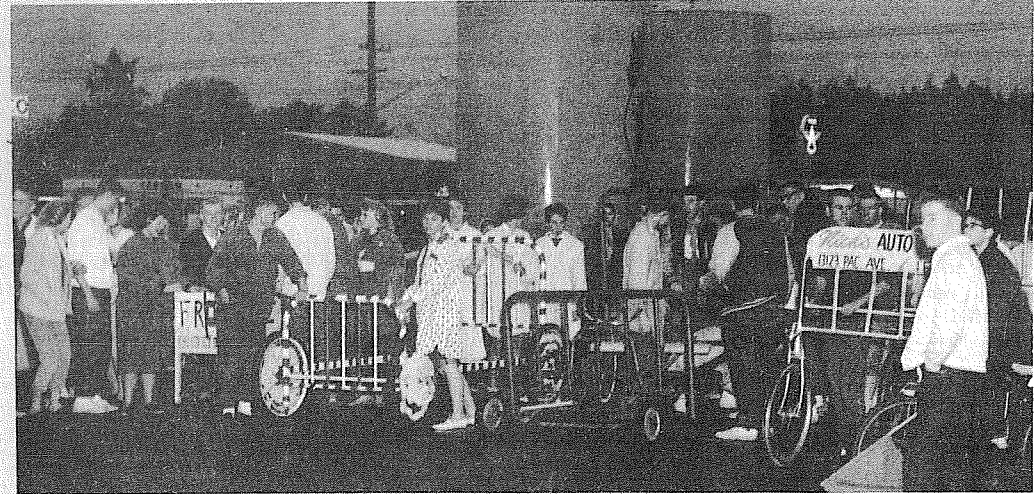

The Parkland Library recently held a poster contest in connection with National Library Week. Several schools in the area were sponsored by local firms.

