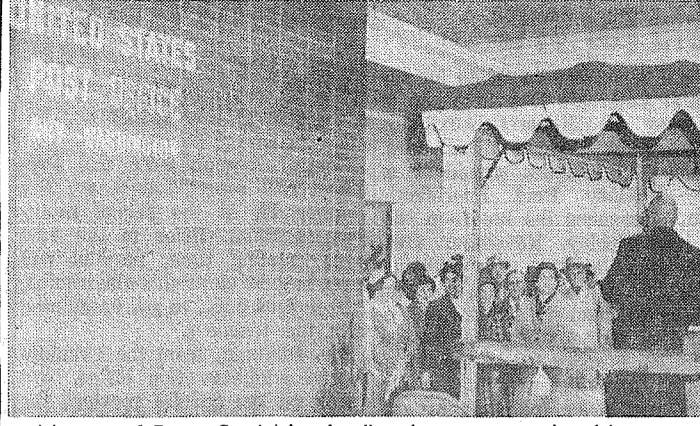

# a-Wondering... and a-Wandering...

## It's the LAW

Jim, 19, wanted to buy a car. His father didn't care if Jim bought a car but refused to have anything to do with the purchase. The first car dealer Jim saw refused to sell him a car when he discovered, by asking Jim, that he was not yet 21. The dealer explained that a contract with a minor was not binding on the minor, if the minor wanted to disaffirm it.

Jim, who looked as if he were at least 21, went to a second car dealer. Jim told the second dealer he was 22 and signed a written application for credit, giving his age in the application as 22. The second dealer sold Jim a car on a conditional sales contract.

Two months after he got the car Jim wrecked it. He then went

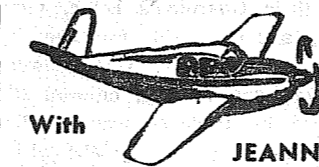
to the dealer he bought the car from, offered him the wrecked car and demanded the return of the money he had paid on the contract, saying he knew that the contract was no good and that under the state law he could get his money back.

Can Jim get back the money he had paid?

The answer is that he can not. It is true that a minor can disaffirm most of his contracts, except contracts for necessities, and for insurance, but when Jim misrepresented his age to be able to buy the car, he lost his right to cancel the contract and get his money back. Instead, Jim is liable on the contract just as if he were an adult, and the dealer can recover the balance due on the contract from Jim.

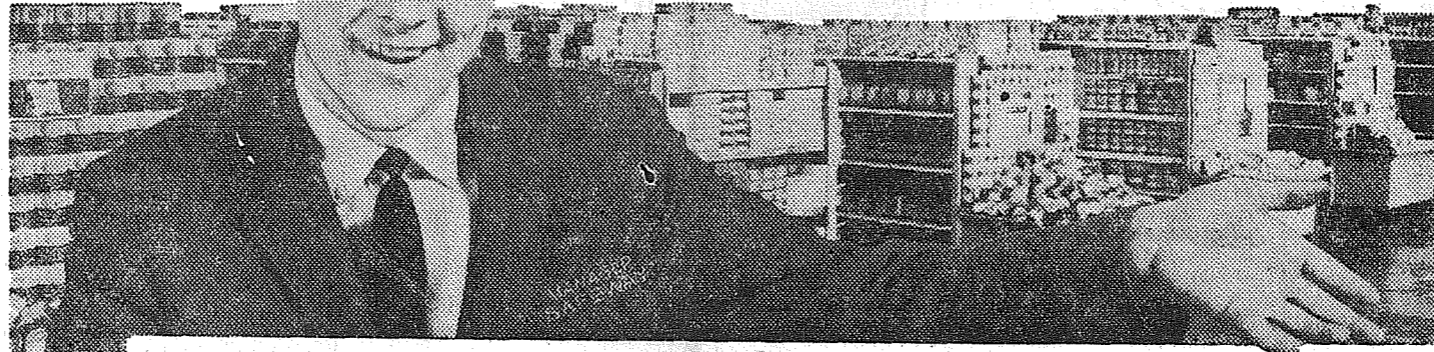

**County Agents Corner**

Pierce County Farm Forestry Association will have as guest speakers: Plant Pathologists Dr. C. J. Gould and Dr. Maksis Eglitis, of the Western Washington Experiment Station. The pathologists have been studying disease problems of evergreen huckleberry and salal brush for several months. The study was initiated by an appeal from the Pierce County Farm Forestry Association for help and guidance in controlling or minimizing effects of the diseases on the multimillion dollar evergreen crop.

