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Cartoons Feature Parent-Child Problems

"Growing Pains," a series of striking new cartoons beginning in this week's issue of the Times Journal, stress many emotional problems confronting parents and children in today's hectic living. The expert touch of Henry B. Rollins, M. D., vice president and medical director of the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company, who has this to say:

"Growing Pains" is the result of letters from troubled parents and their children. Some of the most illuminating letters we have received were written by members of the new generation.

"What we have tried to do in this cartoon is to look two ways at once. After consulting with authorities about the problems connected with bringing up children, after analyzing the thousands of letters we have received, and after talking with parents and their children, we decided that a lack of mutual understanding causes most of the heartaches.

"Through our cartoons we have tried to hold up a mirror that all might look into. We hope that parents will see how the world looks from their children's points of view. We hope that children will be able to understand why their parents act as they do.

"Every child brought into the

world deserves the chance to become a happy, self-respecting, self-reliant adult. To create an environment in which this is possible is the responsibility and the privilege of parenthood.

"Parents who do not live up to the best of which they are capable should not criticize children who do not measure up to expectations. Children want to look up to their fathers and mothers. No hero can ever take the place of a father, unless, a father knocks himself off the pedestal. No love supplants the love of a child for a mother, unless a mother neglects to return the affection so confidently offered her.

"Children need firm guidance. But they rebel at unexplained, arbitrary orders. Rules of conduct should be explained; then enforced. It is not wise for parents to do the very thing they have forbidden their children to do. There is nothing more puzzling to children than parents who do not live up to the rules of conduct they have established.

Self-expression is fine. It should be encouraged . . . at all ages. But when self-expression is confused with selfish, thoughtless, undisciplined conduct there is chaos. Consideration for others

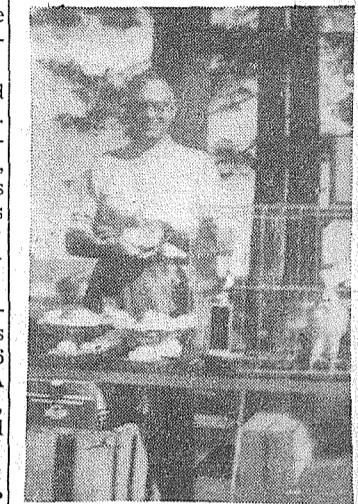
Much Interest In Sun. Pigeon Meet

Summit Firemen Plan Dance 15th

The annual dance of the Summit Volunteer Fire Department will be held Saturday evening, August 15, at the Sportsmen's Chateau. Tickets may be had from members of the department.

The men have been distributing an important booklet on fire prevention to all homes of the area, also a report on the work done in 1958. The 73 emergency calls, of which 60 were for actual fire alarms, represented property valued at \$153,175.00. contents of building being estimated at \$115,690.00. Loss to buildings and cars was \$35,380.00; contents, \$43,445.00 (\$32,000.00 in one fire.) Of the 19 dwelling fires, only five were listed as total losses.

The entire volunteer department drills every Monday night, with two firemen on duty every night. The fire department is fully equipped with first aid supplies and is ready to respond at any time

Freak Accidents Saturday Hard on Service Stations



WHO SAID GAS WAR?—By strange coincidence, the two major traffic accidents Saturday, Aug. 1, each climaxed in serious damage to a service station. The first crash, pictured in the upper shot, occurred in the afternoon at 162nd and Pacific avenue, Spanaway, when a '58 Ford convertible driven by Joe D. Pate of Fort Lewis collided with the side of a car driven by Harold O. Carlson of Graham, caremmed off and smashed into the front of Frank Handy's Associated Service Station and Garage. Pate suffered a skull fracture, lacerations and abrasions; Mr. Carlson and his wife escaped injury. The Pate car was a total loss, the Carlson car was damaged about \$200 and the service station damage amounted to \$4000. The accident was investigated by State Patrol Officers Charles Stansbury and Ralph Bales. The lower photograph shows the front of a service station and grocery at 108th and Yakima and the car of Bertram L. Cooper of Tacoma which crashed into it. Two other cars were involved, one driven by Richard T. Cashmier of Puyallup and a parked car. A special feature of Thursday night's entertainment will be little Kathy Collins, the 11-year-old trick riding sensation known as the youngest trick rider in the United States. Also appearing on Friday's program will be Miss Diane Martin, talented young Sumner pianist.

