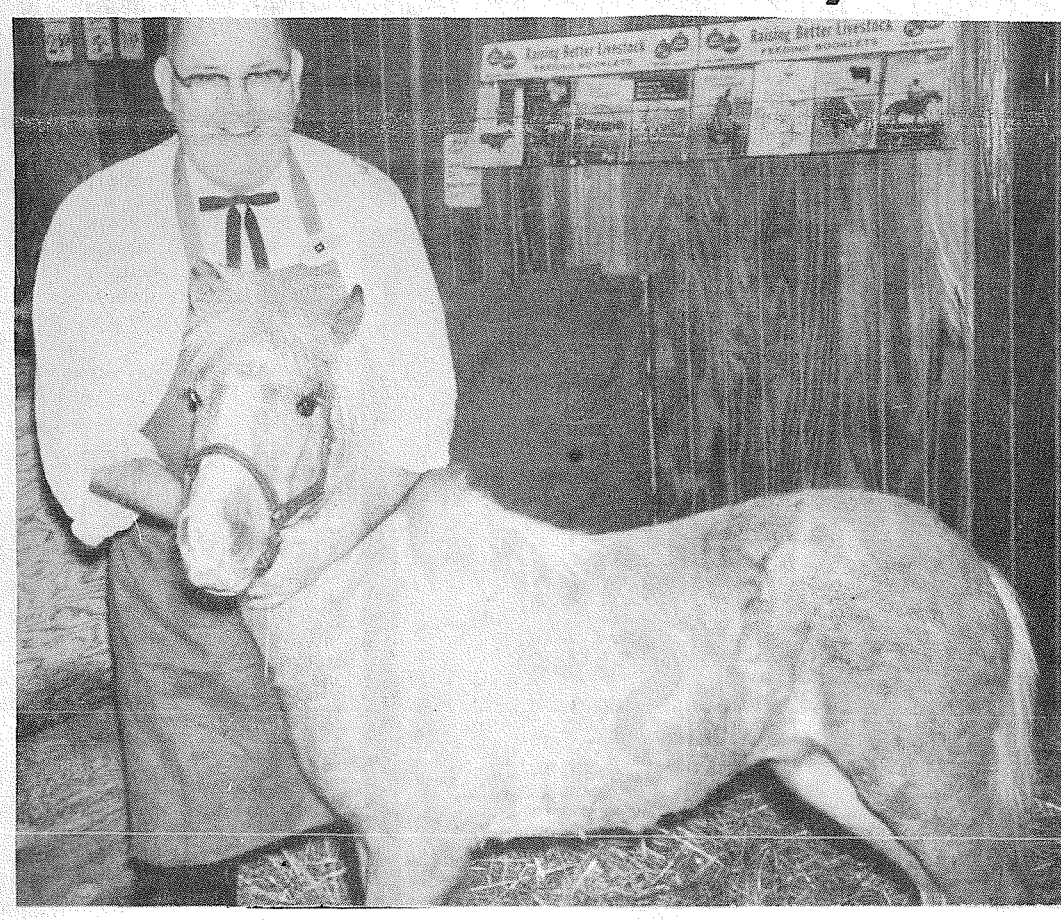

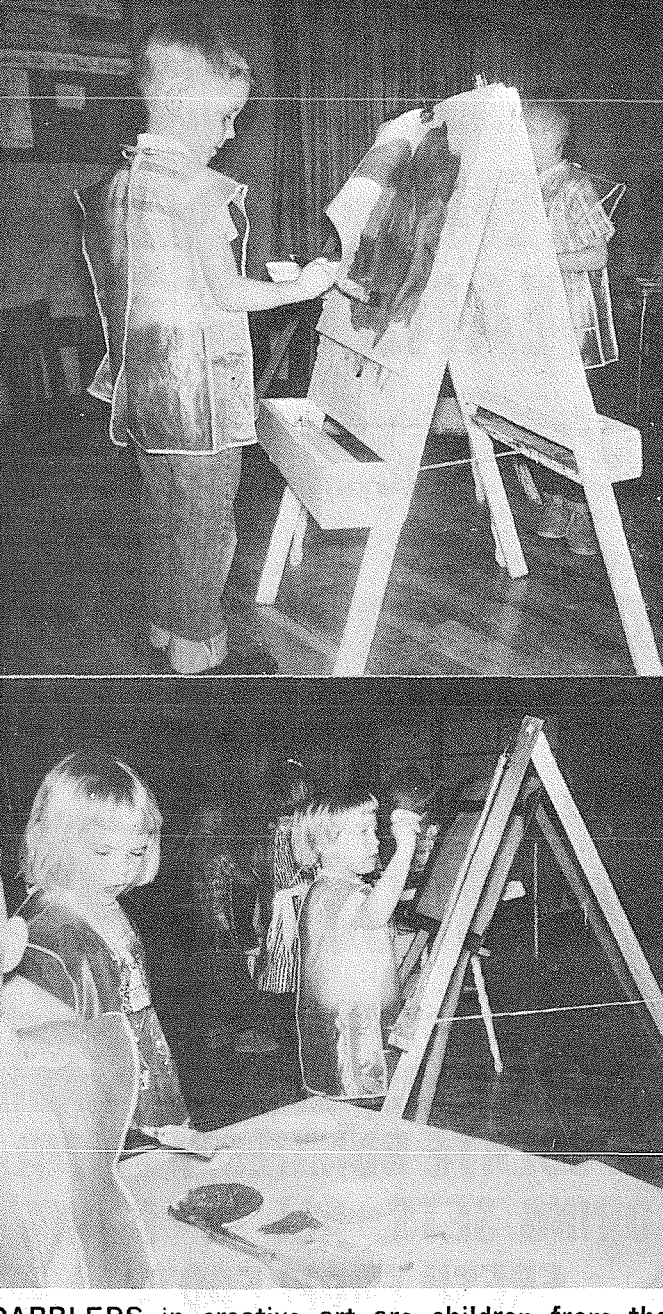

He has played in such places as the Tuschinkie in Amsterdam and for such persons of nobility as Prince Bernard of the Netherlands, and is a graduate of the University of Art and Music in Amsterdam.