Samples of disease stricken plants have been submitted by Association members at regular intervals for study by the scientists. Tentative findings obtained from samples studied and recent field trips were given at the regular Pierce County Farm Forestry Association meeting Thursday, November 3rd, at the Purdy Community Hall.

What would you do if a fire suddenly started in your home or car? It's quite a shock to see a room burst into flames or see smoke billowing through an open window. In most cases an individual is too shaken up to think effectively. I recently found myself in such a situation. I went to the garage to start my car. It wouldn't start. Suddenly smoke and flames spurted from under the hood. My first thought was to call the fire department. As I dashed to the house I noticed my garden hose connected to a water standpipe. I grabbed the hose, turned on the water and quickly extinguished the fire. If the water hose hadn't been handy the damage would have been much greater.

This is a very good time to think of what you would do in case of fire. A plan of action thought out now could well mean the difference between property and lives saved or lost. Family fire drills also would be in order. The youngsters would get quite a kick out of it, too.

You will find local fire control personnel willing to offer suggestions for home fire prevention and control. Why not have a chat with them?

By now most consumers of eggs are getting well acquainted with

the term "Fresh Fancy" which is seen on egg cartons. The term became official on September 5, 1959. It's part of an egg quality program designed to insure top quality eggs for consumers. Since September 15, 1959, approximately 20 egg handlers in 12 different states have officially enrolled in the quality control program.

Egg quality control from nest to consumer is the objective. It starts on the farm. Laying hens bred to produce good quality eggs must be used. Eggs must be gathered frequently and immediately cooled to 60 degrees or less. Eggs from different flocks are packed separately.

When the processor receives the eggs he takes random samples and breaks them to observe the interior quality. The yolks must be well-rounded and a reasonably uniform color. The egg white must be firm. Blood spots, checks, and poor shells are eliminated. If the eggs qualify, they may carry the "Fresh Fancy" designation. Continuous checks are made during the year to determine whether the flock continues to qualify.

In addition to the "Fresh Fancy" term may be used from Grade AA the size of the eggs and a "pull" date of not more than 10 days from the date of testing. "Fresh Fancy"