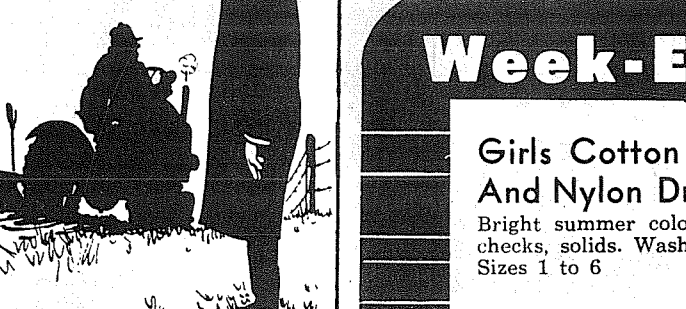

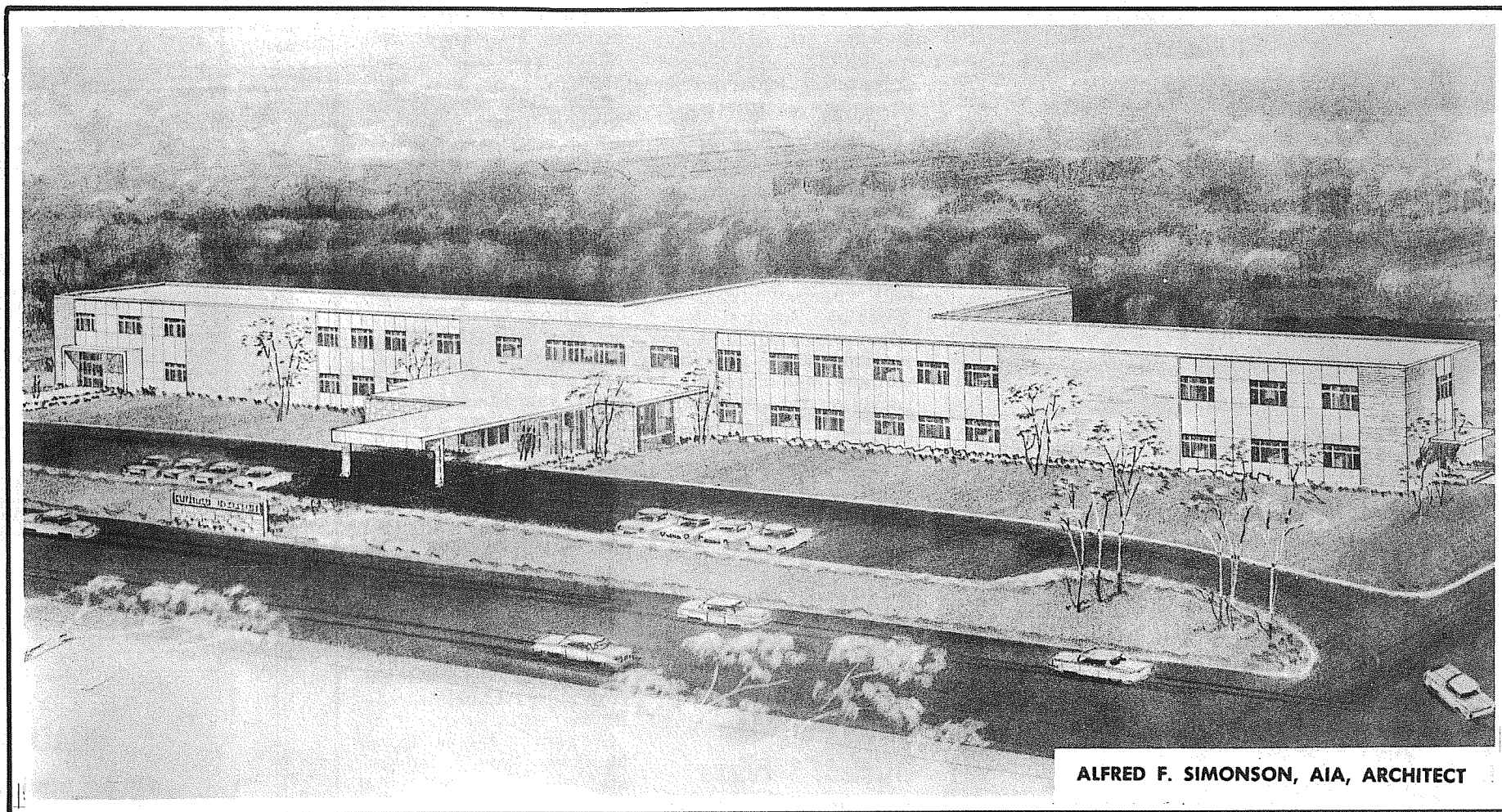

Complete Medical Care Available to Residents

Lakewood General Hospital, at 5702 Lake Steilacoom Ave. is, at long-last reality. After more than a year under construction, the 100-bed, two-story building will be the scene of open house ceremonies Friday through Sunday, April 28-30 and will open at 7 a. m., Tuesday, May 2. For the schedule of open house ceremonies, see box at the left.

The reinforced concrete structure, faced with brick and stucco, is virtually fire

resistant. It is one of the first hospitals built under the new state code.

Built at a cost of \$1,900,000, the two-story building is 404 feet long by 162 feet wide and has a medical staff of 120 doctors and 45 nurses.

The hospital will have a staff of some 110 employees at the beginning and could conceivably employ 225 persons under full operation. A monthly payroll of \$45,000 will give the Lakes area a big economic boost.

The most modern in medical equipment, business machines, furniture and fixtures will grace the building designed by Alfred Simonson of Seattle.

New concepts in the use of soft pastel colors are embodied in every room of the structure. Modern patient-nurse communications systems and remote control television right from the patient's bedside, are some of the features of the northwest's newest facility.

Some of the modern medical innovations include a dental clinic, the latest type of surgery lights, and operating tables and electric sterilizers. The hospital also has a library for its staff as well as air conditioning, a complete pharmacy, laboratory, emergency operating rooms, unique oxygen outlets in each room and portable x-ray equipment.

Elected as president of the board of the hospital's 120-member medical staff is Dr. Bernard Ootkin; Dr. Albert Ehrlich as vice president; Dr. John P. Liewer as secretary and Dr. Herbert H. Meier and Dr. George S. Kittredge as executive committeemen.

Administrator Describes Hospital's Many Functions

Simplified Admitting Procedure Established

The admitting procedure for Lakewood General Hospital has been outlined by Administrator Robert Huesers as follows:

1. All patients must be admitted to the hospital by order of their physician. Huesers noted exceptions such as emergency cases where immediate treatment would be necessary—such as an

accident.
2. The doctor or his office will arrange for the patient's admission.

3. The admitting office will ask a few questions of the patient and a brief form is to be filled out by the patient.

4. When the above steps are completed, the patient will be taken to his room.

Staff Seeks Continuing Improvement Through Research Health Education

Three objectives of any hospital, according to Robert Huesers, Lakewood General Hospital's administrator, are to provide education on both medicine and health science and to participate in research relating to health and medicine.

Coupled with these objectives, the hospital's standard is to become an accredited hospital by the Joint Commission of Hospital Accreditation. This is a group of medical people from the American Hospital Assn., American Medical Association and the American College of Surgeons that establish the criteria for hospital operation. It takes about a year to earn accreditation, Huesers said.

When asked how a brand new hospital would keep up with the rapid changes in the medical field, so as to keep the hospital as new as possible over

the years, Huesers replied "There are degrees of completeness in a hospital. Actually, it's never complete, but with proper planning you might have what we call growth change." He said hospitals must be endowed with a flexible attitude since both medicine and hospital care techniques change over a period of time.

