Diagnostic Center Is For Evaluation Of Children

A "Diagnostic Center, consisting of three classrooms being built at Parkland Elementary School, will be used for evaluation of children who appear to be experiencing learning problems.

A proposal for the restructuring of the special services in the Franklin Pierce Elementary schools was submitted by Dr. Daniel Kelleher and Dr. T.D. Fromong, Special Education Consultants to the Franklin Pierce District.

In their report they showed that there appears to be three distinct types of pupils for which the district is currently supplying special education services. One type is a group of severely retarded individuals who for multiple reasons need an educational program which by its very nature serves to isolate them from regular classroom students.

There is another group of youngsters who for numerous educational and social reasons have failed to make adequate educational progress, despite the combined efforts of all the special services in the district. These students apparently represent the "hard core" of the district's special education population. The needs of these children are such that they will probably have to continue to be dealt with in an educational environment which is to some extent outside the mainstream of regular classroom experiences.

A third group of children, by far the most numerous, is a group who, for a variety of educational, social and emotional reasons either bring a typical learning problem to the

educative process, or who have developed non-functional roles in the regular classroom.

The goal of the special services program is to offer the best educational experience to individual pupils that the resources of the district can provide. It is felt by the two consultants that this is best accomplished through the system in regular age-grade groups, rather than creating off-shoots of the system for those who deviate.

At the diagnostic center the psychologist, speech therapist and nurse will evaluate a child. Then the psychologist with the Diagnostic-Assessment teacher will develop a program - teaching methods and materials to attack the difficulty. A child may remain in this room for perhaps one hour daily while the approach is being developed, re-

turning to his regular class for all other activities. The child care counsellors may assist in programmed materials and behavioral modifications that will further alleviate this problem. The Elementary Counsellor will function as liaison with the center and the classroom teacher, in the latter respect assisting the teacher with the developed methods and techniques from the center.

In the center the two remaining classrooms will respond to the needs of children whose educational/emotional assessment and restructuring is more complex.

The children will not know they are being evaluated. This will be done by the psychologist and other staff with the use of one-way mirrors from an observation corridor to the classroom.

According to studies already made on the effects of the addition, it would seem that virtually no flaws can be found. It almost eliminates rear-end accidents, does not stop the flow of traffic and allows the public to reach the businesses on opposite sides of the road.

The study will be conducted some time within the next two years and the report and recommendations will be presented to the next session of the legislature, Bottiger said.

A \$10,000 appropriation for the study was allocated during the last session of the legislature.

Spanaway

A flash vapor fire in a garage sent the Spanaway-Elk Plain Volunteer Fire Department to 1201 S. 137th on Thursday.

will conduct the survey, will comprise of Senate members Robert C. Bailey of South Bend; Lawrence J. Faulk of Tacoma; Sam C. Guess of Spokane; Elmer C. Huntley of Thornton; Richard G. Marquardt of Seattle; Lowell Peterson of Concrete; and Fred Redmon of Yakima and House member Paul H. Conner of Port Angeles.

When asked from where, to where to addition on Pacific would be made, Bottiger said that for all practical purposes it would have to be in stages as Pacific is now 48 feet wide and would have to be widened to 55 feet because each lane must be 11 feet wide. He added that they would fight to get it on the Highway Department's Priority Program and then they would fight to keep it priority.

In a letter to Charles C. Pahl, director of Washington State Highway Dept., Rep. Bottiger said: "... We must always keep in mind the effort of traffic control devices on the business property owners whose contribution to the support of State government would be adversely effected by traffic control devices that seriously damage their businesses. I can personally assure you that the vast majority of property owner along sign Route 7 strongly support the installation of the fifth lane two-way, left-hand turn lanes as a traffic control device. This traffic control device not only permits access to the property, provides a storage space for left-turning traffic, but provides a buffer between traffic driving in an opposite direction, and therefore seems to be to be a desirable method for solving an increasingly important problem to the users of the highways in this area."

A study conducted five years ago of two-way, left-hand turn lanes in the City of Seattle arrived at the following conclusions:

FP Administrator To Attend Seminar In Honolulu

I/D/E/A, the action oriented division of the Charles F. Kettering Foundation, has announced that Dr. Edward E. Hill, Franklin Pierce Superintendent, has been selected to participate in one of the three National Seminars on Innovation in Education, which will be held in Honolulu during the month of July.

