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BPA Official Explains System

A fairly complete story of the operation of the Bonneville Power Administration electric power marketing was told to members of the Pierce County Power Cooperative last Thursday at the Parkland Fire Station Hall.

Norman A. Gilchrist, in charge of marketing in the Seattle BPA area, told listeners that BPA is now serving 115 customers in Washington, Oregon, Northern Idaho and Western Montana.

Gilchrist emphasized that BPA will not attempt to serve a customer prospect without previous permission of the customer's previous supplier. He added that the first question asked of companies applying for BPA services is, "Do you have a present contract?"

BPA will be able to serve the Parkland, Elmhurst and Steilacoom power companies under the proposal which has been submitted to Congress in this year's budget request. Gilchrist said that the decision on

whether to authorize the building of the necessary power lines rests with the Congress.

When asked how soon power could be delivered to the requesting companies, he said that the fall of 1964 would be the earliest, if everything was authorized in this session of Congress.

Gilchrist added that the service to the three companies would be on a radial line, instead of the loop-type service they now have with Tacoma City Light.

He said the radial line does not usually have the record for service which a loop line would have, but that the lines to be constructed would be built with the idea of reliability. The problem with the radial line, he added, is that if the radial line goes out, the rest of the line away from the substation is dead until service is restored.

The projected line would probably be built on steel cage type poles, Gilchrist said.

On the question of possible rate raises by the BPA, Gilchrist said they are always a possibility, but that the Administration is dedicated to maintain as low a rate as possible for customers, public, and industrial, which are served. He added that a 20% raise would tend to drive out industry already established in the state.

Gilchrist admitted that the BPA lost about \$15 million last fiscal year, but added that its repayment schedule was still ahead by about \$38 million. Bonneville repays the Federal treasury the cost of construction and interest on the principal out of revenues to the system. He said the present rates were established in 1939.

On the question of rates, members of the Power group said that the original approach to Bonneville was made after Tacoma City Light had raised their rates more than two years ago. They added that the original negotiations were started with City Light, then progressed to Puget Sound Power and Light and then finally to BPA.

Pat Gallagher, new County Commissioner, the featured speaker for the event, will also make the presentation to the winner, who must be present to qualify for the prize.

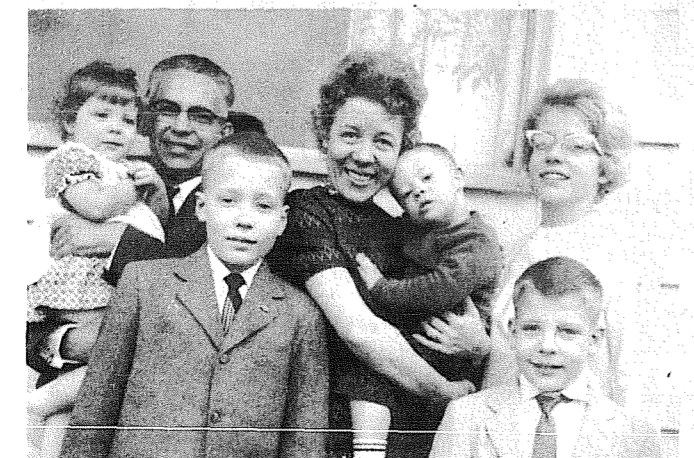
The winning entry was chosen from those sent in by children of the Bethel area, 6 to 14 years of age.