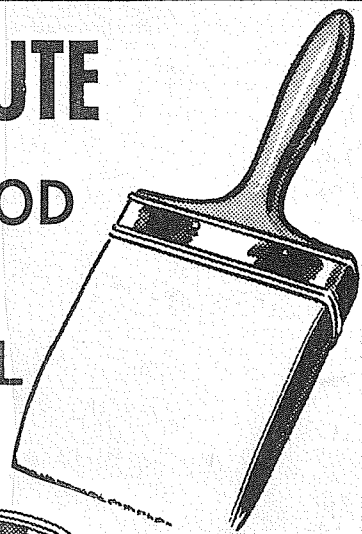
Huesers brings to Lakewood's hospital a colorful educational and working background. A native of Minot, North Dakota, he attended Minot State Teachers College; Medical Field Service School at Ft. Sam Houston, Texas where he was a graduate in medical laboratory technology. Then followed five years at the University of Washington with a BS degree in medical microbiology and two years at Northwestern University in Chicago with an MS degree in hospital administration. He was a member of Alpha Delta Mu, professional fraternity of hospital administrators.

He served in the Army Medical Corps; on the staff of the Children's Orthopedic Hospital; the staff of the St. Lukes Hospital in Chicago.

In July, 1958 he joined Doctors Hospital in Seattle as an administrative resident and later served as assistant administrator at the Burien General Hospital before

taking over at Lakewood last year. Huesers' wife, Elizabeth, is a registered nurse. They live at 5918 120th Street SW.

Automated Business Office Provides Efficient Services

A completely automated business office with the latest advances in hospital accounting is to be found at Lakewood General Hospital.

A new ten-card admitting pack simplifies the entire admitting billing and care of the patient according to Walter W. Wilhelm, office manager.

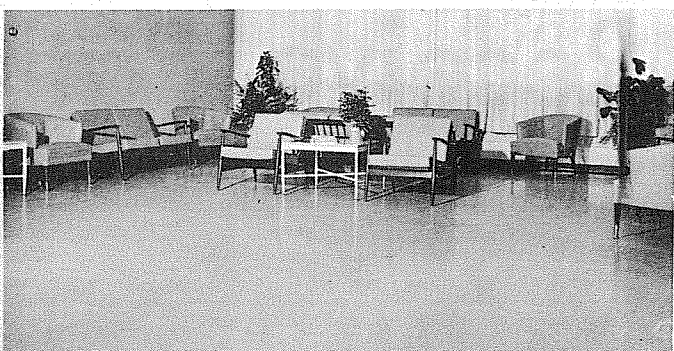
The new form is prepared in a single typing as the patient is admitted. The copies are sent to various parts of the hospital, and complete information is available to all concerned. If the patient, for example, should require a special diet, a notation on the card informs the dietician.

The pack is the basis for medical records and Administrator Robert Huesers says the business-admitting offices are one of the key positions in the hospital.

The hospital will employ a total staff of some 200 employees when fully operative, Wilhelm said. There will be monthly payrolls of about \$40,000 to start, he said. A new hospital accounting machine will simplify the keeping of payroll records, patient payments and other bookkeeping services.

The switchboard will operate some 77 phones. A specially designed lighted name panel will assist the operator to know which doctors are in the hospital at a given moment.

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Surgery, Obstetrics Wards Fully Equipped

Latest Techniques In Premature, Infant Care Available Here

Some of the finest medical equipment in the Lakewood General Hospital can be found in the east wing on the second floor. The wing is devoted to surgery and obstetrics.

Four glassed-in compartments in the nursery section of the obstetrics ward can handle some 30-35 infants for both newborns and premature.

The nursery is entirely isolated from the remainder of the obstetrics ward and has a separate entrance.

One of the newest pieces of equipment to aid in the survival of premature infants is the Isolette, an infant incubator manufactured by Air-Shields, Inc. The unit allows the nurses to work freely with the infant through revolving arm openings that can be closed when not in use.

True isolation of the infant is provided by a unique outside air filter that removes any contamination from the air before it enters the unit. Precise temperature and humidity control, provision for aerosol medication and automatic temperature safety controls are features of the unit. The baby can be weighed without being exposed to outside air and a built-in ruler measures the baby's growth.

Other equipment in the nursery include a coquette which provides steam treatment medication and an infant resuscitator, which is

used after difficult deliveries. Mrs. Lillian Post, supervisor of the delivery room and nursery said many babies just don't feel like breathing when they are born and the resuscitator provides the necessary action to start the breathing.

Mrs. Post was enthusiastic in describing the modern equipment. She was particularly happy over the new infant cribs. Each crib is

made of molded plastic and is attached to a stand that contains a pull out shelf to allow for bathing. There is a compartment where the baby's linen and clothing is stored. She said this feature would ensure that each baby has its own linen all the time it is in the hospital. The baby is never taken from its crib, with these new units, she added.

Surgery Ward Able To Handle All Types Of Emergencies

The surgery ward, located on the east wing of the second floor, is fully equipped to handle all types of surgery. Beneath a Castle shadowless operating light that focuses the light to the surgeon's field, the latest type of surgery table, a Champagne table that is fully adjustable. There are three surgery rooms plus an emergency operating room.

