who prefers to be identified, and one from a reader who, for reasons of his own, prefers to remain anonymous. --Editor)

Dear Mr. Brown:
Well, good for you. I read your article regarding UGN...I am with you 100%.
Wish I had that much nerve, but as you say, anymore it isn't what you want to do, it is do or else. I work too, and I know just how it goes. I'm even afraid to sign my name, but we sure did like your article.
Thank you for sticking up for everyone... A Reader

Dear Mr. Brown:
I have just read your article concerning the UGN which was printed

in the Times Journal Dec. 13th.
Enclosed is an article I wrote to the Tacoma News Tribune about this same situation. I also have written to Mr. Thor Tollefson and Mr. Warren Magnusen. Enclosed are the answers I received. Please note the answer I received from Mr. Magnusen. The letter I wrote to him was identical to the one printed in the Tribune yet, he assumes that his complaint was made because of the company by whom I am employed.
I am not employed by anyone, have no need to work as my husband provides a good living, we have an independent income, and also receive rent.

I wrote to them, Senator Magnusen and Representative Tollefson, because of extreme anger over the UGN collection tactics which actually amount to extortion at the National level.
I know personally of a young apprentice who would have lost his job if he had held out his "voluntary" contribution any longer. First, his foreman tried to make him sign up, two days in a row, when that failed, his boss had a "talk" with him. This young man is trying to pay for the tools necessary to his trade, making payments on a car, in order to get back and forth to work, paying board and room, paying Union Dues, and could not afford to lose his job. He was forced to sign up for the UGN.

Another man I know had eight years employment with a large company. His work was above reproach; he was well liked, honest, and extremely hard working. He also held seniority over every other employee in his division. When his employer attempted to force him to "donate" to the UGN so the company would have a 100% quota, he flatly refused. He told them he would give the amount he wanted to but not sign up for the amount they insisted on. From that time on he averaged two days of

work a week. Was told that work was slack and yet the other men not only worked steady but drew overtime. He stood it as long as he could and quit. This was a company he had worked honestly and loyally for, eight years!

A young soldier friend has told us that during the UGN drive a table is set up just past the paymaster. They must pass this table on their way out. Their "donations" are figured according to their rank. He says, and I quote, "They can't hold the money out of our pay, but God help the man that says he won't sign up!"

This whole UGN business has become a vile racket, apparently approved and condoned by the very people who should be more than willing to stop it and help preserve our freedom.

Mr. Warren G. Magnusen states that "this is not Government business". If it is not the business of our government to protect us from intimidation, coercion and massive extortion, then who's business is it? I realize this is a very long letter, but I am writing it for the many people who do not dare write and sign their names for fear of losing their jobs.

Please note that UGN President, Claude Pearson, says 60,000 people gave voluntary gifts. How many of those "voluntary" gifts were given in the ways I have stated?

Thank you for taking the time to read this and may you have better luck in helping the people than I have had.

By the way, I am 100% American and darned proud of it! My first husband died fighting the Germans to help preserve our freedoms, and the man who became my second husband fought the Japanese until he was so sick with malaria and jungle rot that he was sent home. I do not believe we should relinquish our principles and freedoms without a fight! If my one voice will help, then fight on, Sir. I am with you all the way.

open above Narada Falls to Paradise that will bypass several avalanche and snow slide areas which existed along the old road. The road to Paradise will be maintained for public travel throughout the winter except for periods when unusually heavy snowstorms and snowslides may delay the opening. During the winter months tirechains must be carried in all cars as their use will be required at any time necessitated by road conditions.

Although the severe storm of November 19 and 20 caused severe and rather extensive damage to the Paradise Road in the vicinity of Narada, Park crews have completed repairs so that the Paradise area may be ready for public use as scheduled, according to Rutter.

Park Travelers For November Show Increase

Travel to Mount Rainier National Park for November 1962 totaled 70,824 visitors, Superintendent John A. Rutter announced today. This is an increase of 43.6% over the travel for November 1961 when 49,314 visitors entered the Park. This trend follows the pattern of increased visitor use of National Park Service areas throughout the United States.

Rutter also pointed out that travel to the Park for the first eleven months of 1962 totaled 1,871,119 persons, an increase of 19% over the same period in 1961. A new yearly travel record has already been recorded in 1962 and the visitation in December will add to this record.

