





Dear Miss Brookfield:

I ordered a wig by mail. Well, it finally arrived and what a disappointment! I be riding a broom on Halloween night, but the manufacturer won't take it back and give me a refund. I though of ordering another one in a different color. But my husband is against it. What have you got to say?

A.D., Talladega, Al Dear A.D.:

Here's some advice to paste in your wig band: in buying a wig, always deal with a local wig maker or dealer, department store or beauty salon. The best way to choose a wig is to try on many different ones, for style and color. When you buy a wig by mail, according to a spokesman for the National Better Business Bureau, you do so at your own risk. Among the drawbacks is the customer's inability to discern whether the "real" hair advertised is human or animal hair. Also, color can only be matched approximately, even if a sample is sent.

A leading wig manufacturer advises that a wig closest to your natural hair color - or a shade lighter - and styled similar to your most flattering hair-do is frequently the most becoming. He also advises women to curb their desire for a drastic color change until they buy their second or "fun" wig.

However, for the sake of marital harmony, I would suggest you avoid any mention of a second or "fun" wig when you discuss this subject with your husband.