Dr. Hill is one of 400 potential leaders in American education who has been selected from 15,000 school administrators.

I/D/E/A is an organization specifically planned to assist school administrators with plans for school improvement in order that more schools may keep abreast of a rapidly changing world.

The purposes of the program are to extend the scope of school administrators' knowledge about educational innovations, to offer administrators an opportunity to assess the effectiveness of cur-

rent innovations, to suggest strategy which administrators can adopt to expedite change, to fan the spark of inventiveness that is in each of us and to create a national network of school administrators interested in inventive changes.

Firemen Complete School

Three men of the Spanaway-Elk Plain Fire Department have completed four days of school at the State Conference of Fire Departments held in Tacoma last week.

Fire Departments from all over the State of Washington and from Montana, Idaho and Oregon attended the four day seminar.

Confusion Cleared On "Grace Period"

Letting your driver license expire will cost you some extra time and money after August 1, according to the Department of Motor Vehicles.

State laws were amended this year to provide that any person whose license has expired even one day past his birthday must take a re-examination and pay a \$2 exam fee. The new law will be strictly enforced after August 1, said Douglas Toms, motor vehicles director.

"The law was changed because it caused some confusion," Toms explained. "It caused people to think their expired driver licenses were valid during the so-called 'grace period' while actually they could have received a ticket for driving with an invalid license during that 60 days."

Formerly, persons whose licenses had expired had a 60-day "grace period" during which the re-examination and fee were waived.

"A. 2 WLHTL'S facilitate the movement of through traffic, provide access to adjacent businesses, may do extra service in emergency situations and are less expensive to install and maintain.

"B. Relative few accidents involve the use of "WLHTL'S and the beneficial effect on traffic flow and congestion may help to reduce accidents on the road as a whole."

The Seattle study also stated: "The Joint Committee is required to undertake a "traffic engineering study" of left-turn facilities with regard to efficiency, safety, and the effect of concrete dividers on commercial activities. (The Highways Department here somewhat favors the concrete dividers.)

The Safety Engineer for Pierce County appeared to the last Interim Committee on Highways and told that the county and city engineers had done a study which showed a marked reduction in rear-end accidents and that of all the rear-enders, only two in the city and one in the county were attributed to the extra lane. It was also said that two-thirds of the rear-enders were caused by someone taking a LEGAL left-hand turn. One other factor in favor of the extra middle lane would be the emergency vehicle access during heavily congested traffic.

Although this is only the beginning of the long road to winning, we here at the Times Journal feel that every place of business on Pacific Avenue should give this matter its utmost support.

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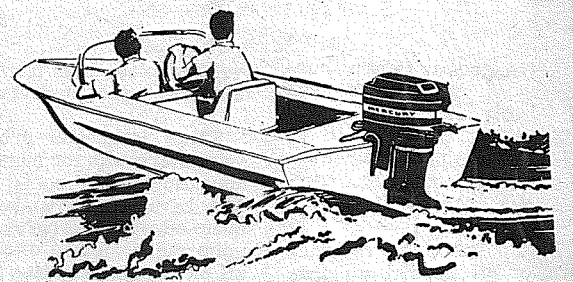
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Real Start To Roundup At Business Meet

Parents and sponsors are urged to attend and give the princesses as much moral support as possible.

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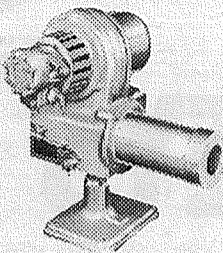
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New Decals For Farm Vehicles

New license decals for farm vehicles will be available at the Pierce County auditor's office starting July 17, the Department of Motor Vehicles reports.

The special decals were authorized by the 1967 legislature to permit farmers to move their work vehicles on public roadways from one field or farm to another without paying full license fees.

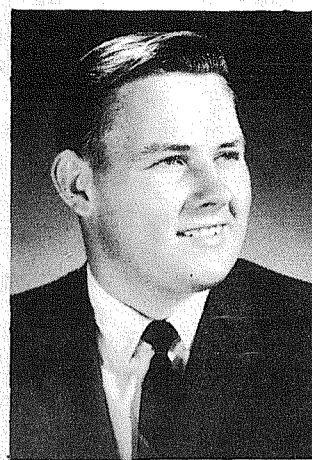
The black and white, two by six inch decals will cost \$5 and will be valid for the life of the vehicle, or until ownership of the vehicle is transferred.

