Fjeran, Business Manager, to invest General Fund, Building Fund and Bond Redemption Fund Monies through the Pierce County Treasurer in the best interests of the district.

The Board of Directors request the public to attend all board meetings so they may become better informed on the workings of their school district.

We crossed the Continental Divide at 9:45 a.m. Wednesday, July 29. This is quite an accomplishment as far as we are concerned. We have a long way to go yet but we feel we will make it, come what may.

This has been one of the longest stretches of nothing since we left. We are holding over a day here and getting new shoes on Armito. If every thing goes according to plan, we will be in Casper in about a week."

Can Johnny Danko Go Marching Home Again

Parkland area residents are being asked to take part in helping young 16 year old Johnny Danko of Cle Elum fight to rebuild his broken body.

It all started on a cold winter day last February when the car in which Johnny was riding as a passenger skidded on icy pavement near Easton and slid into a ditch. John and the driver, who was an adult, climbed out of the car to try and push the car back onto the road.

Suddenly another approaching vehicle went out of control on the same stretch of pavement skidded into the ditched car and struck John and his friend. John was thrown into the bush and wasn't found until after his friend had already left by ambulance for the hospital.

In addition to multiple fractures of the arms and legs, ankles and pelvis, Johnny's future depended on the extent of damage to the motor and memory nerves at the base of his brain.

Upon recommendation of a Seattle neurologist, Johnny was transferred from Virginia Mason Hospital to Good Samaritan Hospital where the turning point towards a brighter future for the lad is in the process of taking place.

County Junior Fair Opens Next Week In Summer Aug. 13

It's the fair with flavor. Good, old fashion county fair flavor. No matter how old, or how young, you'll enjoy the Pierce County Junior Fair in Sumner, August 13, 14, and 15. There's something for the whole family to enjoy.

Why is it called the Junior Fair? Because the exhibitors displaying the some 2000 exhibits are the 4-H and Future Farmers of America members of the county, ages 10 to 21, showing the products and skills they have worked on throughout the year. They will be vying for awards and trophies and trips to the Western Washington Fair, the State Fair in Yakima, and even the national 4-H Congress.

Sound like it's "just for kids"? Not on your life. There are also open classes for adults to enter, trade-fair and concession booths, rides for the tiny tots, displays by the armed services, band concerts, square dancing, track meet, an evening grandstand show all three nights, and much much more.

Those of you who live in the city and have children will especially like the Pierce County Junior Fair. Youngsters can see cows, horses, ponies, sheep, pigs, chickens, and ducks, and touch each one. They can see them preened and at their best in the show rings, or asleep in their barns. They'll smell the good aroma of fresh, clean hay, and hear the moos, neighs, baas, oinks and cackles first-hand.

Sponsored by the Sumner Demoloy boys, dancing will be from 8:30 until 11 p.m. and everyone is invited to attend. There will be a small admission charge.

You'll have to come to see it all. There will be high-powered model airplane flying, an experimental lab. from Washington State University, two colorful shows, the AAU Junior Olympic Track and Field meet finals, a photography salon, and other typical things you would expect to see at a county fair.

It's all at the Pierce County Junior Fair opening next Thursday, August 13, at its fairground in Sumner. Admission is free with the exception of the evening grandstand show.

