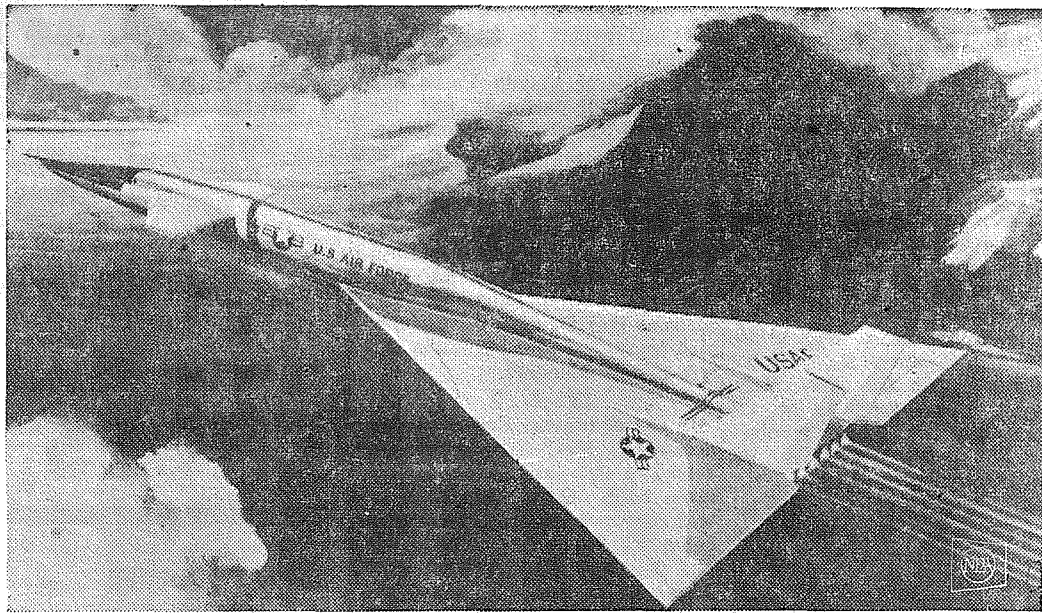

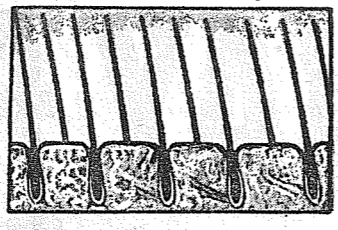

It is said that a picture tells more than a thousand words — and the pictures presented herewith surely prove just that. The top shot shows the store at the time Mr. Nelson and his former partner, Leon Harrison, took over. The Bargain Basket occupied only part of the building shown, the "togetherness" including also a beauty shop, a barber shop, a shoe repair and a refrigeration repair shop under one roof. When the building was remodeled to provide more space, middle photo, the shoe repair shop still stayed. The lower picture shows the new, modernized Bargain Basket, subject of the weekend festivities. "Must be seen to be appreciated" — please come and see!

While the Bargain Basket has been an important feature in food merchandising in the area for many years, the start of its modern phase was in 1946 when the present owner, Ethan Nelson, and his partner, Leon Harrison, bought the business. Mr. Harrison left the enterprise about four years ago to go into another business, leaving Mr. Nelson in sole charge. The original store, which had only 1600 square feet of space including a small apartment for the previous owner, was soon much too small, so the building was enlarged — and again expanded. The meat department has been remodeled and enlarged and Dick Gilbertson, long-time manager of this part of the store, is mighty happy to have everything just as he has planned it. The Bargain Basket operation seems built on team work and co-operation. That viewpoint starts right at the top — with the Nelson family. Mrs. Nelson (Anita) is the boss's right hand man, serving as bookkeeper and office manager. Three sons of the couple are already right in there pitching — Larry, Bert and Paul — with a younger boy eagerly waiting his turn. Wes Drake, store manager, is practically a member of the family, having started to work at the Bargain Basket while in high school. June Marek and Helen Newbury joined the staff at about the same time. Now employed at the store, in addition to the Nelsons, are Wes Drake, Dick Gilbertson, Wanda Ralls, Dorothy Campadore, Leland Wicklein (produce department), Floyd Coons, Marv Kasemeier, Lee Drake (no kin to Wes) and Earl McCoy. Other skilled workers are available as needed. In addition to the many changes inside the store, the exterior of the building has had some attractive face lifting work and the new parking lot off a side street augments the available space to take care of about a hundred cars.

