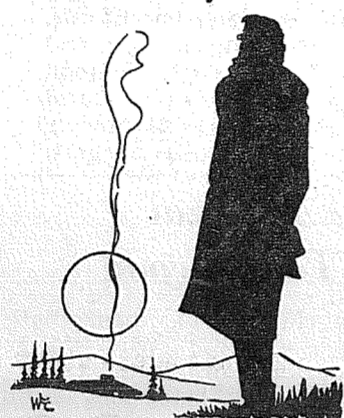

Miss Carol Ferch, PHS Senior was winner of the Teachers Chorus Scholarship Award. The presentation was made during the concert, given in Puyallup recently.

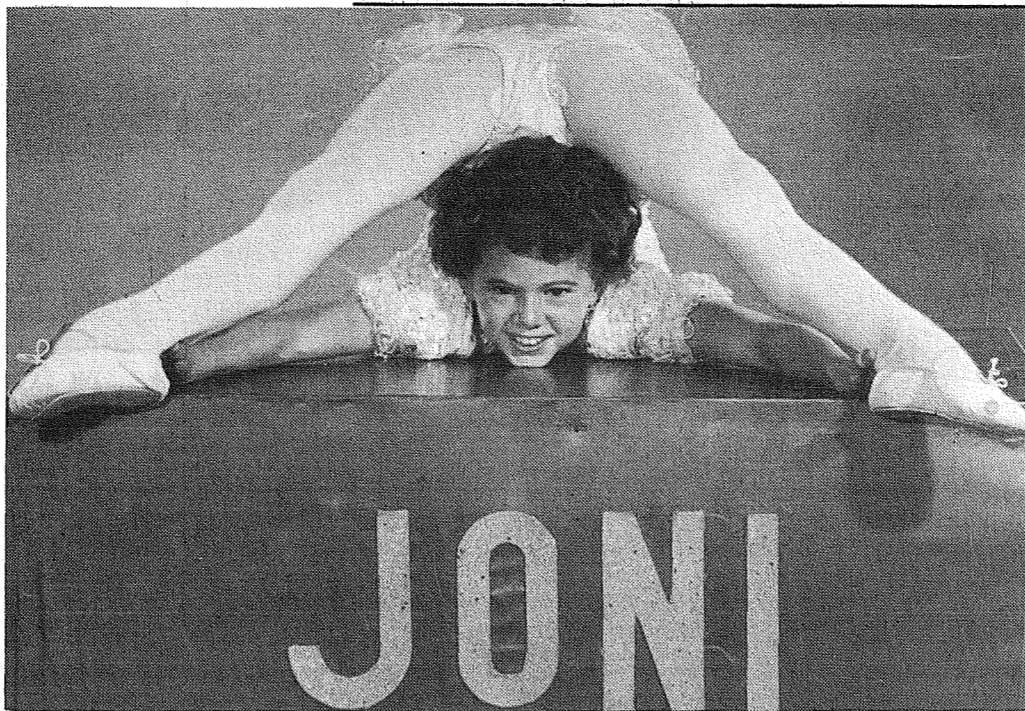
Carol will enter Western Washington College of Education at Bellingham in the fall, where she will major in music.

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Pochel Honors 40 Millionth Frigidaire

Frigidaire division of General Motors has produced its 40 millionth product.

News of this manufacturing achievement has been received from company headquarters by Pochel's, Frigidaire dealer here.

Bob Purtell, appliance manager, reported that the 40 millionth product was a 13-cubic-foot Frost-Proof refrigerator - freezer which rolled off the production line at Frigidaire's huge manufacturing complex at Dayton, Ohio.

Local observance of this production feat will include open house activities at Pochel's, 140th and Pacific where special product exhibits will be shown commemorating the 40 millionth product.

"This milestone has much broader significance than a mere production record," Purtell stressed. "It was made possible only by Frigidaire customers exercising their own purchase choice of home appliances throughout the years. For this reason, our local observance theme will be known as 'appreciation days.'"

He pointed out that Frigidaire's production record was made during its 43 years with the General Motors corporation. About half of this production was achieved during the past 12 years. By contrast, it took the division about 12 years to manufacture the first million products, which were mainly refrigeration units during this early period.

Since then, Frigidaire has added many broad product lines, and in addition to household refrigerators and food freezers, currently is marketing electric ranges, automatic washers and dryers, dishwashers, air conditioners, electric water heaters, food waste disposers and a wide variety of built-in appliances.

He also emphasized that while the company was achieving this production record, there was impressive technological progress in making appliances more dependable.

