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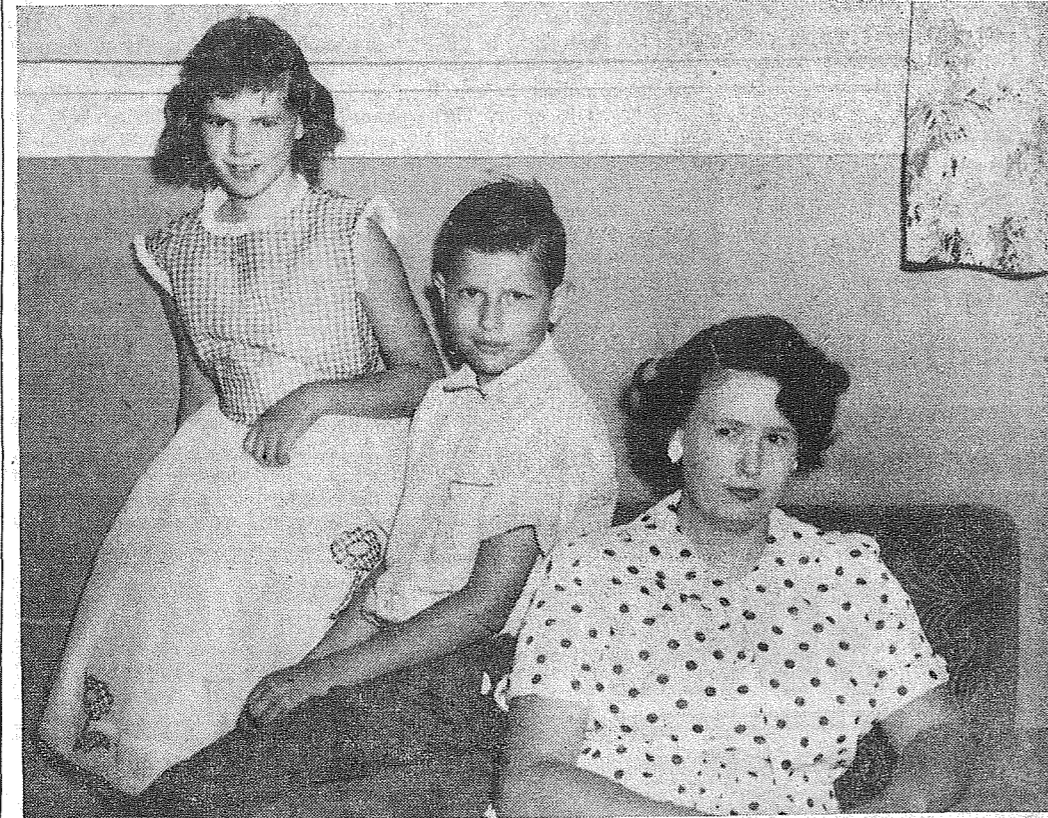

Last Thursday the phone rang in the modest home of Mrs. Trivett, a Korean war widow and mother of three. The male voice at the other end informed her she had just won an RCA color TV set by having her name drawn from a bowl containing

customer's names at this particular store. Only trouble was, Mrs. Trivett in her excitement forgot the name of the store as well as the caller.

She was supposed to pick up the set Friday at 2 p.m. No word of any kind has reached her regarding the prize, if there is such a prize. None of the merchants contacted knew anything about any such promotional stunt, as this

with her son Larry, 12, and daughter Bonnie, 10. She has another son, Bobby, 14. The Trivetts have a TV set in the living room but no car in the garage. Mrs. Trivett manages to get around with the help of rides from neighbors. At the present she is selling Stanley products in order to buy a car.

The thought of a color TV set immediately registered in Mrs. Trivett's mind as a solution to her problem. All she need do would be to sell the set and she would have enough money to buy a car.

The transportation problem may soon become particularly acute for the Trivetts. Her daughter, Bonnie, has kidney trouble and must have to visit a doctor in Ft. Lewis twice a week.

Did a local store really call Mrs. Trivett? Is there a TV set somewhere in the area with her name on it, waiting for its new owner to pick it up? Or is this someone's cruel, twisted idea of a job? A lot of people, especially Mrs. Trivett, would like to know the answer.