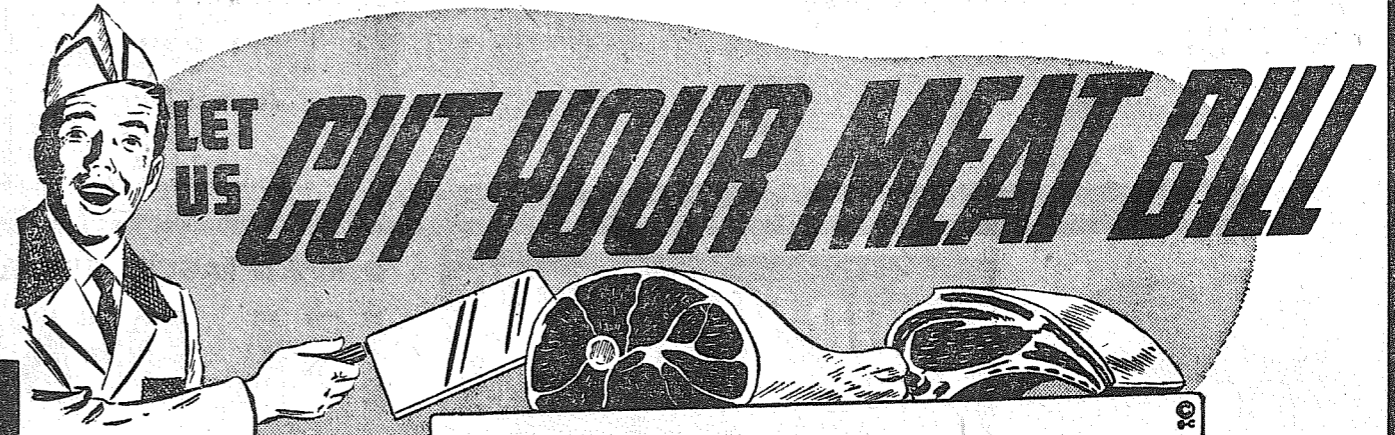

### It's the LAW

**REAL ESTATE SALES TAX**  
Mr. Buyer purchased a home from Mr. Seller on a real estate contract for \$15,000.

As required by law, Mr. Seller paid the one percent real estate sales tax on the transaction, or \$150, even though he had not collected any money from Buyer, who had traded Seller a car, for which Seller gave Buyer \$1,000 credit as down payment on the purchase of the house.

Within a month Mr. Buyer decided that he had bought a house he didn't like, and Seller decided he had received a car which was a "lemon". Since both men were dissatisfied, they agreed to call off the sale, or "rescind" it, in legal terms. The sale of the house

was rescinded and Seller returned the car to Buyer.

Seller then applied to the County Treasurer for a refund of the \$150 paid as the one percent sales tax on the sale of the house. The treasurer refused to pay the \$150 back to Seller.

Angry, Mr. Seller sued the County Treasurer, claiming that since no sale was completed, no tax was due. Do you think Mr. Seller can get his \$150 back?

The answer is that he can not. By the terms of the law imposing the one percent real estate tax, a "sale" occurred when Mr. Seller contracted to sell his house to Mr. Buyer for \$15,000.

The tax was due when the contract of sale was signed. The fact that the parties changed their minds and later rescinded the sale does not entitle Mr. Seller to a refund of the tax he paid. Though the law could provide for refunds in such situations, the law as written does not do so. Therefore Mr. Seller did not get his \$150 back even though the sale was called off.

The head of a taxpayer research organization warns that all the government spending plans and programs that have been hatched in Washington will have to be financed from just one source—and that's the already tightly squeezed taxpayer.

The wonder is that such a warning is needed. But it is—for, apparently, great numbers of people still labor under the delusion that government money comes magically out of the blue, not out of our pockets.

Well, in the short span, of three decades government's tax take has jumped from a proportion of about one dollar out of ten to about one dollar out of three of the national income. If the big spenders have their way, the proportion will soon become one in two, or still more. And you and I along with the other 180 million or so people in this country, will do the paying. No one else can.

Tired of living in the Northwest? You wouldn't be if you had wandered around with me this past weekend. I was down in a country where water hot enough to shave with comes out of the cold water taps and we couldn't let our kids out of the plane barefooted for fear they would blister their feet.

After a trip like that this old NW looks pretty good. Bring on the rain, cool nights where a man can sleep and best of all that cool clear water we all take so much for granted.

That great day, the Fourth of July, has passed again. Parades, speeches, and fire works (Yes, even in the counties where they are banned), marked one more anniversary for the American experiment in self-government. Among other things, there were various exhibitions of military readiness. In San Francisco Bay, naval and coast guard vessels of every kind and size were on hand to add to the atmosphere and to remind people that they have a vast stake in the world beyond the continental shores of the United States. The historic term "Freedom of the Seas" has greater meaning today than ever before. In the words of a little booklet defining the mission of the navy, "Freedom of the seas in peace and sea supremacy in war are basic to the existence of the United States as a world power. Even in the air age I'll have to agree with that one for a while yet."