"For example, Frigidaire service records reveal," he explained, "that 1961 appliances required about 10 per cent less service attention than 1960 models and that 1960 products needed about 33 per cent less service than those made in 1957. And, of course, the 1957 products in turn were much more reliable than those produced 10 or 15 years ago."

He pointed out that, at the same time, most home appliances are priced lower today than 10 years ago, despite inflation, increased wages and rising material costs through the years.

"Since 1954, the appliance price index has been dropping while the cost of living, as measured by the consumer price index, has continued to rise," he said. "Today, appliance prices are about at the same level as the late 1940's. For this reason, today's major home appliances provide one of the best product values in history for our customers."

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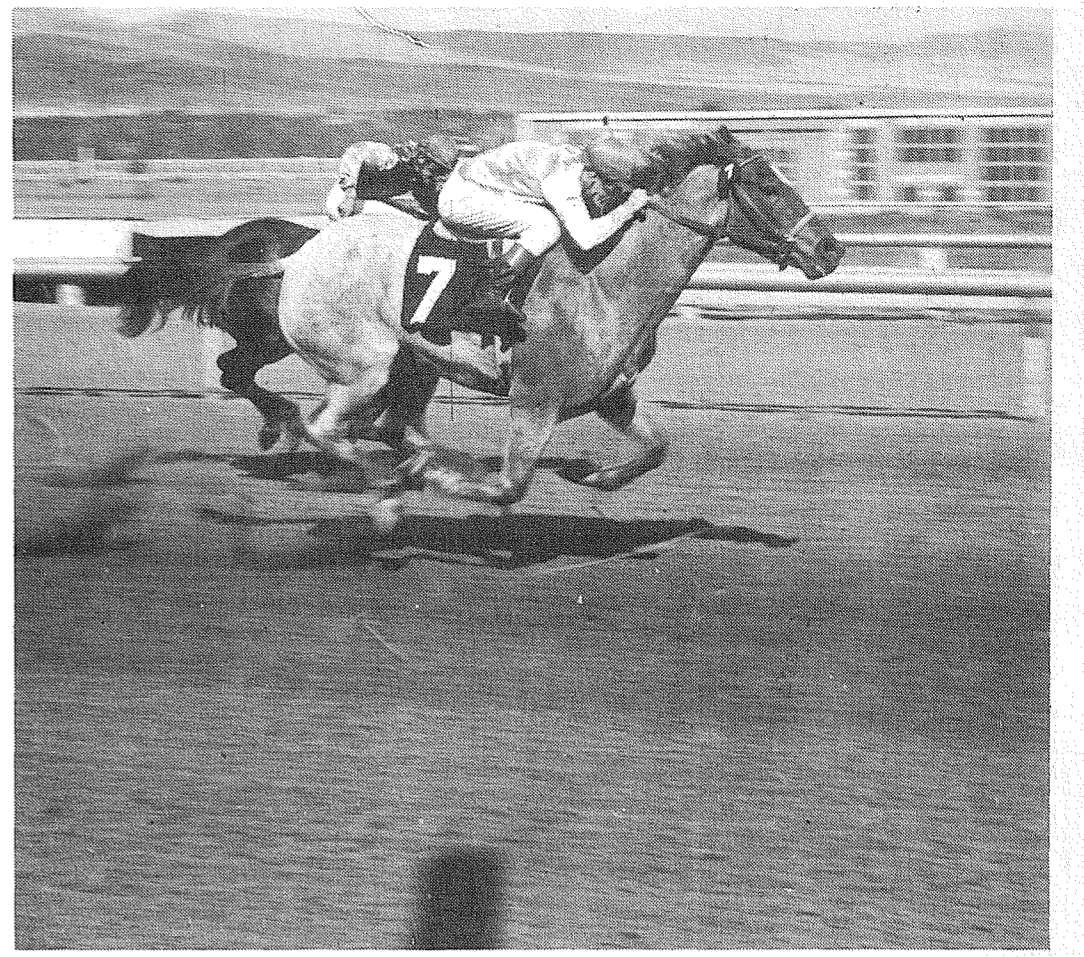

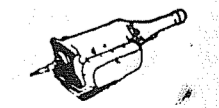
The Jr. Rodeo committee reported 117 contestants with 199 entries. The Rodeo was also successful financially.