Ski tows at Paradise were placed in operation on December 1. These weekend facilities attracted a large percentage of the 2,905 visitors who entered the Park on the weekend of December 1 and 2. Winter weekend use will continue to increase as the snow accumulates at higher elevations in the

Park. At the present time there is 65 inches of snow at Paradise.

Rutter advised visitors to the Park to use extreme caution when driving over the ice and snow covered roads. Most of the winter time accidents can be avoided if motorists stay within their own lane of traffic and drive slowly so they can stop if necessary. He also emphasized that chains are mandatory when the large red sign "Chains Required on all vehicles" is up.

Achievement Awarded To Local Major

The Horse Bite

One of Farmer Brown's horses bit Susie as she was standing in the school yard. The horse was in a fenced-in pasture which adjoined the school grounds.

Susie had been standing next to the fence, along with several other children, some of whom had been teasing the horse. Suddenly the horse reached over the fence and bit Susie on the ear.

Susie and her parents sued Farmer Brown for the medical expenses incurred due to the injury to her ear.

Farmer Brown said he should not have to pay. "How was I to know that the horse would bite one of those kids? It never bit anyone before," he said.

Can he be held liable for the injury done by his horse?

No, said the court. The owner is only required to anticipate injuries that may result from the natural traits and habits of the animals, or from those unnatural traits and habits of the individual animal of which he had knowledge. The horse in this case had never shown any vicious tendencies before it bit Susie's ear.

Nor is it the natural trait of horses to bite people. The law does not require Farmer Brown to anticipate that children would tease a normally gentle horse to the point where it would reach over the fence and bite somebody. The court concluded that there was no evidence establishing any negligence on the part of Farmer Brown.

Susie was not entitled to collect damages.

During the summer of 1961 I had four teenage boys (15 years old) with me in the hills on a prospecting venture on the south side of Mt. Rainier at the 3,500 ft. level. Our laws permitted the twins to work there because their foster father was one of the partners in the venture. The other two boys were friends who were invited by the twins to go along for the experience. All four boys were decent kids and used no tobacco or alcohol and had none of the bad habits. No one got any monetary pay out of the work but all gained morally and spiritually as well as physically.

The work was hard. Very hard. The packs were heavy and the trail four to six miles long in very rough country.

we were sinking had to be pumped out by hand pumps. That kept two boys busy. Another boy worked the winch while the fourth boy handled the bucket. I worked in the bottom of the shaft filling the bucket.

When the water in the shaft began to get too deep for me, I yelled to the boys and there was a quick shifting to new hands on the pumps and the water level went down.

When boundary lines on the claim had to be run the boys all helped. Likewise, gathering fuel and attending to things necessary for survival in the forest, were all handled without complaint.

There was no juvenile delinquency there. Before dark we were all in our sleeping bags under the mosquito net. The boys asked questions and they were all answered from more than 60 years of my own experience. The boys improved much both mentally and physically thru their experience.

One day on the trail I was carrying a 95 lb. load. Three miles in, when I tried to climb over a stack of windfalls, my foot slipped and then I lost my hand hold and fell backward about six feet, landing on my pack

which burst open. (All pack mules land on their packs when they fall over a cliff.)

The boys, who were about 35 yards ahead of me, heard the crash and came back quickly to help me. I was not hurt but needed help to get my pack on my back again. I did not have to wait while the boys lighted a cigarette. They did not smoke.

The boys are past 16 now and are holding down a job. There is more digging to be done next summer but I do not yet know who will help. The boys never considered the work they did as WORK. It was fun for them.

When I told their mothers that the work they were doing was very hard,

they replied, "That is good for them." They were not worried about their "little angels." I thank God for such mothers.

There is a very great need for a change in our laws to enable these 14 and 15 year old boys to gain experience in these out of door adventures