County Loops Plan Meeting

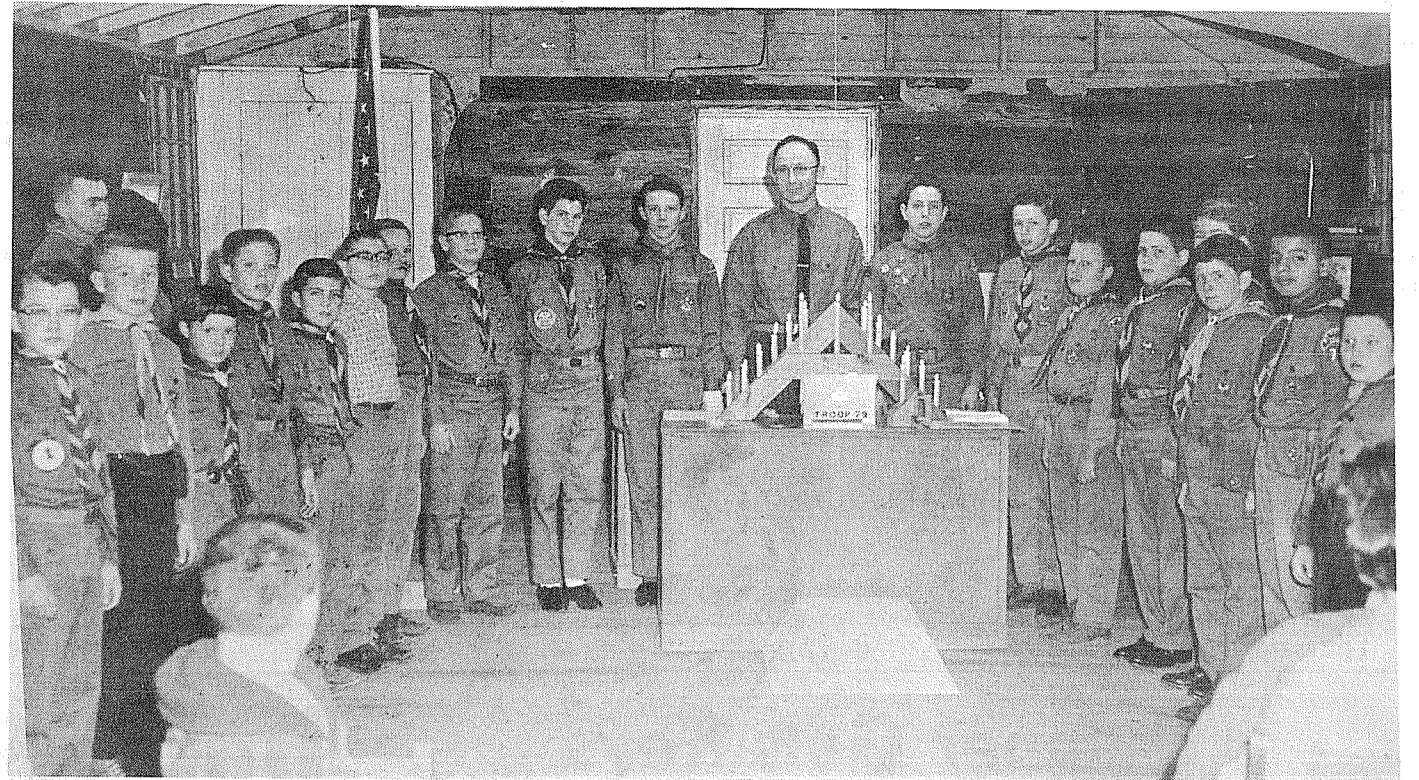

Park Service Installs Ticket Vendors

Ticket-vending machines for collection of a service fee will be in operation this summer at 30 of the 850 campgrounds in the National Forests of the Pacific Northwest Region (Oregon and Washington).

The 30 sites include about 1,450 family camping units. Picnicking, boat-launching, and other day-use activities at these sites remain free of charge.

The U.S. Forest Service has furnished free recreation facilities at campgrounds and picnic sites for many years. But as facilities are improved and demands increase, it is probable that charges will be required for use of many of the developed sites, according to J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester.

New facilities—roads, toilets, etc.—are being installed at campgrounds, including many of those which will carry the \$1.00 service charge this summer. Such construction and the job in installing ticket machines may affect the beginning dates for this year's charge program.

There were some 85 participants in the style show and more than 170 home sewn garments were fashioned.