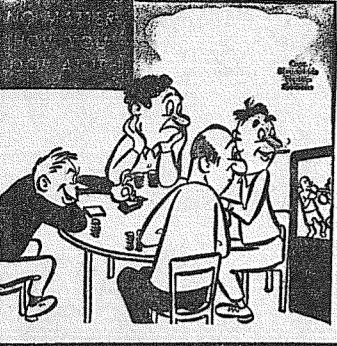

Recently there have been a number of calls on tall dry grass growing close to buildings and the firemen would like to point out that much as they would like to get rid of all the hazards they have neither the man power nor the time to take care of conditions that they know exist in the area, therefore it is to the benefit of the property owner to help remove some of these hazards himself.

a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .
With **JACK BROWN**

Did you ever wonder what's to become of our teenage youngsters? Everywhere you look you see them walking aimlessly, like grade school youngsters, riding around in hotrods as if they had not a care in the world, or just sitting or leaning. Far too few are seen at work and usually then it's a father-son combination. Don't condemn them. It's certainly not the teenagers' fault. Opportunities for them have nearly ceased to exist. Many of these youngsters would be good conscientious hard workers if given a chance.

What has become of the jobs for teenagers? I'll tell you. The protectors of our youth have protected them right out of their God given right to learn by doing. Do you know of a better teacher than experience? I don't.

Let's take the publishing business for instance. Nearly every week I have to tell some presentable young fellow that I have no extra work for him. Maybe I have, but I still can't hire him for so many reasons it makes me sick to think about them. Let's just say that I find some nice energetic deserving young fellow who's busting his seams to learn the printing trade. Let's say I could use him around here to run some errands, keep the place clean and after a lot of instruction by a journeyman he could eventually be of some real value to us. However after I've convinced myself that there is a place in our business for him, I still can't hire him for the following reasons:

1. My men who would have to spend considerable time instructing a newcomer get \$3.63 per hour which is about all the traffic can bear under present conditions so I can't afford to waste those hours I'm paying for.
2. Assuming that I decided I could afford to have him taught the business, I sure couldn't afford to pay him much for his time spent in learning, yet the state recently passed a minimum wage law of \$1.00 per hour so on the basis of a printer's 35-hour week, I couldn't afford to hire him on this score.
3. The union sets the rate of apprentices allowed under their contract to one for 2 or more journeymen, with the 2nd one allowed on the "Playroll" when you reach the figure of 7 journeymen. I don't hire enough journeymen, so on this point I could not hire a promising young teenager without getting myself picketed or having my men walk off the job.
4. The federal wage and hour division of our government have decided that since we publish a newspaper in which products made out of state are advertised for sale, we in effect are aiding and abetting their transportation across state lines and are therefore dealing in interstate commerce and must abide by the rules as such, so on another point we have a minimum wage of \$1.00 per hour, plus time and one half for all hours worked over 40. So once again the amount of pay stipulated, plus the endless red tape required in hiring a teenager under 18, puts me in the position of having to say no to any aspiring young printers.
5. Then of course there are saws and moving machinery in our shop and I haven't even had the courage or desire to look into all the necessary arrangements required to legally have a teenager work under our shop roof.

This is just the "for instance" of one type of business. Today all businesses are hamstrung by the protectors as far as teenagers are concerned.

The next time you see a gang of teenagers standing around don't grumble about them being lazy or anything. They are the by-product of a modern world that is failing to realize that these young people need a chance to learn, to be productive and take their rightful place as skilled men in the trades.

Let's go back to our "for instance" again. What happens to the Times Journal Publishing Co. when our present crew gets too old to work? Guess we'll just have to close up because for every 7 men that grow old and retire only 2 young men have been granted the opportunity to step in and learn the trade to fill their places.

