## PLU's Annual Swedish Festival Planned For Public Friday Eve

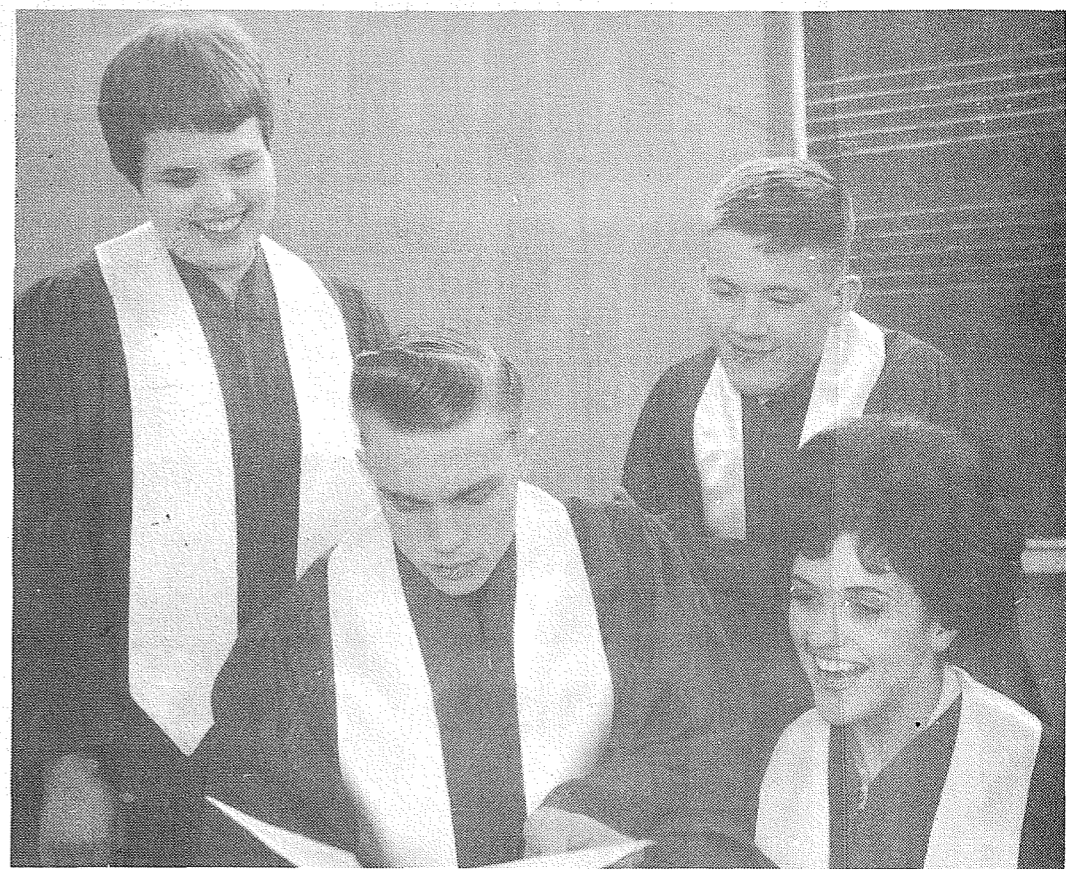

## County Agent Tells Dog Laws

Many questions come in to us about what can legally do about sheep killing dogs. The state law on damage by dogs permits any person seeing a dog chasing stock to kill the dog. The text of the law is as follows:  
RCW 16.08.020 Dogs injuring stock may be killed. A person seeing a dog chasing or injuring any of his domestic animals, including poultry, on property under his control or on a public highway, may kill the dog, or he may notify the owner or keeper of the dog of such chasing or injuring, and thereafter the owner or keeper of the dog shall keep it in leash or confined upon his own premises, and the owner of the animals may thereafter kill the dog if found running at large.  
RCW 16.08.030 Duty of owner to kill marauding dog. A person owning or keeping a dog found killing a domestic animal shall kill the dog within forty-eight hours after being notified of that fact, and failure to do so shall be a misdemeanor.  
The state law also provides that the owners of dogs injuring livestock are liable for damages. Text of this code section is as follows:  
RCW 16.08.010 Injury to stock by dogs - Damage. The owner or keeper of a dog shall be liable for damages and costs to the owner of any animal killed or injured by such a dog.