A sterilizing unit, specially designed for instruments, completely sterilizes in just three minutes.

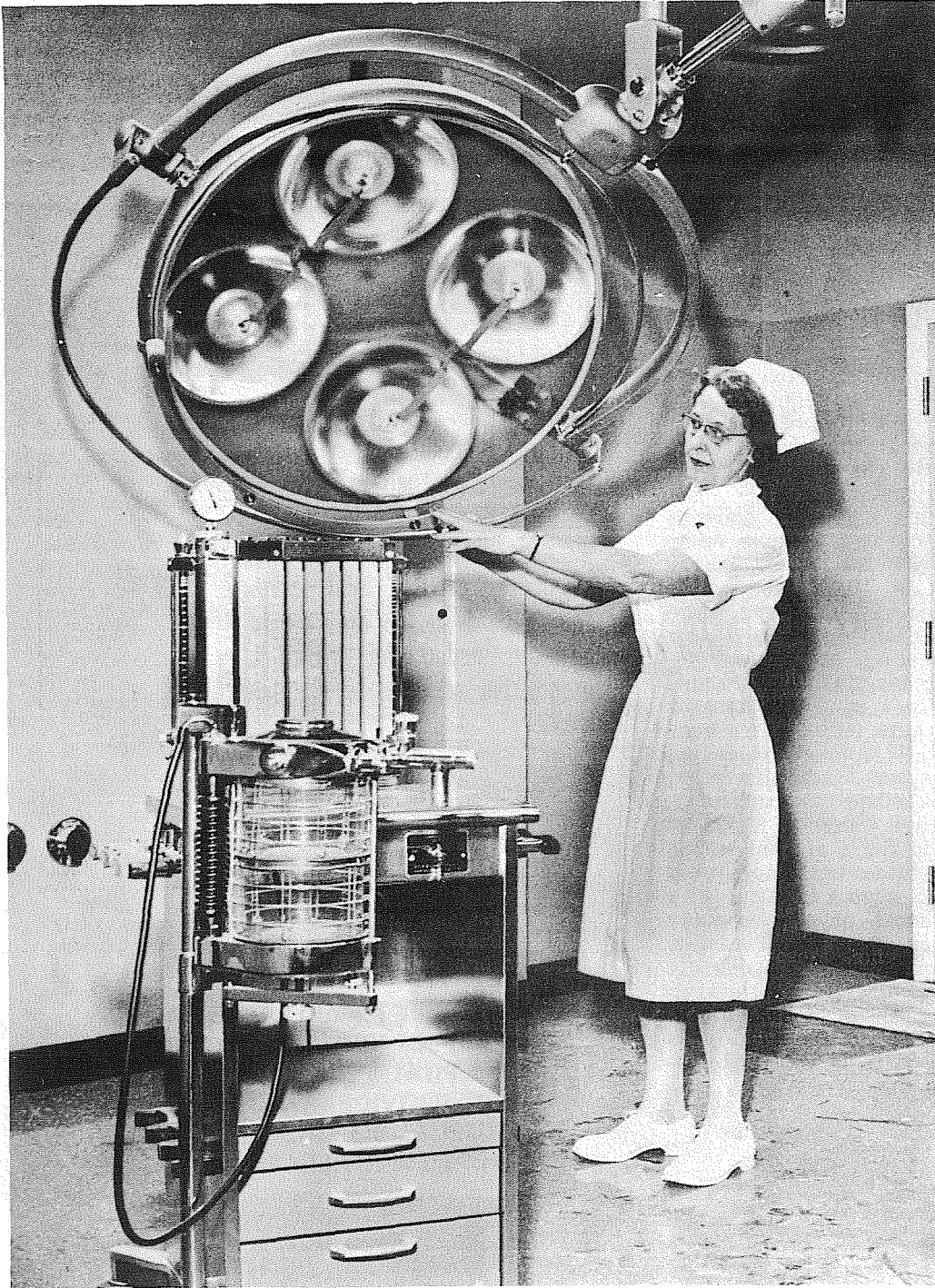
There are four bigger electrical sterilizing units known as autoclaves. They bring in air through ceramic filters and force steam out

so that when the doors are opened, the sterilized linens and garments are completely dry and ready to use. The autoclaves operate automatically and record progress on graphs. The graphs also serve as trouble indicators, by recording any defects in the operation.

Mrs. Esther Leech, supervisor of surgeries, said the units avoid damaging goods through over-sterilization by automatic time regulation.

Located in one of the sterilizing rooms is a water distillator that can provide five gallons of distilled water per hour and has a 12-gallon storage capacity. The unit can be operated continuously.

She said the job of the auxiliary is to provide such services as letter writing and reading to patients, provide flowers; do sewing; shrub and tree planting and in general make the patient's stay at the hospital more pleasant.

