## Eleven Times Around World: Bethel Buses To Make Total of 284,500 Miles

The Bethel School District Bus Fleet, comprised of 26 school buses, will serve 81 single bus runs each day transporting nearly 3000 students to school. According to Francis Olson, assistant superintendent, the buses will cover 1,580 miles each day in serving the Bethel district patrons for a total of 284,500 miles this year.

Maintaining this king-sized operation are two full time mechanics and a helper. Head Mechanic for the fleet is Lloyd Burdick who is assisted by Micky Otto in maintaining the vast operation. Bill Landgrebe assists the mechanics on a part time basis.

Last week three Bethel School Board members, Mrs. Oscar Berrgren, Mrs. Donald Connelly and Mr. Robert Westerman, inspected the fleet in preparation for the opening of schools on September 4th. A meeting was held last night (Wednesday) in which the mechanics, School Board, school district administrators, and bus drivers went over the transportation plans for the year.

Newest addition to the fleet is a 73-passenger diesel bus that was purchased this summer to replace a 58-passenger, 1946 bus. The diesel is the first of its kind for the Bethel District and the school officials are planning to carefully watch the operation of this bus to determine any possible savings that might be derived from its operation over the standard gasoline burning buses.

One additional bus will operate this year to relieve crowded conditions on the Spanaway-Clover Creek Junior and Senior High School run. The bus will begin its run at 146th & Pacific and travel straight down Pacific to the Roy-Y, thence down the Mountain Highway to the two schools. It is hoped that this bus will be able to handle all student passengers on the main highway to cut down the operation of too many buses on these crowded arterials.

One other change will be made in the Bethel District bus runs this year, due to construction work on East 176th. Students who have caught their bus on 176th are asked to walk to the nearest listed bus stop to catch their bus during construction time on 176th. Bus stops will be: 172nd & Y street, 176th & Spanaway, 168th & Denny Street, and 176th & East B.

All other bus runs and schedules for the Bethel buses will be the same as last year. Some changes may be affected later on this year if the changes are needed to maintain peak operation of the Bethel bus fleet.

A full-school day of classes will be held opening day, September 4th, for all schools in the Bethel District. Students in the Special Education Class will be notified about plans for them before school opening. The only change in school schedules will be at Roy, where the kindergarten class will be held in the afternoon.

**Logger Shapes Clay In Persuing Hobby**

Stan Langtwait, whose way of life for the past 20 years has been tuned to the thunderous overtones of whining saws, falling trees and the throaty roar of logging trucks, has perfected the art of pottery making for a hobby of quiet contrast.

"Shapes of Clay", Stan's name for his small pottery operation at his home near Graham, produces some rare and beautiful samples, the result of five years of working towards perfecting the firing processes.

All original and with no two alike, Stan shapes the natural, unrefined clays from deposits found near the Nisqually glacier with commercial pottery clay to create unusual figurines, bowls, pitchers and vases. Glazed on the inside, the pieces retain a natural texture on the outside, with the striking color patterns the result of foreign matter in the clays, and their varying degrees of hardness.

