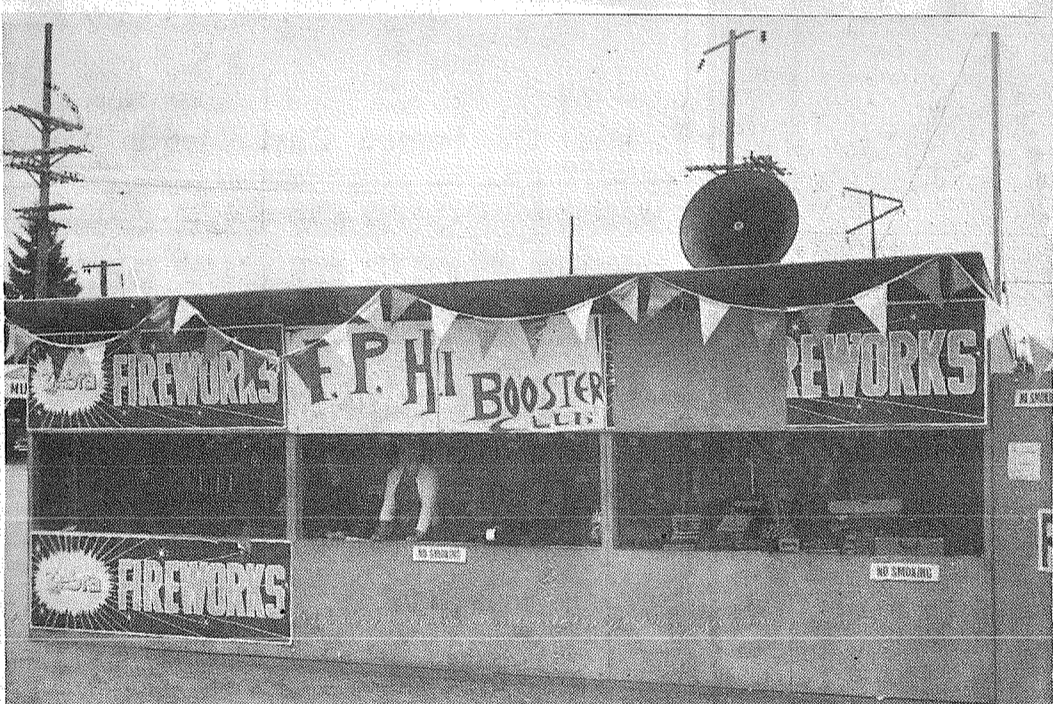

## County Kids Must Have Physicals

Parents of the Franklin Pierce Schools are reminded by Superintendent Edwin L. Nelson to arrange immediately for school physical examinations. Students who will be in grades 1, 7 or 10 in the fall should make arrangements now for a physical examination since this is required for school entrance, especially for those who will be engaging in Physical Ed. Programs.

An exam completed within three months prior to entrance in these grades will be acceptable.

Doctors in the area report an inability to take all requests for physicals as the opening of school approaches. They advise June and July as the best dates for these appointments. Boys competing in football, however, must present evidence of a complete physical taken within 30 days of the first turnout.

New students may obtain physical exam blanks at the district school office or by calling LE 7-0211.