Another service planned by the group is the permanent establishment of a gift bar in the lobby.

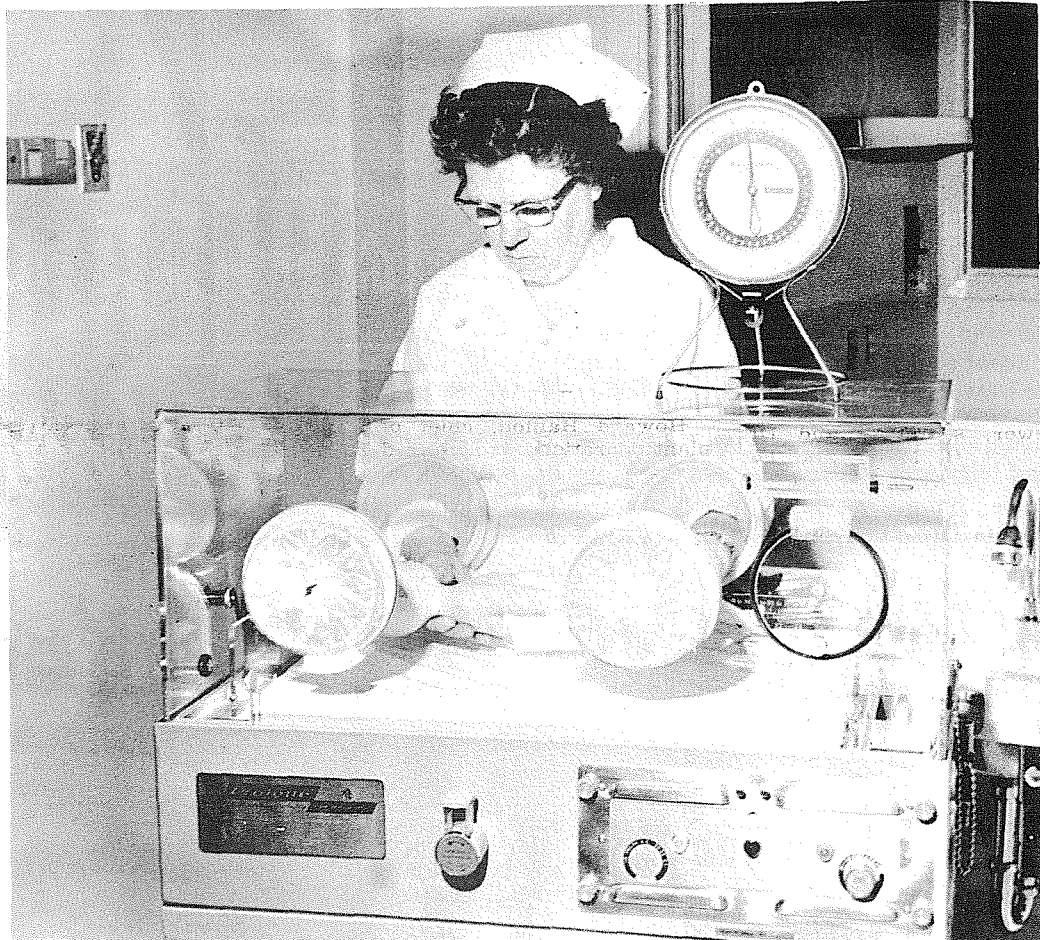
Mrs. Wilson stressed the organization welcome men as well as women. She said there are many projects, such as woodworking, that men could so as a service to the hospital.

Self-Sufficiency of Lakewood's Hospital Described As A 'City Within Itself'

Any hospital is a "city within itself," according to Robert Huesers, hospital administrator. The remark was made in reference to the self-sufficiency of the Lakewood General Hospital.

To meet a standard of high criteria, all departments of the hospital must co-ordinate all their efforts to a single goal—the care of the patient, Huesers said.

In those efforts, Huesers said, a hospital has to readily provide such things as 24-hour pharmacy service, complete food service, and alternate power in case of normal failure.

He pointed to the importance of adequate medical records, in-service training, emergency room service.

modern equipment, a large supply of oxygen—such as the hospital has in its 34,000 cubic foot capacity tank, complete control of weather conditions within the hospital through adequate heating and air conditioning facilities and a dental clinic, as other examples of the hospital's ultimate objective of proper care for the patient.