Any truck, pickup or other vehicle used mainly on the farm in agricultural operations is eligible for the farm decal. However, such a vehicle must be "only incidentally operated or moved along public highways . . . within a radius of 15 miles of the farm where principally used or garaged."

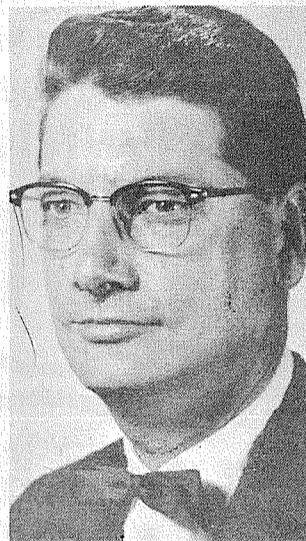
A 1966 graduate of Bethel High School, Pennington enlisted in the Navy on April 5.

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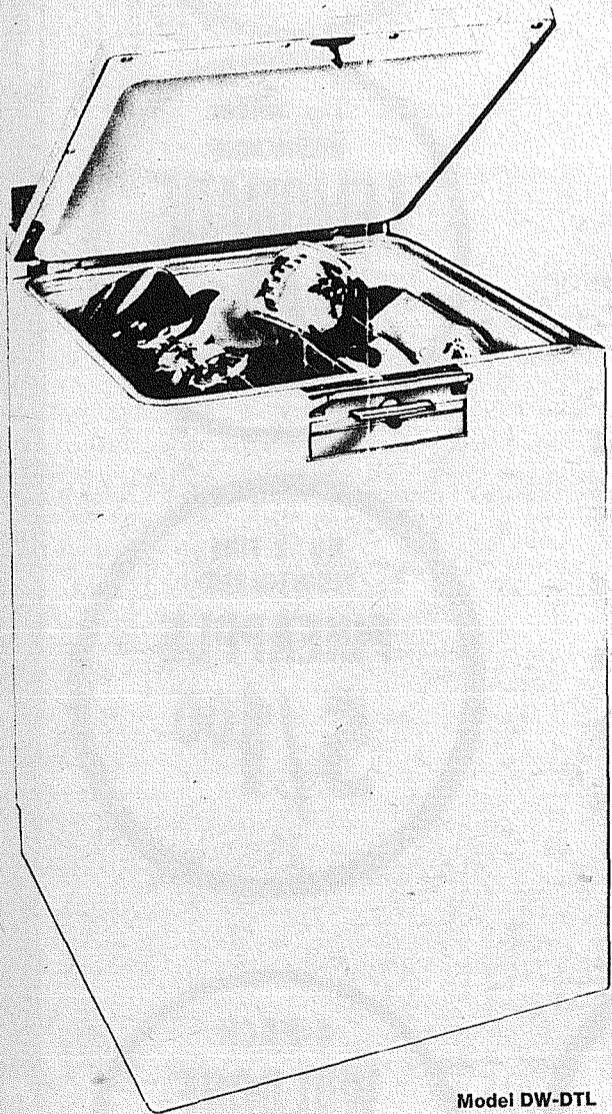
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Bethel School District Is Bigger In Square Miles

(Last week we ran the first of a two-part special feature on "Educational Costs" in our school district. Here is the second part.)

When reviewing the differences between the costs of the Franklin Pierce School District and the Bethel School District it is easy to see the differences.

Bethel School District, although a small district population wise, has a larger transportation cost, because it is bigger in area than its counterpart, Franklin Pierce.

Of the Bethel School District's 1966-67 \$2,124,557.38 budget, 1.18 per cent was spent on pupil services; 4.31 per cent is spent on operation of the food services; 9.78 per cent on pupil transportation; 7.82 per cent on operation of plant, including groundskeeping, custodial, heating, utilities, insurance and warehousing and distribution; maintenance of the plant takes another 3.14 per cent; community services, .008 per cent; payments to other districts for handicapped, educational TV and cooperative education services is 1.55 per cent; and non-warrant expenditures is another .08 per cent.