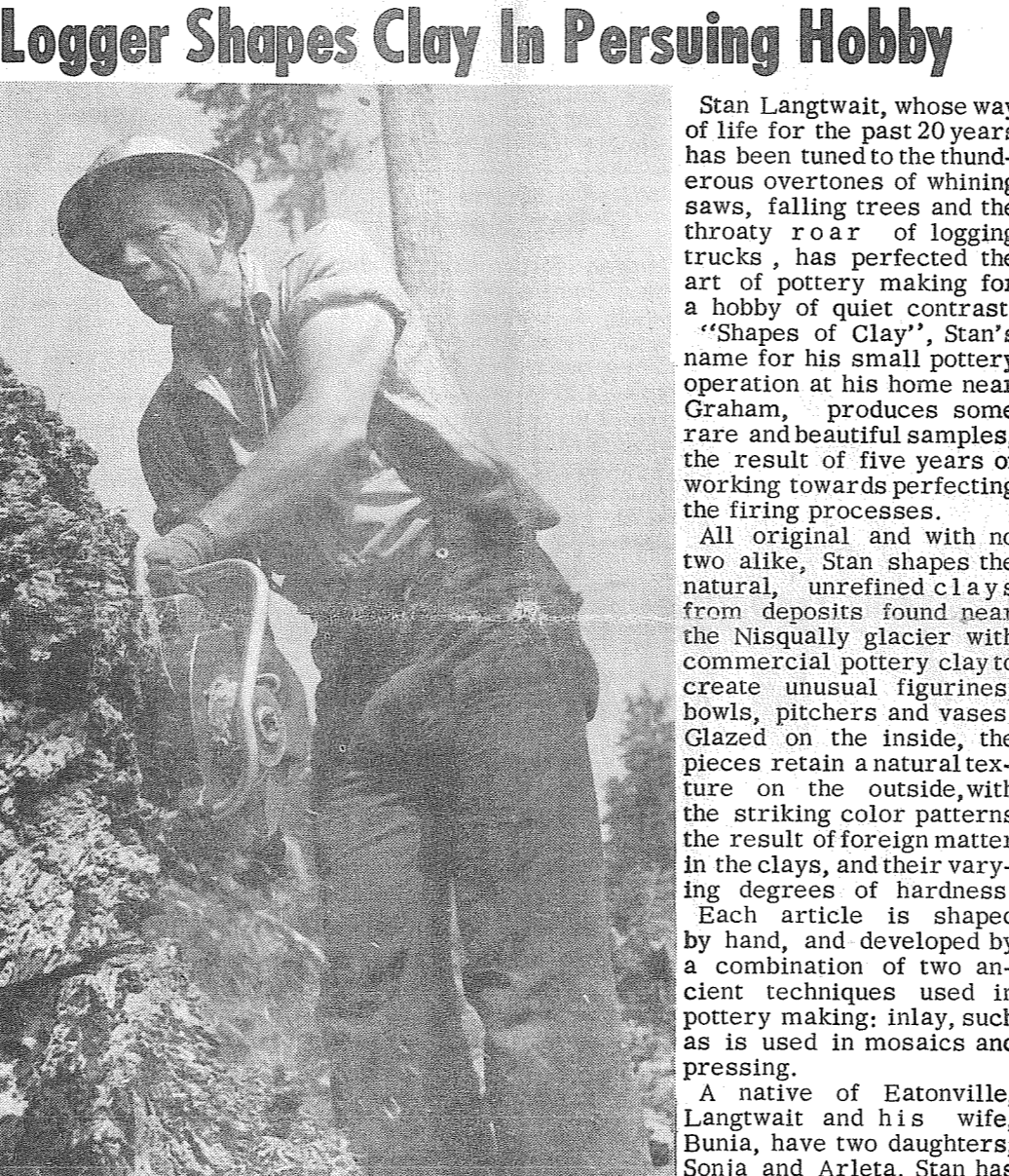
Each article is shaped by hand, and developed by a combination of two ancient techniques used in pottery making: inlay, such as is used in mosaics and pressing.

A native of Eatonville, Langtwait and his wife, Bunia, have two daughters, Sonja and Arleta. Stan has been an employee of Weyerhaeuser for all of his logging career.

**Millage Approval Would Give \$300,000 For Renovation of Spanaway Park**

Some \$300,000 will be spent to renovate Spanaway Park if the special millage in the election Sept. 11 is approved.

The Pierce County Commissioners list replacing ancient toilet buildings, fixing park roads and improving beaches, bathhouses and water systems as some of the things which need desperately to be done if Spanaway Park is to carry the load of people which visit it each year.

Last summer, 350,000 visits were made to the park and the demand continues to grow.

Also, on the schedule if the millage is passed, are improvements for athletic facilities in Spanaway Park which are sorely needed in this area of the County. These plans for recreational development are part of the over-all work envisioned by the Commissioners. They will be made possible by the million dollars raised if the special levy is met, \$19,500 res. 508 So. 144th; The levy is for one year only, the Commissioners stressed, and will be for approximately 3.5 mills.

Bob Howard lobbied in an extra base hit for the Old Timers, who recorded four hits for the nine-inning contest, with Spanaway getting eight.