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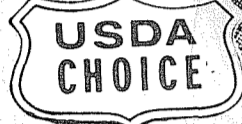
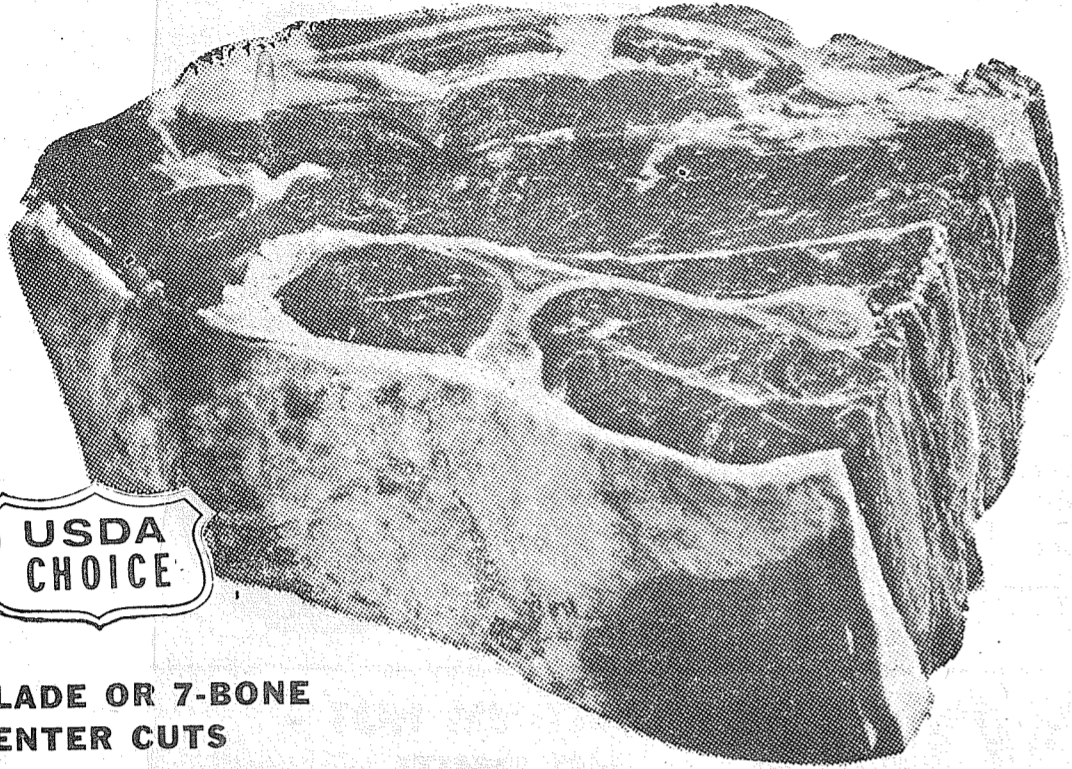

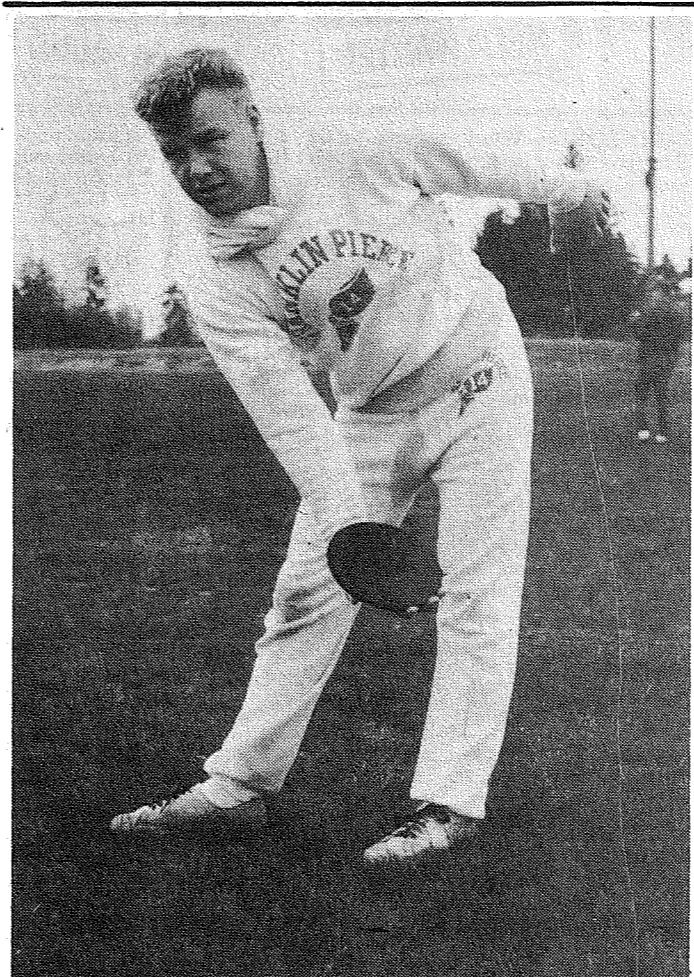
