


Eleven Times Around World: Bethel Buses To Make Total of 284,500 Miles

The Bethel School District Bus Fleet, comprised of **Bi-Partisan Rally** 26 school buses, will serve

Bus Fleet, comprised of **Dr-I Grinschi Kony** 26 school buses, will serve 81 single bus runs each day transporting nearly 3000 students to school. Accord-ing to Francis Olson, as-sistant superintendent, the buses will cover 1,580 miles each day in serving the Bethel district patrons for a total of 284,500 miles this year. Maintaining this king-sized operation are two full time mechanics and ahelp-er. Head Mechanic for the fleet is Lloyd Burdick who is assisted by Micky Otto in maintaining the vast operation. A meeting was held last night (Wednesday) in which the mechanics, School Board, school district ad-ministrators, and bus driv-ers went over the trans-poration plans for the year. Newest addition to the fleet is a 73-passenger die-sel bus that wæ purchased this summer to replace a S8-passenger, 1946 bus. 