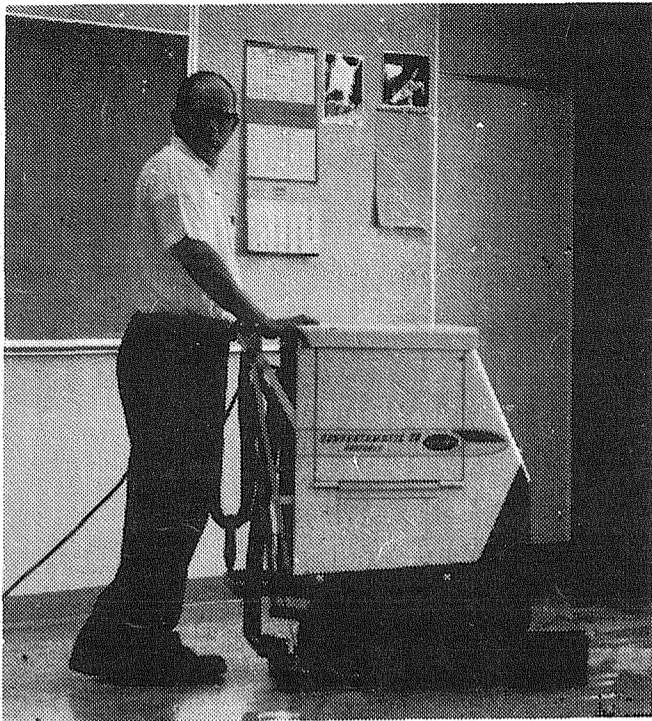
Bethel, a "Class 2" district, has to contract out some of their work, for instance, they do not have a complete handicapped program and consequently most of their children are sent to the facilities in Tacoma.

In \$ and ¢ the district paid \$53,304.19 for utilities, \$14,500 was spent on maintenance of the grounds and equipment; and transportation costs amounted to \$56,302.93.

The preliminary budget for the 1967 - 68 school year estimates that the district's funds will be supplied as follows:

Local Taxes, 13.27 per cent; county administered funds, 2.62 per cent; state funds, 71.3 per cent; federal funds, 8.09 per cent; local non-tax revenue receipts, .18 per cent; local non-revenue receipts, 3.77 per cent; federal non-revenue receipts, .67 per cent; and transfers and payments from other districts, .11 per cent.

Building projects underway, or proposed for the Bethel School District are a 10-room elementary in the North Bethel area, an 8-room intermediate school on a 30-acre Spanaway site (at 159th) and a three room edition to Spanaway elementary school, which is scheduled for opening in September of 1968.

Bethel Announces 45 Children In Head Start

The Bethel School District's summer Head Start program, which got underway June 12th, is taking care of 45 pre-schoolers this year. The classes, three of them, are being held again this year at Elk Plain Elementary.

"The goals in Head Start are oriented toward preparing the child for school physically, socially and psychologically," said C.R. McAvoy, project director. "We here at the center attempt to aid the child in bridging the gap and making the adjustment from home to school. Group activities, storytime, eating together, visiting the zoo at Point Defiance, or even such simple things as sharing a teeter-totter, all help give the child a sense of belonging to the group," he added.

Building self image and finding one's own identity among what is at first a group of strangers is considered of great value to the Head Starters by the staff.

One of the big advantages of Head Start is the small classroom size, with a certified teacher, one paid aide, and often a volunteer, for each class. The number of students per adult is relatively small and allows for more individualized attention than is normal

during the regular school year.

Coordinated through the project nurse, the children are given medical and dental examinations and treatment. The program also includes a hot lunch, snack time and a field trip each week.

Eighty per cent of the costs of the Head Start Program is funded by the Federal government through the Tacoma-Pierce County Opportunity and Development, Inc. The remaining twenty per cent of the project's cost is assumed by the district as their share in the program.

Bethel's Head Start, being operated separately from the rest of Pierce County and Tacoma, and starting early in June, was host to 75 prospective Head Start teachers from all parts of Western Washington. The trainees were attending an orientation - training workshop at Pacific Lutheran University under the direction of Dr. Kenneth Johnston, Director of the School of Education.

All of these activities, along with adult guidance and supervision give the child just what the title of the project implies a "head start" for school.

Bethel Board Approves Agenda

Bethel School District Board of Directors met in regular session last week to face a large agenda.