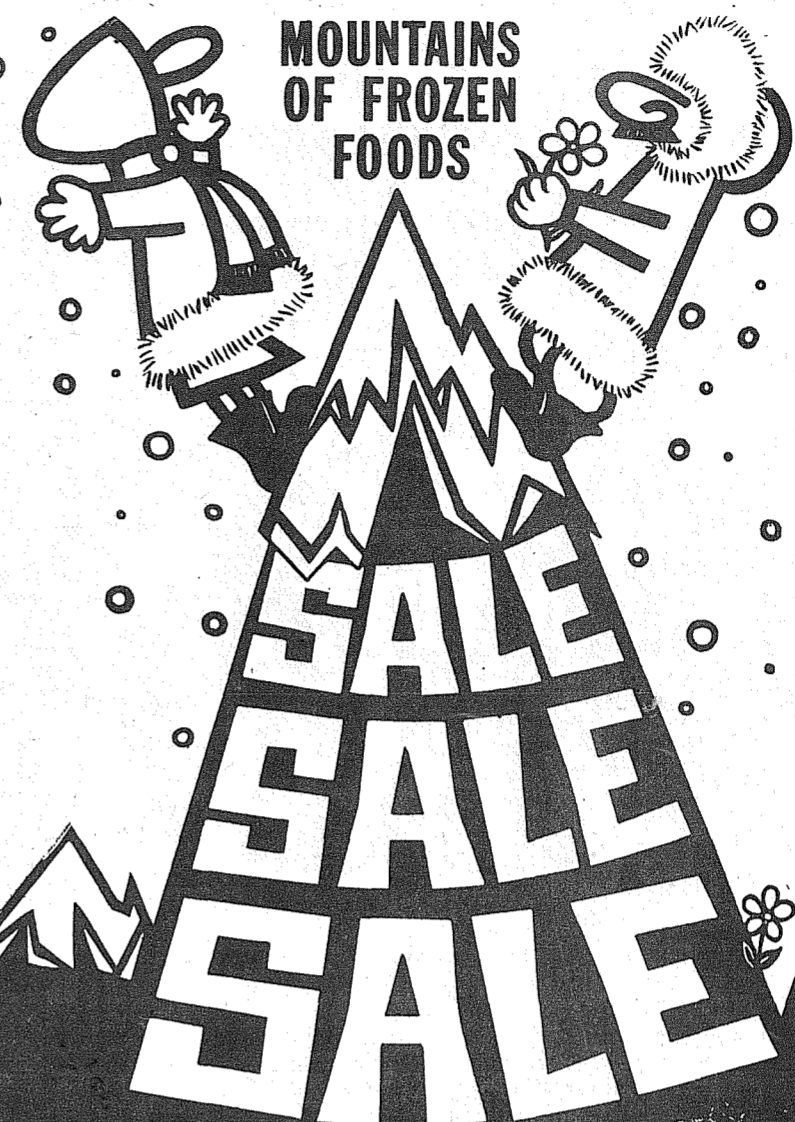

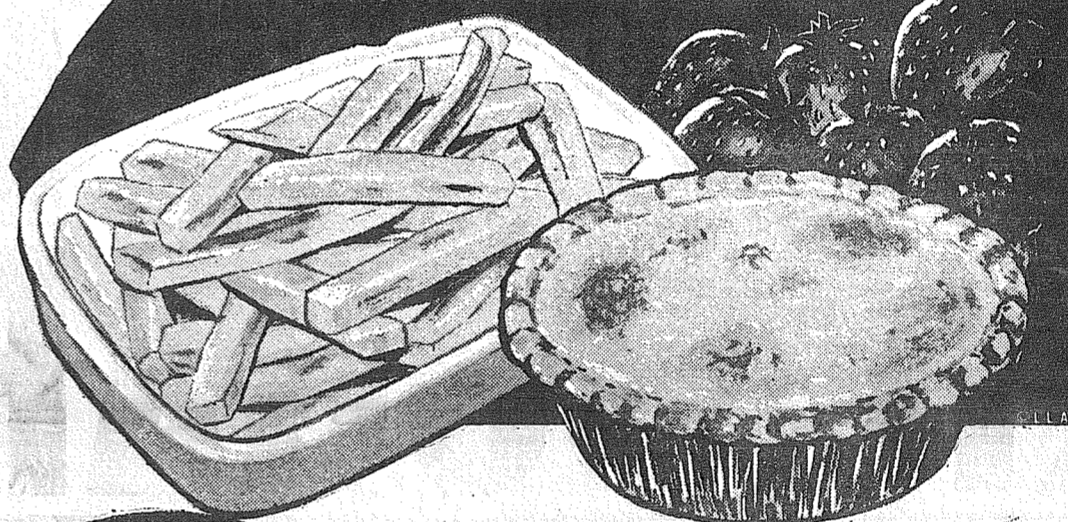

**Seasonal Fires Needless Damper During Holidays**  
It's ironic, the Parkland Fire Department points out, that the joys of Christmas are so often clouded by a seasonal rash of fires and needless tragedies.  
The firemen offer some good advice it behooves us all to follow; Stand your Christmas tree in water. Check lights for frayed wires. Keep tree away from heating systems. Turn off lights when you leave the house. When needles start to fall, remove the tree from the house.  
Natural trees, when brought into the home, always constitutes a seasonal fire hazard. From a fire safety viewpoint, metal trees are desirable because they are non-combustible. However, there is a potential danger of electric shock if lighting strings are used on these metal trees.  
Above all, plan your actions should a fire start, and remember to call the Fire Department at once.