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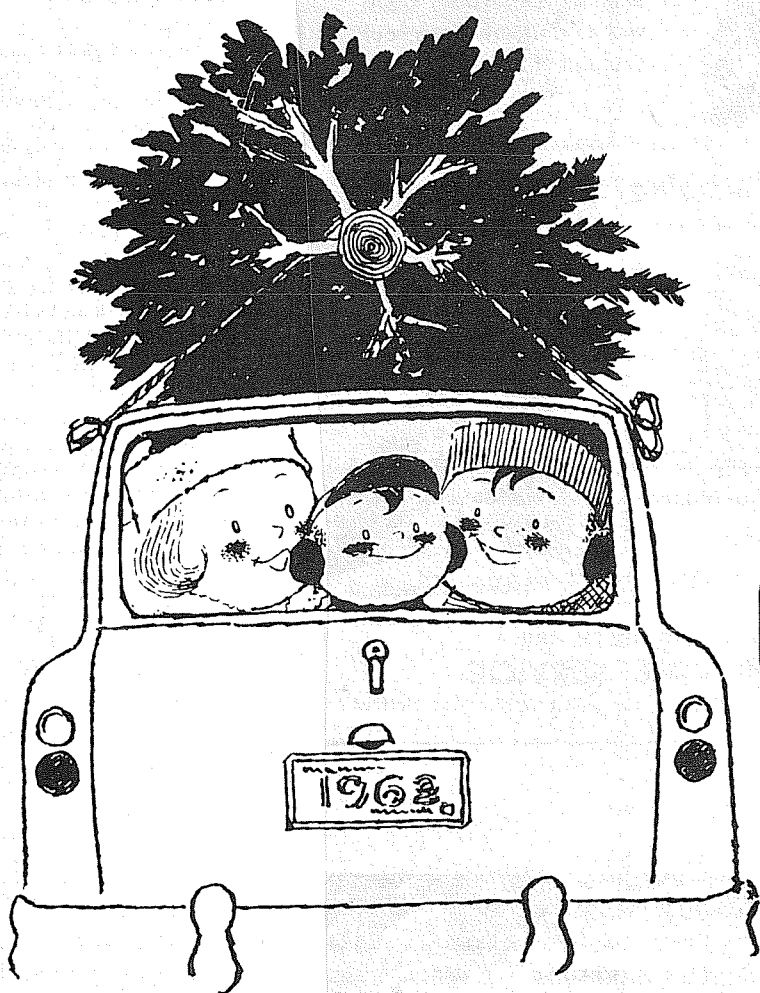

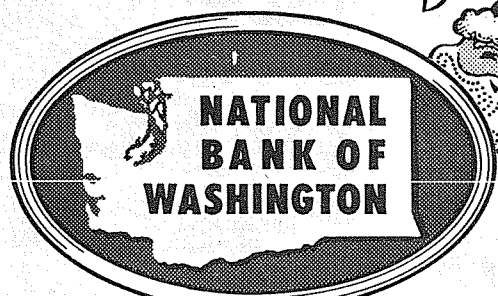

Road Closures, Slides Keep Park Crews Busy

The heavy rain and strong winds of last weekend added to the woes of maintenance crews at Mt. Rainier National Park, which was hard hit by the heavy November 19-20 storm, according to Superintendent John A. Rutter. The Park's road system suffered extensive damage at that time, and nearly all the Park's forces and equipment are being concentrated on repair activities. Much of the damage occurred to roads at high elevations where every day and hour is important in completing essential repairs before heavy snowfall occurs.

Rutter reports that rock and mud slides were numerous along the Paradise and Stevens Canyon Roads. Extensive sec-

tions of road shoulders were washed away. A short section of the Stevens Canyon Road was washed out, forcing its closure until next spring. Storms and extensive storm damage during the late fall season are frequently recorded in Mount Rainier National Park's history and brought about the following typical factors. A total of 5.88 inches of precipitation fell in 24 hours on 25 inches of snow or more at higher elevations. Temperatures remained above freezing. In a few short hours, water cascaded down the mountain sides over-flowing the smaller creeks and swelling the rivers to flood stage. Road ditches became torrents themselves, over-flowing across the road-

bed, washing away large sections of road shoulders, and leaving boulders and debris on the road surface. The Kautz Creek and Tahoma Creek Bridges across the Paradise road below Longmire were threatened and it became necessary to close the road at the Nisqually Entrance through-out the night of the 19th. However, the bridges survived the flood crest although channel improvement will be necessary to minimize danger from future torrents.