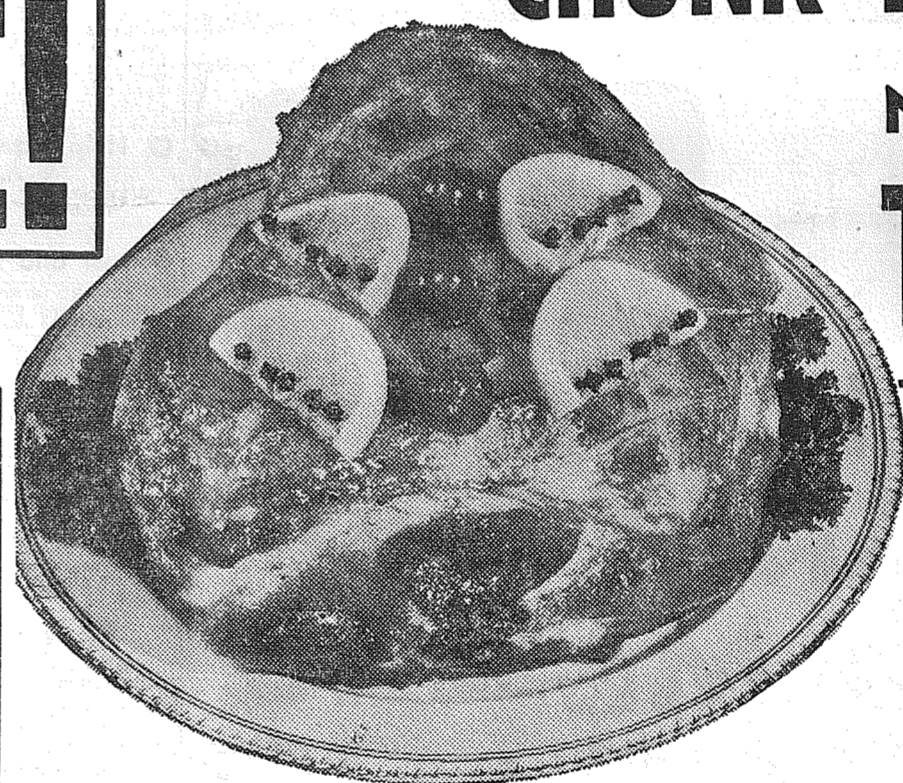

**County Agent's Corner**

Seedlings for forest and Christmas tree plantings will be available November 1st, according to the State Department of Natural Resources. The two year old plants cost less than a penny apiece. \$9.60 is the cost of 1000 trees, which includes an applied rabbit repellent.

Varieties available include Douglas Fir, Ponderosa Pine, Norway Spruce, Lodgepole Pine, Scotch Pine, Noble Fir, Shasta Red Fir, Grand Fir and Pacific Silver Fir. All of these trees are suitable for Christmas tree plantings. Douglas Fir is the tree most popularly used for forest plantings in the production of timber and pulpwood.

Minimum order is 1000 trees of a species. Department of Natural Resources Regulations require that the trees be planted outside of corporate city limits, that their use will not be ornamental, and that they will not be resold with roots attached.

Order blanks are presently available from the Extension Service, 742 County-City Building, State Department of Natural Resources, and the Soil Conservation Service, both at 506 River Road, Puyallup, Washington.

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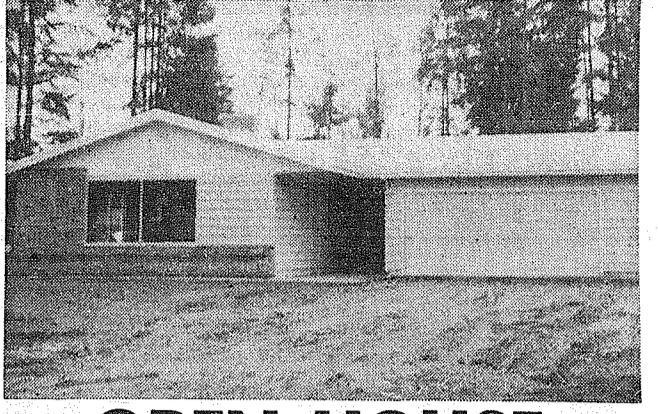

**It's the LAW**  
PRESENTS AS A PUBLIC SERVICE BY THE WASHINGTON STATE BAR ASSOCIATION

Johnny, eight years old, got on a public bus with a bag of candy in his hand. After paying his fare he sat down in a rear seat.  
He took out a candy sucker on a stick and put the candy in his mouth. The bus driver later had to jam on the brakes hard to avoid a collision with a car which ran a red light.

When the bus stopped suddenly, Johnny was thrown forward and the candy on the stick jammed into the roof of his mouth, seriously injuring him. A friend told Johnny's dad, "You should sue the bus company. They're responsible if someone is hurt on a bus."

Do you think the bus company must pay damages for the injury? In such circumstances, the bus company probably would not be liable. It's not enough, in order to recover damages from a bus company, to prove someone was hurt on a bus. The bus company, through its driver, must have been negligent in some degree.

