County Agent's Corner

Fertilizer for Timber Growth?

Fertilizer might be as important to the forestry industry in coming years as it has been to farm crops in the past decade.

Joe Buhaly, county Extension agent, said this is the opinion of WSU scientists, based on recent research. Forest-tree fertilization studies have been made by researchers at both WSU and the University of Washington.

M. M. Mosher, associate forester at WSU, compared the growth rate of fertilizer and non-fertilized ponderosa pine in eastern Washington. He found that the fertilized trees produced 29 per cent more diameter growth.

Mosher also found that lack of

moisture in eastern Washington forests can limit growth even more than lack of fertilizer. Plots receiving fertilizer and irrigation in the summer grew 127 per cent faster than plots receiving neither.

Dr. Stann Gessel of the University of Washington has conducted fertilization studies on Douglas Fir in western Washington. He found that nitrogen stimulated the rate of growth and developed greener needles on the trees. Gessel also found that nitrogen applied in late summer to Christmas tree plantings on poor soils improved the green color of the trees by harvest time. There is one evidence that the fertilized trees have better keeping quality also. Fertilizer applied to Christmas trees in the spring, however, may have an adverse effect by stimulating too fast growth.

Researchers have found that fertilizer also increased seed cone

production. This finding can be an important factor in reforestation by assuring adequate supplies of quality seed for the production of seedling trees.

The studies have shown further, that fertilizer applied to seedling transplants will stimulate growth, increase vigor and help young trees get ahead of competing brush and vegetation.

Fertilizer pellets of long lasting qualities for planting with the seedlings have been developed and are being tried by companies such as Crown Zellerbach Corp., Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, Simpson Logging Company, etc. One problem encountered in this connection is that deer and forest animals prefer the fertilized seedlings to those which have not been fertilized.

Forestry researchers agree that much more information is needed on the physiology of trees, on tests for fertilizer needs of forest soils, on methods of fertilizer application, and on the economics of using fertilizer for faster timber production.

Research now being conducted by universities and the forest industries in Washington and Oregon promises answers to many of the



ology, religion, sociology and speech.

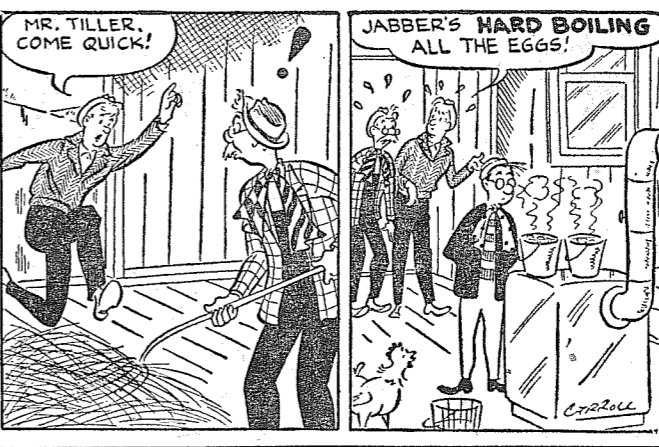
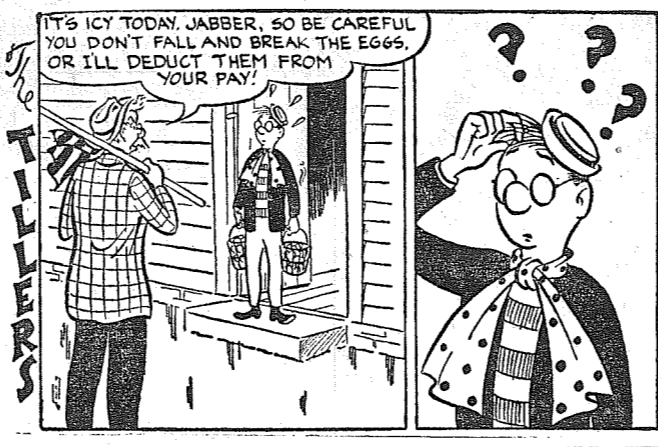
In addition to the regular college faculty, seven educators from the area will offer courses at night. Mrs. Sidney Engest of Seattle will give a course in art in the elementary school.

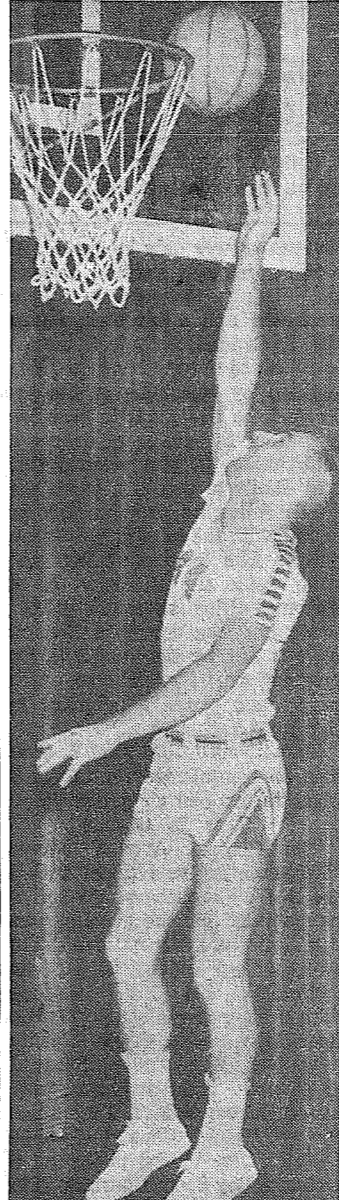

Who won the steel strike? If you ask me, I'd say: no one. On the surface it would appear that labor did, for even now its leaders are taking the bows for emerging victorious. But what of the steelworkers themselves? They'll never recover the wages they lost in the balance of their working life time. What of the U.S. producers who were effected? They may never regain the markets they lost to foreign competitors. And what of us, the John Q. Citizens? If this strike proves to be a stimulus for a new inflationary spiral, the cost to all segments of our people will be incalculable. So who Won?

Not long ago a prominent Judge wrote to the New York Times saying that in the 17 years he had been on the bench not one Chinese teen-ager had been brought before him on a juvenile delinquency charge.

P. H. Chang, Chinese Consul-General in New York, was asked to comment. He said, "I have heard this story many times from many judges. I will tell you why I think this is so. Filial piety is a cardinal virtue my people have brought over from the China that was free. A Chinese child, no matter where he lives, is brought up to recognize that he cannot shame his parents. Before a Chinese child makes a move, he stops to think what the reaction of his parents will be. Will they be proud, or will they be ashamed? Above all other things, the Chinese teen-ager is anxious to please his parents."

The amazing record of the Chinese children and young people shows that it is in the home that the cure for juvenile delinquency will be found—and in no other place.

I ran across an interesting figure the other day. It seems some 10 million Russians are being taught the English Language. How come? Anyone drop a fork lately? Looks like company coming unless we do like the man who's donkey died in the desert. Get up off our dead steed and do something about it.

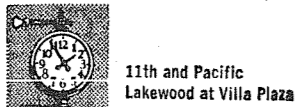