Superintendent Rutter states that first attention is being given the Paradise road so that normal snow removal operations can be carried out this winter and the public can use and enjoy the winter use facilities at Paradise as planned. Repairs have already progressed to the point where access to Paradise Valley will be possible this next weekend barring another severe storm. Rutter added, however, that the recent rain has practically depleted the snow accumulation at Paradise and new snow is necessary before satisfac-

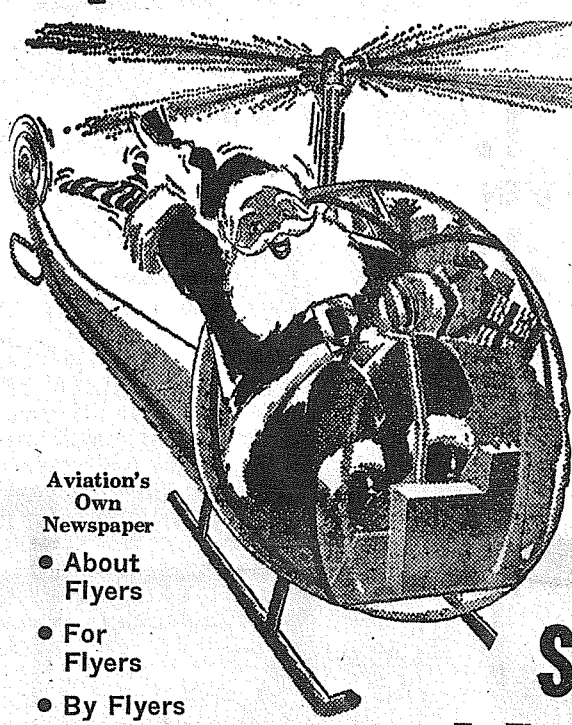

The Avalauncher, a carbon dioxide-powered cannon, will be used at three of 29 winter sports areas in the Pacific Northwest Region to reduce the avalanche hazards faced by skiers and other recreationists.

J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester, U. S. Forest Service, Portland, said snow avalanches sometimes threaten recreationists and improvements on at least three of the major ski areas—Mt. Baker, Stevens Pass, and Crystal Mountain, in the State of Washington. The new Avalauncher will be used in these areas. One of the devices is now on hand for use, Stone said.

The Avalauncher throws an explosive charge into a snow field which jars the snow field and brings down threatening snow before it can cause a harmful avalanche.

The major portion of the avalanche control work will be done with 75mm and 105 mm recoilless rifles, which project shells at long range. This control work is usually supplemented by hand-placed charges and by cutting of dangerous snow fields by skilled skiers. The new Avalauncher will supplement the hand-placed charges and the skier-control work.

Monty Atwater, a Forest Service employee who has gained national recognition in avalanche control, developed the Avalauncher, cooperating with the Diamond-King, Inc., of El Segundo, Calif. The device was inspired by a carbon dioxide baseball-throwing machine. It throws a 2 pound charge of high explosive powder from 300 to 500 yards. The Avalauncher is mobile and operates at low cost. It also has the advantage of being made commercially by private industry and will be readily available to winter sports area operators. The new Avalauncher can be used by anyone with proper training.

The limited range of the present Avalauncher greatly restricts its use. To overcome this problem, Diamond-King is developing a 1000-yard Avalauncher.

Skiers should be alert to avalanche dangers, especially following a heavy snowfall or an extended period of high winds, Stone reminded. All skiers who are interested in venturing away from established ski areas should, for their own safety, consult local Snow Rangers for advice on the location and degree of snow avalanche dangers which may exist.