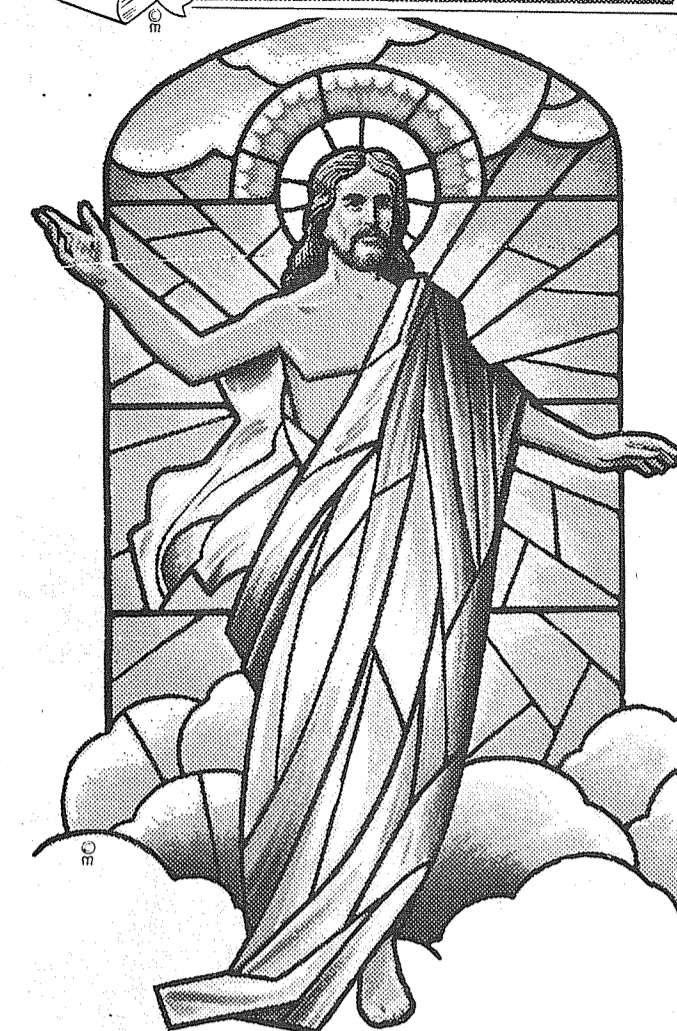

Self-Employed Farm Tax Eyed

Most farmers must pay a Federal self-employment tax for 1962, Neal S. Warren, Director of Internal Revenue for Seattle District, reminded them recently.

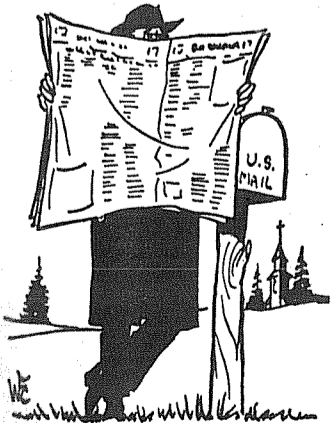
He said the rate of self-employment tax is 4.7 percent, and is in addition to any income tax payable.

Social Security taxes are paid by employees and their employers, and the self-employment tax must be paid by persons who are self-employed. These taxes are used to pay old-age, survivors and disability benefits under the Federal Social Security program.

A self-employed person is one who operates his own business or farm. A farmer is considered to be self-employed if he employs others to operate or work the farm, even though he does not live on it himself.

If earnings from self-employment are \$400 or more for the year, he must file a Federal income tax return and pay the self-employment tax due even though he owes no income tax.