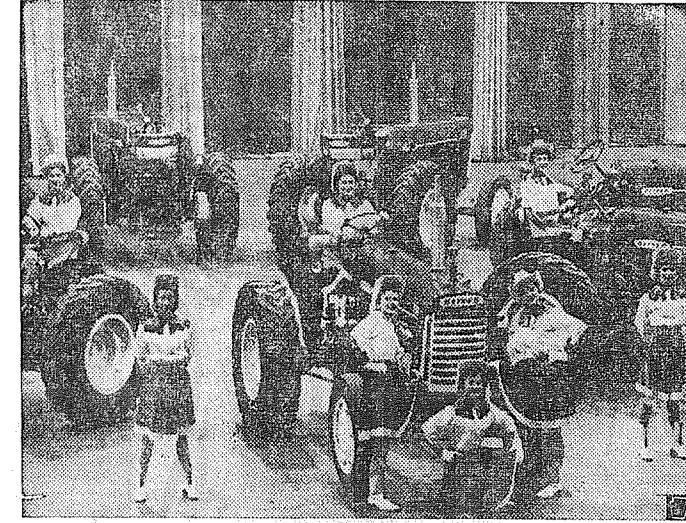
A person is negligent only if he violates a duty owed to someone else. In this situation the bus driver would not be considered negligent unless a reasonably prudent bus driver would have observed Johnny with the candy in his mouth and would have stopped the bus and made Johnny stop sucking the candy. Unless there was a law making it illegal to eat candy on a bus, it is extremely doubtful that a reasonably prudent bus driver would take such action.

Since there was no duty on the part of the bus driver to take the candy away from Johnny, the bus company would not be liable for his injuries.