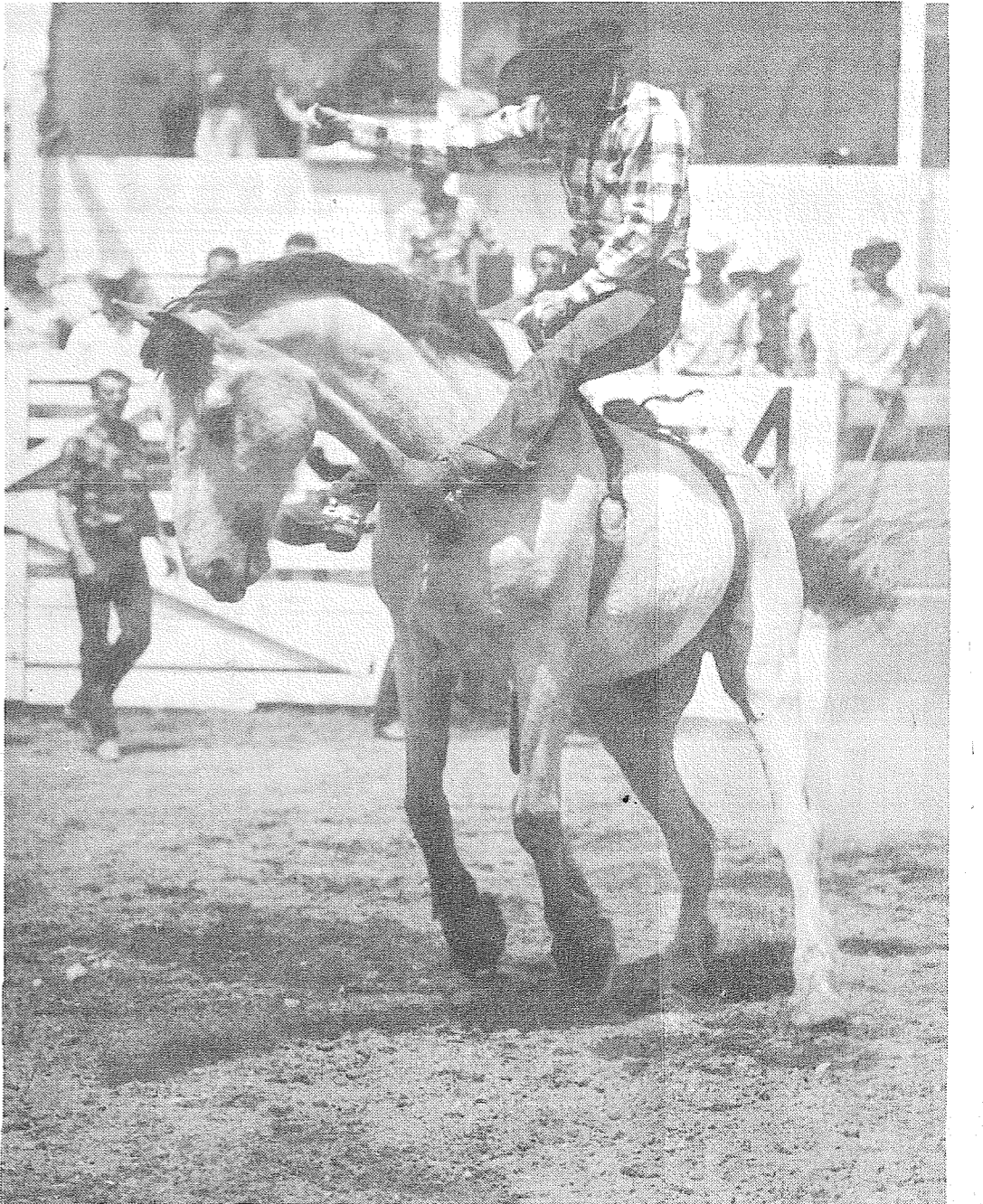

**a - Wondering and a - Wandering ....**  
with Jack Brown

It is commonly believed that wage increases are good, for the reason that they increase purchasing power.

But this idea, as John Davenport of Fortune magazine observed in a recent speech, is an economic illusion, which arises from a failure to distinguish between wage rates and total payrolls. In his words, "For instance, if a firm is employing 20 men at \$2 an hour, but would employ 25 men at \$1.90 an hour, payrolls would advance even though wage rates fell."

"Per contra, if a firm is employing men at \$2 per hour and wages rise to \$2.25, it may be forced to cut back employees to only 15 men. "In this case, purchasing power has actually dropped even though wages have advanced. The wage rate is only part of the equation. "What makes up purchasing power is payrolls." And, you can bet your last sou, if wage rates are forced up to levels that weaken a business ability to compete in the market place, and thus causes a loss of business, payrolls and purchasing power have no way to go except down.

Too often the citizen, preoccupied with making a living, does not take time to inform himself about his government. Yet history teaches that democracy survives only as long as we the people take an active part in the making of governmental decisions.

One-third of the average Joe Blow's income goes to pay various kinds of taxes. That makes government our biggest cost. Businessmen who spend many sleepless nights trying to figure how to cut unit production costs by a fraction of a cent, or reduce overhead by a few dollars are prone to ignore one of their greatest single cost factors—taxation.

Husbands and wives perspire and argue over family budgets but are unwilling to pay any attention to one item—government—which is now costing them more than food, clothing and medical care, on an average according to the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey of New York.

Once started on the path of growth, many government agencies are like Topsy—they just grow whether there is any reason or not.

Citizen interest in government is sorely needed now and I do mean—now! Without a sound economy, and that means government on a solid financial base, we will pay one heck of a price.