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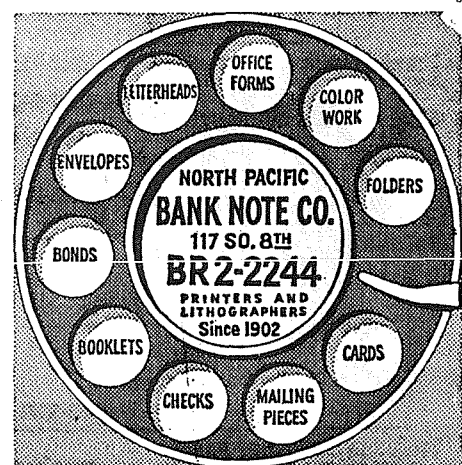

Bedside Intercom Unit Helpful Medical Tool

Lakewood's modern 100-bed facility has the latest in patient-nurse communications. Beside each bed there is a control panel that allows the patient to be in touch with

the nurse at all times. Here is how it works: Should the patient wish to contact the nurse, he merely pushes a button on a pillow speaker which activates a light outside the patient's door, indicating the patient's location, and also on the control panel at the nurse's station. The nurse will talk to the patient through an intercom near the patient's bed. To answer, the patient merely speaks in a normal voice.

The advantages of this modern system to both the patient and the nurse are quickly apparent. For the patient, he will have immediate service for his needs, rather than the periodic checks nurses formerly made. The nurse will save herself making an extra trip should the patient require something to be brought to the room.

There are also emergency station intercom systems located in the hallways and in bathrooms. A further advance to ensure the safety of the patient, is a monitoring system that is used to check for such sounds as irregular breathing. The system thus enables the nurse to maintain a constant surveillance of an entire ward.

Radio-Television Facilities Built Into Every Room

Along with a patient-nurse intercom and a telephone beside the bed of each patient, there are convenience outlets for listening to TV or radio programs through a pillow speaker without disturbing other patients.

The unique system allows the patient to remotely control the volume channel or station selection and volume level right from his bed.

The hospital has leased some 20 television sets that can be wheeled into the rooms or put on specially built wall racks.

WALL OUTLETS: Instant Oxygen Service Available In Every Room

Immediate oxygen service is available in every room of the Lakewood General Hospital. Beside each bed is an oxygen outlet which requires only the insertion of a tube and mouth attachment to the outlet to make it ready for instant use.

This modern convenience is a feature found only in the newest of hospitals. The oxygen supply is stored in a large, white tank of 34,000 cubic feet capacity, at the rear of the hospital.

Pipes run from the tank to each outlet in the hospital. Robert Huesers, hospital administrator, described the tank as a "huge thermos jug". He said there are only three hospitals in the northwest with such a facility. The central oxygen supply does away with the bulky tanks formerly used.

The hospital also has two oxygen tents which refrigerates and humidifies the tank to the wall outlet.

Every room has a sink and wall mirror as well as private and semi-private bathrooms. There are large wardrobe closets in each room as well as colorful chairs for visitors. Bathing facilities are conveniently located in the various wards.

A new type of three-way light over each bed provides for a variety of uses such as general illumination and reading. A night light has been installed near the doorway of each room.