Nightshade Abundant In Local Area

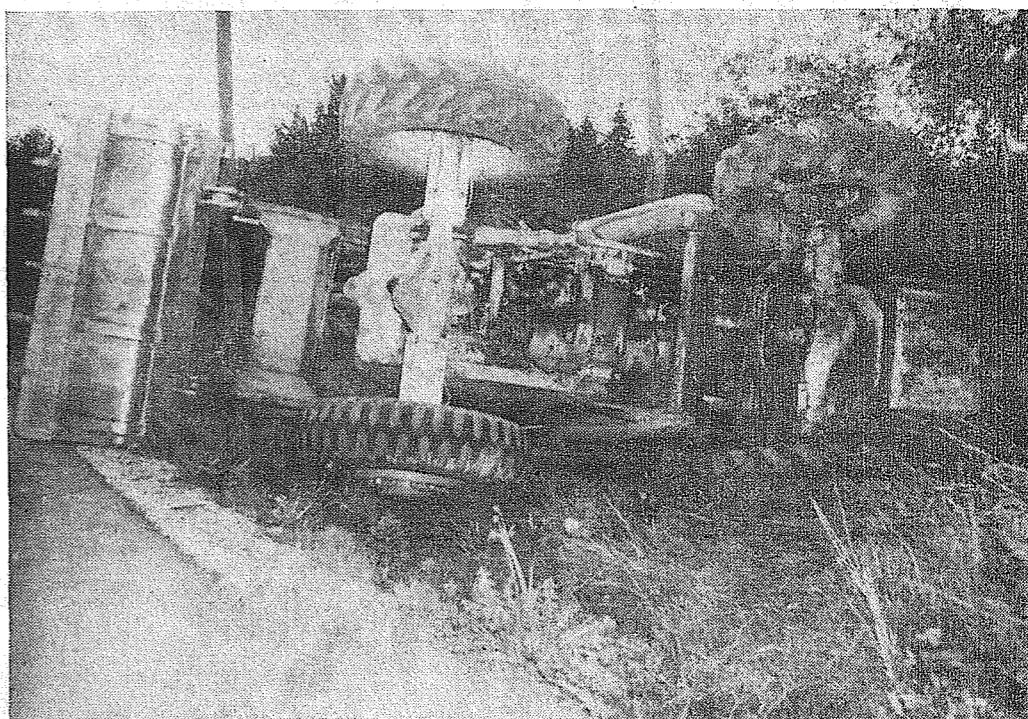

Killed in Train-Car Crash Tues.



Edwin E. Ellingson, 68-year-old Roy farmer, was fatally injured when his car was struck by a south bound freight as he was west bound on Purcell Road, 13/10 miles south of Roy. Ellingson, who lived at Rt. 1, Box 35, Roy, died instantly when he failed to yield the right of way to the oncoming Milwaukee train. When the car approached the tracks, the fireman, Herman Medlow, immediately warned the engineer, B. E. Miller, Miller, 59, of 641 So. Fife, put the emergency on, but was unable to stop the train before it ran the crossing. Medlow, 41, of 6514 Flannigan St., Tacoma, said the 1955 De Soto sedan was tossed 10 feet in the air, then rolled over and over another 90 feet before coming to a stop 18 feet off the tracks. The engineer stated that proper warning was given by the train whistle. The investigating state patrol officer, Al Stewart, checked the tape showing the speed of the train and found it to be legal. Puyallup Schools Will Open Sept. 7

The Puyallup Public Schools will open for the school year of 1960-61 on Wednesday, September 7, 1960. There will be a full day of school the first day. The Elementary Schools will start at 9:00 a.m., the Junior High School at 8:30 a.m., and the Senior High School

at 8:00 a.m. The term "Puyallup Public Schools" refers to all the schools in district number three: Firgrove, Woodland, North Puyallup, Firwood, and Waller Road, as well as the five elementary buildings that are in the Puyallup city limits.

All registrations, including junior high and elementary schools, should be carried out during the mornings from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. on August 31, September 1 and September 2. The following students should be registered during these three half-days:

- a. All kindergarten children not already registered last spring who will be 5 years old by October 31, 1960.
- b. All first grade children not already registered last spring who will be 6 years old by October 31, 1960.
- c. All new students.
- d. All students in grades 1

through 6 who have changed their addresses since school was dismissed in June.