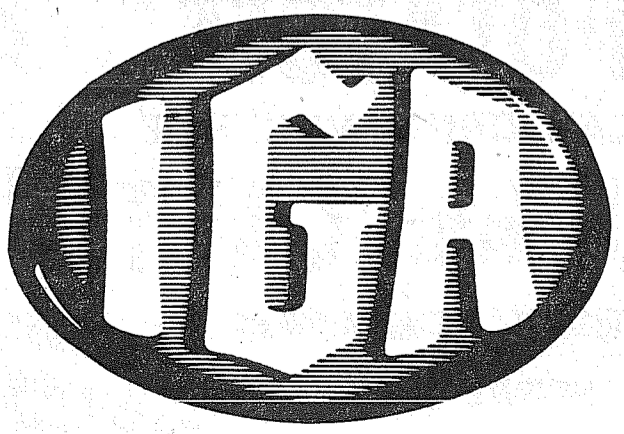

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# County Agent's Corner

By Florence Allen

Many people have been calling the county agent's office this week to find out how to freeze strawberries or make frozen jam. A bulletin that is free for the asking from the county agent's office is "From Farm to Freezer". All you have to do to get this bulletin is to drop a card to county agent's office, room 742 County-City Building.

A new bulletin that many of you will enjoy using is "Frozen Jams, Jellies, Spreads and Pie Fillings." Nowadays jam and jelly making can be cool work. The new frozen jams and jellies need little or no cooking. Best of all, they have more fresh fruit flavor, color, and aroma than cooked jams and jellies. More vitamins, too.

New style jams, jellies, and pie fillings are easy to make and to store. They can be made from fresh fruit in the summer or from frozen fruit in the winter.

The new bulletin gives recipes for frozen sour cherry jelly, red raspberry, blackberry, bosenberry, black raspberry or loganberry jelly, grape jelly, orange jelly—jams from strawberries or other berries, grape, tart, plum, apricot, cherry and peach. Spread recipes include: berry, apricot, apple, blueberry, concord grape, purple plum and orange juice.

Pie fillings include: pureed blackberry filling, whole blackberry filling, blueberry and chopped cranberry filling, blueberry and whole cranberry filling.

This bulletin can also be ordered by sending a postcard to the County Agent's office.

Systematic production testing of dairy herds is a good business proposition. It helps a dairyman pinpoint his assets and liabilities.

Several alternate production-testing plans are in operation. A producer can select the one that fits his particular situation and his personal preference.

Of the three plans offered under the auspices of the Dairy Herd Improvement Association (DHIA) the most comprehensive and popular is the Standard Plan.

Standard Plan testing is conducted according to uniform national DHIA rules and procedures.

The tester, who is a trained employee of the county DHIA and whose work is supervised by the County DHIA Board and the WSU Agricultural Extension Service, visits the farm once each month. He weighs the milk from each cow and takes a sample, which is analyzed in the laboratory for butterfat content and, in some cases, for solids-not-fat and protein.

Records from Standard Plan testing not only provide the owner with authentic nationally recognized information regarding his herd, but are also sent to Pullman where they are analyzed and provide useful information for dairy science research.

Standard Plan records are used in determining the performance of sires, an increasingly important matter with the rapid growth of artificial breeding.

If the dairyman is interested in building a reputation for his herd, selling breeding stock, proving the sires in his herd or helping prove sires used through artificial breeding, Standard Plan is his obvious choice.

A dairyman who is interested only in obtaining figures for his own information might well consider the Owner-Sampler Plan. Under this arrangement, he weighs his own milk and takes samples, just as the tester does under the Standard Plan.

Samples are analyzed under DHIA supervision and records are provided for the owner, but such records are not officially recognized for sire proving, sales or advertising purposes. Costs, of course, are lower than under the Standard Plan.

A variation of the Owner-Sampler Plan is the Tester-Sampler Plan, under which the tester takes

the samples, but no national DHIA regulations apply and records, though valuable to the dairyman, are not recognized by the dairy industry.

Another DHIA alternative is the Weigh-a-Day-a-Month plan. Under this plan, the dairyman weighs the milk from each of his cows once a month and records the weights on barn sheets which are

sent in through DHIA for calculation. No samples are taken, so records are limited to milk weight only.

This plan is designed to provide inexpensive records for small herds, but has never become popular in the state of Washington.

Dairyman who do not choose to test their herds under any of the DHIA alternatives can, of

course, keep their own records without supervision or join an independent testing association which formulates its own rules. Records from these sources, while valuable to the dairyman in planning his feeding and breeding program, are not recognized for sire proving, sales or advertising purposes.

In our county we have presently 38 herds on the Standard Plan and 19 herds on the Owner Sampler Plan.

make heifers grow more rapidly. This was because of the extra cost of grain, as well as poorer milk yields when the heifer freshens.