We're plowing under America's richest crop, the potential of our youth. Let's wake up fast while there's still time to salvage our most valuable asset.

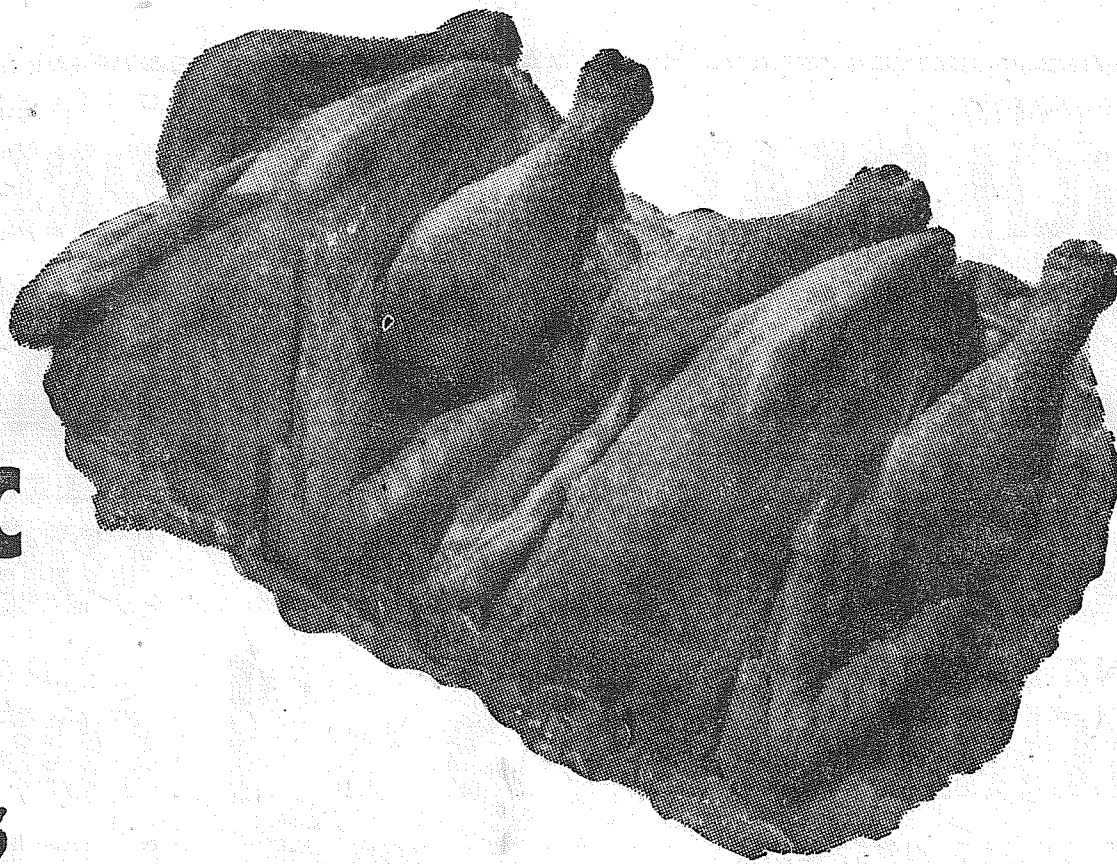

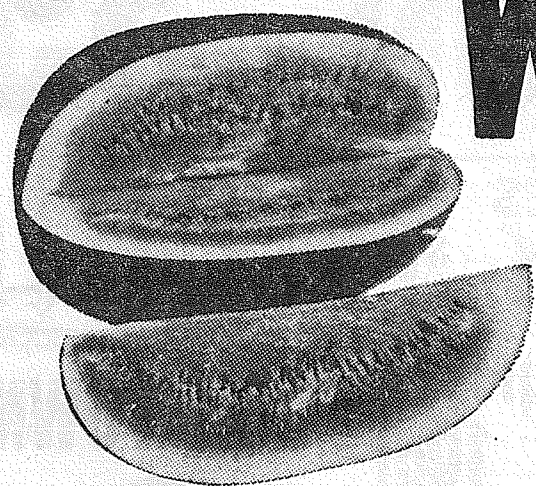

Phone Co. Asks New Rates for Parkland

Reasons behind Pacific Telephone's request for increases in basic monthly service affecting Parkland customers were contained in testimony presented last week before the Washington Public Service Commission in Olympia. Hearings opened Tuesday (July 28) for presentation of the utility's direct testimony, according to manager Ron Johnson.

