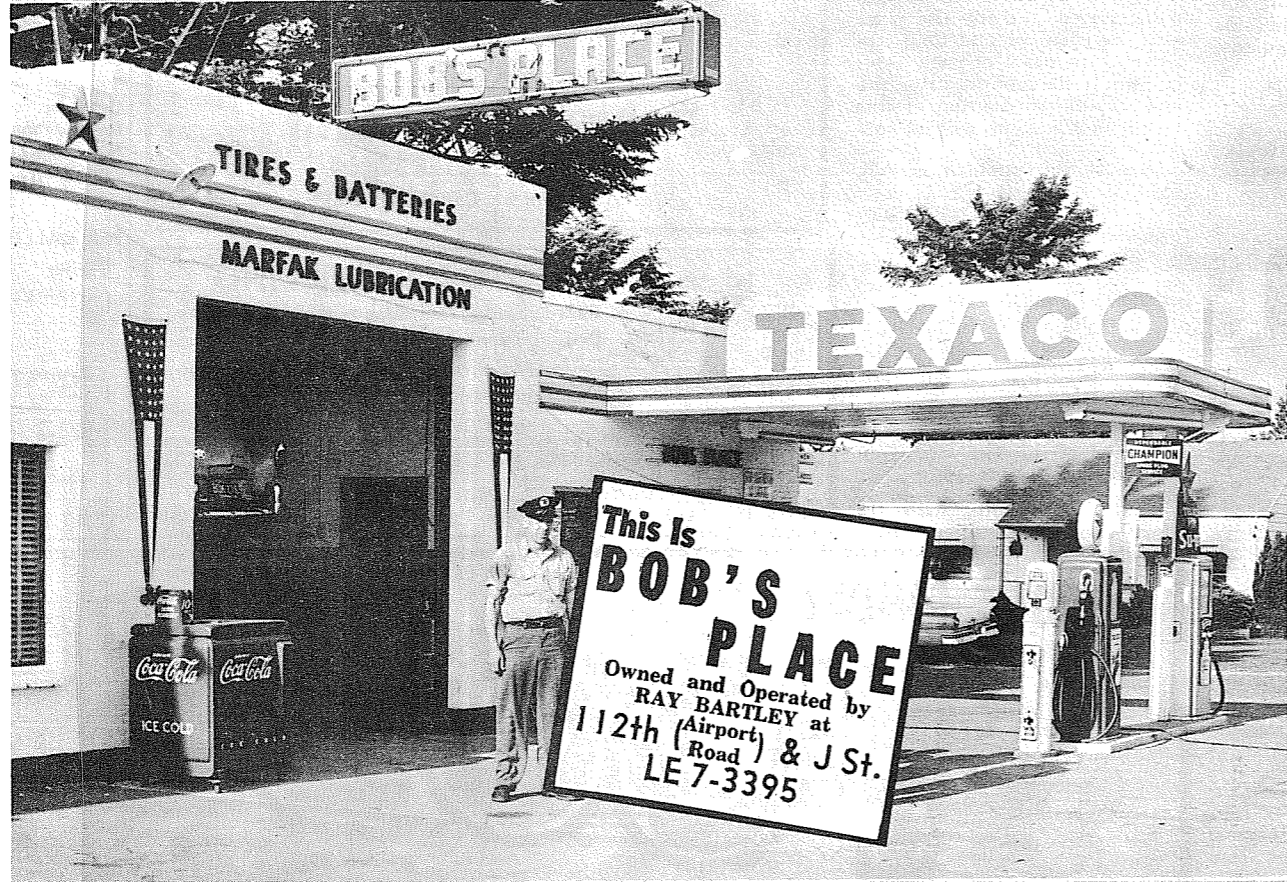

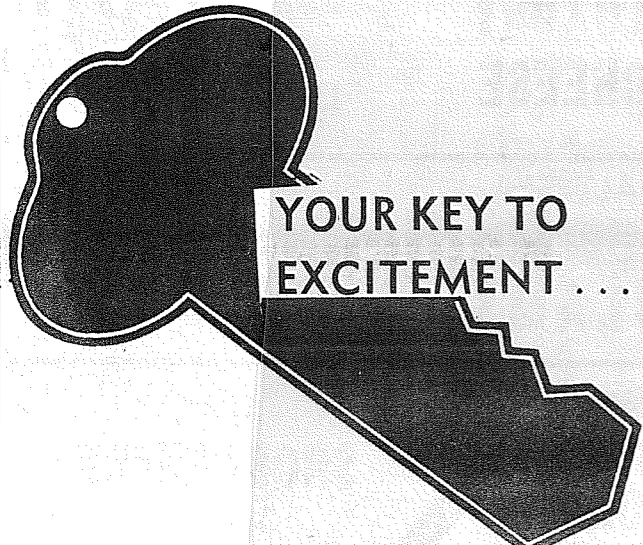



LETTERS to the EDITOR

Dear Sir:

This school district is confronted with that perennial problem of having adequate schools without taxes being too burdensome.