Perpetual Trophy Offered To Parkland Businesses By TJ

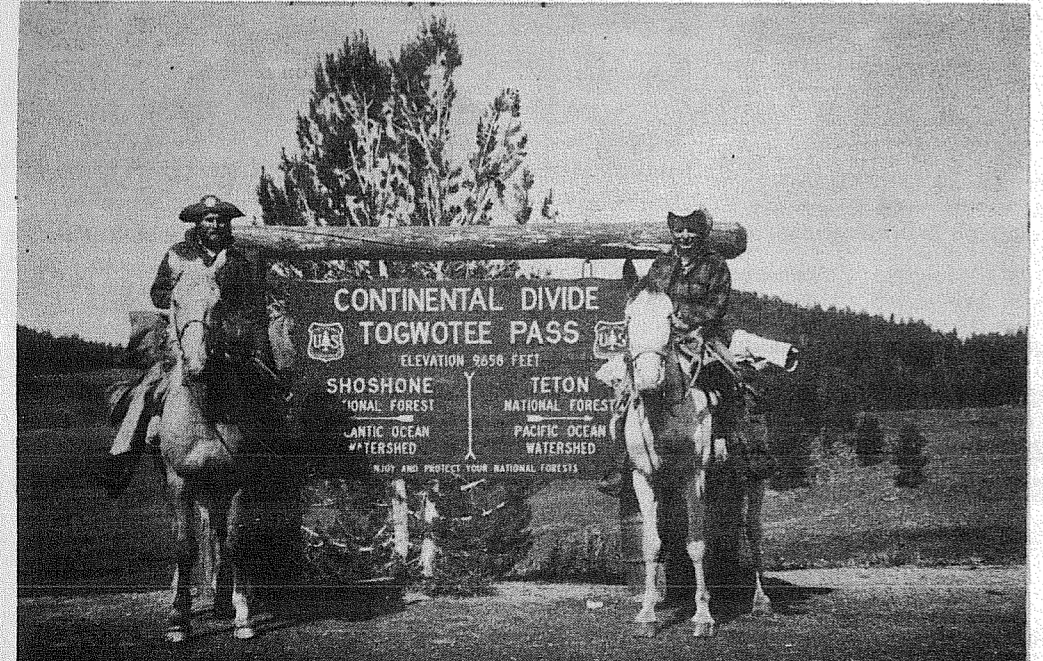

Spanaway Man To Participate At Assembly

Alan Ruud, Bible Study servant in the Spanaway congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses has been assigned a position in the management of the "Fruitage of the Spirit Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses" sponsored by the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society. The four-day state-wide assembly will be held in Tacoma, Washington August 13-16 at the University of Puget Sound Memorial Fieldhouse.

Ruud will assist in the Public Address department, one of the 20 departments needed to set up, operate and dismantle the convention. All assembly departments including the Public Address department in which Ruud will assist will be staffed by Jehovah's Witnesses who volunteer their time and service without payment.

Concerning his assignment Ruud was quoted as saying: "In these days when so many nations are against God and atheism is on the advance it is a privilege to participate in an assembly for the purpose of building up faith and giving a witness to God's Kingdom."

The assembly in Tacoma is one of 37 such assemblies being held in the United States this summer and is expected to draw 7,000 delegates.

Highlight of the assembly program will be the discourse on Sunday afternoon by L.M. Dugan of the Watchtower New York world headquarters on the topic, "Peace Among Men of Good Will" or Armageddon—Which?"

Traffic Laws On Your Side

"Traffic laws are on your side. You should know and obey them."

So states the Washington State Safety Council, coordinating agency for numerous safety programs dedicated to ward protecting life and property.

"If every driver, and every pedestrian, would realize that traffic laws are for his protection, he wouldn't think of disregarding them," the Council explained.

When a motorist drives faster than the speed limit, makes wrong turns, goes through red lights or stop signs, or passes improperly, the risks are traffic fines, costly car repairs, towing costs, medical or funeral bills, lost wages, damage suits, and lawyers fees, to name a few.

"Unfortunately, some otherwise law-abiding citizens treat traffic laws casually and even ignore them when inconvenient to comply," the Safety Council observed. "Too many drivers discard their morality when they get behind the wheel of a car."

The attitude that "it's okay if I can get away with it" causes many accidents.

"Traffic laws are on your side, but they can't help you if you ignore them."

Poultrymen To Study Feed Freight Rates

Poultry and egg producers will learn about a coordinated effort to reduce feed grain freight rates to western states at an 8:00 p.m., Thursday, August 6th meeting in the Western Washington Experiment Station Winter School Building, Puyallup.