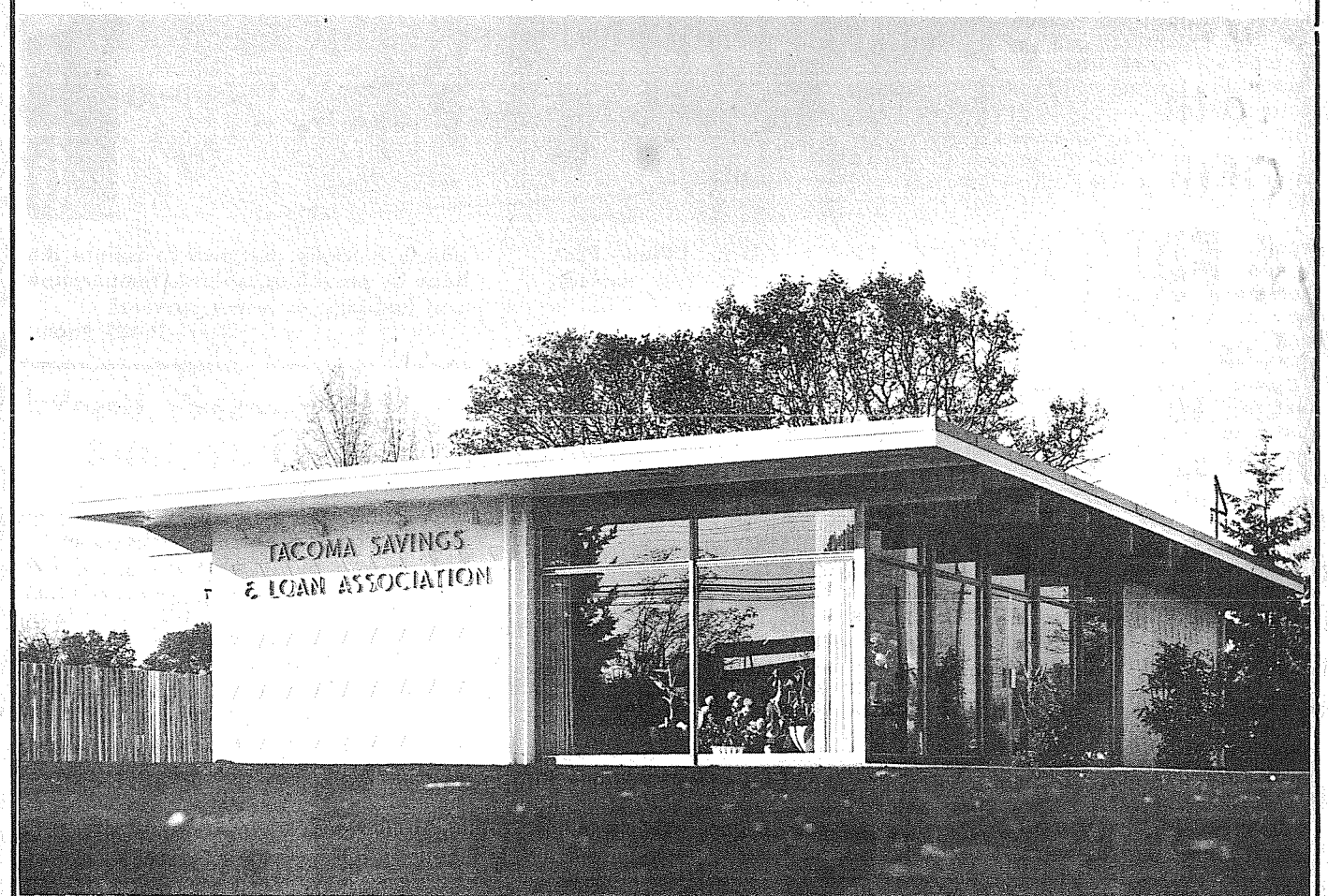

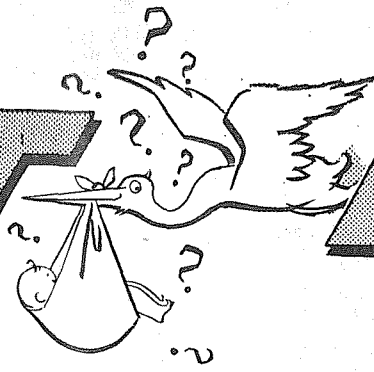

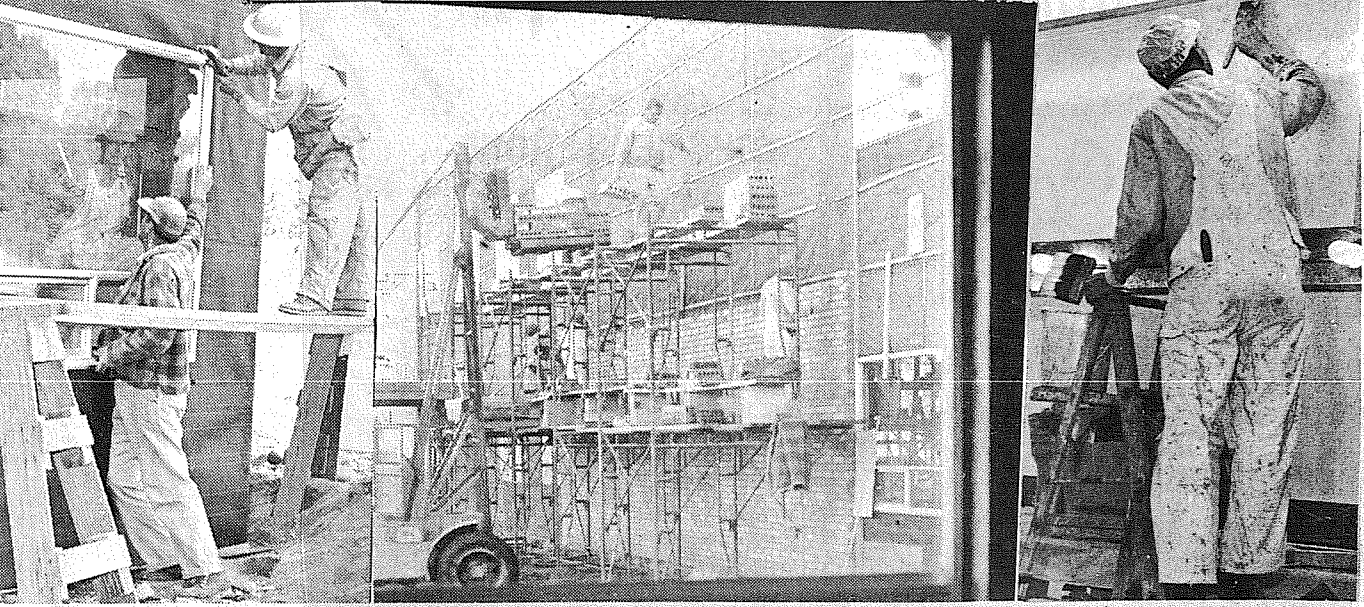
400 - Foot Structure Completed in Little More Than a Year

Construction of Lakewood General Hospital began in September, 1959 and was originally intended to be a frame building with a brick veneer. Due to a spur of stock sales, the hospital board and architect Alfred Simonson found it economically feasible to revise the building plans to a reinforced concrete structure.