Here is a plan that would solve this problem as well as related problems such as shortage of teachers and inadequate salaries.

Put the schools on a full time basis. Divide the school year into four equal parts, each part having the same number of school days. Divide each grade into three equal parts, each part being taught every quarter. Require the students to attend any three quarters. Students to be allowed to attend all four quarters if their parents so desire. (Such students of course would complete one and one-third grades each year.)

What would be the advantages of this system?

1. Teachers and other personnel would have a full year work, thus increasing their pay by twentyfive per cent.

2. By using the teachers full time we would require twenty-five per cent less teachers.

3. By using the school buildings the full year we could reduce the cost of our building program by twentyfive per cent.

4. Children could take their vacations at the time most convenient for their parents.

5. Under this system the above average or below average pupil could be kept at the work they are capable of doing.

6. Students attending full time would graduate from high school three years earlier than under the present system. This would mean working that much sooner and a financial gain to each student somewhere between ten and twenty thousand dollars. (No, I don't advocate going to work, but if we don't provide more schooling, it would probably happen.)

How else could we improve the schools?

It is also generally agreed that foreign languages should begin while the student is quite young if the student is to be able to think in that language and to speak without an accent. If we defer foreign language until the student gets to high school we are just wasting money. The problem seems to be lack of teachers rather than lack of money. It is suggested that a linguist be used instead of a regularly qualified teacher. If one were provided for each

grade school and each class was given instructions for about twenty minutes daily (with the regular teacher present) the students should have a pretty fair vocabulary by the time they reach junior high school where they would take up the grammar. It would be more satisfactory to have qualified teachers and it is in the realm of probability that the Federal Government would desire to support a teacher exchange program or to hire the teachers outright from some of the countries that have been receiving aid from the U.S.A.

Thirty-eight years ago I graduated from high school. In that thirty-eight years many things have happened. One thing stands out like a sore thumb. We still have just twelve grades

of free schools that are available to everyone in the community. By this time we should have a full college education available in every community. With the Federal Government willing and able to finance better education maybe the thing to do is to ask Uncle Sam to start Junior Colleges in our High School Buildings at night. It wouldn't be the best arrangement but it would be a lot more feasible financially for a great number of students to get a college education.

I will admit that this isn't the best plan in the world, but HAVE YOU GOT A BETTER ONE? If you have, let me know and I'll support it.

What new taxes would I advocate to pay for this? NONE. Our realstate tax

should be revised, however, so that all taxes on residential property would be kept by the district, but that all commercial property be assessed on a state wide basis and each school district given its pro rate share according to the number of students attending in the district. If this were done and assessment made according to the state constitution, taxes in this district would probably raise by one third, but the school district would have five times the amount it now has to operate on. DON'T YOU THINK IT IS HIGH TIME FOR EVERYONE TO PAY THEIR FAIR SHARE OF THE REAL ESTATE TAX?

While we are about it we might as well take up the needless expenditure of money in

other ways. First we have our school buildings insured, and pay a nice fat premium on them. If the premiums we all pay take care of the fire losses and keep the insurance companies in business as well as the insurance salesman's commission, then the state, by backing the school districts in case of fire loss, should be able to save a considerable amount.

Second, on all the new school buildings we have been paying an architect's fees. Why not decide on a uniform school plan and adopt it for the state. If necessary, employ a State architect to revise the plans each year to keep them up to date and to make any revisions necessary to adapt them to a site. (I doubt very much if any school board could be talked