Mr. Joe Spiruta from the Washington State Department of Agriculture, and Mr. Wally Berge, Western Farmers Association, will describe the problem facing the poultry industry and efforts being made to help.

Washington state is at a distinct disadvantage due to high freight rates on feed grains shipped from the Midwest. Southeastern states recently received reduced freight rates.

Cecil Foster, President of the Pierce County Egg Producers Association, invites all poultrymen to attend and learn how they can help the industry.

School Costs On The Rise

Small School districts spend more dollars per pupil than larger school districts in Washington State, according to figures released by the independent Washington Research Council.

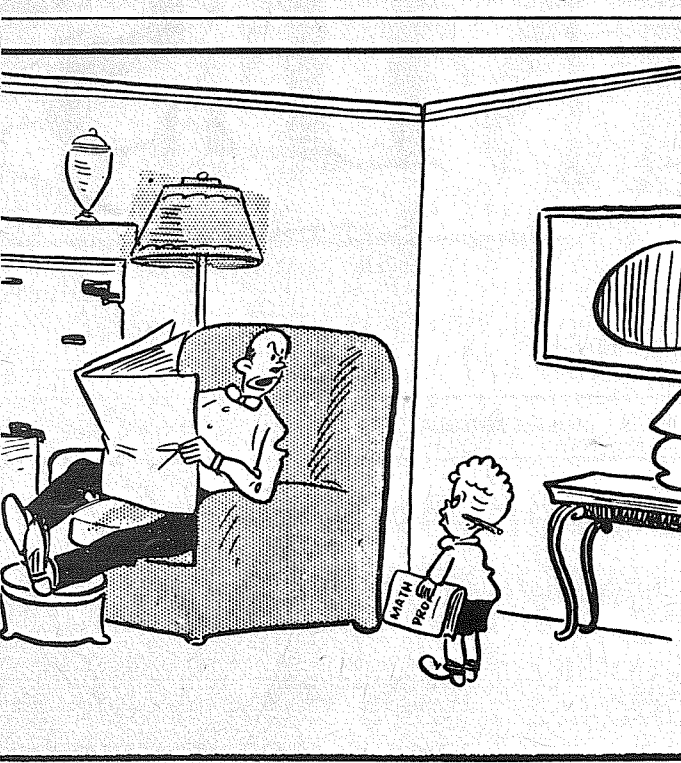
The Council's figures, based on a U.S. Bureau of the Census report, showed that the highest per pupil cost was \$687 in districts with less than 50 pupils and the lowest per pupil cost was in districts with 1,200 to 2,999 pupils.

State financial aid per pupil was highest at \$383 in the districts with less than 50 pupils, and lowest, at \$294, for districts of 3,000 or more pupils. The fact-finding Council said that school district reorganization is an emotional issue because it "tends to result in elimination of small districts because they usually provide less comprehensive curricula at higher costs per student."

The Research Council also cited a study from Stanford University in 1963 which covered 589 school districts in 10 states. The report's findings included the following conclusions which apply only to districts with 1,500 students or more:

- Unit costs (i.e. expenditure per pupil) were found to decline with increasing district size up to enrollments of at least 20,000 students, and in many states to a point well beyond this size.
- The optimum scale

Local Men Win \$320 In Awards

Major General C.E. Hutchin Jr., commander of Fort Lewis, Thursday gave a special program to acquaint the nearly 600 civilian supervisors on post with the history and role of the Army in the Northwest. It was the first time that a post commander here had called the supervisors together for such a program.

Gen Hutchin discussed the history of the military in this area from the time of the Lewis and Clark expedition to the present. He also briefed the audience on the status and mission of Fort Lewis units.

In addition, two Tacoma men were given certificates of commendation for money saving innovations they suggested. Andrew J. Thomas, 9815 E. Madison, of the post's engineer division, and Edward C. Hendricks, 9517 Golden Given, of the maintenance division, were given the awards.

Thomas received a \$120 check for suggesting that welding equipment be installed on utility trucks for use in the field. His suggestion will save an estimated \$2,320 a year, General Hutchin said.