Senior High School students who have not previously registered may register at the High School two weeks before school begins, August 22 through September 2, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Ninth grade students from Firwood, Edgemont and Riverside registered last May with their principals so it will not be necessary for them to come to the office to register. New students from these areas and any other non-high school students may register according to the above details.

All students who expect to attend the first grade in the Puyallup Public Schools must have a physical examination before they will be allowed to enter. These examinations will be provided by most Puyallup doctors in the office of the doctor. This will eliminate the use of school time after school has started for medical examinations. The Puyallup doctors have a card which they will issue to each parent for his or her first grade child after the physical examination. If there are patrons who prefer to have their children examined by Tacoma doctors instead of Puyallup doctors, they should be sure to obtain a card from the Superintendent's Office to be filled out by the doctor. The doctor will

check and sign this card or Physical Examination Report. The report should be presented to the principal when the child is enrolled. A birth certificate or equivalent will be required to be presented for each kindergarten and first grade student.

There will be two sessions of kindergarten at Waller Road School. They will serve the Waller Road District which includes both sides of Canyon Road from East 80th to Pioneer, and west of this road to the city limits of Tacoma. All pupils living in the Waller Road School District not previously registered should register at the Waller Road School.

Students living west of and on both sides of Vickery will register for the morning session.

All pupils living east of Vickery Road, and including both sides of Canyon Road, will register for the afternoon session. The new west boundary line between Maplewood School District and Waller Road will be Canyon Road. All children in kindergarten through the sixth grades who attended Maplewood School last year, who live between Vickery and both sides of Canyon Road, should attend the Waller Road School on September 7. All kindergarten through sixth grade pupils not already registered last spring who live in the area defined should register at the Waller Road School.

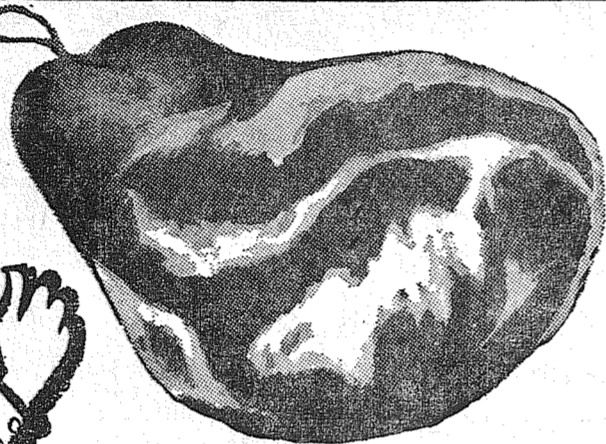

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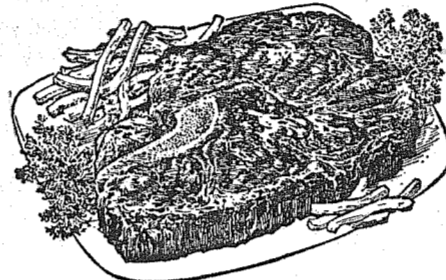

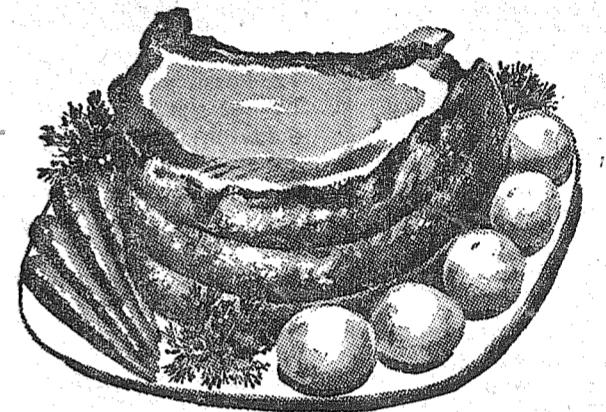

 Walter Cope, Democratic candidate for representative from the 28th District, has issued this statement in behalf of his candidacy: "It is time that some effort be put forth to bring sensible government to the citizens of this state. This thought seems to be farthest



away from the minds of many incumbents each time they journey to Olympia. To me the most important question is not "How much can we spend?" rather, "How much can we SAVE?" Or is it possible to save money in our present state government? Certainly, by plugging loopholes in our present so-called "giveaway" programs. Another form of savings could be achieved by minimizing politics in our state institutions program and making further progress in running them on a businesslike basis.