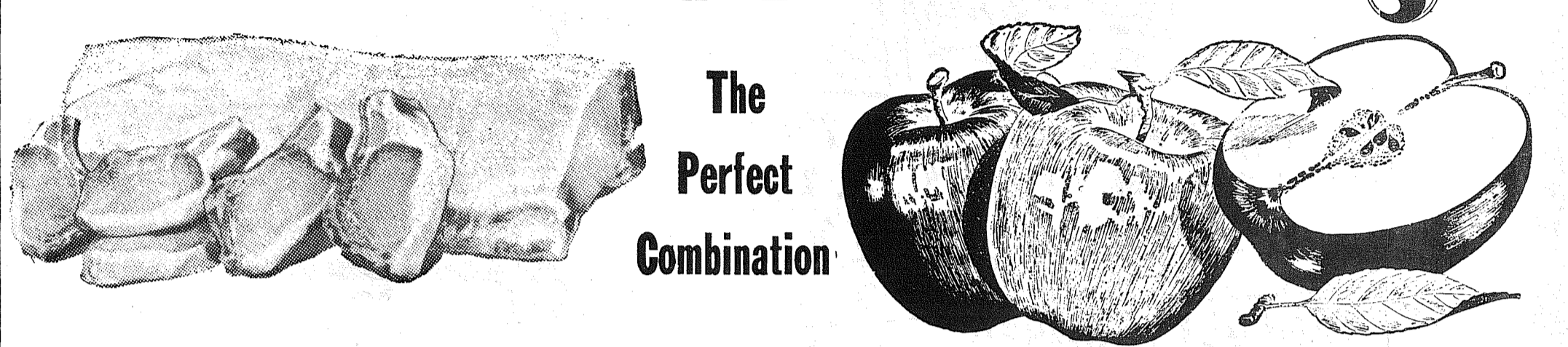
into buying a site that a stand-money paid out as interest if and school could not be erected this condition did not exist. The upon without changes by the State should be able to figure out a better method than this architect).

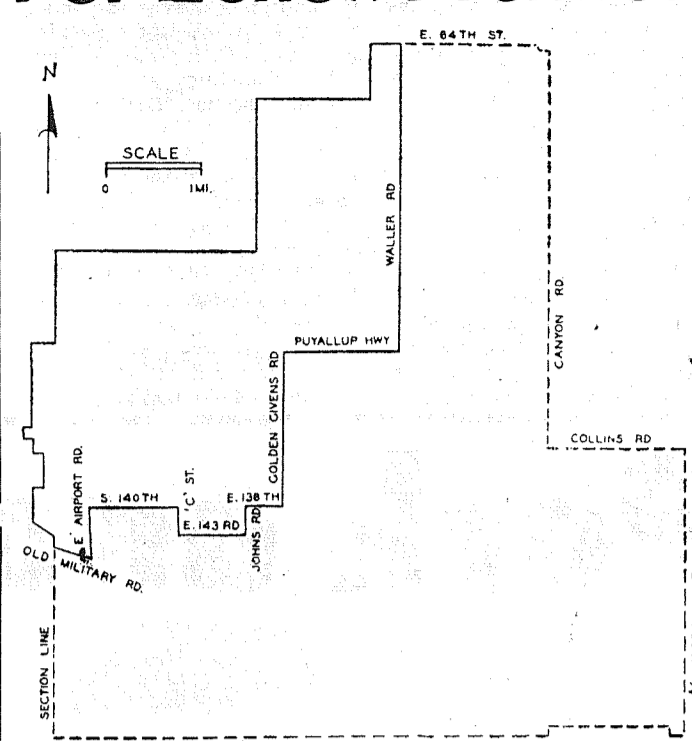

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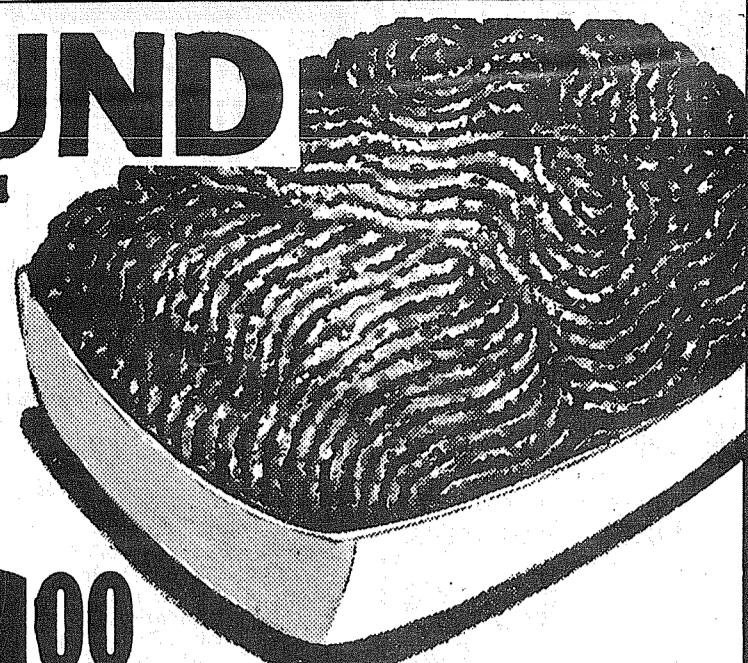