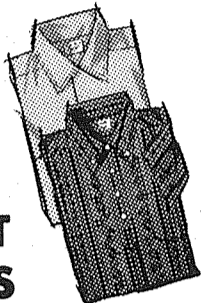

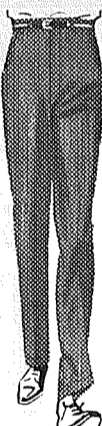

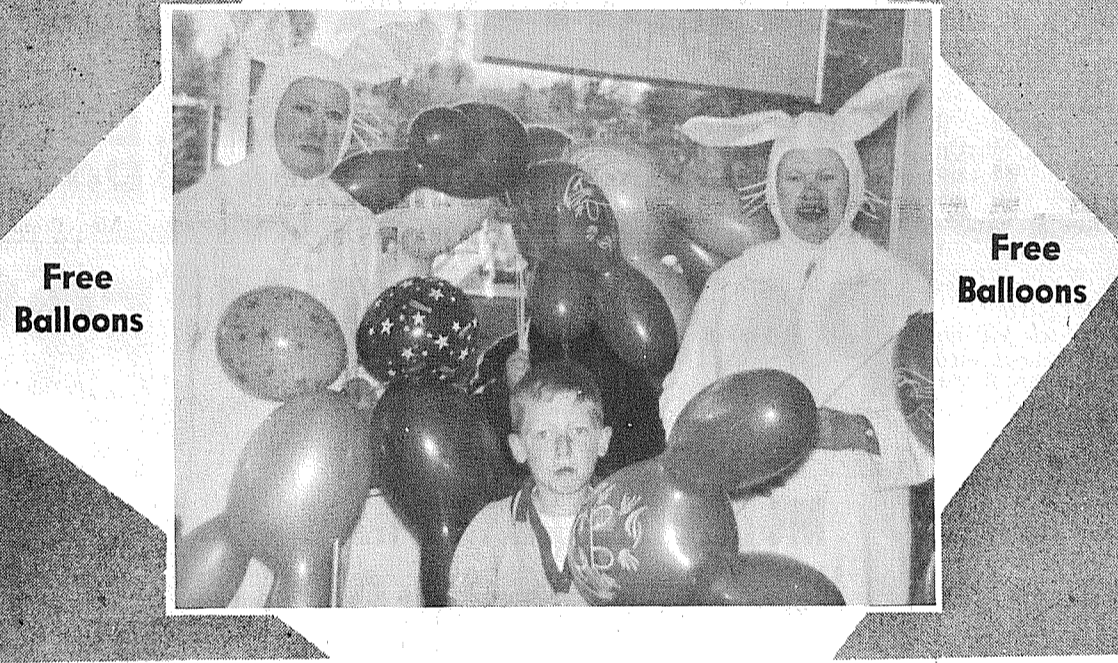

For years I have had a yen to go watch the Sammamish Slough boat races but never could quite see driving that far just to set on the bank and watch the boats flash by one given point. Last Sunday as I read an account of the races, accompanied by the usual pictures showing some joker climbing the bank with his boat, inspiration hit. I tossed the kids into the plane and headed for the Redmond area.

My timing was perfect. One race was just starting from Lake Sammamish to Lake Washington. I dropped down over the creek bank and by leisurely circling the boats we were able to watch them from a few hundred feet all the way down to Lake Washington. We watched them make each hairpin turn, saw one boat climb a bank and thoroughly enjoyed every minute of the race. From a spectator's standpoint this method of watching the race is unsurpassed. I told the clerk to toss in a pound of the salmon, too. When he totaled up my bill I thought he was quoting me the national debt. Seems sea food is high, at least up Everett way. Anyway, I asked him if he'd given me only a pound of salmon and he assured me that he had. I walked the length of the counter and "Ah, so!" the mystery was solved. The big 48c figure had 1/4 pound printed under it in very small print. I paid up, shut up and shoved off, but couldn't help thinking about the smoked salmon.

When I was a kid going to school, smoked salmon was a status symbol. Each noon hour as all of us opened our lunch boxes the room would take on the tantalizing aroma of the city dump, as kid after kid pulled out a big chunk of smoked salmon, and the teacher slipped outside for air. Yes, it was a status symbol of us who had nothing else to eat during those tough depression times. Salmon were abundant in those days and we carted them off by the load to smoke for the winter at a net cost to us of a bag of salt. A chunk of smoked salmon had about as much value from a monetary standpoint in those days as a tick did on a hound dog.

Now it seems the lowly chunk of smoked salmon has risen from the status symbol of the hungry swab to that of the gourmet. Who says it isn't a changing world?

You've all heard the old cliché about cheering up, things could be worse, and the age old ending of the story. I believe it was really written for me, even though it took several years for the climax.

As the story goes, I was sitting in my office last week with my feet on the desk, contemplating some personal problems that at the time were paramount in mind, like how to raise a family single handedly, when one of the jokers that works here . . . let's rephrase that . . . One of the jokers that puts in his time around here, came thru the office and made the ageless remark, "Cheer up, boss, things could be worse." It brought a smile to my face as I thought of the usual ending, but it did make sense, so in a matter of minutes I erased the morbid mental block I had and actually I did just that . . . I cheered up, and sure enough . . . things did get worse. Within a matter of minutes some character served me with papers wherein it was indicated that someone still believes in Santa Claus, for I am being sued for nearly a quarter million dollars, and that will make a lot of nectar. While I'm standing there looking this over, who pops in but Harold LeMay with a buddy in tow looking for a \$500 donation for the Boy Scouts. A good cause and a great need, but needless to say, with timing like that, all they got was the use of my crying towel.

As Harold and his buddy waded out of the joint the phone rang and we were informed that CBS had changed the dates on the showing of the National Air Show.