"I feel that additional effort should be put forth to attract new industries to our area and full benefit derived from our national resources, thus creating new sources of revenue to meet increased demands. I am opposed to the levying of additional taxes which would tend to drive industries from our state and thus increase the tax load on the individual. Common sense dictates that in order to experience economic growth it is necessary to stimulate, rather than stifle, present industry, and also create conditions which will attract new industries.

County Agent's Corner

FARM GIRL AMBASSADOR WRITES WITH INSIGHT
 For the past 12 years Washington 4-H members together with those from other states have been participating in a program called International Farm Youth Exchanges — (IFYE).

The program calls for farm boys and girls from this country to live in farm homes of other countries for several months as members of the family. A reciprocal portion of the program brings farm youth from other countries to live here. So far 30 Washington 4-H'ers have participated.

An obligation of IFYE's as they call themselves, is to write home telling of their experiences. One of the most illuminating of these letters has just been received from Bernadine Schmitt, Lincoln County, enroute to Scotland. Her writing ability and the insight she shows prompts us to run it here.

"Leaving the Seattle airport, I started my trip with a breathtaking view of the Puget Sound area. The beauty of a state that I had usually taken for granted became very evident. The weather there was beautiful the whole trip except for a few "up and downs" in Illinois. The most impressive sights from the air were the state of Washington, the Rockies, the Mississippi River, the Pittsburgh Steel Mills and Washington, D.C.

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But there was one thing that impressed me more. That was that I was in a jet sipping tea, speeding over the same ground a great Uncle of mine had traveled walking beside a covered wagon about seventy years ago. If someone had not walked those long, dusty miles I wouldn't be an I.F.Y.E. or least of all riding a jet across the same ground. This is something that the younger generations should never forget.

Washington D. C. was more beautiful and impressive than I had expected. The monuments are inspiring, the people extremely friendly, the living gracious, and nowhere in the U.S. do so many important things happen as often. The I.F.Y.E.'s spent most of their time hopping between the National 4-H Foundation, the Department of Agriculture, and the State Department. We heard talks by the people that you read about in the news but never expect to meet.

One of the most interesting times I had was on my way from the airport. I met a diplomat from Indonesia and he very kindly explained all the sights for me. He seemed tickled at the chance to tell an American something about America.

Once I became lost near the Capitol and I met a man who turned out to be the head of one of the heads of the missile program. He thought that the I.F.Y.E. was a good approach to world

relations and said that if we I.F.Y.E.'s worked hard at our jobs they might never need the missiles. Another interesting experience was meeting Senator Symington's son quite by accident. I had gone to get advice about where to go to get the different candidates, stands. One of the places I went afterwards was Symington's office. They liked the sound of the I.F.Y.E. program and gave me Mr. Symington's voting record. Jim Symington had spent two years in Great Britain and gave some very helpful advice. Jim said his father was trying to get a school started to train people for the kind of work that the I.F.Y.E.'s are doing.

After a hectic 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. week with little time for sight seeing, we left for New York and the beginning of our travels overseas."

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Marmalades Capture Citrus Fruit Goodness



Homemade marmalade on the shelf is a comforting sight. If a friend has just sent you a gift basket of oranges and tangerines from Florida, now is the time to try these recipes. Fine fruits are in the stores, too.

Trio Marmalade
(Six 8-oz. glasses)
One tangerine, 1 grapefruit, 2 oranges, 2 cups water, 1/4 teaspoon soda, sugar (about 6 cups).
Remove peel in quarters. Remove half the inner white part from grapefruit peel with paring knife; discard.
Cut peels into fine slivers; place in deep saucepan. Add water and soda. Bring to a boil; cover and simmer 20 minutes.

stirring mixture occasionally. Dice pulp, removing core and seeds. Add pulp and juice to undrained rind. Cover; simmer 10 minutes.
Measure; add 1 cup sugar for each cup mixture.
Bring to boiling point, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved. Cook mixture rapidly, stirring frequently, to prevent scorching, until thick and clear, about 30 minutes, or until syrup runs off side of spoon in two drops which "sheet" together.
Pour into hot sterilized jar or glasses; paraffin at once.