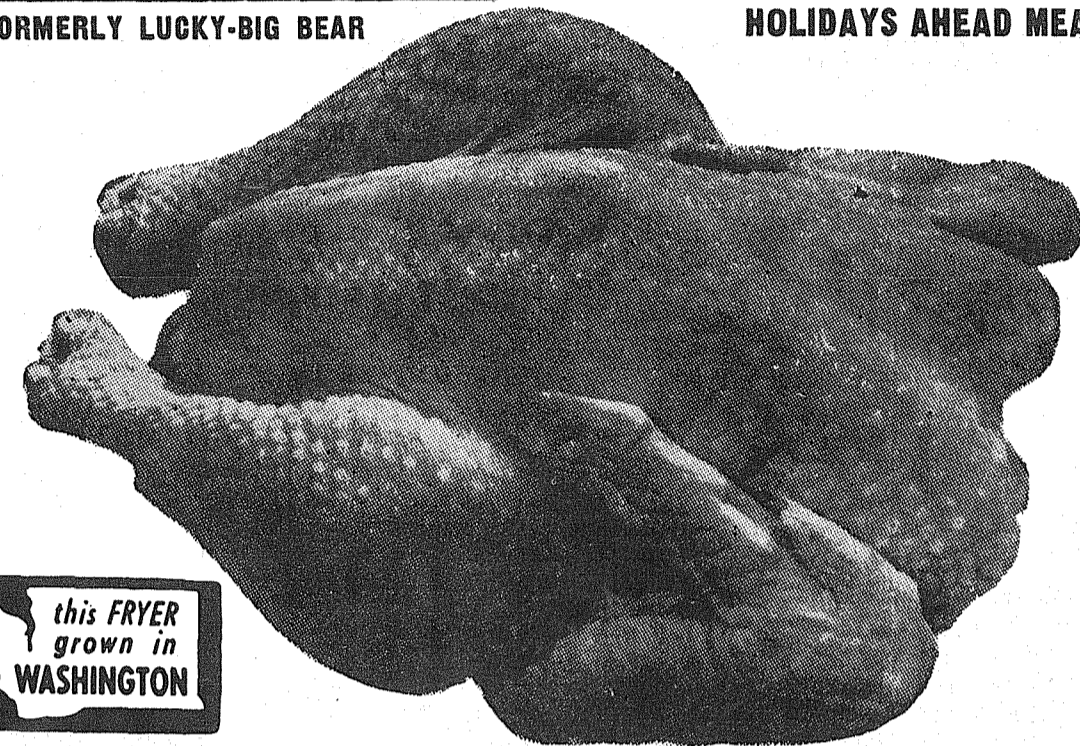



## Your Growing Garden

Harriet Kennedy

It was probably inevitable that some scientist would get around to doing a research project to find out if love could benefit plants. It did. Love neither smothers nor neglects. Over-watering house plants, over-feeding, fussing over them too much, is as harmful as neglecting their basic needs. If you have provided them with a good environment, regular care when needed, then step back and simply enjoy them.

With the holiday season coming up, house plants, can, with minimum care, add living beauty to festive decorations. Keep an ample size long spout watering can in a handy place. It only takes a few minutes daily to test the top of soil - under mulch - with your fingertips. If pots are small, or shallow, air is dry, more frequent waterings (not flooding) will be necessary than is needed for plants growing in deep planters or larger containers, or if there is more moisture in the air.

Plants will need food every 2 to 4 weeks depending on their size and the size of their containers, and whether or not you have attended to "pinching back" a bit of the new top growth to assure more fullness. This pinching back also keeps plants from becoming "leggy". Follow package directions EXACTLY as to amount to use dry, dilution and application recommended! You can mix your own plant food right in the watering can. For this you will need a bottle of liq-

uid whale or fish (again follow exact directions), a bottle of liquid seaweed and a package of natural minerals. The minerals will have a tendency to settle so they will need a simple stirring with, perhaps, a slender stick.