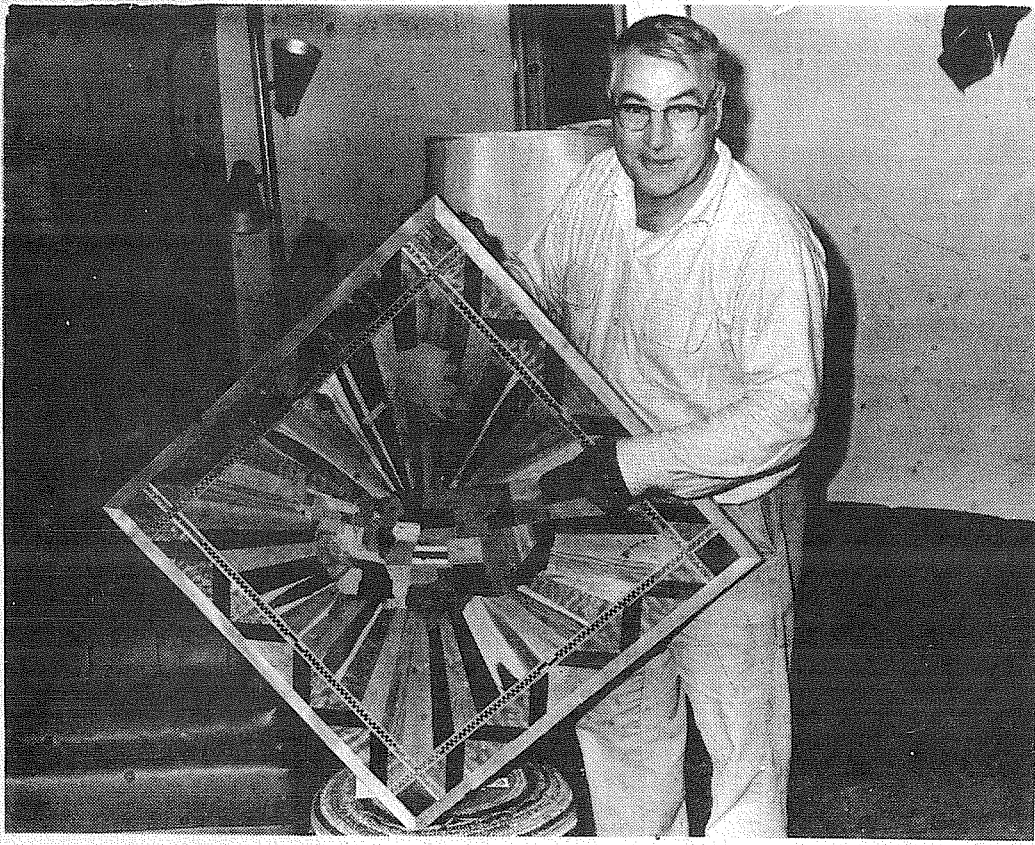

Air Survey Completes Timber Blowdown Picture

An aerial survey of blowdown timber left in the wake of the Columbus Day storm will be completed this weekend, weather permitting, according to J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester, U. S. Forest Service, Portland.
The cooperative survey will cover approximately 8 million acres of timberlands in western Washington and western and southern Oregon not already surveyed for blowdown. Lands involved are state, private, and federal (primarily National Forest and Bureau of Land Management).
The Forest Service, at the request of the Timber Disaster Committee of the Northwest Forest Pest Action Council, is coordinating all survey information and making the supplemental aerial surveys as needed to give coverage of an area totalling 22 1/2 million acres. The aerial project will fill the gaps in information already furnished by the state foresters of Oregon and Washington, private industry, National Forests, and Bureau of Land Management districts affected by the storm.
Completed surveys will show the estimated volume of timber blowdown and will provide a general map of the windfall damage by light, moderate, and heavy classifications. The aerial survey involves sketch mapping of blowdown areas.
Survey data will help point out problem areas and determine salvage goals, Stone said. Quick salvage is important to prevent outbreaks of insects, primarily the Douglas-fir beetle. It is important to prevent loss through decay and to reduce the fire hazard. The data also will be used as guides in determining need for reinventories of timber stands, probable effect on allowable cuts, and so forth.
Eight aerial observers and four aircraft are involved in the supplemental survey. Five observers are from four western regions of the Forest Service, one from the Bureau of Land Management, and one each from the states of Oregon and Washington. The men have been flying every day that visibility would permit.

Be patient with your stock when you are putting out a feeder for the first time. It may take sheep a little while to discover the feeding box and what it's for. Seasoning the feed with salt will make it more attractive.

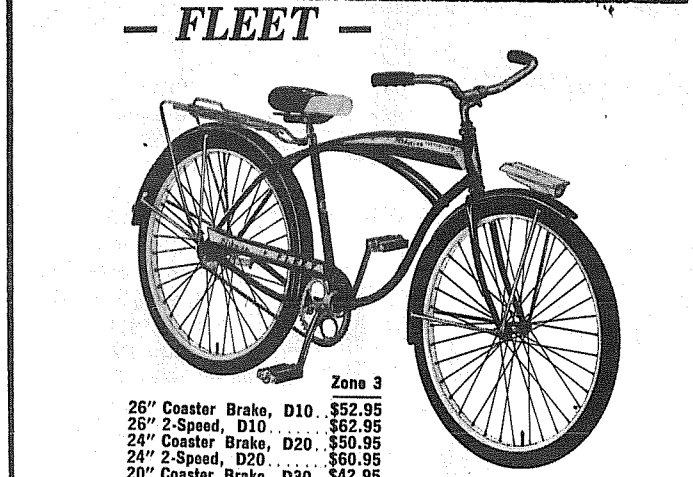
