

New Spanaway Park Access Area Open in time for Fishing Season

Convenient Facilities Ready for Public Use

In compliance with the demand of local fishermen and sportsmen, a new public access area has been completed at Spanaway Park and is ready for fishing season, which starts next Sunday, April 23rd.

The black-topped paving extends from the parking area into the water, making it easy and convenient for boat-owners to launch their craft.

The project was spearheaded by the Pierce County Park Commission board of authority in connection with the Sportsmen's Club. Designed by E. L. Mills and Associates, the work was done by Cascade Paving, Maintenance foreman supervising the construction was Einas Holmberg.

A fee of 50c will be charged for use of the ramp. All proceeds received will go toward park improvement.

A welcome relief to all users of the ramp is its convenient location next to the bathroom. The former location was inadequate in size and practically inaccessible. The new ramp measures 40 feet wide at the bottom, flaring out wide enough at top to conceivably launch two boats at the same time.

Choir Will Sponsor Smorgasbord

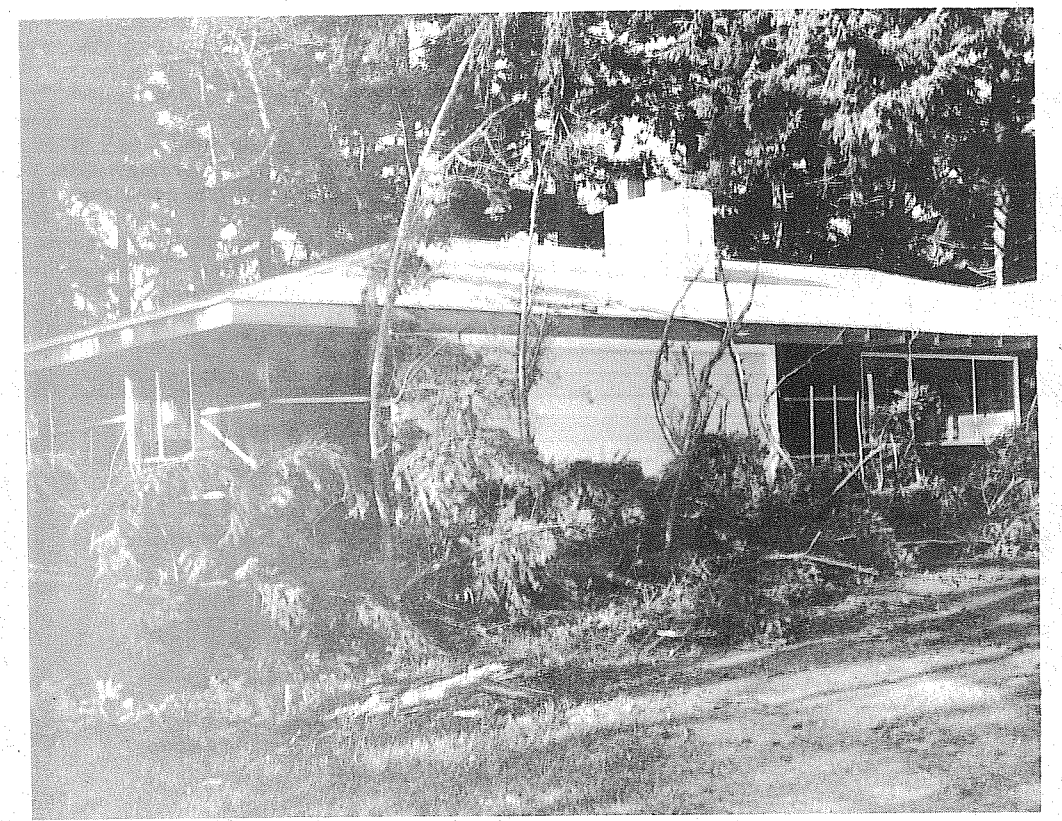

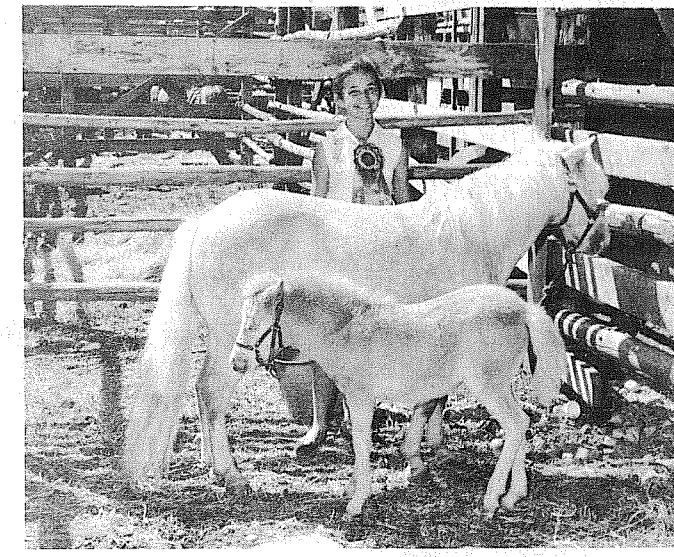

O.K., so now everyone is looking at my cotton-pickin' ears. At any rate I got a load off my chest.