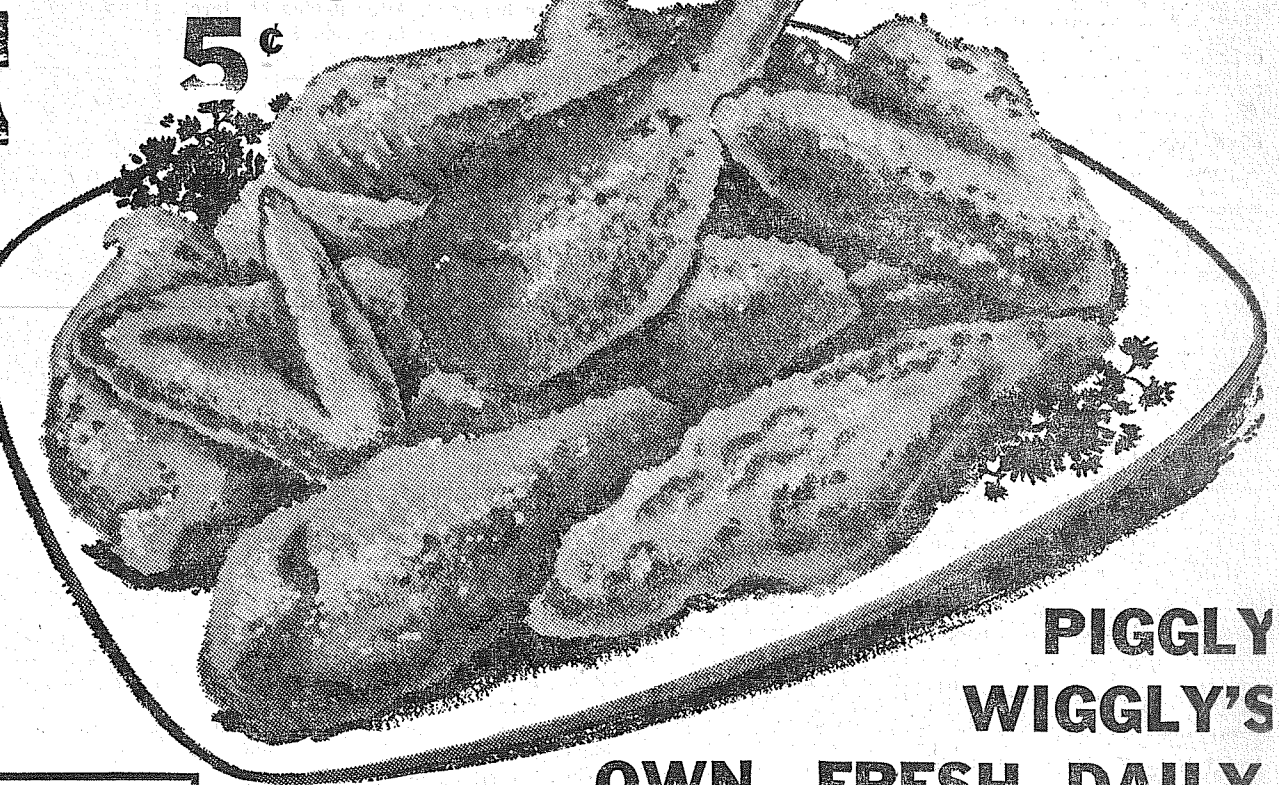

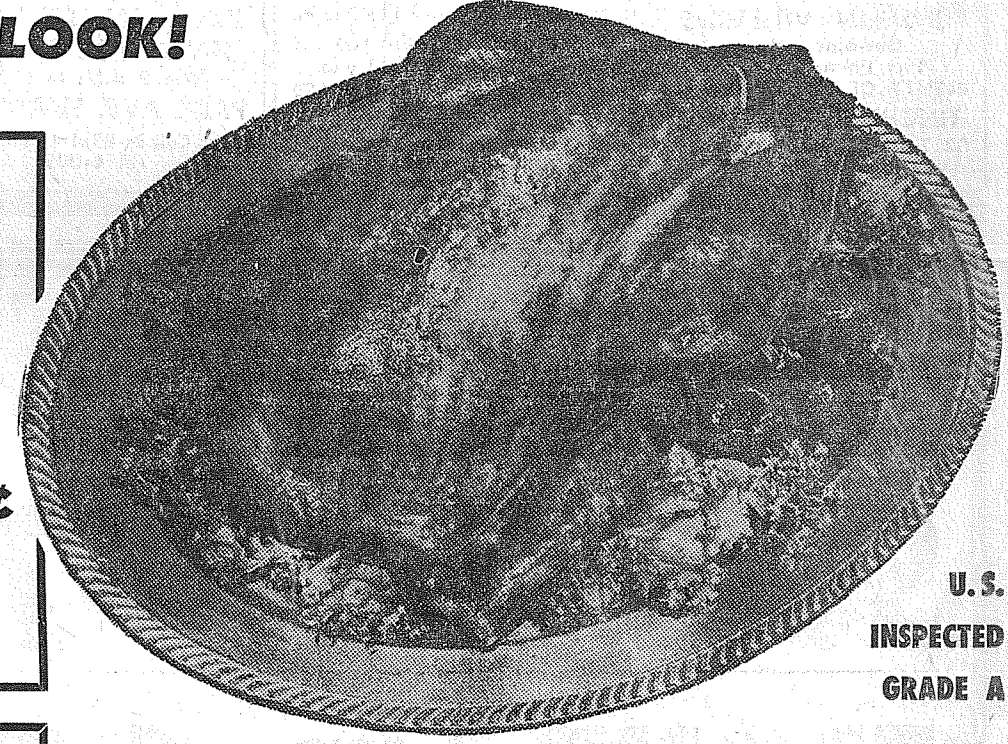

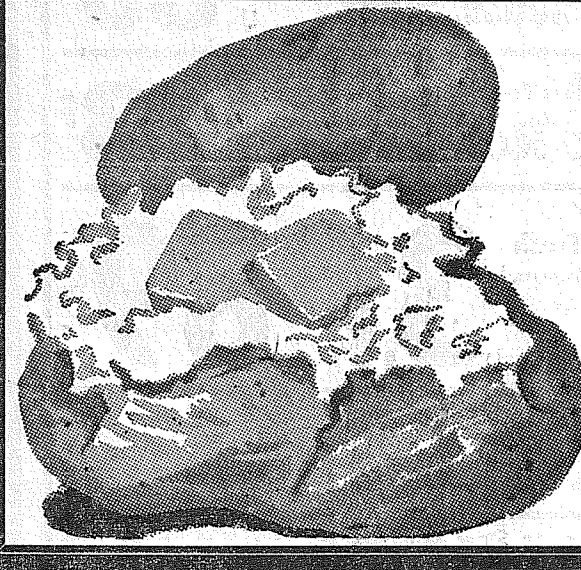