Tangerine Jam
(Approx. 10 medium glasses)
Ten to 12 tangerines, 1/4 cup

lime or lemon juice, 7 cups sugar, 1/2 bottle liquid fruit pectin.
Remove peel from tangerines; discard white fibers. Cut sections in three pieces; remove seeds. (There should be 4 cups prepared fruit.)
Turn fruit into large saucepan; add lime or lemon juice. Add sugar; mix well.
Place over high heat. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil one minute, stirring constantly.
Remove from heat; stir in liquid pectin immediately.
Skim and stir 5 minutes to cool and prevent floating fruit. Ladle into glasses; paraffin at once.

a-Wondering... and a-Wandering...

With JACK BROWN

It seems too bad that we don't have an iron curtain—or at least a curtain—that we can draw down during our party conventions to keep the rest of the world from seeing the antics our politicians go through to nominate candidates for the most important position on earth.

Underneath it all, there must be a certain amount of serious purpose. For if the candidates nominated reflected the atmosphere of the conventions, we would certainly end up with a low grade moron in the White House.

Every four years cartoonists, editorial writers, reporters and even radio commentators blast out at the circus atmosphere of our national conventions—and every four years the atmosphere becomes more and more objectionable. This year the Republican gathering was a little less raucous than usual, but probably only because of the lack of competition.

I cannot help wonder why the delegates to national conventions insist that inane revelry must continue. I hope to see the day when it will be replaced by serious deliberation—without bands, without parades, without catcalls and with reverence for the job at hand. Meanwhile, here's hoping our allies and our enemies will not judge us by the actions of our convention delegates.

It's getting so that every joker that finds himself before a camera and mike seems to think he's another Jerry Lewis.

Dr. V. Orval Watts, professor of Economics at Antioch College, a lecturer at Harvard, and the author of many books, recently came to Portland, Oregon, to speak at a School for Anti-Communists. In an interview he said: "Free enterprise, gold standard economics has become an almost underground movement in the college today. The writings have been suppressed, many of the men have been fired for teaching free enterprise economics so they have become a minority group."

"More and more the time of the American businessman is being taken to win an opportunity to keep his business going and to expand it in the face of growing restrictions by government and increasing tax burdens."

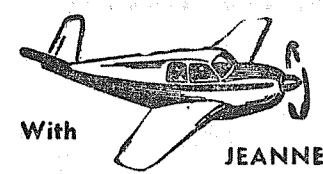
"If you are not an idealist, you don't teach free enterprise economy very long. There is considerable unpopularity involved."

However, said Dr. Watts, "All truth has to go through a period of suppression and persecution to burn out the dross—to get people thinking. I am hopeful there is a change in the trend of the thinking of the young people not very far ahead, a return to the revolutionary ideas of the founding fathers."

"Much of our present-day school and college teaching pays homage to alien ideas that glorify big government and promote socialism—that leave a student confused and with a feeling that there is something wrong or crooked with American business and the profit motive, and that only the 'common man' (whoever he is) and the politicians have the best interests of the people at heart."

More teachers like Dr. Watts are needed to help build respect for and belief in the superiority of private property rights, personal liberty and individual opportunity, instead of more advocates of political control of the individual and "cradle to the grave" security, which means lost freedom. You can't swap freedom for security without losing both.

It's the LAW

TITLE BY TRESPASS

Generally speaking, the law is intended to reward good conduct and to discourage or punish wrongful conduct.

There is one field of law, however, where a person can be rewarded, surprisingly enough, for what is generally considered wrongful conduct.

A person who commits a "trespass" on his neighbor's land, or wrongfully uses his land for a long enough period of time without being put off by his neighbor, may acquire title to the neighbor's land by what is called "adverse possession." This oddity in the law grows out of the fact that for years the law has favored the use of land, rather than its disuse.

For many years the law in English-speaking countries has reasoned that a man should know the extent of his land and know what is happening to it. The ancient law givers reasoned that it was better for a man who did not use his land to lose it to someone who was using it, than it was to keep the land lying idle. Consequently the law grew up that a man who had occupied a piece of land for twenty years would automatically become the true owner of that land.

In this state statutes were passed many years ago requiring a person to sue within a definite period to regain title to any piece of his land which was being used by another person who claimed the land.

This field of law is complex, with about a half dozen laws governing different kinds of claims. But the important thing to remember is that you can lose title to your land without ever selling it, or, on the other hand, you may have acquired title to someone else's land without paying a dime for it.

(This column is written to inform, not advise. Facts may change the application of the law.)

