Voters again will have the right to vote on the special millages necessary to operate the Franklin Pierce School District for the coming year.



A pleasant surprise this year is the reduction of the total millage by 5 mills, so that if the levy passes, the tax total will still drop somewhat.

With the millage pegged and total bonded indebtedness restricted as to use of the revenues, schools seem to need this special election to raise the money they cannot raise under the regular assessments.

The cost of holding a special election each year, with its problems to school administrators, is a burden which we have placed upon ourselves. Every school superintendent I've ever talked to has drooled over the amount of money spent on these elections.

While in the main, we tend to forget that school costs rise as our own do, it would seem that a lot of teaching could be done with the \$10,000 or more spent on elections each year in many of the districts.

It is not my purpose to say that the schools are doing a poor job. My feeling is that schools of today are doing the very best job they can with the tools they have available.

Each person has his own idea of what the schools should do. "They should. . ." prefaces remarks about schools which range from thoughtless statements to some very provocative thoughts.

At any rate, with an election presenting itself to the voters of Franklin Pierce School District on Tuesday, each one must make his effort to get to the polls and cast his ballot.

The worst thing that can happen to this country is for elections to be lost by default.

Parkland-Spanaway residents can feel a justified pride as this week's United Good Neighbor campaign reports come in. In addition to oversubscribing their quota by one-third at least, with more than \$1200 reported when \$900 was asked for the Parkland area. The original \$900 quota was raised from the quota which was asked for last year.

Have you looked at your leather hunting jacket lately? Brush can raise havoc with leather, scuffing the sleeves and leaving a once-a-bit anxious about finding your way in and out of a wooded area. As the old saying goes, an ounce of prevention. . . You'll find that an old rifle shell makes an excellent whistle. It can be heard for a long distance and its sound is easier to locate than a gunshot. The next time you're in a tight spot, just use a rifle shell whistle to let your buddies know where you are.

When you're out duck hunting your hands can get mighty cold. Once more an empty shell can come to the rescue. Since a shotgun shell lengthwise three or four times down toward the brass. Elk Plain Teacher Guides Handicapped Children



"Arranged environment" is the keynote to the work being conducted by Mrs. Katharine M. Small, Elk Plain Grade school teacher.

Mrs. Small works with handicapped children, teaching them self-education and self-improvement. A visitor to Mrs. Small's classroom is immediately aware of the progress of her master plan for Special Education as it comes to life in the classroom.

She calls it the "X" celsior Plan, developed when she served as a volunteer assistant in the prison training and literacy program in Oahu Prison, Honolulu, Hawaii.

The program includes everything from daily prayer to word punctuation. "Character education is taught daily", explained Mrs. Small, "It is based on the theory that to act right is to be right."

This is Mrs. Small's third year with the Special Education program in the Bethel School District. Twenty four students are subjected to an intensive academically oriented program. Special equipment such as lights, hearing aids, teaching machines

and teaching aids are utilized.

Children with both mental and physical handicaps are treated equally as simply children with handicaps. They are remarkably quick to learn and are immediately responsive to the teacher's demands.

There is no such word as "retarded" in Mrs. Small's vocabulary.

ROY MARINE IN Participating In Large Maneuver Exercise 'Warm-Up'

Maui, Hawaii (FHTNC) -- Marine Pfc. John L. Ohin, Participating in Exercise "Warm-Up", a joint naval-Thurston of Roy, Wash., is marine amphibious operation with Marine Helicopter Transport Squadron 161, a unit of an amphibious task force now taking part in Operation "Silver Sword", an assault on beaches on the island of Maui Mrs. Donald C. Thresher in the largest maneuver of the Hawaiian Islands since World War II.

Washington motorists are facing a record smashing challenge today that makes Roger Maris' 61st homer look like an infield pop-up by comparison.
State Patrol Chief Roy A. Betlach says the state's drivers can figuratively "belt the cover off" the traffic record book in the last quarter of this year if they cut fatal traffic mishaps by one third. He said such an achievement would spare nearly 100 lives this year, save an estimated 16 million dollars, and set the lowest mileage death rate the state has recorded since records were started back in 1937. Zenger was the printer and publisher of a paper known as the New York Weekly Journal. He criticized the administration of Royal Governor Cosby of New York in print. The tyrannical Cosby had Zenger jailed on a charge of libel.
Zenger had editorialized that the Governor had deeds to lands destroyed, judges arbitrarily displaced, new courts established without the consent of the Legislature and had denied the right to vote to certain landowners. All of these accusations were true but truth was held to be no defense in a prosecution for seditious libel, which was defined as "a written censure upon public men for their conduct as such."
Zenger was brought to trial and his New York counsel were disbarred because they came to his

possible," Chief Betlach declared. "At the end of September we had 40 fewer traffic deaths in Washington than were recorded during the same period of 1960. Our death rate per 100 million miles of travel was also well below last year's near record mark."