Representative Van Zandt of Pennsylvania recently described piggybacking—the technique whereby truck trailers, automobiles, and containers are carried on railroad flat cars—as “one of the most promising transportation developments of our time.” However, as most of you have read in the dailies, it is under attack by the Teamsters Union, on the grounds that it is taking business away from the trucks, and action to restrain it is demanded.

This, as Mr. Van Zandt went on to show, would be to put a road block in the way of progress with a vengeance. He traced, for instance, the history of the movement of new automobiles. Once almost all of them were transported by rail. The improved highways and the development of new trucks changed the picture completely. The automobile manufacturers turned almost entirely to truckers for this service.

Now the pendulum has swung the other way. The reason is that dramatic technological progress in railroad equipment and operating procedures have made piggybacking movements of cars more economical and convenient than highway movements—to the direct benefit of everyone who makes, sells, and buys automobiles.

Thus, piggybacking is a competitive device which has succeeded—precisely as in past times the truckers came up with their competitive devices which succeeded. It is an example of how one carrier, in this case the railroads, can use its own inherent advantages to attract business. One day, perhaps, the trucks or some other agency of transport will strike on another and still better technique. If so, they will be entitled to the business.

Mr. Van Zandt also dealt with a number of assertions made by the Teamsters Union in opposition to piggybacking. These dealt with rates and profits, the military value of rail transport, and so on. In every case, he found them baseless. And he made a point which should interest every motorist and taxpayer—that piggybacking results in a reduction in highway wear and tear, and in increased safety and convenience for the driving public.

Regardless of how strong these points are or are not, this is still America where every firm and/or individual should have an equal opportunity to maneuver in our competitive markets for business earned on the basis of initiative.

Just to keep the record straight, I do not own any railroad stock. In fact, the last delegation in here to punch me in the nose for something I wrote that they did not like was from some railroad organization, so don't accuse me of being biased. I just hate to see our competitive system strangled by court orders, laws and red tape.

One thing I can't understand is why all the guys I know with a good crop of hair that could look like I wished I did pay good dough to have some barber crop them down to look like me. Maybe there's something to this Yule Brenner bit.

Well, maybe someone does read this column after all. L. W. Moore, president of the American Oil Company writes: “Whatever the shortage outlook—and it seems to change from day to day and from expert to expert—we believe this country is going to continue to grow at a healthy rate. We are not only putting our faith in the future, but our money as well.”

The sooner other businesses, both large and small, take this attitude, the better and stronger our nation will become. Here's a tip of the old dog-eared fedora to Mr. Moore and his associates.

Speaking of fedoras and bald heads, I wonder how come most guys like me run around showing the world that we have grown thru the top of our hair while the guys with the curly locks run around under a Stetson?

Extended Service Will Link Tacoma, Graham Residents

Pacific Telephone Northwest manager, J. R. Olson, announced today that extended area service (EAS) for Tacoma and DuPont with Graham, Puyallup and Sumner will go into effect Tuesday, April 25.

Under the new service arrangement, Tacoma and DuPont customers will be able to dial directly to phones in Graham, Puyallup and Sumner without long distance charges. Customers in those communities also will be able to dial Tacoma and DuPont phones without long distance charges.

Olson said the plan had been approved last fall by the Washington Public Service Commission after a postcard survey conducted by the telephone company indicated a majority of customers in Graham, Puyallup and Sumner were in favor of the plan. Customers in Tacoma and DuPont were not included in the survey since their regular monthly phone rates will not be increased even though they will receive the benefits of the plan.

EAS will increase the number of telephone most customers can call without long distance charges by a substantial number. Most Graham customers, for example, will be able to dial some 116,000 more phones; Puyallup, 112,000; and Sumner, 127,000.

Customers in those cities with optional extended service now, also will have their calling range increased: Graham, 100,000; Puyallup, 94,000; and Sumner, 103,000.

Tacoma - DuPont customers will be able to call some 10,000 phones in Graham, Puyallup and Sumner without long distance charges.

Olson said that the alphabetical, or white, pages of the Tacoma directory will be delivered to all Puyallup and Sumner customers about June 1. Graham customers already are included in a special section of the Tacoma directory.

"Putting EAS into operation in the Tacoma area has been a job requiring more than a year of effort to find out the wishes of our customers, and to engineer and install equipment to provide the service," Olson said.

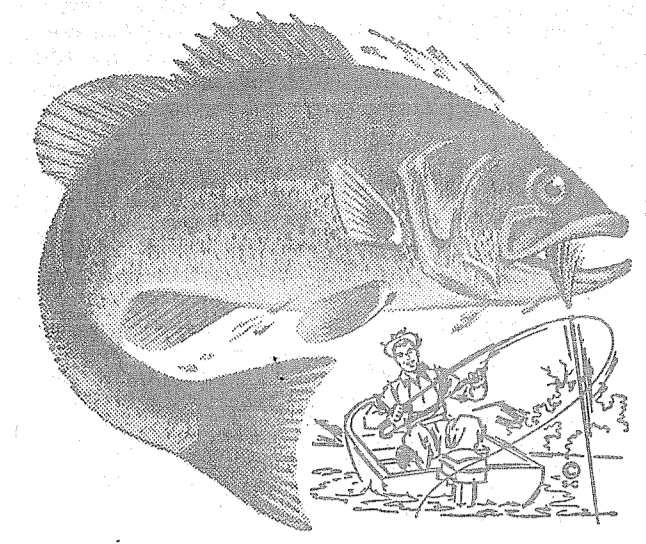