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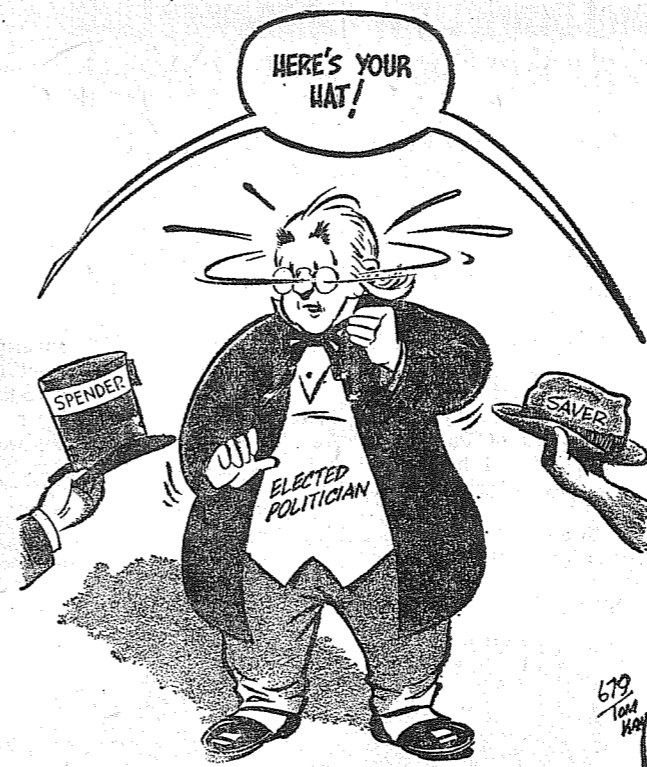

It's the LAW

John bought a house in 1950. He immediately recorded the deed to the property in the county auditor's office.

The next year the county treasurer sent the real estate tax statement to the former owner of the land, who threw it away. John didn't pay any taxes that year. The same thing happened each year for the next five years. John got no tax statements and paid no taxes.

In 1956 the county sold John's property at a tax foreclosure sale. One day a man came to the door, introduced himself as Walter, and told John he would have to move out of the house as Walter owned it. John was furious. He insisted, "You can't do this to me!"

Do you think John is right? Does he own the house or does Walter?

The answer is that John had better start looking for another place to live. A land owner is presumed to know that if he does not pay the taxes on his land, he will lose the land for unpaid taxes.

In this situation John knew he wasn't paying the taxes on the land but he reasoned, incorrectly, that it wasn't his fault that the county treasurer didn't bill him for the taxes. John had the duty of seeing to it that the taxes were paid, and he cannot get his land back by blaming the county treasurer.

A person who knows he has not received a tax statement for property he owns has a duty to investigate and find out why he is not being billed for the taxes. Because John failed to see to it that the taxes were paid on his land, he lost the land for unpaid taxes. (This column is written to inform, not advise. Facts may change the application of the law.)