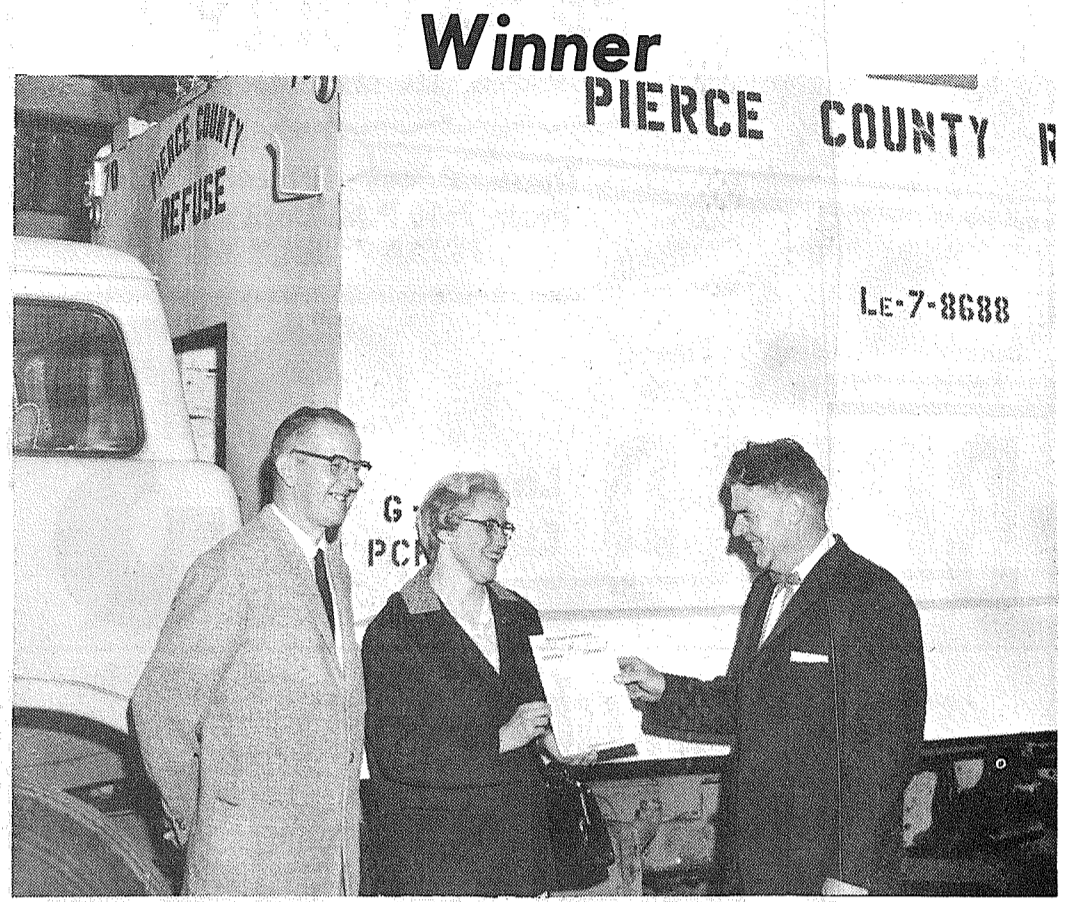

## Zip Code To Speed Mail Handling

The post office institutes this week a new system of mail dispatch to speed and improve mail delivery. The system is called Zip Code and the post office stresses the importance of using it on all correspondence and in the return addresses.

Postmaster A. G. Thorsen of Graham explained that the zip code is comprised of a post office area number plus a zone number. In Tacoma the post office area number is 984, thus a Parkland resident would use the number 98444 on his return address. In Graham the area number is 983 so an address would read, Graham, Washington, 98338.

The new Zip Code plan will permit the post office to short-cut repeated address reading. Each address formerly had to be read as much as eight or 10 times by postal employees before it reached its proper destination. With Zip Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined. The new method is expected to cut up to twenty-four hours off the time between deposit and delivery.

Thorsen described the new Zip Code as the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence.

Mail patrons should contact their local postmaster to learn the Zip Code number for their area.

**Boaters To Report Any Accidents**

Seattle, June 19 — The Coast Guard reminded boat owners today that most boating accidents must be reported.

Washington State boat owners are required by law to report accidents resulting in death or injury to any person or property damage in excess of \$100.

If loss of life results from the accident, a report must be made within 48 hours. All other accidents must be reported within five days.

This requirement to submit boating accident reports applies to all motorboats, including all larger vessels which are used for pleasure and recreational purposes only.

