## Qualified Voters Have Til Feb. 9 To Sign Up

Voters have until February 9 to be sure they are registered to vote in the upcoming school levy elections for both Franklin Pierce and Bethel School Districts.

## County Schools ShareTold

Resident requirements for otherwise qualified voters are state residence for one year, 60 days in the County and one day in the precinct.

Bethel District voters will decide three measures: A \$140,000 bond issue for a high school addition; a \$15,000 special kindergarten levy and a \$65,000 special maintenance and operation levy.

Franklin Pierce's election will be concerned with the following issues: \$350,000 in bonds for a building fund for elementary schools; \$148,000 for general maintenance and operation; \$44,000 for additional school buses; \$29,600 for maintaining and operating kindergartens for the coming school year.

The total mileage for Franklin Pierce is 15 mills a reduction of five mills from last year's levy, which was passed by the voters.

Clover Park School District #400 received the largest single allocation of \$2,951,244.

Individual allocations included \$122,922 for Franklin Pierce School District #402; \$10,733 for Eatonville School District #404; and \$55,814 for Bethel School District #403, Spanaway.

Allocations for school construction under Public Law 815, covering the period Fiscal Year 1951-1961 called for \$536,560 for Franklin Pierce School District; \$28,281 for Eatonville and \$489,633 for Bethel.

For passage each item on the ballot must receive a vote equal to 40% of the total cast at the last general election and must receive 60% yes votes of the total number cast at the special election.

## PLU Library Granted \$500

The Pacific Lutheran University library has been awarded a grant of \$500 by the Association of College and Research Libraries, a division of the American Library Association, it was announced yesterday by the ACRL grants committee.

The grant made to the PLU library was one of 78 selected from among 348 applications.

Initiated in 1955, the ACRL grants program is designed for improving the quality of library service to higher education through fundamental research in librarianship and otherwise aiding in the best use of the most modern teaching and learning materials.

Frank H. Haley, PLU librarian, stated that the grant will be used to purchase and subscribe to journals in chemistry. These will include: Journal of Inorganic and Nuclear Chemistry, Vol. 1 to date; Quarterly Reviews Vols. 1-13; Helvetica Chimica Acta, 1940-60; Canadian Journal of Chemistry, 1940 to date. These are in addition to several U. S. and foreign chemical journals which the library has available.


The one memory that I would like to erase is the fact that, try as I might, I never advanced beyond the Tenderfoot rank.



### Navy Officer Cadet Slots Are Opened

A 50 per cent increase in openings for Naval Aviation officer training has been announced by the Navy. Authorization to select the increased number of officer candidates extends through March 1962.

To qualify as a Naval Aviation Cadet (NAV-CAD), applicants must have completed two years of college. A bachelor's degree is required for selection as an Aviation Officer Candidate (AOC). Both NAV-CAD's and AOC's pursue an 18 months training course toward designation as a Naval Aviator. AOC's become commissioned officers upon completing 4 months pre-flight training. NAV-CAD's are commissioned when they complete flight training.

Another AOC program trains candidates for designation as Naval Aviation Observers and as Aviation Ground Officers. Applicants with less than 20/20 uncorrected vision can qualify provided their visual defect does not exceed certain limits and can be corrected with glasses.

AOC's are encouraged to submit application 12 months before graduation, and NAV-CAD's may apply six months before they complete two years of college.

### Legislation Would Help Industries

Two depressed United States industries, lumbering and intercoastal shipping, would be helped by legislation introduced by Western Senators led by Senators Warren G. Magnuson and Henry M. Jackson, both D., Wash.

The legislation (S. 2737) would equalize shipping rates for American lumber with those of Canada by granting a subsidy to the hard-hit intercoastal carriers. Both industries, Magnuson explained, have lost ground because of foreign competition. With Canadian lumber capturing more of the Eastern market, the intercoastal shipping industry has lost ground simultaneously because the competing Canadian product has been carried in foreign ships. Seriousness of the situation is shown by the fact that Canadian lumber now holds almost 69 per cent of the Eastern Market, compared to only 7 per cent "only a few years ago," Magnuson declared.

Magnuson said the subsidy to intercoastal carriers, provided in the Magnuson-Jackson measure, would be payable when the Secretary of Commerce determines after hearings, that an American industry is losing a substantial part of its business to a foreign competitor because of the Jones Act requirements. The Jones Act specifies that trade between U. S. ports must be carried on American-flag vessels. This causes domestic lumber producers to pay higher American rates.