Approvals and recommendations during the meeting are as follows:

The board approved retaining McLean, Inc. for the sale of bonds in the amount of \$36,000.00 and set July 18th as a special meeting for approval of the necessary resolutions. Mr. Sam Granberg represented McLean, Inc. and made the proposal.

(The 1966-67 enrollment was 3,700).

Elk Plain; Mrs. Shirley Pierson, home economics at the high school; Donald L. Crouch, woodshop at the high school; and Miss Susan King, fifth grade at Spanaway Elementary. Mrs. Jan Anne Boyd will teach third grade at Clover Creek School.

A proposal for the early entrance of both kindergarten and first grade was approved. This allows for students whose birth date falls between September 10th and October 30th to enroll, provided tests and conferences of the parents, school psychologist, and principal indicate that it would be beneficial for the child.

Other personnel for the 1967-68 school year included the appointments of Mrs. Clarice Garner as secretary at Clover Creek School; Mrs. Dorothy Lindbo, voucher clerk in administration; Gordon Before, assistant custodian at Spanaway School; and Guy Perry, assistant mechanic at the bus garage.

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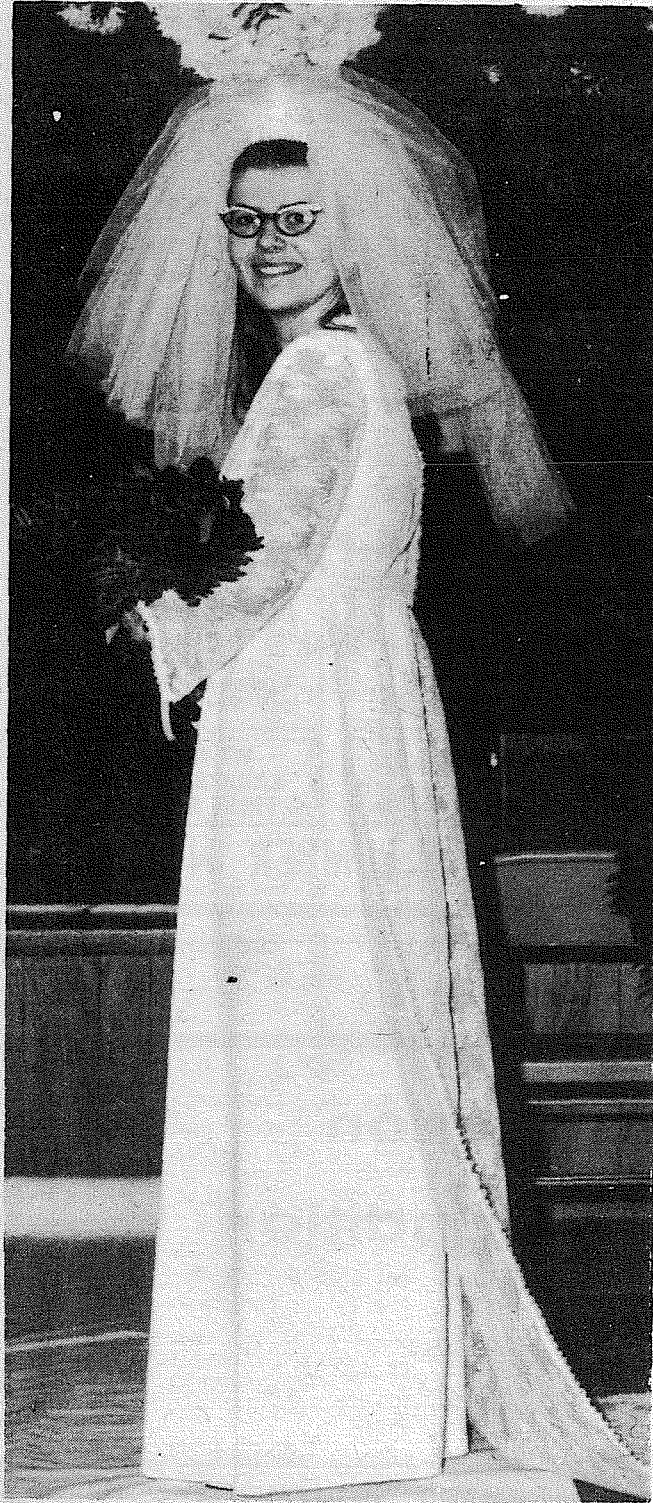
