Watterson, 18, of 11807 Vickery Road, Monday afternoon. Both cars were total wrecks. The accident, occurring on Portland Ave. near E. 87th, was quickly attended to by the Midland firemen, who aided the State Patrol in blocking off the accident scene and helping the injured parties. Miss Eldridge and Paula Robison, 16, of 1212 E. 85th, a passenger in the Watterson's car, were both taken to St. Joseph's hospital. Miss Eldridge suffered a broken leg, while the others sustained head injuries. State Patrolman Richard Jelsing was investigating officer.

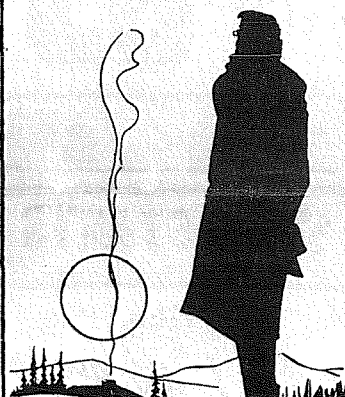

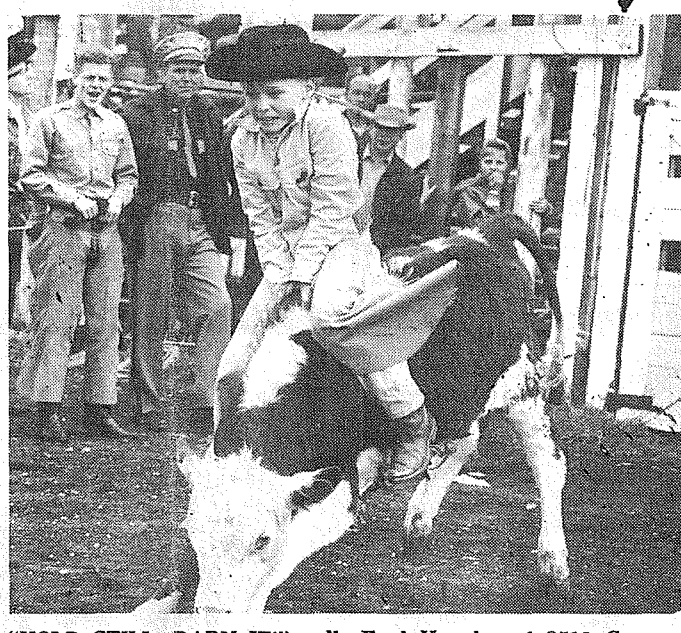

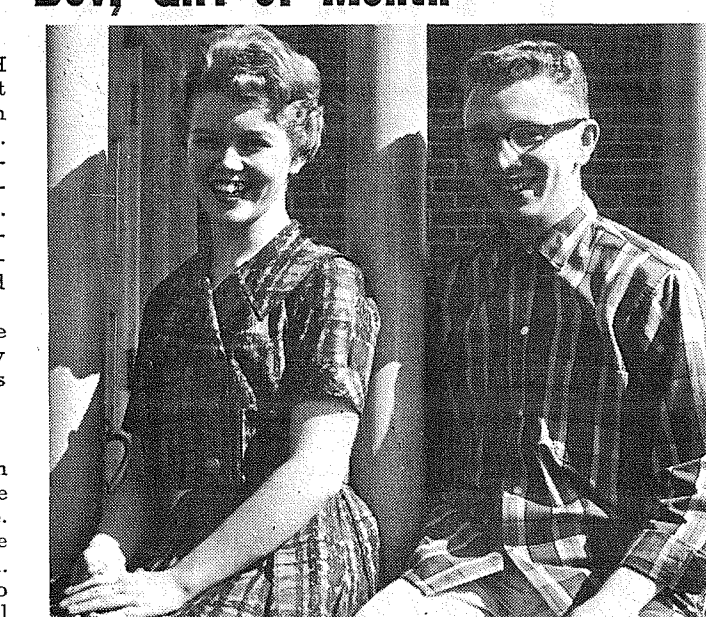

1910 Invoice Shows Interesting Change

Curiosity on the part of Bob Bartley, 1013 South 112th, recently brought some interesting figures to light. While rum-

aging through some effects of his mother, Mrs. A. Deforest of Raymond, Bob came up with an invoice from the Commercial Importing Co., Inc. dated Oct. 6, 1910. The invoice listed the following items F.O.B. Seattle: 10 lbs. coffee at 24c, \$2.40; 2 lbs. G.P. tea at 53c, \$1.06; 1 lb. pepper, 35c; 25 lbs. rice at 5 1/2c \$1.37; 10 lbs. tapioca at 6c, 60c; 1 bottle lemon extract, 75c; and one bottle vanilla 75c making a grand total of \$7.28.