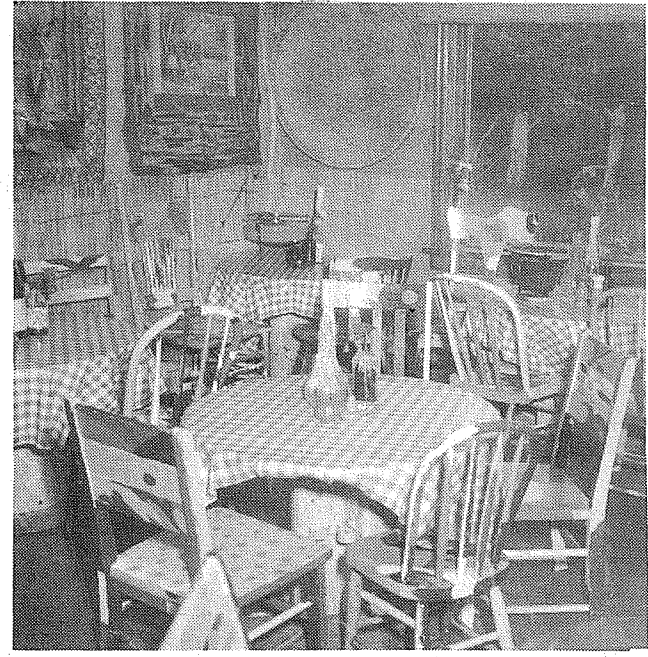

I took off in the morning for Port Angeles to pick up my number three son in one of the company flivvers. A hundred and twenty-five miles and two toll bridges later I picked him up and headed back. Total toll: \$3.80. Gas used: nearly a full tank. Another three or four bucks. Time spent: Nearly a whole day. A scenic drive: Nuts! I can see more beautiful scenery from an airplane in a half hour than I can in a day on the ground in a car. A safer ride: Nuts again! I'm 12 times safer in the air. Time spent: A day against a normal hour and a half round trip.  
The next time I have a day to waste I'll do it fishing or something. Not driving!

It would seem that somewhere on Capital Hill the seeds of common sense have started to sprout. As you well know the government has been laying out a wad of loot each year on the rental of storage space, or for the building of new. In fact the figures have been staggering. Now, under the leadership of Bernard Boutin, administrator of General Services Admin., steps are being taken to remodel existing government buildings to be used for storage instead of looking up a buddy and having him build a new building to rent to Uncle on a long term lease or to sell. The results are showing up in savings in our pockets.  
When G-S-A needed space in Seattle for a record center, it utilized a portion of the Sandpoint Naval Air Station. Ordinarily the cost, new, for such a record center would have been "six or seven million dollars", Boutin said. "However, by converting a small existing building, the entire project was accomplished for \$20,000 and the new record center is a beauty," Boutin related.  
"It will take care of our needs for many years," he added.

Space at the Auburn Depot has also been put to use reflecting another savings.  
And so a tip of the old sombrero to Boutin.

In fact, while I think of it, let me say that I do feel that common sense will soon prevail thruout our government. For this one reason, and one reason alone. Americans are starting to wake up and let their thoughts be known. Mail directed at our elected officials is growing by leaps and bounds. So, sound off, often, firm and loud and I may find myself tipping the hat in this column more and more. Believe me . . . I certainly hope so.