Joining Magnuson and Jackson in sponsorship of the measure were Senators Wayne Morse, D., Oregon; Maurine Neuberger, D., Oregon.

Your telephone number graphical boundaries are yours alone! No one else accepted for Eastern and in the state or the nation Western Washington. East has the same phone number as you!

This individuality of telephone numbers is accomplished by the "Area Code" plan now in use throughout the United States and Canada.

According to Pacific Northwest Bell manager David L. Williams, plans already drawn to include the entire world in the "Area Code" system.

When Direct Distance Dialing was developed a few years ago, it became apparent that numbers could not be duplicated, and not enough unduplicated combinations were available even for the U. S.

He explained. The maximum number of individual telephone numbers possible at that time was about 8-million combinations -- less than the number of new telephones added to service throughout the world last year.

Division of the United States and Canada into more than 100 code areas -- each having a three-digit number -- enabled DDD planners to multiply the 8-million existing seven-digit combinations by 100, or roughly some 800-million individual ten-digit numbers in the United States and Canada.

**It's The Law**

Vera owned a late model car with power brakes and electric windows. Though she had owned the car for months, she had never discovered that the power brakes worked only when

the motor of the car was running. One day when the car's battery was low and would not start the motor, she started coasting the car down a steep hill to start the motor.

Before the motor started the car came to an intersection with an arterial street. Vera put on the brakes but discovered she had no brakes.

Her car ran through the stop sign and hit a car on the arterial street, causing damage to the car and injuries to the driver. When Vera was sued, she denied liability, contending she was involved in an unavoidable accident since she had not known that the car's brakes would not work unless the car's motor was running.

Do you think she can avoid liability for the damage done by her car because she did not know of the unusual defect in the brakes on that model car? The court said she was liable for damage done by her car, even if she hadn't known the brakes wouldn't work unless the car was running. The court held that a car is a "dangerous instrumentality," and it is the duty of the driver to know of any defect which makes it unsafe to operate under certain conditions.

Since she had a duty to know that the car couldn't be coasted safely with the motor not running, she was negligent in failing to know that fact and her negligence caused the accident. She was required to pay for the damage inflicted by her automobile.

**Good Beef Needs Careful Plan**

You know, it's a pretty hard job to keep up with the demands of beef cows and bulls that will produce calves which will gain efficiently on what we say a minimum amount of feed so that it's more economical for him. He then can cut his herd or he can make more money from the calves he has. He also is going to put out a product that is more desirable to the consumer (to me this is quite important at the present time)--he's going to put out meaty fast-growing young animals that will have what we call a minimum amount of fat to make the grade, and still these young animals will be desirable and will be bought more readily by the housewife.

How about the housewife and the consumer. . . how does all this effect the pocketbook of the consumers and also the quality of products that they purchase?

If we have more beef being produced more economically by the rancher, then he in turn is going to get a pretty good price for this. He is going to make some money, he's going to stay in the beef-cattle industry, and there's going to be more beef available of a desirable quality for the consumers.

Ordinarily we have what is called a type-score of the individual because it is related to our federal grading of choice, good, etc., from the standpoint of carcass grades. Then we have the records and how much feed it takes these cattle to put the gains on.

Then if we get carcass records on some of the young animals from the progeny tests, we also have an indication of the quality of animal that is being produced. In other words, the amount of meat in the particular carcass that is being produced.

In what way do the cattlemen benefit from using the testing program-- either type that we have mentioned? First of all, of course, he finds the animals within his own herd that are going



**Goodwin Chase Named Advisor For Committee**

James J. Saxon, Comptroller of the Currency, Washington, D. C., today named Goodwin Chase, chairman of the board and president of National Bank of Washington, Tacoma, to his advisory committee. This committee will assist the Comptroller in the conduct of a broad survey of the functioning of the national banking system, and will cover in its inquiry all existing applicable law, regulation, interpretive opinion policy and procedure. The purpose will be to determine necessary modification in order to enable the commercial banking system to perform effectively its proper role in meeting the growing and changing needs of the nation's economy.

The study will determine steps which might properly be taken through administrative action and those steps which may require the submission of legislative proposals to the Congress of the United States.

The chief executive officers of national banks will be called upon to submit any proposal for changes which they believe, through their broad experience, are needed.

The Comptroller of the Currency is the supervisory authority of national banks in the United States.