The company has been operating on a restricted basis for the past two years because of reduced earnings, company witnesses testified.

They said the company cannot continue to operate on this restricted basis very long without an adverse effect on service to our customers and an increase in long-term costs.

They added that the company is also concerned about its ability to meet demands for future growth unless its earnings situation improves. Basic monthly rates have not increased in five years.

The Commission was informed that in order to protect its reduced earnings level the company adopted vigorous expense controls, slashed its 1959-60 construction program by \$10½ million and postponed a number of growth and service improvement projects. The

employee force has been reduced from 11,500 to 9,500 people.

Vice president and general manager, Ben Bowling, testified that the company's earnings are not competitive with other industry, or other utilities and thus is not in a position to invest large amounts of capital to meet growth and improve service.

If the company is able to obtain the earnings it seeks in 1960, he added, customers could expect a more rapid filling of orders for better grades of service, expansion of local calling areas, more direct service for suburban customers, faster introduction of Direct Distance Dialing, improved service for rural areas and introduction of new and better types of equipment.

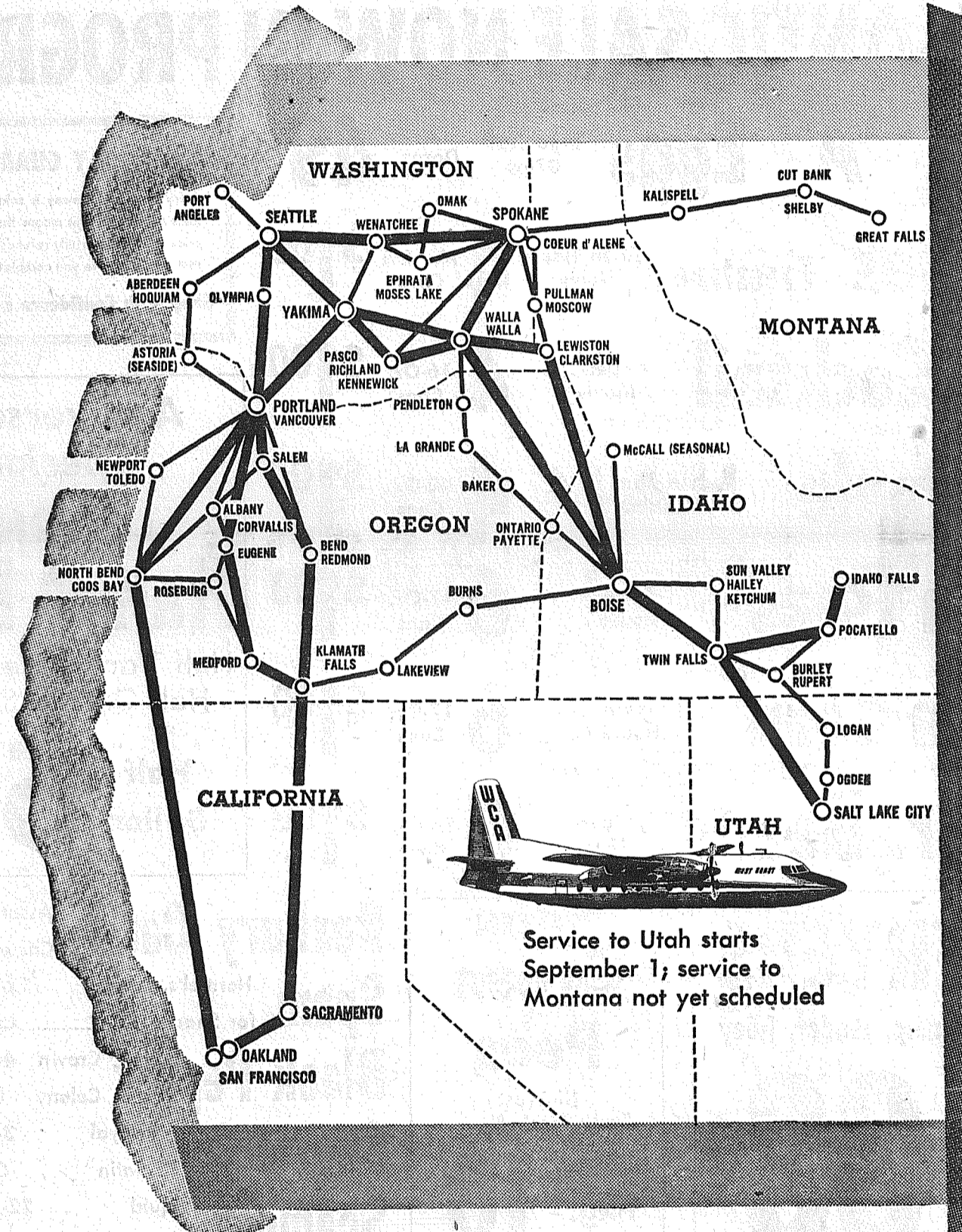

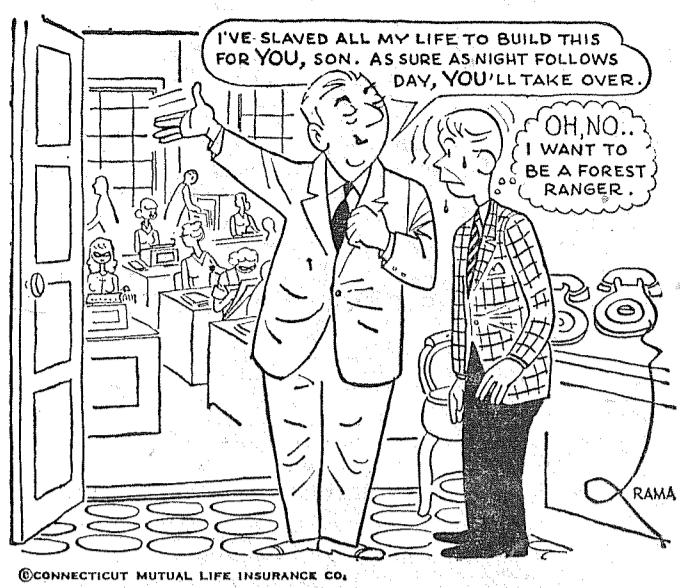

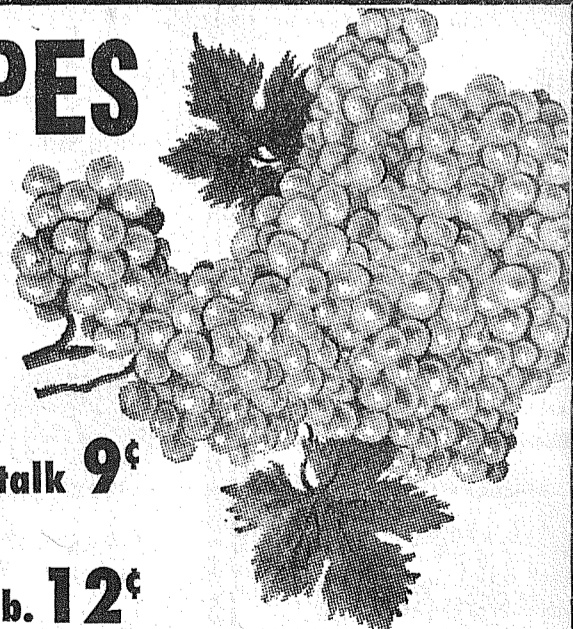