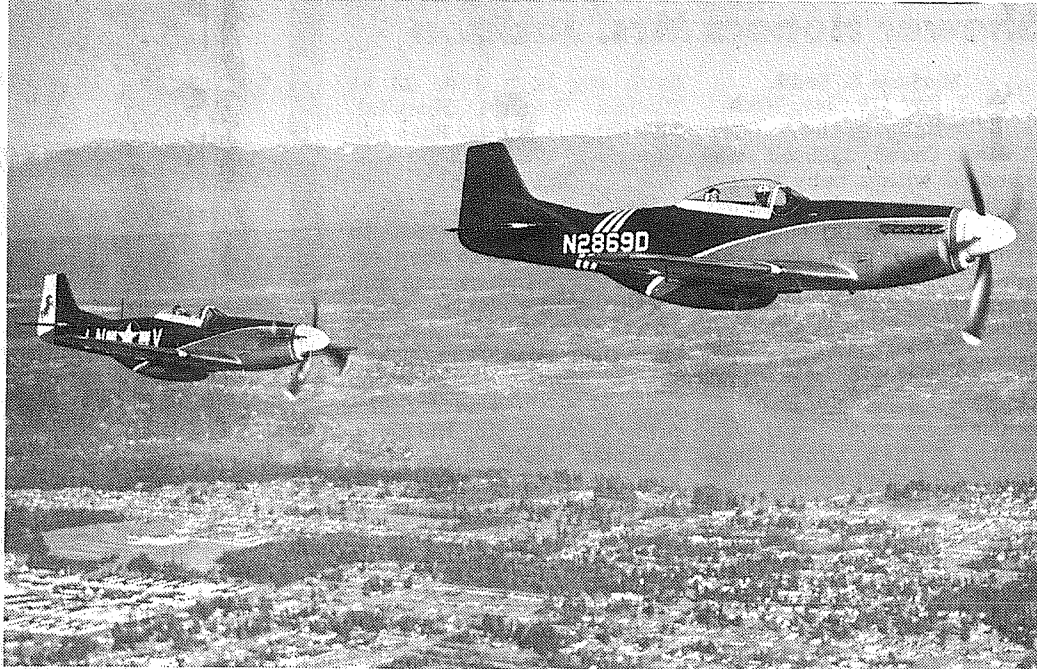

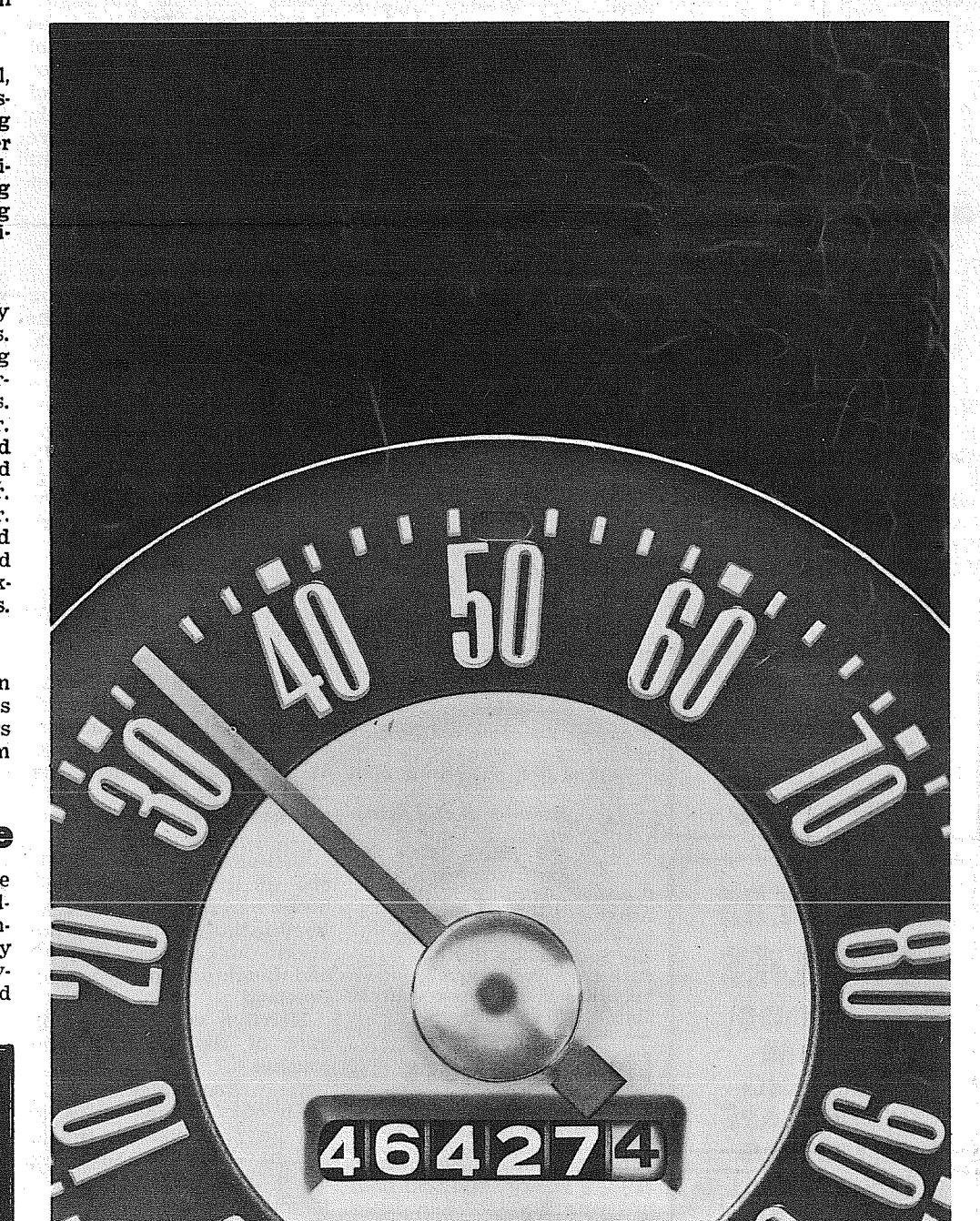