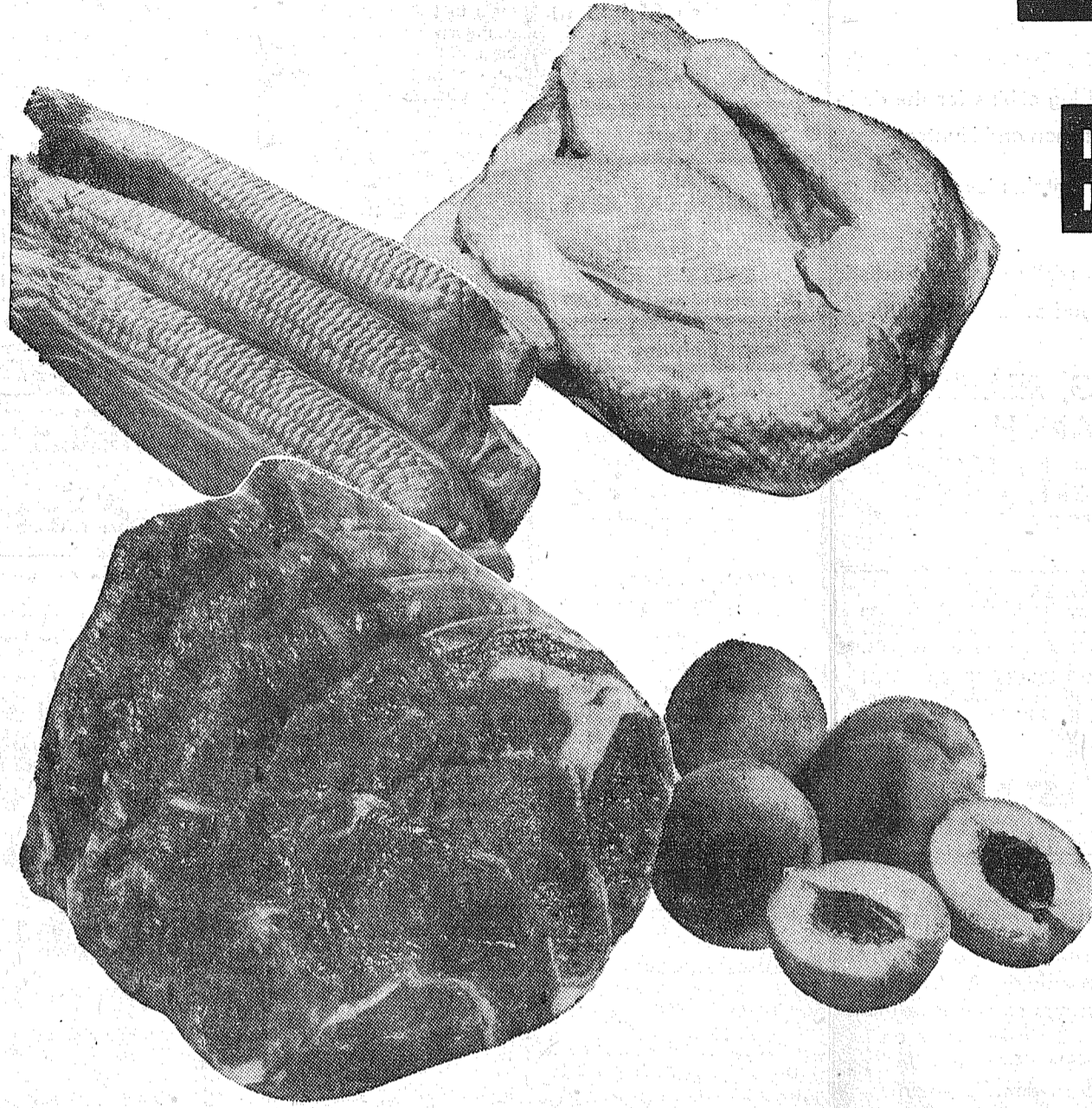

\$12,000 in medical and hospital bills.

Deadbeat took the \$12,000 and left the state without paying Dr. X or Local Hospital. Upon learning that Deadbeat had left the state Dr. X and Local Hospital demanded that Moneybags pay Deadbeat's doctor and hospital bills. Moneybags refused on the ground that he had already paid Deadbeat for his doctor and hospital bills.

Do you think Dr. X and the hospital can make Moneybags pay the doctor and hospital bills Deadbeat didn't pay?

Under Washington Statutes Moneybags can be required to pay Dr. X and Local Hospital. Moneybags should have made sure that the liens filed in the County Court House were satisfied or provided for before he settled with Deadbeat.

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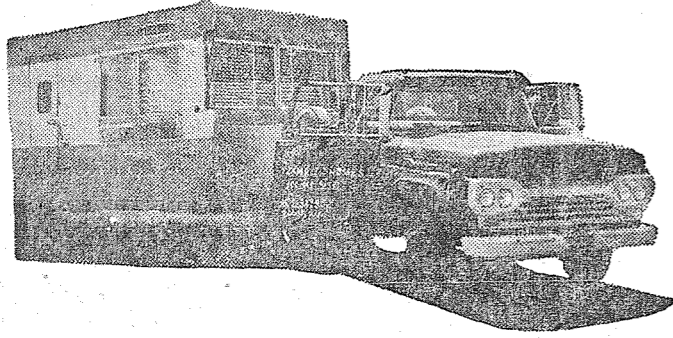
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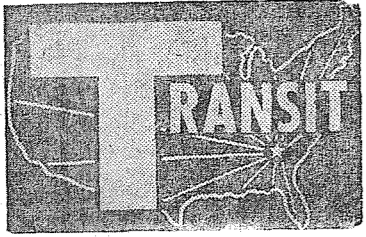