Hendricks was given a check for \$200 for suggesting that special guards be installed on hydromatic transmission to protect them. It will save \$3,967.

Tips on GOOD LANDSCAPE GROOMING



By Howard & Elaine Motteler

Successful budding can usually be accomplished about this time of year on both evergreen and deciduous plants. However, this year the growth period is later than normal. Plants and trees are still in their main period of growth. A plant is about ready to bud when the shoots have stopped growing. Older trees are ready to bud earlier in the Summer than younger trees of the same variety.

Older trees tend to stop growing sooner and have a shorter, more critical period when they can be budded successfully. Budding on an established tree is most easily done on this year's shoot. Budding on older wood is more difficult because the bark is thinner and more brittle. The buds are placed (we often put two or three buds in each shoot) near the base of the shoot in a position where the limb which develops from the bud may become a permanent part of the trees.

Later the shoot above the bud and other shading limbs of the tree should be cut off so as to give the bud direct sun and room to develop. This does not have to be done

until the following winter. By then you will know whether or not the bud has made a union with the tree or plant.

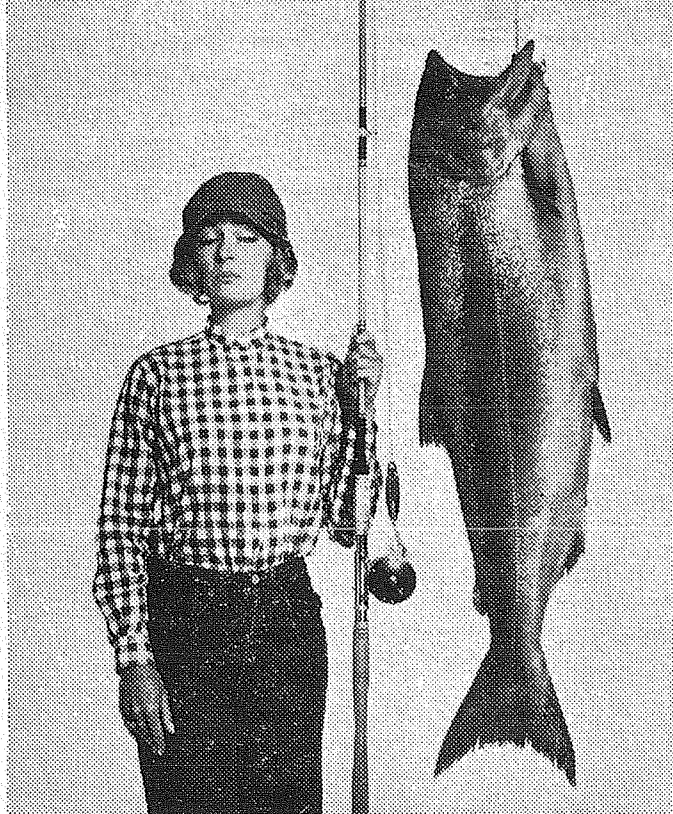
We obtain our buds for budding from the mid-section of this year's growth shoots. A single shoot will normally provide ten to twelve buds. A bud is found where each leaf comes out from the stem. Shoots can be kept for several days by sticking them in water until the gardener is ready to use them.

To hold the bud in place we use electrical friction tape. Also we use grafting wax (obtained from a feed and grain store) to keep the buds from drying out. We have found that it takes about three years before the limb which develops from a bud begins to bear fruit.

As was mentioned in the previous article on budding, more information may be obtained by calling the Pierce County Agricultural Extension Service, FU 3-3311, Ext. 511, and requesting the free pamphlet Home Propagation of Ornamental Trees and Shrubs, Home and Garden Bulletin No. 80.





America's high school students are being taught to drive cars but they are not being told how our economic system makes it possible for them, or their parents, to own automobiles.

The Brookings Institute is authority for the estimate that only five per cent of high school graduates have been exposed to as much as a one-semester course in economics.