Wondering what fifty years had done to the cost of goods. Bob wrote the company, hoping they might still be in business, and asked for today's prices on the same items. Three days later he had an answer back. He found it interesting enough to call this newspaper, and we in turn think it would interest you.

The letter is as follows: **ROYAL CORONA COFFEE CO.** March 17, 1961

Mr. Robert E. Bartley 1013 So. 112th Street Tacoma 44, Washington Dear Mr. Bartley:

It was very interesting to receive your March 13th note including prices on coffee and other food products on invoices dated back to 1910.

Commercial Importing Company now operates under the name of Royal Corona Coffee Company—a division of Continental Coffee Company.

Some of the items you listed are no longer handled by the company. Prices of those that we do still handle are:

10 lbs. of coffee at 74 1/2c, \$7.45; 2 lbs. OP Tea at 95c, \$1.90; 1 lb. Black Pepper, \$1.12; 1 quart Lemon Extract, \$1.85; 1 quart Pure Vanilla Extract, \$3.65; Total \$15.97.

Although 1910 is long before I was born, from what I can learn of earning power of the working man in that era it would take considerably longer in 1910 to earn the price of a pound of coffee than it does today. This, possibly, might indicate that most of us wouldn't be too happy living in what is often called "The Good Old Days."

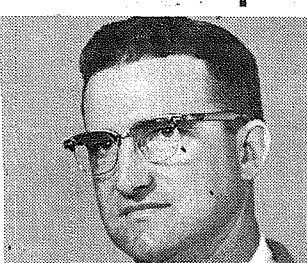

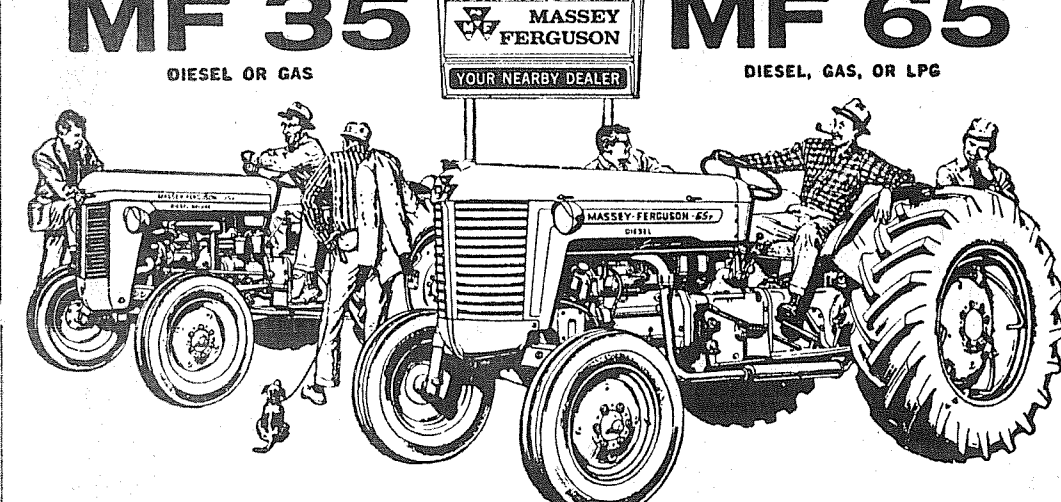

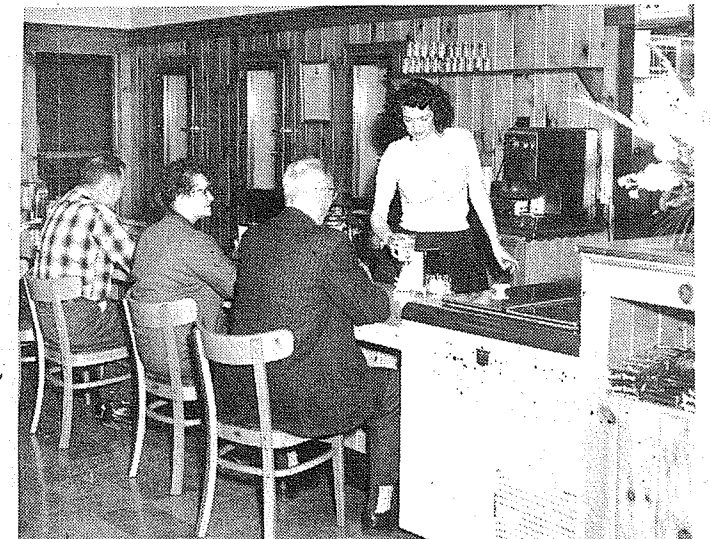
