

Sheriff Salutes Round-up Queen Local People Aid In Saving Child

Two young Midland mothers and their children played important roles in the saving of a life Monday evening, May 25. Mrs. Marge Bortle and daughter Deborah and Mrs. Leona Turosik and George Ann, Barbara and Paul were on the Old Tacoma dock watching people fishing when a tiny boy ran up to them saying that a little girl had fallen into the Sound. Rushing to the edge of the dock, they saw bubbles rising and immediately spread the alarm. Sgt. William G. Pierce of Fort Lewis plunged into the water and in the third try, brought Angela C. Chapman of 2906 North Mc-Carver St. to the surface. Others pulled the unconscious child and her rescuer to the dock, where artificial respiration was started

immediately. All efforts might have been in vain however but for the quick thinking and action of George Ann Turosik who, not waiting for the rescue of the drowning child, ran to the near-by Top of the Ocean to call the fire department. The escue squad arrived with the esusitator shortly after Angela was lifted to the dock and soon had her out of danger.


The firemen gave George Ann much of the credit for saving the child as they estimated her action had saved at least five precious minutes, which might well have meant the difference between life and death. Removed to Mary Bridge hospital for observation Angela was taken home by her parents the next morning. In the meantime, Mrs. Bortle took charge of all the children on the dock, having them form a circle

holding hands, to insure that no body would venture too near the edge of the dock and fall in.