Our neglect in this area would be understandable if we had an economic system of which we were ashamed and wished to hide it from our children. The very thought is preposterous, of course, since American free competitive enterprise is the greatest and most dynamic system in all history.

We should, therefore, be boasting about our economic system and insuring that our youths are fully aware of the principles that have made possible the highest living standards the world has ever known.

The present vacation period provides an ideal time for school boards and administrators whose programs lack economics courses to correct this deficiency by preparing for their introduction in the fall semester.

America should not be complacent about economic illiteracy.

When they are not engaged in business, the people of Singapore eat. There are cafes everywhere and for every pocket-book. Restaurants where chopsticks are regarded with intolerance and the specialty of the house is Coo au Vin and Tournedos Henri IV, crowded Chinese cafes and Malay eating houses where there's hardly a need for printed menu cards, clubs where the symbol of unity is Worcestershire sauce and where the frozen mutton comes from Australia, luxury residences hidden behind gardens where the bougainvilleas, hibiscus, and orchids lend the appropriate floral decoration to dinners served by softly gliding servants.

Singapore is a culinary maze. There's hardly anything you can't get there—even Hungarian goulash.

MALAY CHICKEN RICE TO SERVE SIX 1 - 4 to 5 lb. boiling fowl, 4 small red onions, 1 carrot, 1 fresh red chili, salt, freshly ground black pepper, 1 1/2 cups uncooked rice, 1 teaspoon saffron, 1/2 cup vegetable oil, 2 cloves garlic. Clean and dress the fowl and place it in a saucapan with two of the whole onions, one carrot, the chili cut into strips, and enough water to cover. Season with salt and pepper. Bring to a boil, then slowly simmer until meat is tender. When done, cut chicken into twelve small pieces. Cook rice separately in the chicken stock, and when tender add the saffron.

Meanwhile heat oil in a heavy iron skillet and fry the remaining two onions, which have been finely chopped, and the garlic. In the same pan, fry the cooked chicken pieces until crisp. Add these to the rice; stir well. Serve hot.

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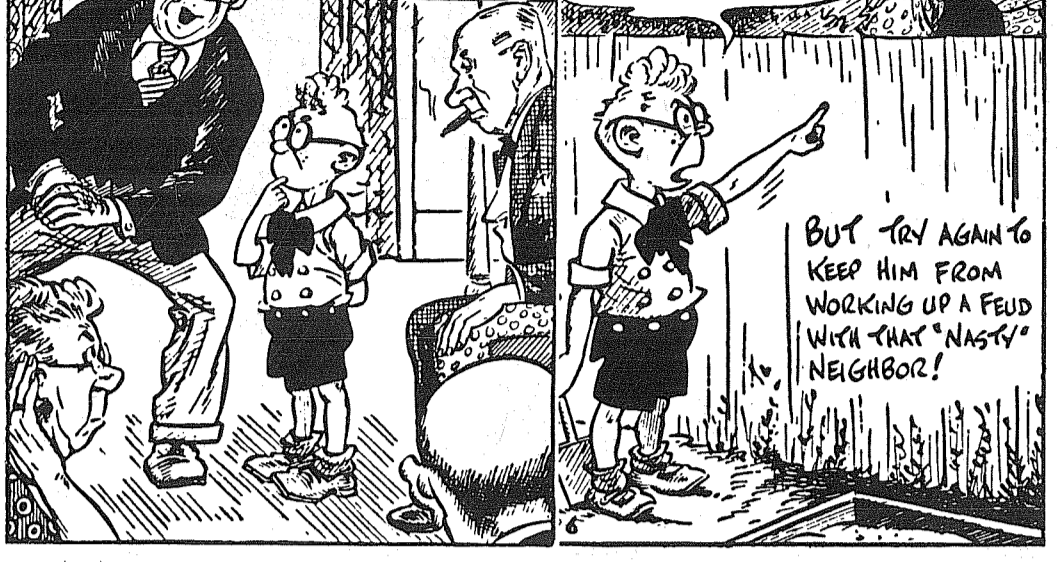