Unless you wish to save seeds, cut flowers back to the next leaf node as soon as they start to wilt. Occasionally a stray stem may sprout forth at an unattractive angle which you may wish to trim off. Every plant goes through some kind of dormancy so aged if you occasionally lose a plant. This can happen to even the best gardeners even though they may not admit it. Last in this list, but first in importance, is to always repot every plant you buy as soon as possible after it is brought home from the store. Commercial growers must use controlled methods to provide enough plants to satisfy market demands. These same conditions are not possible in a home. If a potting mix is also purchased at the same time, it must be examined to see what should be added to it - by you - to provide the right texture and nourishment. If you are not sure you have enough knowledge to do this, go ahead and experiment anyway -- be daring! Above all never underestimate your own instincts and intelligence. It has been written "perfect love casteth out fear," give your plants lots of love, do the best you can and don't worry, after all practice makes perfect.

# State Drivers Cut Fatalities For Third Month

Washington motorists, apparently sobered by the spiraling highway death toll in their state, have cut traffic deaths for the third consecutive month. State Patrol Chief Roy A. Betlach said today that November's 45 traffic deaths were 16 fewer than occurred in the same month last year. Chief Betlach said there were also 16 less highway deaths in October, and the September toll was down 13.

However, even with 45 fewer deaths during the past three months, the state's 1962 traffic toll is still 50 more than for the first 11 months of last year. At the end of November 560 persons had died in traffic accidents so far this year. Chief Betlach said only the continued efforts of safety conscious drivers during hazardous December could keep the state from recording one of its worst traffic years in history.

Six traffic deaths were recorded in Pierce County during November, bringing the number of highway deaths in the county to 42 for the first 11 months of this year.

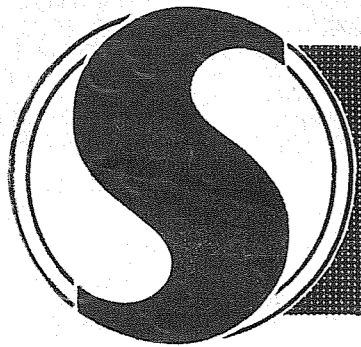
