One of Farmer Brown's Editor: horses bit Susie as she was standing in the school yard. The horse was in a fenced-in pasture which adjoined the school grou-

Susie had been standing next to the fence, along with several other children, some of whom had been teasing the horse. Suddenly the horse reached over the fence and bit Susie on the ear.

Susie and her parents sued Farmer Brown for the medical expenses incurred due to the injury to her ear.

Farmer Brown said he should not have to pay. "How was I to know that the horse would bite one of those kids? It never bit anyone before," he

Can he be held liable for the injury done by his horse?

No, said the court. The owner is only required to anticipate injuries that may result from the natural traits and habits of the animals, or from those unnatural traits and habits of the individual animal of which he had knowledge. The horse in this case had never shown any vicious tendencies before it bit Susie's ear. Nor is it the natural trait

of horses to bite people. The law does not require Farmer Brown to anticipate that children would tease a normally gentle horse to the point where it would reach over the fence and bite somebody. The court concluded that there was no evidence establishing any negligence on the part of Farmer Brown.

Susie was not entitled to collect damages.

When the water in the shaft began to get too deep for me, I yelled to the boys and there was a quick shifting to new hands on the pumps and the water level went down.

When boundary lines on the claim had to be run the boys all helped. Likewise, gathering fuel and attending to things necessary for survival in the forest, were all handled without complaint.

There was no juvenile delinquency there. Before dark we were all in our sleeping bags under the mosquito net. The boys asked questions and they were all answered from more than 60 years of my own experience. The boys improved much both mentally and physically thru their experience.

One day on the trail I was carrying a 95 lb. load. Three miles in, when I tried to climb over a stack of windfalls, my foot slipped and then I lost my hand hold and fell backward about six feet, landing on my pack pack mules land on their packs when they fall over a cliff.)

The twins, who were about 35 yards ahead of me, heard the crash and came back quickly to help me. I was not hurt but needed help to get my pack on my back again. I did not have to wait while the boys lighted a cigarette. They did not

The boys are past 16 now and are holding down a job. There is more digging to be done next summer but I do not yet know who will help. The boys never considered the work they did as WORK. It was fun for them.

When I told their mothers that the work they were doing was very hard,

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

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



Air Survey Completes Timber basketball. Blowdown Picture

An aerial survey of blowdown timber left in ing the wake of the Columbus Day storm will be completed this weekend, weather permitting, according to J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester, U. S. Forest Dervice, Portland.

The cooperative survey will cover approximately 8 million acres of timberlands in western Washington and western and southern Oregon not already surveyed for blowdown. Lands involved are state, private, and federal (primarily National Forest and Bureau of Land Management).

The Forest Service, at the request of the Timber Disaster Committee of the Northwest Forest Pest Action Council, is coordinating all survey information and making the supplemental aerial surveys as needed to give coverage of an area totling 22 1/2 million acres. The aerial project will fill the gaps in information already furnished by the state foresters of Oregon and Washington, private industry, National Forests, and Bureau of Land Management districts affected by the storm

Completed surveys will show the estimated volume of timber blowdown and will provide a general map of the windfall damage by light, moderate, and heavy classifications. The aerial survey involves sketch mapping of blowdown areas.

Survey data will help point out problem areas and determine salvage goals, Stone said. Quick salvage is important to prevent outbreaks of insects, primarily the Douglass-fir beetle. important to prevent loss through decay and to reduce the fire hazard. The data also will be used as guides in determining need for reinventories of timber stands, probable effect on allowable cuts, and so forth.

Eight aerial observers and four aircraft are involved in the supplemental survey. Five observers are from four western regions of the Forest Service, one from the Bureau of Land Management, and one each from the states of Oregon and Washington. The men have been flying every day that visibility would