Construction began anew in April, 1960 under a new state code which makes the building virtually fireproof. The \$1,900,000 structure took about a year to complete.

The photo-montage, shown here, a 'Times' photographic record of construction progress over the past year, shows pouring of concrete, erection of reinforced steel girders, installation of aluminum-frame windows and painting in the final stages of construction.

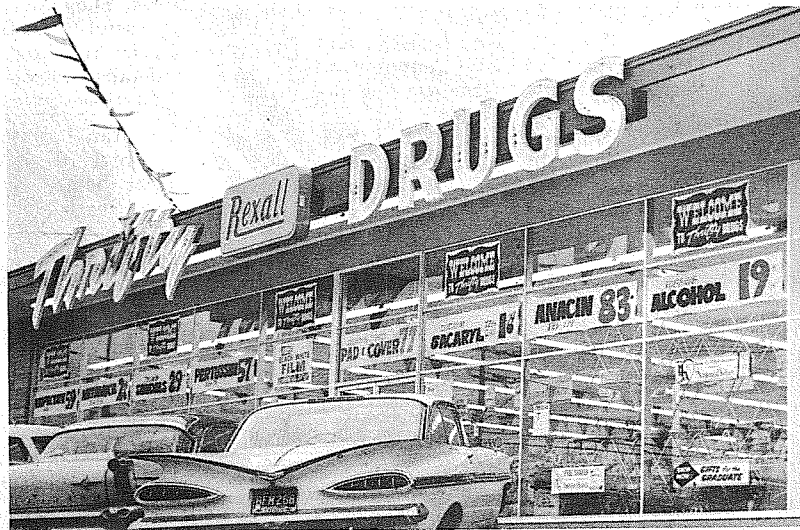

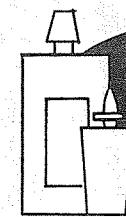

with JACK BROWN

Last Sunday while working on our aviation paper, I was heading for North Bend, Oregon, with a passenger who was capable of flying the plane. I turned the controls over to him and sat back to enjoy the ride and some of the scenery. Sitting there looking down as we passed over towns and suburban areas, I came to realize that an old timer could well be classed as one who could remember back to the time when a hilltop was not considered valuable property.

Ever since our nation's leader made his speech about the business climate of our country in which the play was upon the word "recession", "depressed areas", etc., I have been looking for a verse I once read that seemed to fit the general conditions today to a tee. Yesterday one of my employees came in asking if this was not the verse I have been seeking. It sure was, and although you may have read it or heard it many times before, I'd like to refresh your memory with it one again.

ONCE UPON A TIME

There once was a man who lived by the side of the road and sold hot dogs.
He was hard of hearing so he had no radio.
He had trouble with his eyes so he read no newspapers,
But he sold good hot dogs.

He put up a sign on the highway telling how good they were.
He stood by the side of the road and cried: "Buy a hot dog, Mister."

And people bought.
He increased his meat and bun orders.
He bought a bigger stove to take care of his trade.
He got his son home from college to help him.
But then something happened . . .

His son said, "Father, haven't you been listening to the radio? There may be a big recession coming on.
You had better prepare for poor trade."

Whereupon the father thought, "Well, my son has been to college.
He reads the papers and he listens to the radio and he ought to know."

So the father cut down on his meat and bun orders.
He took down his advertising signs.
And no longer bothered to stand on the highway to sell hot dogs.
And his hot dog sales fell almost overnight.
"You're right, son," the father said to the boy.
"We are certainly headed for a recession."

Another income tax deadline has come and gone, and millions of us feel a sad flatness in the pocketbooks.
Once the income tax was a rich man's tax—people of small and moderate earnings paid little or nothing. But now, as Citizens Public Expenditure Survey observes, "the long arm of the Internal Revenue Service reaches out to nearly everybody."

Here's the cold statistical story: Of the total federal tax, people who earn under \$5,000 a year pay 21 per cent. The \$5,000 to \$10,000 group pays 39 per cent. The \$10,000 - \$15,000 earners pay 11 per cent. The \$15,000 - \$50,000 people pay 17 per cent. And the real big income group—\$50,000 and over—pays only 12 per cent.

This isn't because the rich are favored—income tax rates reach a top bracket of 91 per cent. It simply reflects the fact that there are not enough wealthy people to foot the bill for government—but there are millions of individuals in the modest income brackets. So, inevitably, the latter must pay the great bulk of government costs. And they, collectively, would gain the most from reductions in non-essential government spending.

The next time some joker tries to convince you that all is copasetic, ask him to explain this one . . .
A little over twenty years ago it cost less to run the entire federal government than our annual cost for interest alone on the national debt today.