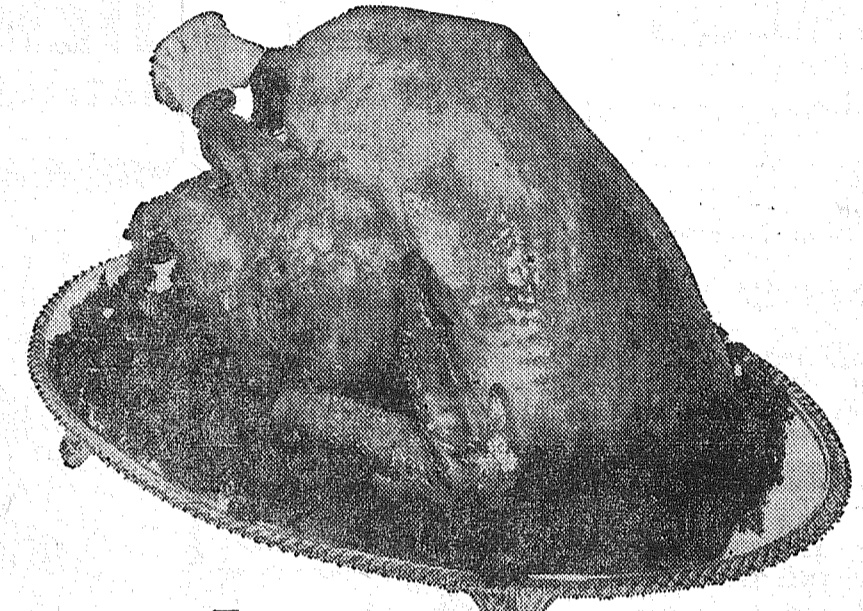

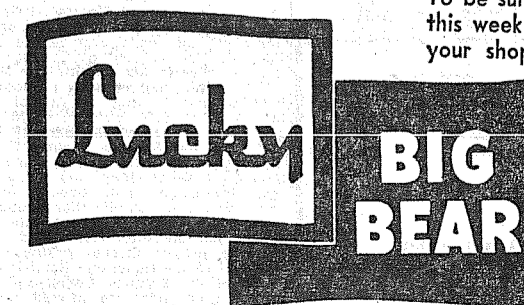

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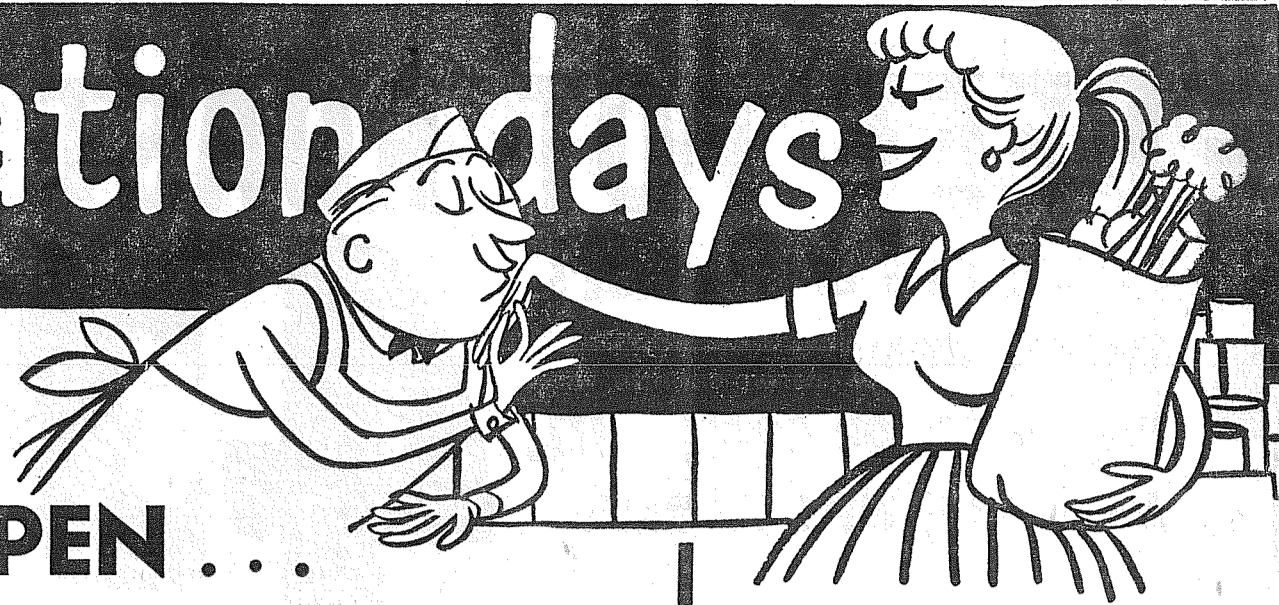