Washington State Council records show the three year average traffic death rate for October, November and December is 161. Betlach said this figure could easily be reduced by one third.

defense. After disbarment they secured the services of Andrew Hamilton of the Philadelphia bar to continue the defense. Hamilton was the foremost lawyer in the American Colonies and the term "Philadelphia lawyer" was long used as a special compliment in his individual honor.
Hamilton offered his services to Zenger without fee. Displaying great moral courage he defied the judges who were controlled by the Governor and told the jury that it was not considering the cause of just a poor printer. Instead, it was considering the cause of "the liberty both of exposing and opposing arbitrary power by speaking and writing truth." The Chief Justice instructed the jury that the printed words of Zenger were libelous and that if the jury found he had published them, (and he admitted he had) then Zenger should be found guilty. Under such circumstances it seemed obvious that Zenger would be convicted. Fortunately, the jury, which was not controlled by the Governor, defied the court. Zenger was found not guilty, and was freed. Governor Morris, one of the members of the Constitutional Convention, said years later, "The trial of Zenger in 1735 was the germ of American freedom, the morning star of that liberty which subsequently revolutionized America."

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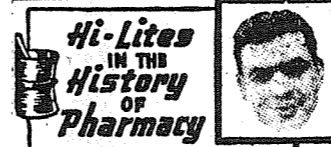

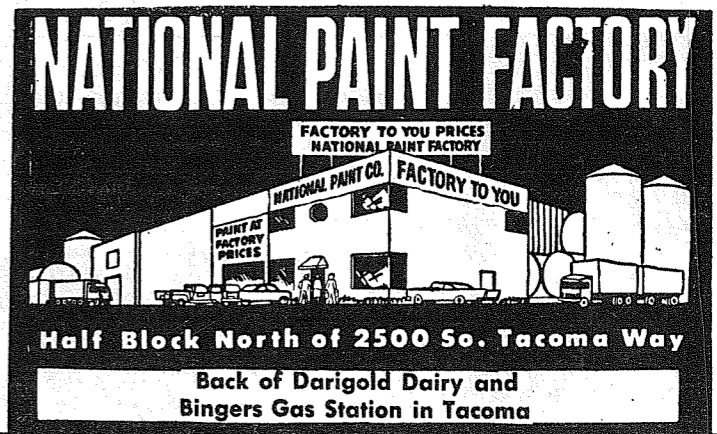

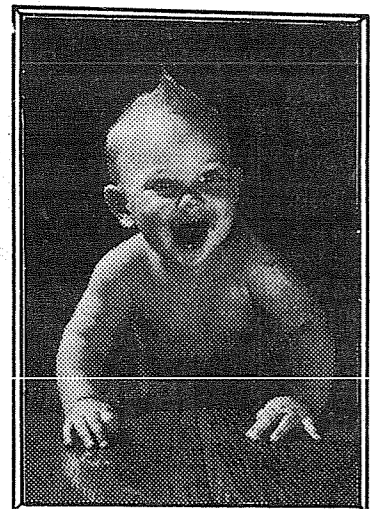

Crowded hunting cars packed with gear will also add to the hazards. He said fatigue, especially on the way home, is likely to be a factor in safe driving, too.

INSECTS often follow as
 secondary invaders of the drought stricken trees. The secondary invaders are no threat to healthy, vigorous trees as the healthy trees' natural protection will normally prevent invasion of the tree.

A flare up of tree dying
 has occurred several times since 1939, according to reports made by entomologists of the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station. These reports were made on earlier occurrences and not on the current situation. The pattern of the earlier damage, however, follows closely that which is occurring today.

A spokesman for the
 Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station commenting on an outbreak of several years back states in his report as follows: "Our experience has been that poor growing conditions are primarily responsible for the heavy tree killing in the general area of the Fort Lewis Military Reservation. In most cases, the trees are growing on very shallow, gravely soil, and after reaching an age of about 40 to 50 years often begin to be killed by such agents as drought, bark beetles, and diseases. We have made examinations periodically over the last 20 years in the area and have always found the same situation. The last examination was made following the very dry season of 1951 and 1952 when very heavy killing of Douglas Fir occurred in the Fort Lewis area. In many cases beetles were finishing off the trees, but the primary cause of death was attributed to poor growing conditions coupled with the drought."

As a result of several years of intensive work in developing disease-free and variety-pure raspberry planting stock, which has meant that a considerable amount of money had to be spent in initiating and continuing this project, now comes the reward — not only the Matlocks, but to raspberry growers as a whole, from the State Department of Agriculture that is responsible for plant certification in the state of Washington, that the Matlock planting stock has been certified. To my knowledge, the first in the state.

This is a needed phase in raspberry production and for a long time at any grower meeting you would always hear remarks such as this "If there was only a source of certified raspberry plants, the raspberry industry would have a chance to upgrade itself." That chance has now materialized and I am sure that the growers in western Washington and in the Pacific Northwest will be very happy to know of this source and will use it well. So let me say "Congratulations on a job well done!"

Watering of particularly admired ornamental trees during future extremely dry periods is recommended. This is especially true for droughty soils to sustain the life and vigor of the trees.
