Directory Needed Here But Is This The One?

A great many newspapers live out their existence without ever taking a stand on anything more controversial than mother-

hood, which they are for, and sin, which they are against, and the flag, which they wave when they can remember.

I happen to think that patriotism is a virtue to be cultivated, that motherhood is the greatest fulfillment a woman can have. And by the way, I am against sin.

However, other things require a position, a place to stand up and be counted

among the pros or the cons.

During this past week residents of this area have been calling this newspaper to report and complain about telephone calls they have been receiving from an outfit calling themselves the 'Parkland-Spanaway Suburban Directory.'

This group may be completely legitimate, but the questions which are being asked, I think, should be answered only by a citizen to his government in a regular census questionnaire.

Such things as name, address, place of business and position are proper for a directory and from what I can gather one is needed for Pierce County.

However, when the questioners go into the subjects of the number of cars in the family, annual income, and other things of like nature, then I think they are asking more than is needed in a directory.

According to Walter West of the Better Business Bureau these people are asking more than a legitimate directory needs.

The Better Business Bureau recommendation is that no information should be given on the telephone.

This 'Suburban Directory may be perfectly proper and a business which is needed, but the temptation to sell lists containing information on the number and age of autos and the annual income of families might overcome the original purpose of the compilation.

University of Puget Sound and Pacific Lutheran University professors do summer work for legitimate surveys and the students taking classes from them conduct surveys during the school year.

However, these surveys are conducted with all the proper safeguards and if you answer the questions you will remain anonymous and your information becomes a part of the mass of statistics which are being assembled.

One of the hardest things for any newspaper editor to do is to "let his hair down" and talk shop with the readers who are the main reason for his existence.

The probable reason is that the newspaper, perhaps more than any other business is aware of the obligation to serve the public interest.

Any business in any community is approached on a regular basis for contributions of one kind or

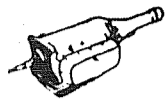

WHERE DO WE FIT?

The Newspaper, The Advertiser, And The Reader

A quiet exploration of the varying roles of the weekly newspaper, the advertiser and the reader can be of much interest. Which of the three is the most important? Which is least in importance?

First, what function does the weekly newspaper fulfill? The answer is a complex one, but in capsule form we can say that such a publication is a bridge extending between the reader and what is happening in the community, and also a bridge extending between the reader and the advertiser.

The advertiser's role is to furnish such goods and services as are needed in the trading area. He must reach these potential buyers in the most expeditious manner possible--and the weekly newspaper has two excellent arguments in favor of being this bridge. (1) The cost to the advertiser is less when compared to other media, and (2) the readership is high.

And what of the reader? The thousands of families and individuals, that when taken en masse form the trading area--their role is to buy and buy and to keep on buying. But why should they exercise this great purchasing power within their area? Why not shop afield (in our case in either Lakewood or Tacoma), particularly if the merchants in these other areas have taken more pains to make such shopping easier for the reader?

What happens to our area if the readers should take ALL of their business elsewhere? We know the answer. Every single establishment, would be bankrupt, with the possible exception of the newspaper. The newspaper still has a chance, an outside one,

of securing enough advertising from these other locales to still exist.

An ugly little incident, not uncommon, took place recently. A weekly newspaper made an error in the businessman's advertisement. The paper felt badly and made every atonement possible--but it still wasn't enough for the advertiser. He apparently wanted blood.

Which leads us to the point of where is the line drawn? Is the advertiser in a position so unassailable that he can say and do what he pleases no matter the cost to the newspaper in money or human dignity? In other words, we revert to the original question--which is the most important and which is the least in importance, the newspaper, the advertiser or the reader?

Basing my conclusion on survival ability should economic chaos strike in the form of the readers taking ALL their business out of the area, I would have to rate the readers as far and away the most important--and the advertiser as the least in importance.

What can be learned from this conclusion? That it behooves us, the newspaper and the advertiser, to work together, to support one another in all possible ways, in order that we may offer the reader the best that is in us. Such a policy WILL SUCCEED and none of us will be the loser for having adopted it!

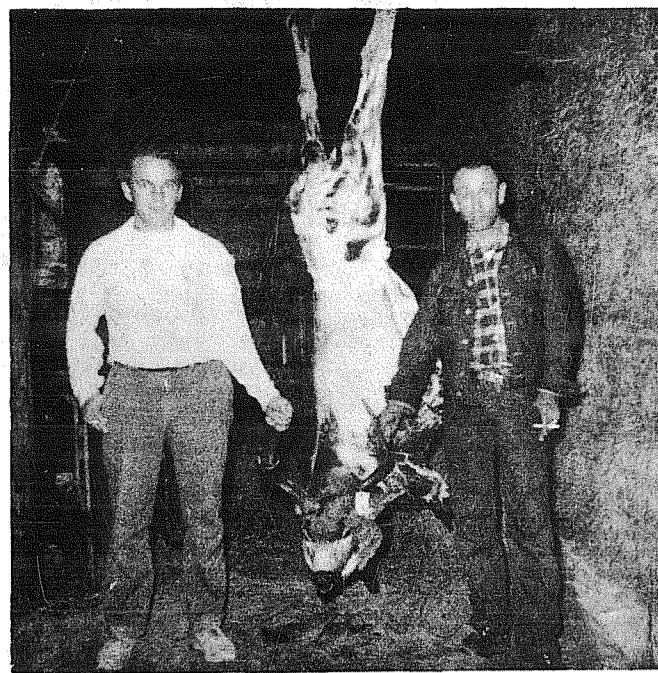


